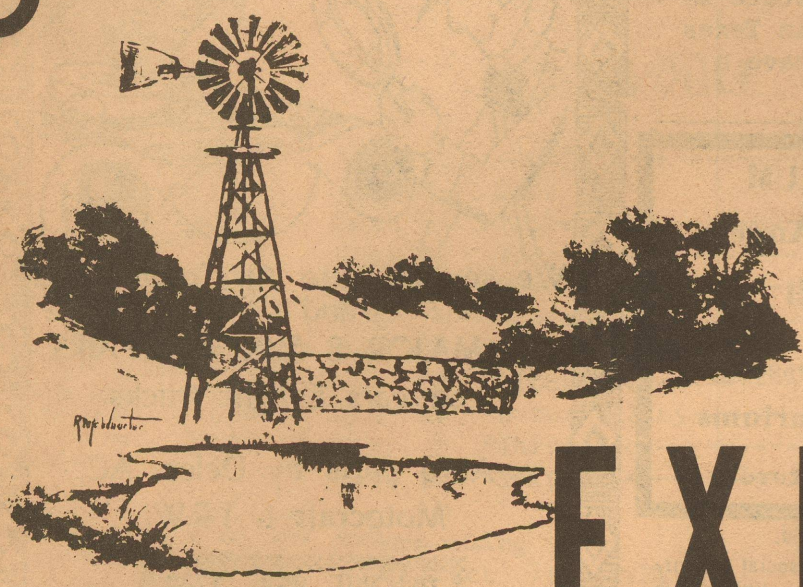

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LAW CONFERENCE

(Austin) Attorney General John Hill will host approximately 350 State and local law enforcement officials Sept. 8-10 at the 26th Annual Attorney General's Law Enforcement Conference.

The conference, co-sponsored by the District and County Attorneys Association, will be held at the Sheraton Crest Inn in Austin.

Among those expected to attend are district and county attorneys, county judges and sheriffs, police chiefs from the large metropolitan centers, and assistant attorneys general.

U.S. Attorney Michael P. Carnes of the Northern District of Texas, one of the featured speakers, will address participants on 'Privacy and Security Under Federal Regulations'.

Joe B. Dibrell, assistant attorney general and chief of Hill's Law Enforcement Division, is serving as conference coordinator.

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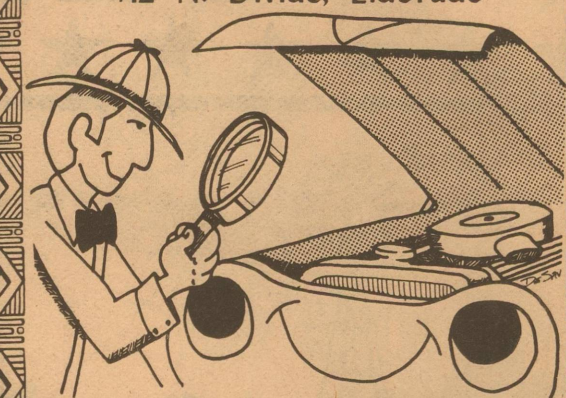

who can guess nearest the weight is called a livestock buyer by the public, a robber by the rancher, and a poor businessman by his banker.

The price of livestock is determined by consumers and goes up after you have sold and down after you have bought. A buyer for a Nebraska packer was sent to Omaha to watch the Livestock Market. After a few days' deliberation he wired to his office: "Some say the market will go up - some say it will go down - I say the same. Whatever you do will be wrong. Act at once."

When you have light cattle the buyer wants heavy ones, and when you feed heifers they want steers, and visa versa. When they're thin they should be fat; and when your steers are fat the buyer tells you the market on tallow is shot, and you've got 'em too doggone fat. Children ASK!

Why do we have to obey laws? What's the law?

Most children think of the law as things the police want, or don't want, them to do. First, find out just what sort of a concept your child has of the law. In other words, find out where he is in relationship to laws. We parents don't keep informed so it would be great to go to the school or county library and get books to read. Dry? You thought they were when you had them in school, but they really are not all that dull. It depends on your attitude. If you really care and want to help your questioning child, go to the books and learn. Take them on a tour to the City Council or County Court or Council.

Local laws are made, for the most part, in your own community. These are posted in public buildings and in newspapers. Being ignorant of the law is no excuse. You can even go to jail for breaking a law you did not know about. Unfair? No, for the rights of others are to be considered. If one disobeys a law that hurts some other person, he must pay for it, otherwise our system of justice would be broken.

Most young children have a good sense of justice. If their friend hurts them and they run to mom for comfort, mom is apt to be harsh on the friend. Most children will in turn take up for the person that hurt them. However, as they get older, they feel 'put upon' by parents, teachers, and peers - even the law.

It is very important to teach this as young as possible. It is not an easy task. Our best hope is to keep pliable, teachable, and invincibly loving!

WIND EROSION CONTROL PROGRAM

Farmers and ranchers interested in earning a cost-share for seeding either cropland or range-land to improved grasses should file an application by **September 17, 1976.**

The local SCS office will inspect each applicant's site for which cost-sharing is requested. Based on the SCS report, the county committee will approve as many applications as the available funds will permit.

Seeding must be done between January 1 - June 1, 1977. The cost share rate for this practice is 90% of the cost not to exceed an amount determined by the county committee.

GRAIN STORAGE FACILITY LOANS

Loans may be obtained through your ASCS office to purchase and erect facilities in which to store the grain you produce on your farm. The amount of the loan can not exceed \$25,000 or 70% of the applicants needed storage and equipment.

Financing is over a four year period and the current interest rate is 7½ percent. Interest is figured on the unpaid balance. Check with us if you are interested.

WOOL INCENTIVE PROGRAM

You may be thinking that there will not be any incentive payment this year since the price of wool was pretty good. We will continue to take wool incentive applications just as in the past because it is not until after the end of the year that the average price of all wool sold is figured. Usually, wool produced outside of Texas is sold at prices lower than what we receive. If the national average selling price falls below 72 cents per pound, there will be an incentive payment on wool and unshorn lambs.

Be sure you file all receipts of unshorn lambs and shorn wool with your ASCS office.

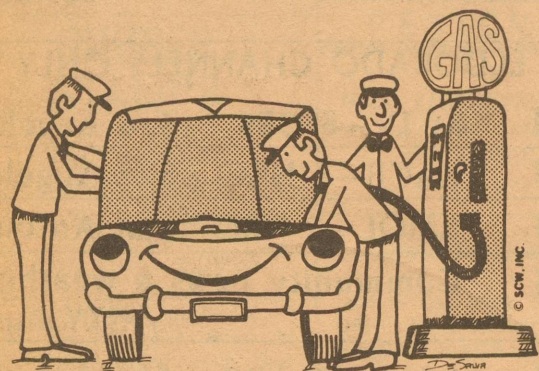

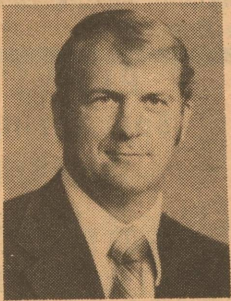

(Washington) Congressman Bob Krueger (D-Tx) has been selected as the "most effective freshman Democrat" in the United States Congress. Krueger was named "most effective" in a survey of the offices of all freshman Democrat Congressmen. The survey was conducted by 'Roll Call,' the newspaper of Capitol Hill.

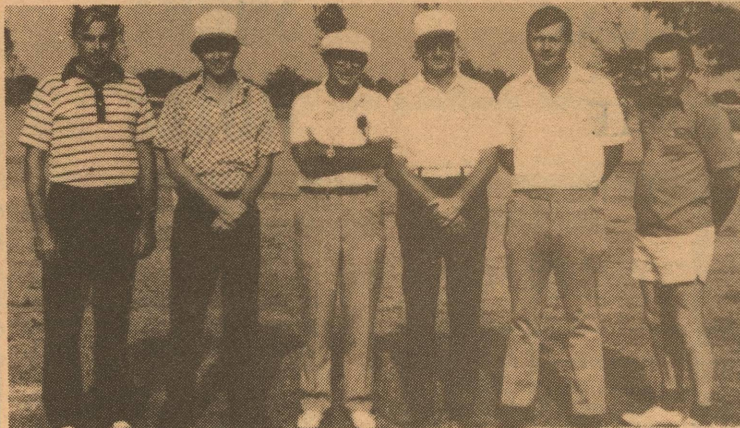

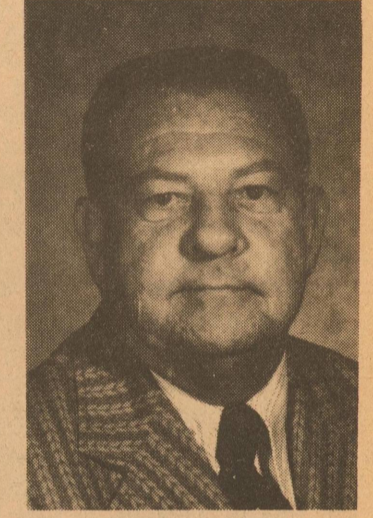

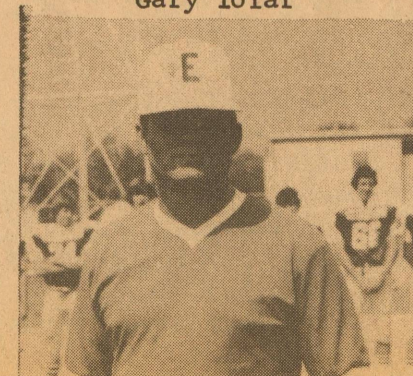
Eagles can expect a tough opener.
