


Gary Hanusch recognized in Eagle Scout ceremony



AirMed-1

In an effort to augment emergency care provided to area trauma patients, Shannon AirMed 1 air ambulance service recently began carrying blood on board during flights. The readily accessible blood can enhance patient outcomes when received earlier in treatment.

"We are the only air ambulance service in West Texas to provide this type of on-board service" said Rod Gardner, director of Shannon AirMed 1.

Two units of O-negative blood provided by the Shannon Medical Center blood bank are carried on each flight. O-negative is a universal blood type that can be accepted by almost every patient, said Gardner. The blood is stored in a temperature-controlled environment while not in use and is carefully packed for transport in an approved container with special materials to maintain its temperature.

"When properly packaged, each unit of blood is viable for up to 72 hours," said Gardner. "We keep the blood stored in our crew quarters, so there is no delay in responding to a call."

Along with maintaining temperature, AirMed 1 has the capability to rapidly warm the fluid for transfer to a patient who is experiencing shock or losing body heat. Gardner says blood, when needed by a patient, has the ability to supply oxygen while traditional IV fluids cannot.

Funds donated by Crockett County EMS and the Texas Department of Health Bureau of Emergency Management were used to purchase the equipment needed for blood storage.



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
