DANVILLE, Ill., Sept. 21 (AP) - Thirteen corporations and 16 officials who operate or serve the A&P Stores over the nation were convicted today of conspiring to control a substantial part of the country's food business.

An immediate appeal was planned by the New York Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, 12 of its subsidiaries and 16 of its officers who called the bench ruling of Federal Judge Walter C. Lindley "a severe blow" not merely to the chain but to its millions of patrons. "If upheld, it will mean less food on every dinner table and

less buying power in every pay envelope," the defendants said. Possible maximum penalties of a \$5,000 fine and a one-year prison sentence confronted each of the defendants on each of the two counts of a criminal information brought by the Department of Justice's anti-

MYSTERIOUS DEATH PROBED OF HOPE DIAMOND HEIRESS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (P)-A vague aura of mystery to night surrounded the death of 24-eyar old Evalyn McLean Reynolds, blonde heiress who lived under the shadow of the fabulous (and some say sinister) Hope diamond.

Coroner A. Magruder MacDonald gave a tentative verdict of "acute congestive heart failure," but said chemical tests will be made to determine whether sleeping pills had anything to do with the wealthy young matron's death.

Detective Sgt. Louis M. Snyder, after a "routine" investigation, said death was due to "apparent natural causes."

Mrs. Reynolds, wife of former Senator Robert R. Reynolds of North Carolina, was found unconscious in her bed late yesterday at the storied McLean estate, "Friendship." Her door had to be broken in to gain entry.

She was dressed in night clothing. Nearby stood a radio, tuned at normal volume, a bottle of sleeping medicine, and her pet dog. She was found by a physician, Dr. B. W. Leonard, who had

Maritime Agency Places Parity On Wage Rates

By The Associated Press

New York's waterfront was free of pickets for the first time in more than two weeks last night and the pool of approximately 450 strikebound ships in the harbor was returning to normal as CIO and independent seamen started back to work after winning parity in wage scales with AFL seamen.

The last pickets were withdrawn after the Marine Firemen, Qilers, Watertenders and Wipers Association, an independent union based on the West Coast, voted to end its strike in New York.

The action came as the maritime commission in Washington placed. maritime wage rates on a parity for the first time.

The commission directed that the marine firemen, last holdout union in the prolonged, costly maritime strike, should receive the same pay as that awarded to the CIO National Maritime Union by Arbitrator James L. Fly.

It never occurs to the average American that democracy is an exportable commodity, like automobiles and canned peaches. To him a democrat is a person who votes for the candidates of the Democratic Party, whose symbol is a donkey, probably stemming from Ignatus; Donnelly's famous wisecrack: "The Democratic Party is like a mule-without pride of ancestry or hope of posterity."

He seldom pauses to tot up the blessings of demoeracy as he lives it. He forgets that his ancestors had to pledge their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor to win individual freedom of conscience, and to break the evil power of a police state.

The idea that he should go off somewhere and spout democratic platitudes to the peoples of other lands never occurs to him. Sure, he likes, democraey; it is a way of life to him. But if the other fellow doesn't like it, that's just the other fellow's hard luck. If he brags, it is about his car or his hunting pup or his fishing tackle or his comfortable, gadgetfilled home, not about the institution called democracy which made them possible.

If he was a salesman for democracy in far lands, he was unconscious of it. He was just being himself. The world envied him his fine equipment, his plentiful and wholesome food, his independent spirit and his glow of health. If strangers interpreted all this to be products of democracy at work, well and good; the GI did not become an evangel of democracy, burning with a desire to convert others to his way of thinking.

Our brand of democracy is challenged today as never before; and we Americans should begin to think about the need of getting just a little uneasy about it. It has become fashionable for other isms to steal the name but not the principles of democracy. Arrests without warrant, executions without trials. the denial of free speech and worship, and the death of individual initiative and enterprise, are not democracy, but the antitheses of democracy.




