

### Road to new transportation system won't be stump free

AUSTIN - One of the first laws dealing with transportation in Texas provided that each county seat be connected by a first-class road.


Last Friday, Eldorado hosted Junction at Eagle Gym. The green and white Eagles totally dominated the game from start to finish and came away with a 25 point win,


