The fire began at the dirt road north of the Eldorado Wool Warehouse and spread within 75 feet of gas storage tanks and a warehouse belonging to Halbert Oil Company before it was stopped.

Twelve men from the Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department fought the fire between 3:30 and 5 a.m. It was reported by Pat Joiner who lives nearby.

County Sheriff Orval Edmiston said he felt the fire was started by someone, but could not tell if it was deliberate. He said a car was seen leaving that general area about the time deputies and firemen began arriving at the scene.

\$400,000 budget approved by **County Commissioners Monday**

Gather family history now for county book

Gather up your family records--It's time to begin writing your family history for the Schleicher County Historical Society. The society has sent letters to each family in Schleicher County so that each one can contribute to the "History of Schleicher County," which the society will publish.

The letters explain the purpose, content and description of the book. The book will be bound in leatherette with an

embossed logo on the front. It will contain between 400 and 600 pages.

The book is to "preserve historical records for the education and enjoyment of future generations.

It will contain histories of all families who lived in Schleicher County at any time. Each family is being asked to writeup its history including birth dates, military service, marriage dates and dates of death,

during a short morning session Monday. The sum is from several funds but does not include federal revenue sharing funds. A short version of the budget follows this story.

During the meeting, the court discussed hiring a night deputy with Sheriff Orval Edmiston. The present night deputy, Johnny O'Harrow, will replace Jack Jones who has resigned. Edmiston has been trying to find replacements for the night deputy, but told the court during a meeting Aug. 8 that he could not interest anyone in the job because of the low monthly salary.

The night job now pays \$550 a month. The city pays \$450 of the salary, and the county pays \$100 plus fringe benefits such as social security, insurance, retirement and workmen's compensation. The county also furnished the deputy's car.

During the previous meeting, the court authorized Edmiston to ask city officials if they could increase their portion of the salary. Edmiston told the court Monday that the City Council hesitated to make an official decision because two members were absent. However, the aldermen present gave him a verbal agreement that they would make a \$50 monthly increase.

The court decided to offer \$700 for the job which means a \$100 increase monthly for the

Know Your Neighbor

How I was called to

By H.W. Gaston

It is difficult to find words that will fully and completely describe one's call to preach. Probably no two persons are called in the same manner. Several experiences in my early life

I was a member of a western frontier family of 13 children. My father and mother were Methodist.but there was no organized church there at that time. They were both Christians and made goodness attractive and beautiful. At home they taught us the Bible and the teachings of the Methodist Church. All of the children except one or two still have the same helief

Another experience in my childhood that influenced me in a strange way was a murder in our neighborhood. My parents made me feel that there were great forces of evil at work. The shocking effect it had on the mother of the murdered boy and the enormous crowd of shocked people at the funeral made me realize the tragedy of a wasted life. We saw the great struggle between the forces of good and

Soon after this tragedy Miss Florence Morris of Italy, Texas came to our community as the teacher of our public school. She was very small in stature, but a great big bundle of goodness and intelligence. Where other teachers had about used up all the switches on Mule Creek, she made

goodness so attractive and alluring that switches weren't needed. I haven't seen her since those school days, but have wished many times that I could see her and tell her just how much she meant to me and

Later I was in school at Brownwood. My pastor was Dr K.P. Barton, who could say more in fewer words than any person I have ever heard. Because of tragedy in his own family perhaps, he was very sympathetic and kind. His influence on me, and other members of the church, was great. I hungered and yearned to mean as much to God and people as Dr. Barton. Not that I could reach the heights that he did, but that I could strive to do

I felt the call to preach at this time, and was licensed to

preach and become a ministerial student at Howard Payne College in Brownwood. Later I went to SMU, Dallas. My call to preach was both direct and indirect. All the people that I have written about had a powerful influence upon me and my decision. The evil and shocking tragedy, the people who made goodness so alluring, certainly drove me a long way down the path of goodness and truth. The longer I travel the road that leads to God in all his glory and loveliness, the more anxious I am to tell others of His truth, grace, mercy and love. I long to see the time when goodness will cover the earth as waters cover the sea. [Editor's note:Mr Gaston is now retired and lives in Christoval.

The Home Demonstration Clubs are also sponsoring a membership luncheon on Wednesday, Sept. 7. Dr. Al Forlano will be our speaker. If you would like to learn more about home demonstration clubs, plan on attending our luncheon. Even if you don't want to join, you will have the opportunity to hear a fine speaker. Dr. Forlano will be talking about the effects that "non-prescription medications" can have on our bodies. We will have more information about this in next weeks paper.

This week I have some microwave statistics for you and also a new microwave recipe. I haven't tried the recipe (I don't have a microwave!) but it sounds delicious. I hope you enjoy using it.

MICROWAVE COOKERY ... a subject no longer on the 'foods of the future' list. Microwave oven sales have dramatically increased since 1970, when 40 thousand units were sold. Units of microwave ovens sold in 1977 totaled 2,000,000 (including units sold commercially). It is estimated that about 4 per cent of the households in the United States currently own a microwave oven. The microwave industry, however, is anticipating unit sales will reach 4 million units by 1980.

Who is the microwave consumer? According to Leo Shapiro and Associates, a research company studying and monitoring the growth of microwave cooking:

1. 40 per cent are purchased by families with household income of less than \$15,000.

2. More than 50 per cent of the microwave ovens are purchased by families with two wage earners. 3. More than 30 per cent of the customers are under 35 years of age.

Ordination history is told

An ordination is an event with a long history, having its roots in the ancient Hebrew culture. Yet it is rare for a local congregation to witness.

It is that moment when a person accepts a new identity as a member of the clergy. For some churches it is a sacrament called "holy orders", and is performed by a bishop. In the reformed tradition of churches, growing out of Switzerland, Holland, and Scotland, it is not considered a sacrament. Yet it is a solemn and holy occasion.

The Presbyterian, or reformed, service will be celebrated as Lyman Mobley becomes a pastor.

A commission from churches throughout West Texas will ordain Lyman. This body consists of both clergy and lay people. It reflects the fact that the church is governed by both clergy and lay officers. Lyman will then be a member of this judicial body which oversees the work of the denomination from El Paso eastward to Eldorado.

The ritual is historical and each word and motion is rich with meaning. The laying-on-of-hands is the essence of the ordination service. In theological terms the congregation watches the visible sign of a mystery. The candidate kneels while the elders press their hands upon his shoulders and head. It is a way that certain powers are passed on to him.

By this act the commission serves as a witness to the fact that the person has been given certain abilities for leadership, counseling, preaching and administration. They are called "charismatic gifts"--a word becoming popular in our lingo. It simply means that these abilities are given to the person for the sake of the congregation, and not for his own personal aggrandizement. When the elders lay on hands, it is their way of publicly recognizing these things in him.

The gesture has a rich history. Jewish priests used to lay their hands heavily on the shoulders of the sacrificial animal--a bull, or a ram--and offer a long, solemn prayer. They pressed the weight of their bodies on the animal as a way of signifying that this animal stood in place of the people. It was being offered up on their behalf.

In the Christianizing of this tradition, it took on plural meanings. The consecrated individual still stands on behalf of the people before God, but also stands on behalf of God to the people.

The ordination service will reflect these various meanings in the liturgy. The choir plays a significant role, entoning a prayer for the spiritual gifts to be given to the candidate.

The congregation will have greater involvement that in the usual Presbyterian format. For the denouement of the service, the people, instead of being met at the back door by the preacher, will move as a body in the opposite direction. They all go forward to meet him as an expression of affection.


