A general meeting for all teachers will follow at 9 a.m. in

the auditorium of the high school. Completing Thursday's events will be a map and globe workshop from 10 a.m. to 12 for all teachers. This workshop will be held in the high school cafeteria by Nystrom Company, followed by all teachers reporting to their respective school from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. All teachers are to report to their respective schools Friday, August 25 and remain for 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Elementary pupils are to register during the morning hours.

Monday, August 28 at 8:30 a.m., all teachers are to be at their respective schools. At 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. An elementary Physical Education workshop will be held by Filmore Hendrix Texas Education Agency either in the high school

cafeteria or Junior high school gym. A full day has been scheduled for Tuesday, August 29 with teachers to be at respective schools from 8:30 to 10:30 and general assembly will be held in the high school auditorium at 11 a.m.

The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce will honor all teachers at a luncheon to be held in the high school cafeteria from 1:45 to 1:30 p.m. Following the luncheon, all teachers are to report back to their respective schools from 2 to 4:30 p.m.

This concludes the pre-school teacher activities before classes begin at 8:15 a.m. the following day, Wednesday, August 30.

University Professor to Speak At Annual Teachers Dinner Here

Dr. Robert K. Leigh, Associate Professor of Education and Psychology at West Texas State University will be the speaker at the Muleshoe Classroom Teachers Dinner, August 22, at 8 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church.

Dr. Leigh holds degrees from Baylor University, Northwestern University, Garrett Theological Seminary, and the University of Houston.

Dr. Leigh's teaching experience has been varied at the public school and college levels, both in Texas and California. In addition, he has been active in professional, civic, and religious work.

He is a member of Alpha Chi, Phi Delta Kappa, and Kappa Delta Pi. He has been chairman of the California Association of Professors in Elementary Education, and was the coordinator of the Gifted Children's Program between California State College at Long Beach and Long Beach Unified School District.

In 1961 he was a delegate from Texas to the National Education Association. While

teaching at Port Arthur, he was president of the Port Arthur Classroom Teachers Association and a member of the Southeast Area C.T.A. Coordinating Council.

Last Wednesday, Billy accidentally became entangled in a power take-off shaft on farm machinery. He was taken to Amherst Hospital where he underwent surgery and treatment for the leg injury.

With the son under the doctor's care, Byron went back to the farm to complete the work started by his son.

One hour and one-half later, you guessed it Byron was admitted to the emergency room in Amherst hospital and was immediately wheeled into the operating room for surgery and treatment on his leg, same side as that of his son.

Byron had also become entangled in the same power take-off. His leg was more seriously injured than his son, Billy's.

Both remain in Amherst hospital.

Plant Planned At Hub Location

Hub is the next spot on the area map eyed by progressive Friona businessmen for a manufacturing plant.

A cattle feed manufacturing plant which will make use of cotton burs is to be built south of Hub, the Friona group announced.

Burs have been secured from all Friona gins for the coming ginning season and negotiations have been made with Bovina and Lazbuddie gins while others in the immediate area are incomplete.

The plant expects to use burs from some 12 gins in manufacturing a pellet containing eight percent protein and four percent fats. This is more food value than is contained in cotton seed hulls, long used as a source of cattle food.

The plant will be located three miles south and one-half mile west of Hub. Dehydrating equipment will be installed to process alfalfa hay, haygrazer and other crops of this nature. The burs will be a winter project at the plant with other crops utilizing the plant during the summer.

The plant will employ seven or eight persons during peak production, A.L. Black said. Black was spokesman for the group of Friona businessmen who are financing the new plant. A manager is expected to be named in the near future.

The group plans a November opening date for the plant in order to use burs from the upcoming cotton crop.

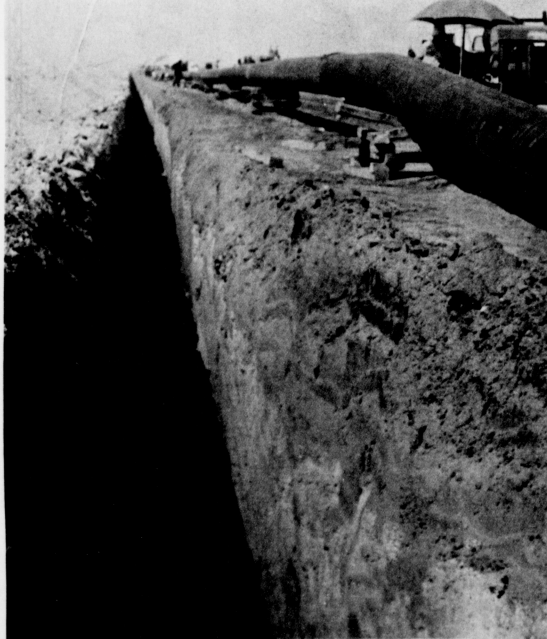
Officials Attend District Dallas Leaders Conference

Field Day

An exhibit, showing the results of fertilizer application compared to non-fertilized plants of the same crop will be a new feature in the Field Day program at the High Plains Research Foundation Thursday afternoon, September 14. The effect of the use of herbicides and insecticides will also be displayed. Various products and their uses in fertilizer, herbicides and insecticides will also be shown. This new feature will be presented by the committee on fertilizer, herbicides, and insecticides, headed by Ralph Wheeler, Chairman. The exhibit will be located in the head house of the Jim Hill Greenhouse which is attached to the Southwest corner of the High Plains Building. Other research on various varieties of soybeans can be seen in the greenhouse adjacent to the exhibit. Members of the committee will be hosts to the Field Day visitors during the entire afternoon at the exhibit. This committee is recommending \$1.50 additional fertilizer and two more herbicide research projects for 1968. Their proposals will be studied at the semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees on the morning of September 14. For the fourth year an exhibit of cotton varieties, cotton products and gin equipment will be included in the Field Day exhibits. This exhibit has been popular on previous Field Days. The twenty six laboratory gin building will be the site of the cotton exhibit. Donald Johnson, Chairman of the Foundation Cotton Research Committee and Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, and his committee will be hosts at the display during the afternoon. This Cotton Committee will also make recommendations for future cotton research programs to the Board of Trustees.

Bill Introduced To Allow Teachers To Deduct Costs

A bill to allow teachers to deduct costs of educational expenses was introduced by Congressman Bob Price last week. Price joined other Republicans in co-sponsoring the measure which, he said, was needed because of constantly rising education costs and would be an incentive for a teacher to further his or her education and in turn, upgrade our educational system. Price said adjustments made by the Internal Revenue Service are not enough and that presently, educational expenses must be itemized with other deductions and, together, exceed the amount of standard deduction. "Also," Price added, "present regulations do not include expenses for education which will qualify a teacher for a new trade, position, business or specialty." "This may restrict a teacher from furthering his qualifications which might lead to administrative positions and there are other restrictions which should be removed," Price said. Deductible expenses in the Price bill would also include travel expenses.

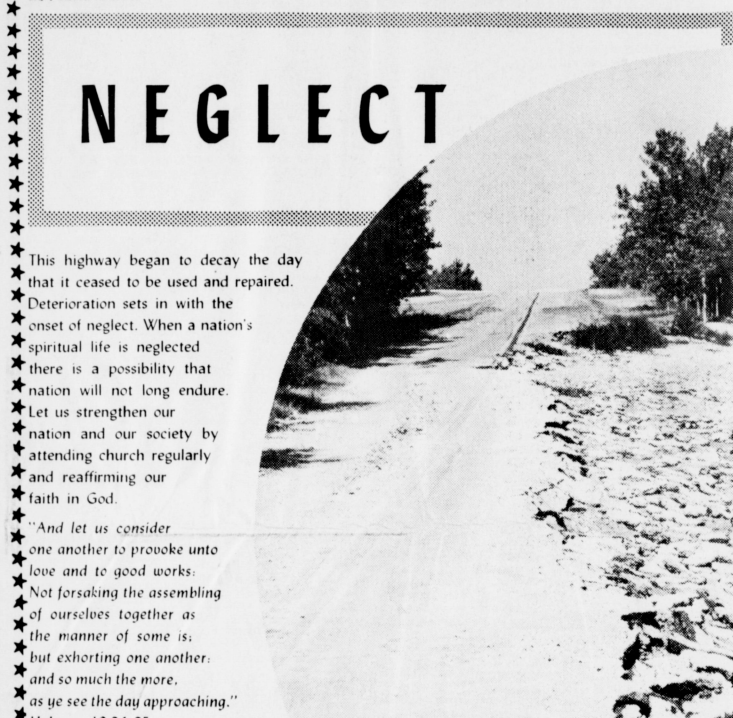
Charles Armstrong Is Trainee Grad From Amarillo AFB

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that while said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or precinct law enforcement official is hospitalized or incapacitated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salary; providing, however, that said payment of salary shall continue to the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however, that no provision contained herein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or nullify Article 16, Section 31, of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

USING INSTANT FLOUR

When using instant flour there's more in the cup than meets the eye.

For best results one should take 2 level tablespoons out of each cup of flour called for by the recipe, because a full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe, designed for regular flour, may alter the shape, texture and flavor of the final product.

Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles. This takes up less space in a measuring cup. Therefore, instant flour mixes more readily with water without forming lumps and is a handy product for making gravy.

In baking, instant flour weighs more per cup and takes up liquid faster than regular flour, leaving too much flour for the dough in relation to the liquid.

For example, in popovers, the batter doesn't contain

enough for the product to "pop" properly.

The Agricultural Research Service suggests improving the taste and appearance of pastry by adding more fat to the dough. Some companies making instant flour suggest that extra fat be added to the product to help overcome the tendency of instant flour to soak up water.

Although a little extra fat helps, researchers warn that adding extra water to the dough is no solution. This destroys the proper balance between ingredients and tends to ruin the baked product.

POTATOES AND CALORIES
Do you refuse potatoes because you feel they are too high in calories?

Remember, no food is fattening until your body's need for calories has been met. Surplus food from any source is stored as fat and stored in the body.

One medium-sized potato, 5 ounces, supplies 90 calories.

This is about the same as a medium-sized apple, pear, grapefruit or orange, none of which is considered a high-calorie food.

Added fat and gravy, often served with potatoes, do increase the calorie count considerably. For example, fried potatoes may be two to three times as high in calories as the same weight of boiled or baked potatoes. And the sour cream or butter or margarine added to the baked potato for tastiness also add up in the calorie category.

But, it's not the potatoes that add pounds, it's the surplus calories from other sources.

SUMMER CLOTHING CARE

Summer time living can be hard on hot weather wardrobes, so clean your clothes regularly.

Try the following short cuts on summertime clothes care. Swish bathing suits through warm soap or detergent suds after each swim. Bright sun, sand, salt water and oily or chlorinated fresh water all constitute bathing suit hazards and plain water alone won't do the job.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of the obligations that may be issued by the Veterans Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) for the purpose of providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto.

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas known as the State of Texas Veterans Land Board, which has been designated the Veterans Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional amendments as modified hereinafter. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in financial matters, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in legal matters, and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in financial matters. One (1) such citizen shall be appointed by the Governor and one (1) such citizen shall be appointed by the Legislature. The members serving on said Board shall complete the term of their office on the date of their appointment. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans Land Program and shall have the authority to issue bonds or obligations as now or may hereafter be provided by law. The absence or illness of the Commissioner shall be filled by the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board and shall have the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

The inspection fee has been raised 75 cents this year and will be \$1.75 per vehicle. This fee will be charged at the Inspection Station for every inspection made, whether approved or rejected. However, all Inspection Stations will be required to reinspect free of charge any vehicle rejected by it after necessary adjustments have been made within a period of seven days.

"When a Division of said Fund (such Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to this Act) shall be authorized and the lands purchased therewith contains sufficient moneys to retire all principal and interest on such bonds, the moneys thereon, except such portion as may be set aside for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses here authorized, shall be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds, as may be prescribed by law. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of said moneys for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds, unless such moneys are first deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds, as may be prescribed by law.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, that Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows: "Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor, vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called 'Texas Park Development Bonds' and shall be issued in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual rate of interest that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund and administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

The men of the 524th TFS gave her a MacAuster Award -- said she was the prettiest pilot ever have flown with the famed "Hounddogs" -- and the Captains Williams now had one more thing in common.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely: general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows: Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital district; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

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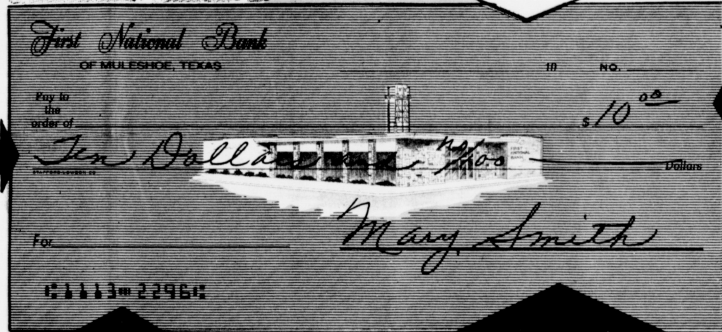
