## The Winds of Springtime

March is the windy month in exas. Somebody told me the oth day, "It'd be all right if the wind didn't pick up that gritty dust." But then it wouldn't be Texas, would
 hose of New England. When m wife and I visited Mount Washing on in New Hampshire years ago we nearly froze in the snow, even hough we
mountain.
In his book "A Walk in the Woods", Bill Bryson relates a Salvatore Pagliuca, a meteorologist at the summit weather observatory on Mount Washington had an experience no one else has had before or since. Mount Washington gets a little gusty, to put it mildly. And this was a particularly breezy day.
During the previous twentyfour hours, the wind speed had hour and below 107 miles an hour and often gusted much higher. When it came time for Pa gluica to take the afternoon readings, the wind was so strong that he tied a rope around his waist and had two colleagues take hold of the other end.
The men had difficulty getting the weather station door open and needed all their strength to keep Pagliuca from becoming a kind of human kite. How he managed to reach his weather instruments and take readings is not known, nor are his words when he finally tumbled GEEEEEEEEEEE WHIZ!

What is certain is that Salvatore had just experienced a surface
ing approaching that velocity has ever been recorded elsewhere. "In The Worst Weather On
Earth, A History of the Mt. Washington Observatory", William Putnam writes, "There may be worse weather, from time to time, at some forbidding place on earth, but it has yet to be reliably recorded." Among the Mount Washington weather station's many other records are: most weather instruments destroyed, most wind in
twenty-four hours and lowest
windchill (a combination of 100 mph winds and a temperature of 47 degrees, a severity unmatched even in Antarctica).
Mount Washington receives 246 inches of snow a year. In 1969, eight feet of snow fell on the summit in three days. On average, the wind blows at hurricane force (over 75 miles an hour) two out of three days during the winter and $40 \%$ of days overall. Because of he length and bitterness of its winters, the average mean temperature at the summit is 27 degrees. The summer average is 52 degrees, a good 25 degrees lower than at its base. It is a brutal mountain and yet people go up there, or at least ry to, even in winter.

He estimated that the polymer would cost $\$ 15$ to $\$ 30$ per day, depending on the daily flow into the plant. City Secretary Carolyn Mayo updated the council on the city's finances and explained that revenue in the Sanitation Department has exceeded the budgeted amount by more than $\$ 34,000.00$. She noted that the windfall is coming from "tipping fees" paid to the city by Duncan Disposal, as well as the City of Rocksprings and the ment, all of which use the locat landfill.
The council then reviewed the monthly bills and ordered them to be paid. They also reviewed the ity's investment report.
In other business the council voted to pursue a grant through the Office of Rural Community Af fairs and to participate with Schleicher County in hopes of acquir ing a "Colonias" grant for the installation of new water and sewer ines in and around the Orien Heights addition, which lies outside the city limits.
The council also authorized the city staff to update an inter-local agreement with Schleicher County and to review agreements with the Chamber of Commerce and the Chamber Pride Committee con cerning the operation of several cerning the operation of several parks in town. They also autho rized the hiring of a part-time perCity Hall.
