
Three Schleicher County ranches to receive • **Family Land Heritage Awards from TDA**

Auta Mae Bradshaw, Bessie Westbrook and Kathleen St. Clair will be among 114 Texas ranchers and farmers being honored tomorrow, Friday, March 15, 2002, by the Texas Department of Agriculture. The three women will receive the Family Land Heritage Award, denoting their families' continuous ownership and operation of ranches in Schleicher County since 1901. Each year since the inception of the program in 1974, farm and ranch owners with a family heritage of 100 years or more on the same piece of land are honored by the TDA. To date, only one Schleicher County Ranch has been so honored, that being the Coralina Ranch, established in 1883 and honored in 1985.

Now comes three ranches, two owned by sisters, that have been continually owned and operated by a single family for 100 years.

The Bradshaw Ranch and the Westbrook Ranch are part of the M. M. Reynolds Estate. Myrtle (Porter) Reynolds took up school lands in 1901, claiming four sections 17 miles east of Eldorado. Myrtle's father and brother, Jerome and Charles, had each claimed four sections in 1895. Part of that land is still in the M. M. Reynolds Estate owned by Auta Mae Bradshaw and J.R. 

Ron Stone, a well-known Texas broadcaster and historian, will be serving as master of ceremonies. Red Steagall, noted Texas cowboy poet and songwriter, will perform following the certificate presentation. The Family Land Heritage Program has honored 3,580 properties through the year 2000.







In statewide contested races, Laredo businessman Tony Sanchez easily defeated former Attorney General Dan Morales for the Democratic nomination for Governor and the right to face **Republican Governor Rick Perry** in the November General Election. With 97.2 percent of precincts reporting Sanchez had 62.7 percent of the vote, easily avoiding a runoff.

Republican Attorney General John Cornyn easily defeated a field of four other candidates to win the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate seat currently held by Phil Gramm. Cornyn, who polled 80 percent in the G.O.P. primary, won't know who his opponent will be until a runoff election decides the winner between Victor Morales and U.S. Rep. Ken Bentsen in the Democratic primary.






