Once reports of the hearings are compiled, and once the two governmental entities vote to adopt their redistricting plans, a final report will be forwarded to the Department of Justice in Washington, D.C. for review and approval.

The City and County's redistricting plans differ only slightly from their current precinct alignments. For the most part, jagged boundary lines were straightened and moved slightly to even out population shifts in the districts. Every ten years new census numpers force governmental entities to determine if shifts in population are sufficient to warrant going through the redistricting process. In the case of the city and the county, it was determined that there is between the most populated and least populated districts. And, by federal standards, that is all that is required to begin the redistricting process. Similarly, racial and ethnic makeup of the districts is considered.

Visitors will only be allowed to enter with coins, and no more than \$20 at that.

The problem, the agency says, is that friends and family members of prisoners have been known to smuggle \$20 bills to inmates.

One way, they say, is by exchanging a contraband bill through a lingering kiss.





They returned to open session at 8:29 p.m. and accepted the resignation of Coach Ronnie Molina. They also approved the hiring of Vickie Williams of San Angelo as a Middle School teacher and coach. The Success has also learned that Beverly Massingill of San Angelo has been hired to serve as the district's top market value of the property Food Service Director. She is slated to begin work on July 10, 2001.

Supt. Blanch expressed his legislation allowing for the creation of a 4-3 redistricting plan. It was noted that the State Legislature passed a bill that would allow certain school districts like SCISD to adopt 4-3 systems. Under such a system, there would be 4 singlemember districts, and 3 at-large districts. The purpose is to allow the school to use the precinct lines adopted by counties as their single-member district boundaries. The trustees instructed Blanch to contact the district's lawyer, Sarah Leon, concerning the issue and to get her opinion if the 4-3 system would work here.

Blanch then advised the board that the district can expect an 18-20 percent increase in the cost of health insurance. Currently, the board buys its employee health insurance from Blue Cross and Blue Shield. Blanch said the increase will cost the district approx. \$50,000. The board expressed its concern that Blue Cross and Blue Shield is refusing to release employee experience histories so other insurance companies can be contacted for bids. The board instructed Supt. Blanch to contact to TASB's legal counsel about charging Blue Cross and Blue Shield with restraint of trade. It was noted that the property evaluation for the 2001-2002 tax year should increase by about \$18 million for the upcoming budget year. Trustee Eddie Albin said that while this may look promising at first glance, the trustees need to consider how the increased tax base will lower the district's effective tax rate. Albin cautioned that the district might not be able to raise enough money without being at risk of exceeding the roll back tax rate. That's the rate at which voters may choose to lower the school's tax rate. Before adjourning it was noted that the school's enrollment at the end of the 2000-2001 school year was 637.
