# **Concerned** citizens meet with City Council

The Eldorado City Council was reminded of the stray animal problem facing the city at the monthly Council meeting last Tuesday night.

Several Eldorado residents presented the Councilmen with a letter that urged them to enact an animal restraint ordinance in Eldorado. The letter said:

"We are here to commission the court to begin immediate action on the enactment and enforcement of an animal restraint law for our town. We further request that much endeavor and thorough research go into this enactment to insure a sound law that can be maintained at minimal cost.

Our reasons for requesting this petition are:

We feel children and teachers are in constant danger of attack on the school premises, because un-leased dogs are always on the school yard.

We feel to have our flower beds dug up, shrubs and garden plants up-rooted and watered, yards cluttered, trash containers over-turned, garages pilfered, etc. is a form of vandalism.

Many of us are to take walks upon request of our doctors. In so doing we are encountered with everything from small dogs nipping our heels to huge hounds giving the impression they will severely attack us. Those of us who keep our dogs in

confinement wish to take them on a leash for their health also, therefore we are in additional danger. Our health and that of our pets as well as our rights to enjoy these walks are definitely infringed upon.

We feel it is inhumane for pet owners to endanger their pets to be beaten by sticks, struck down by automobiles, shot or poisoned. They chose these pets and should take every precaution caring for them.

We feel as pet owners and non pet owners that we should show compassion to our neighbors and pride in our City to act now."

# Officials are prepared for a tornado... is your family?

After a massive tornado hit the city of Monahans recently, local citizens have been asking themselves if there is any civil defense program for this city. Although there was not a CD chairman appointed to replace the late Palmer West until last Tuesday night, the sheriff's department, the school system, the hospital and West Texas Utilities all have plans for such a disaster.

Sheriff Orval Edmiston told the Express News that the Weather Bureau at Mathis Field in San Angelo monitors a radar system at all times and can pinpoint "heavy cells" which may be either rain, hail or a tornado. When they site such cells, they contact the sheriff's department and either the sheriff or a deputy will go to the area and observe the cloud, which "We do all the time," said the sheriff.

He added that if a tornado is spotted by the sheriff's department and seen going toward town, it is reported back to either the fire department or the sheriff's department. Then either personnel at Shaw's Motel, who

answer the fire phone, or Mrs. Edmiston, who can sound the whistle, will then sound the warning. Only, instead of a constant blast, a tornado warning is three long blasts with a pause between each.

If a tornado is seen by the public, it should be reported the same as a fire.

All city and county officials emphasize that persons should get under cover when they hear the warning instead of trying to outrun the tornado. If you are in your house, you should get as close to the middle of it as possible or in the smallest room. such as a closet or bathroom.

If you are in a field or on the road, do not stay in your car. Instead get under a culvert or lay in the bar ditch.

Persons living in mobile homes or who are a long way from home, may find shelter in several basements around town. Edmiston said the basements at the First Baptist Church, the First Presbyterian Church, the Memorial Building or the courthouse are all good shelters.

The annual leader recognition dinner is sponsored by Electric Cooperatives in the District.







The students will present a medley of Mancini tunes, plus a collection of American songs, Boogey Woogey Bugle Boy.


The public is welcome, with admission charge set at \$1 for adults and fifty cents for children.








The suit will be handled in Justice Court or trial. The pet owner (under the animal nuisance law) could be fined up to \$200 and/or 1 year in jail.

They can also be relieved that officials here feel that they can receive help from other towns and cities if our own facilities or plans fail.





#### CLEVA'S FIRST PLACE ESSAY

#### THE FUTURE OF SOIL AND WATER IN OUR AREA

How long can the United States continue to rely on the abundant fertile lands that we have always been fortunate enough to have? It is very likely that in the near future, these lands will no longer supply the food and products that we find necessary for our survival. In order for man to avoid this danger, it will be necessary for us to combine every possible effort, both mentally and physically, in a group effort to restore to our land and water the beauty and purity of which we have always been so proud.

Our area is one in which farming and ranching play an extremely significant role. There is proof existing that if soil is well vegetated, whether grass or forest, wind will not blow it and water will not wash it away. In order to usefully conserve water and soil, we must first determine the maximum safe use. Then we must apply conservation practices that conserve water and protect the soil while it is in that particular use. The main objective of the soil conservationist is to devise methods of producing needed crops and at the same time protecting the soil against the elements. Conservation enables the individual to farm efficiently and reduce his costs.

Conservation must not be regarded as a program for farmers and ranchers alone, but as a program for the nation. We must continue to make advancements in the field of conservation, but we must also acquire the knowledge to apply them usefully. The future of the United States depends upon its people and their willingness to make sacrifices for the improvement of our country's land and water. Conservation means the development, protection, and wise use and management of all our resources for the needs and enjoyment of all the people.

#### Soil Program

How builders can avoid the problems of moding homes is one of the principles covered in a slide talk available from the Soil Conservation Service,

"This presentation, SOIL BASICS FOR BUILDERS, informs people of some of the hazards of construction caused by soil conditions," Williams said. "In addition to flooding soils, the 12-minute presentation covers septic tank soil selection, shrinking and swelling soils, corrosive soils, and sliding soils."

"All of these problems are present in Eldorado," Williams said. "According to our Soil Conservation Service soil scientists, the location of these conditions can be identified and mapped. Building plans can be adjusted to avoid flooding, cracking houses, underground damage by corrosion, and other soil related difficulties. "The use of soil survey information to avoid building problems is not experimental," Williams said. "In some areas, millions of dollars in public and private money have been saved by simply avoiding known problems or by making the adjustments necessary in construction details." The slide presentation, SOIL BASICS FOR BUILDERS, with a taped script may be scheduled for groups or programs by contacting the Soil Conservation Service office at 853-2720.

## A Word From Our Mayor

Mosquitos are a problem we must all combat. Spraying of barrow-ditches, alley, etc. will not be sufficient to control this annual pest. You, the citizen can do much to help. 1. Keep your lawn and weeds cut.

2. Look around your place and empty any bucket, can, barrel, old tires, tubs, etc. of water where mosquitos might breed.

3. Drain any area where water stands and becomes stagnant. If unable to drain such an area, spread a thin coating of oil on the standing water. The oil will kill mosquito larva.

4. Spray your shrubs, flowers and gardens with a spray that will kill both flies and mosquitos and is acceptable to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

5. Repeat these practices after each rainfall. Your help plus an effort by your City Government and fire department will help keep our fly and mosquito problem to a minimum.

Your City Council voted at this week's meeting to purchase insecticide for the purpose of spraying the town for mosquitos. Your fire department will be in charge of spraying our streets and alleys. May I again urge you to look around your house and business and follow the above mentioned steps. Together we can minimize the mosquito problem in Eldorado. J. Patrick Ragsdale

br Lambert Wilkes, Professor of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University says there are a number of advantages to



pinching plants just for the fun of it, but do pinch mums, zinnia, salvia (red sage), cockscomb (celosia), petunias, marigolds, and snapdragons to slow down top growth. This encourages lateral branching and more abundant blooms. Plants pinched back will be less likely to blow over or break in high winds. With mums, pinching should continue until mid-July. By then, growth should be compact and sturdy with flower buds forming. Usually, one early pinching is enough for annuals as petunias. Some newer types of annuals are base-branching and do not need pinching.

2. To pinch, use your index finger and thumbnail to break out the lead growth at tip of plant. Pinching just after transplanting is also effective in reducing leaf area and making up for roots that may have been lost.


3. Azalea leaf gall -- At this season, sometimes earlier we often see some thick, fleshy leaves scattered among healthy leaves of our azaleas and camellias. Such leaves remind one a bit of "Cauliflower Ear" of the boxer. The swollen leaves are covered with a white powdery material. Such leaves are alarming to the new gardener who has not experienced leaf gall on his azaleas and camellias. The disease is more alarming than destructive. Don't get overly-excited. Pick the leaves. Burn them to prevent spread of the leaf gall.

4. Fertilize crapemyrtles -- For abundant summer bloom, feed crapemyrtles now. Use a balanced fertilizer such as 8-8-8. For large shrubs, apply as much as 1 cup per plant. Crapemyrtles are our showiest of summer-flowering shrubs.

5. Still time to plan for summer color by planting lantana, periwinkle, moss rose, copper plant, verbena and zinnia. For shade, use coleus, begonias, nicotiana, caladium or impatiens.

6. Don't allow those attractive hanging baskets to dry out too much. This is especially true of the sphagnum lined wire baskets.

7. Look-out for first sign of bagworms on narrow-leaf evergreens. Fairly easy to control with Sevin, malathion or



crop of spring foliage. This is the normal seasonal shedding of old leaves by such plants as magnolia, photinia, gardenia, cleyera and abelia.

11. Repot crowded house plants and move to a shady spot until well established.

12. Chinch bug damage will probably soon be evident. Contact your area entomologist for the most up-to-date controls.

13. Time to propagate those favorite mums from cuttings. As soon as they are rooted dig up and discard the parent plant.

14. Renew mulch material in the garden and shrub border to beat the summer heat.

15. Should complete pruning of climbing roses this month to allow time for development of new canes for next year's bloom.

16. Continue to make monthly application of fertilizer to annual beds. Use according to instructions on container.

 If you want attractive roses this fall don't forget to spray with Phaltan, Benlate, or Maneb for blackspot control.
 Plant caladium bulbs anytime this month, also dahlias

and cannas. 19. Does your lawn grass look ragged and brown as soon

as you mow it? Check mower blade, maybe it is dull. 20. Keep compost pile damp but not soggy.

21. Hydrangeas need plenty of water for attractive blooms.

22. Good time to establish a bermuda grass or St Augustine lawn now that the soil is warm.

23. In alkaline areas of the state watch for iron chlorosis symtoms on landscape plants. Refer to L-435, IRON CHLOROSIS for information on how to correct.
