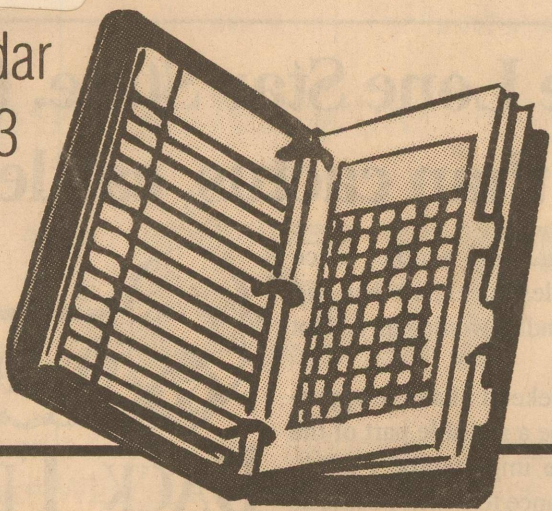


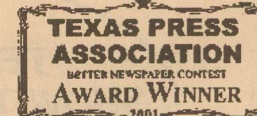

## Newman resigns as EHS principal

### Trustees adopt calendar for 2002-2003 school year

Eldorado High School Principal Ken Newman will be leaving his post at the end of this school year. News of Newman's resignation came Monday evening during the monthly meeting of the Schleicher County ISD board of trustees.

Following the board's formal vote to accept the resignation, Board President Phil McCormick told Newman, "We accept your resignation with regret and applaud you for your years of service to Schleicher County ISD and we applaud your accomplishments here."

Newman is in his twenty-second year of service at SCISD. When asked after the meeting about his future plans Newman said he hoped to take a year off before getting back into counseling. Before taking the job as EHS principal, Newman served several years as a high school counselor.

In other business the trustees adopted a new calendar for the 2002-03 school year (See calendar on Page 4).

Under newly enacted legisla-

tion, Texas schools are prohibited from beginning their fall semester before Monday, August 19, 2002, and that's exactly when SCISD students will be required to report to class. The final day of the first semester will be on Friday, December 20. Students will return to class following a two-week Christmas break on Monday, January 6, 2003. Classes will let out for the summer on Friday, May 23.

SCISD Superintendent George Blanch noted that school districts wanting to begin class before August 19, may do so, but only after seeking public input and obtaining a waiver from the Texas Education Agency.

The trustee meeting had been delayed by a week due to Spring Break. It was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Board President Phil McCormick. Trustees Eddie Albin, Kurtis Homer, Berta Nicholson, Jo Helen Kotsch and Steve Sessom were in attendance. Trustee Sam Whitten, Jr. was absent.

Among other business the trustees heard a report from Middle School Principal Julie Griffin who updated the board on activities on her campus. She explained

that thus far the school year has been busy and reported only two fights and far fewer problems than last year. Griffin noted that the new lunch schedule required her students to visit the cafeteria in two shifts. "That spread the kids out more and allowed for more supervision," Griffin said.

She noted that, with the approach of April 16, the date of the upcoming TAAS tests, the anxiety level is up a bit on her campus. "There are some new things on the test this year and the teachers are uncertain what to expect," Griffin explained. She added that next year her students will be facing the brand new TAKS Test for the first time. (Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills.)

Griffin concluded her report by praising the work of her staff saying, "I have one of the best faculties in the state of Texas."

The board reviewed the district's financial reports and heard from Finance Director Loretta Edmiston who advised that the school had received two "School to Work" grants totaling \$1,000.00. The grants, received by teachers Angela Case and Sharon Spinks are offered by Howard College. Edmiston also told the trustees that the district had received a new school bus, as well as a new Chevrolet Astro van, ordered previously.

Next the board okayed the min-

utes of the Feb. 11 meeting and approved all science book titles as part of the annual text book selection process. Local teachers will be able to choose textbooks from the approved list.

The board then reviewed and approved the District Improvement Plan. Notable among the plan's goals are: improve reading comprehension in grades 3-10; ensure that all students are performing mathematical calculations at or above grade level; and improve attendance to 97 percent. The attendance goal was increased from 94 percent. SCISD currently has a 96 percent attendance rate. Supt. Blanch noted that the new goal will be difficult to attain but will give his staff something to strive for.

In other business the trustees approved six out-of-district field trips and briefly discussed a trip to Asilomar, California by the Annenberg/Rural Trust group. It was noted that while all of the travel expense and most of the meal expense for that trip is being funded through the Annenberg Grant, some of the meals for adult sponsors will not be covered. After being assured by Supt. Blanch that the program has enough funds to cover the expense, the board took no action on the matter.

In a related matter, the trustees learned that the final request for

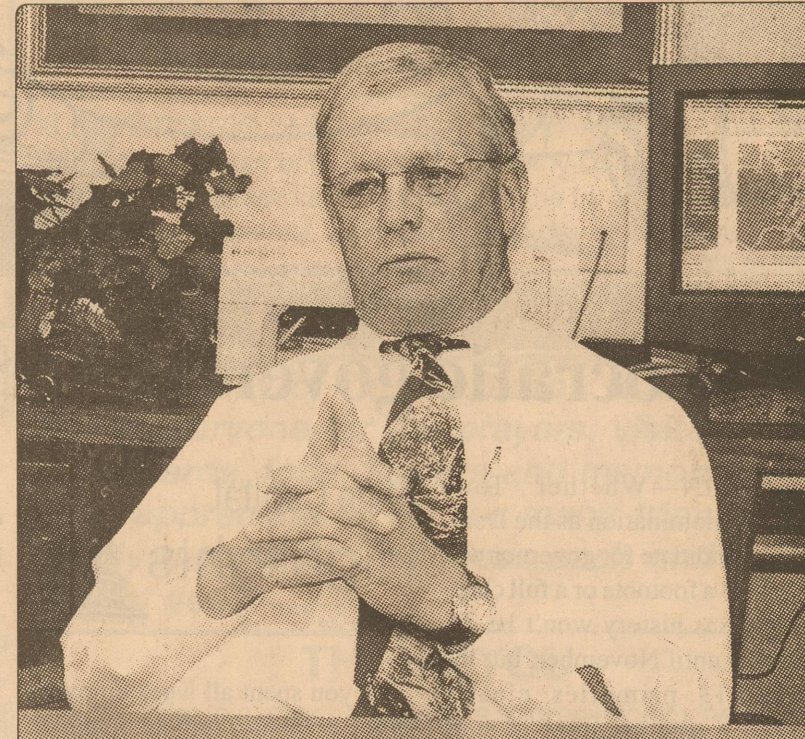

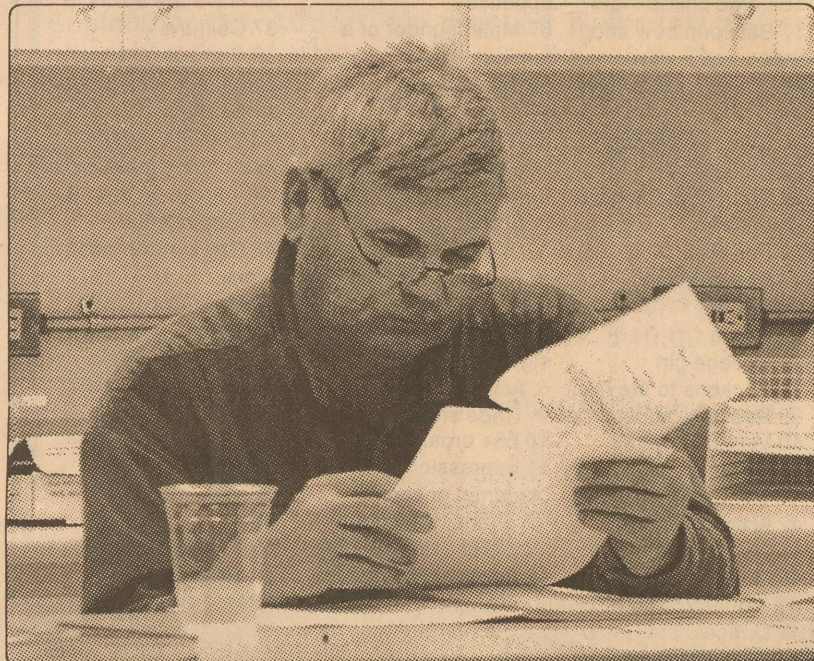

## Governor Perry appoints William Edmiston to TAHC

Dr. William Edmiston Jr. of Eldorado was one of five persons named by Texas Governor Rick Perry this week to the Texas Animal Health Commission. Edmiston is a rancher and owner of Eldorado Veterinary Clinic.

Edmiston is currently president of the Texas Scrapie Certification Board. He is a member of Texas Veterinary Medical Association, American Veterinary Medical Association and past president of the Sheep and Goat Predator Management Board. He was named Outstanding Conservationist of 1999 by the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservationist District. He earned his bachelor's degree at Texas A&M University and his

Doctor of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine.

Others appointed by Gov. Perry included Richard Traylor of Carrizo Springs, Rogelio "Roy" Martinez of McAllen, Jerry Windham of College Station and Jill Bryar Wood of Wimberley. All terms will expire on September 6, 2007 and are subject to approval by the Texas Senate.

Perry also named Richard Traylor as presiding officer of the commission. The TAHC is made up of twelve appointed board members. The purpose of the commission is to protect and enhance the health of Texas animal populations.

## Comptroller Rylander delivers sales tax rebates

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander delivered last week \$271.3 million in monthly sales tax payments to Texas cities, counties, transit departments and special purpose taxing districts. Sales tax allocations to local governments are down 2.4 percent compared to the \$278.2 million paid in March 2001. So far this year, local sales tax allocations are down 0.2 percent compared to the first three months of 2001.

March sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in January and reported to the Comptroller in February. The state's share of sales tax collected during this period was \$1.2 billion, down 1.5 percent compared to a year ago.

Comptroller Rylander sent March sales tax rebates of \$181.9 million to 1,115 Texas cities, down 1.8 percent compared to March 2001. March sales tax rebates of \$15.9 million went to 121 Texas counties, up 3.7 percent compared to one year ago.

In the allocation, the City of Eldorado received \$5,521.67, down 6.56 percent from the March payment last year of \$5,909.82. So far this year, the city has received \$20,633.86, a decline of 9.63 percent from 2001 when the city re-

ceived \$22,833.12 at this point in the year.

Schleicher County's sales tax rebate this month totalled \$4,412.43, down 42.85 percent from the \$7,721.03 received in March, 2001. Year-to-date, the county has received \$18,486.06. That's down 22.32 percent from \$23,799.79 received during the same period last year.

The Schleicher County Health Service tax rebate for March was \$5,296.56, down 33.33 percent from March, 2001's total of \$7,945.11. The year-to-date total for the Health Service tax stands at \$13,896.75. That's a decline of 39.08 percent from the same period last year.

As in the last two months, the steep decline in Schleicher County's sales tax rebate, as well as the Health Service tax rebate, is mostly attributable to an overpayment the Comptroller made to the county last year. That money is now being withheld, a practice that will continue until the overpayment is recovered by the state.

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation is scheduled for Friday, April 12, 2002 and will be reported the following week in the Eldorado Success.

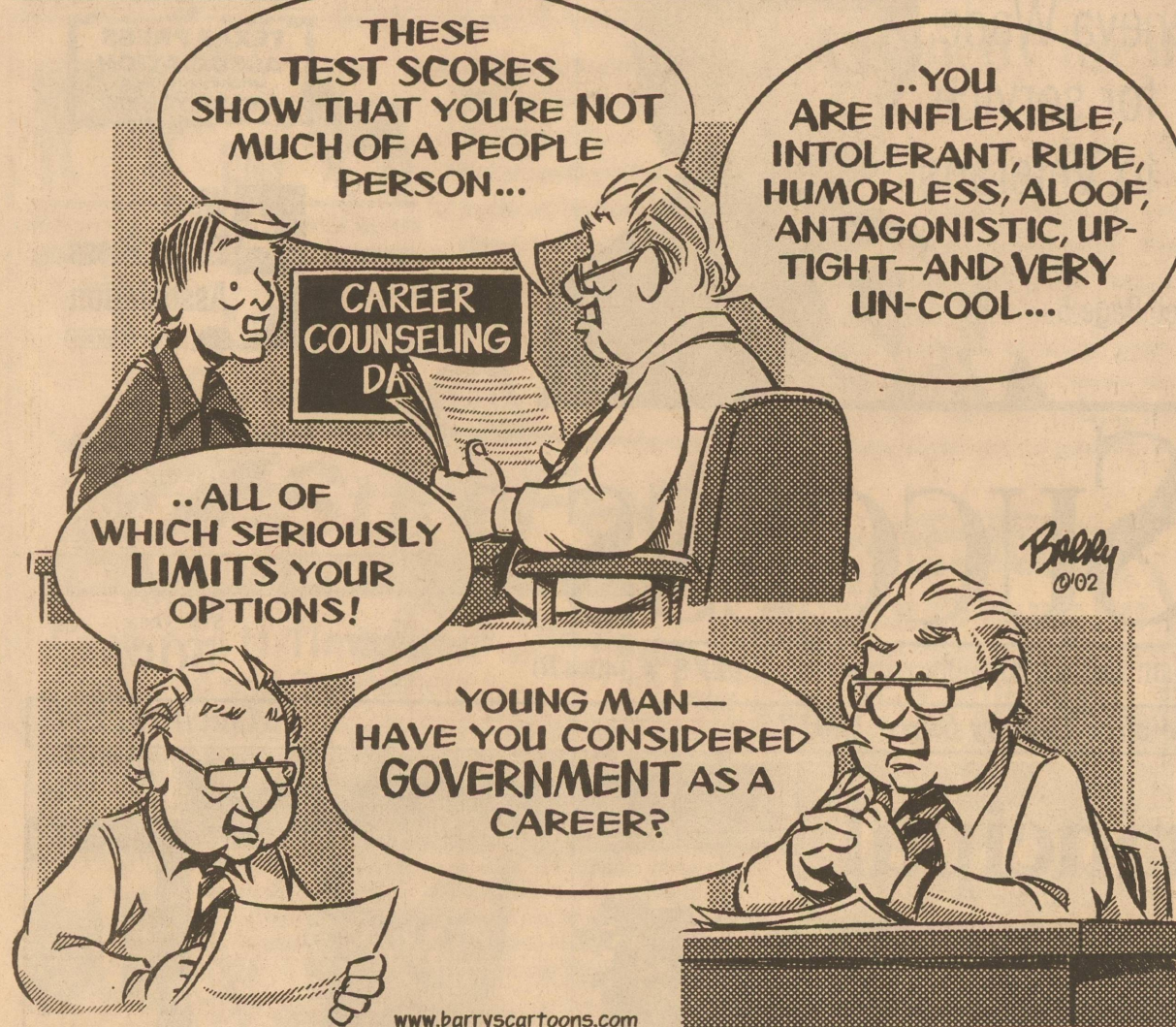
What's this stuff — Elementary Principal Bob Wanoreck spent part of the afternoon Tuesday escorting students to their parents' cars after a rare afternoon shower.

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## Democratic governor's candidate makes history

AUSTIN—Whether Tony Sanchez' nomination as the Democratic candidate for governor will amount to a footnote or a full chapter in Texas history won't be determined until November, but the March 13 primaries clearly marked a turning point in state politics.

Never before in Texas has a Hispanic gotten the electoral nod to run for governor. If the Laredo businessman can defeat Republican incumbent Rick Perry this fall, Sanchez would become Texas' first Hispanic governor since statehood in 1845.

If you spent all week enjoying spring break in a remote mountain cabin somewhere or on the beach, Sanchez received 60.99 percent of the vote in the Democratic primary against former Attorney General Dan Morales, who got 32.80 percent of the votes cast.

In real numbers, of 1,024,814 votes cast for governor in the Democratic primary, Sanchez got 624,991 votes to 336,102 for Morales.

Republican Gov. Rick Perry, of course, had no opposition in his party's primary.

The other big contest in the Democratic primary was the race for the U.S. Senate nomination. Former Dallas mayor Ron Kirk, the perceived frontrunner, came in a close second to Victor Morales, putting them in a runoff.

Morales got 325,896 votes (33.45 percent) to Kirk's 320,576 votes (32.91 percent.)

Though every major Texas office holder is a Republican, the state's Hispanic population may be poised to swing Texas back to its Democratic roots in the future.

Hispanics accounted for more than a third of the votes cast in the Democratic primary, possibly as high as 36 percent.

"This is a real trend-setter," political analyst William C. Velasquez told the San Antonio Express-News after the election.

Beyond that, it means a doozy of a political campaign over the next 33 weeks.

And neither candidate wasted any time in getting down to cases.

"He's very experienced at being a professional politician," Sanchez said of Perry. To that he added that Perry has "never made a sincere outreach to the Hispanic community the way I believe it should be made."

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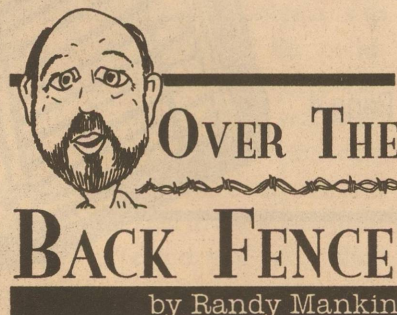
## The Lone Star State, there's more to it than cactus, cattle and oil wells

Yes, "fixinto" is an actual word. So are "backards" and "forards"... "onced" and "twiced."

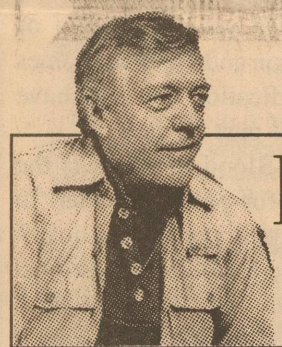
The sound of coyotes howling at night only sounds good for the first couple of weeks.

### The Battle For Iwo Jima

The original Iwo Jima Monument is on the campus of the Marine Military Academy in Harlingen. It was created by Dr. Felix de Weldon in 1954 and depicts the flag raising on the island of Iwo Jima during World War Two. The bronze version is in the Arlington National Cemetery. It is the world's tallest bronze statue.

Dr. de Weldon was going to donate the original (made of gypsum) to his son's school in Rhode Island, but that school did not do anything patriotic, like pledge the flag. Dr. de Weldon called the Pentagon to seek a place for his original, which had been in storage for years. The Pentagon suggested the Marine Military Academy in Harlingen.

It was originally intended to be sent to Harlingen from Rhode Island by train, but the head of a trucking association in Texas convinced Dr. de Weldon that the train trip would damage the statue, so it was moved by trucks to Harlingen in April of 1982.

Iwo Jima was the US Marine Corps' costliest battle. Americans suffered 26,000 casualties. Nearly 7,000 died. Of the 23,000 Japanese defenders, only one thousand survived.

The island, five miles long and two miles wide, was crucial to the United States. It was heavily armed with huge cannons that fired on American planes en route to Japan. The Marines landed on February 19, 1945, expecting a three day battle. It lasted 26 days.

One of the historians of that battle is Ed Swaney of Harlingen, who served on the USS Nevada,

the flagship of the Pacific fleet sent to provide cover for the Marines on the ground. He has written about the battle and narrated a video, which is available in a museum near the monument in Harlingen.

The Japanese soldiers with their heavy artillery were hidden in caves and catacombs. They had erected barriers around the island that made landings almost impossible.

The US troops found a foothold by February 23 and raised the American flag on Mount Suribachi, the highest point on the island. Joe Rosenthal, an Associated Press Photographer, snapped a picture of the flag raising. The next day, when the photo appeared on the front page of virtually every newspaper in America, it became an instant symbol for millions of people on the home front, an indelible portrait of patriotism and determination.

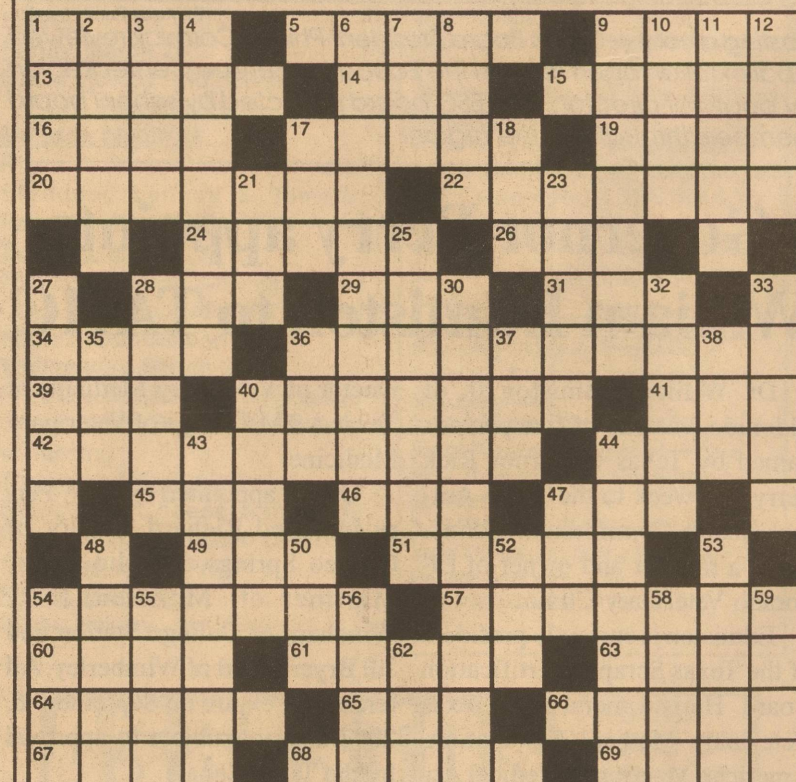
Three of the five men who raised the flag were killed in action a few days later in a mortar attack. One of them was Corporal Harlon Block of Weslaco, Texas.

Japanese guns had to be eliminated. It was usually one Marine against one enemy cave. As each one was destroyed, the menace of Iwo slowly lessened. Innumerable cases of hand-to-hand combat occurred and there were countless cases of individual heroism. It was a landmark of mass courage and individual valor and a battle the likes of which mankind most probably will not witness again. The Japanese surrendered the island on March 16, 1945.

funds for the Annenberg/Rural Trust Program will be made on March 30, 2002, and that all funds must be expended on or before June 30, 2002.

The board then reviewed ballots for board of directors of Education Service Center Region XV. Several members cast their ballots and handed them in to Supt. Blanch.

At 6:45 p.m. the board then entered into executive session for the purpose of discussing teacher contracts as well as the contracts of program directors and counselors. Resignations and "other personnel items" were also listed on the agenda for the closed-door session.

Joining the board in executive session was Supt. Blanch. The three campus principal, Bob Wanoreck, Julie Griffin and Ken Newman, were also called into the session one at a time.

The group emerged into open

session at 8:30 p.m. and voted unanimously to approve all contracts, as recommended by Supt. Blanch. They then moved to accept Principal Ken Newman's resignation.

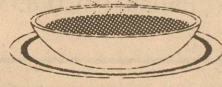
Before adjourning the board heard from Supt. Blanch on several information items. He advised that student enrollment now stands at 627 and advised that preliminary information indicates that property values in Schleicher County will decline by 15 to 20 percent, due mostly to the decline in oil and gas prices. Blanch also advised that a lawsuit brought by Duke Energy against the Schleicher County Appraisal District had been settled and that SCISD's portion of a refund to Duke will amount to \$21,000.00.

### Letter to Voters of Schleicher County, Precinct 4

Congratulations to Matt Brown, my counterpart in Republican Primary for County Commissioner, and Good luck in the General Election in November.

Thanks to my supporters for your vote in the Republican Primary. With the primary falling during Spring Break, I appreciate the extra effort to vote early or change family plans to be able to vote.

My apologies to those voters who tried to vote for me, but were unable to, because of changes to the precinct boundaries by the Justice Department about February 1st. When I filed and paid \$600 for the privilege, I didn't realize that not only was I at the mercy of the electorate, but also the whims of the Justice Department. At filing, I bought a registered voter list and a precinct map from the county clerk, and started campaigning, on the assumption that the early bird gets the worm. I knocked doors and talked or left a card, at almost every house in the precinct as drawn and listed. I passed out voter registration cards where needed, so as to substantially complete with campaigning by the voter registration deadline on February 11. Most common question answered was "Where do I vote this time?"

On February 14, Eldorado Success ended their report of County Commissioner's meeting with "The meeting ended with several county officials looking over a map of the new commissioner's precincts." I assumed the map I had purchased a month before after filing was what they were examining. Now, upon close scrutiny of the front page photo, I see that the map was changed from the one available at filing. Newest new map excludes Sunset Acres from Gene Jones to Ed Meador, block with Star Stop, and block where Eloise Day lives-moving them to Precinct 1, and moving block where Steve Sessom's office is the opposite way. School block was removed from 4, making it unavailable as a polling place for Precinct 4.

I really thought I was paying attention. I didn't see a clear notice of Precinct lines changes in the paper, didn't see a notice of same on bulletin board at courthouse, and didn't hear it in personal communication with county officials in several trips to courthouse to file campaign finance reports, attend to personal business, and attend Appraisal Board Meet-

ing. Maybe I'm naive, but a change in a voting district after the filing deadline seems to warrant some kind of public notice, if not to the voting public, then at least to the candidates who have paid for the privilege to run.

I understand that precinct lines were changed by the Justice Department in response to the 2000 census. First draft was denied in October 2001, and County paid their law firm an extra \$8000 to send a lawyer to Washington (sorry George) D.C. to hand walk something thru Justice Department so we could hold election result was received and adopted early Feb.

#### WHAT'S THE POINT?

No, it's not sour grapes. I lost to a worthy opponent.

Changing the voting district during the election process seems fundamentally unfair to me. The precinct line didn't move me out of eligibility like it did Pat Ragsdale in 1991, but it could have.

Campaigning on a personal level, telling people they are in my precinct, asking them to make the effort to vote (as a Republican), and then hearing they are unable to, making me appear misinformed at best, and a complete fool to some, doesn't set well.

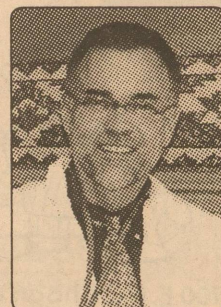

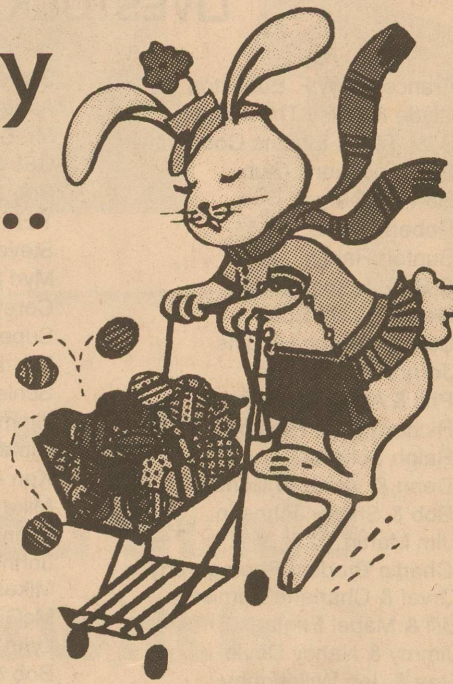

We chuckled over Howell as

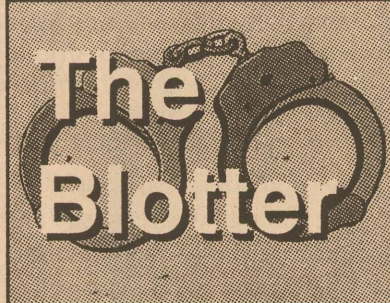

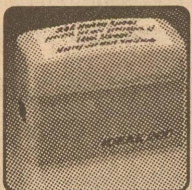
