### State Bank Meeting.

At a meeting held by the stockholders of The Eldorado State Bank on Feb. 4th 1908, the following officers were elected, Directors, Robert Bailey, W. L. Aldwell, L. J. Wardlaw, E. M. Barbee and R. F. Halbert, Robert Bailey was elected President, W. L. Aldwell Vice President and J. A. Whitten Cashier.

The conditions of the bank was entirely satisfactory to the officers and stockholders, showing a net profit to the stockholders of \$1,776.63 or more than 10 per cent profit in less than 10 months time.

The directors set apart \$1,000.00 as a surplus fund and carried the balance \$776.63 as individual profit. After the election of officers the stock holders were banqueted and enjoyed a feast at which Oysters, Goat meat Wine, etc., were served.

In order to be certain of getting a stand of cotton, the land should be prepared sometimes before planting, so that it may settle and become compact. A compact, firm condition enables enough water to be drawn up from the subsoil to sprout the seed even in dry weather. A good plan is to list the cotton land in the fall, winter or early spring with two furrows of a turn plow. Then just before planting, the middles should be broken out. This gives a firm soil to plant in, and a nice clean bed for the plants, planting time usually marks the beginning of dry weather, when the farmer should begin to work to save moisture. If prepared just before planting, without previous listing, the land should be rolled, dragged or harrowed so as to make it firm. Often when the weather is dry cotton seed lie in the ground from April to June on account of being planted on a loose, fresh bed. Did you ever notice in a very dry season that the cotton or wheat came up well near a turnrow where the team had packed the ground, when it did not come up over the rest of the field?—Talpa Tribune.
