

The district teams all have a Total Station, a surveyor's device used to map an area by measuring angles and distances using geometric and trigonometric techniques. Many Total Stations include a Theodolite, an optical device that shoots a laser to a prism held by officers at specific points around the scene. In complicated cases, teams may take up to 400 measurements from different spots.
