

The Woolen Mill was built by the late Joe Muller Christian and opened for business some sixty years ago. During World War II, the mill churned out thousands of wool army blankets. In recent years the mill fell into disrepair and, although the equipment continued to run, it became unprofitable. Faced with closure of the mill and the possible removal of much of the historic equipment, community leaders moved to purchase the mill.
