


and the Lions Club Eye Bank.







CERTIFICATION

July 15, 1976 is the final date for cotton growers to certify their cotton acreage. Farms having an effective allotment this year need to report a zero acreage if no cotton is planted. Growers who released or transferred all their acreage need not certify.

DISASTER PROGRAM


The disaster program administered by the ASCS provides benefits to those farmers whose crop yields are adversely effected by a disaster such as hail, drought, flood or insects. It is important for farmers to report the disaster to their ASCS office while evidence of the crop is apparent but not later than 15 days after it is harvested or abandoned. It is necessary to appraise the potential production of those crops which are going to be abandoned. Grazing, plowing, baling or otherwise altering the evidence is prohibited until after the apprasial is

GRAIN STORAGE LOANS

Loans are available to producers who need facilities to store their grain. The current interest rate is 71/2% per year and the loan is repayable over a five year period. Eligible borrowers can receive loans of up to 70% of the cost of the grain storage facility. Since the price of grain usually goes down at harvest time, we certainly think it advisable to have some grain storage available on your farm so that you may hold your grain for better prices.

MESQUITE SPRAYING

Aerial spraying of mesquite is well underway in the county. Approximately 4,000 acres of mesquite will be sprayed under the ACP costsharing program . Practically all of this acreage will be sprayed with Tordon. This chemical is about twice as effective on mesquite as 2,4,5-T It also does a real good job on controlling

Throughout the country, homeowners and apartment residents are reacting with everincreasing concern to the problems of making ones home more secure against uninvited entrysince a burglary occurs every 15 seconds in the **United States.**

Several simple do-it-yourself precautions perhaps as a week-end project--can increase home security.

A big part of the solution to burglary problems lies in the individual homeowner or apartment dweller adopting a more security-conscious attitude toward his home, his possessions and the well-being of family members.

Whether a professional or an amateur, any burglar wants a quick entry, peace and quiet while he works, and a fast, uninterrupted exit.

Once considered a night-time occupation, more than half of the burglaries today take place in broad open daylight from 11 a m. - 3 p m.while people are away at work or out shopping. Nearly half of the entries are made through the front door.

Many in the security and law-enforcement areas agree that the best way to avoid dangerous 3rd - Louise Logan confrontation with an uninvited intruder is to fortify security at the outer perimeters of the home--not with a moat or a cannon, but with secure doors, locks, windows, proper lighting and a daily routine filled with lots of common sense and caution.

Doors and windows are critical security points in houses, apartments and mobile homes. Unfortunately, most doors and windows don't offer much resistance to anyone wanting to gain entry. Even an amateur burglar with minimal

The American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) received a request from state Bicentennial commissions and Bicentennial communities for a simultaneous bell-ringing program

ARBA established 2 p.m. (EDST) for the nation-

wide community bell-ringing activity in accordance with the guidelines enacted by Congress several years ago.

The Congressional Resolution determined that 2 p.m. (1 p.m. CDT) on the afternoon of July 4 was the most appropriate hour to ring the bells symbolizing the moment in history in the year 776 when the Liberty Bell proclaimed the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

The Resolution set the date and time as July 4 at 2 p.m. EDST and civic and community leaders across the nation are urged to take steps to encourage total public participation.

It is hoped communities will coordinate their plans for the bell ringing with the 2 p.m. EDST schedule so that there may be a simultaneous naina of freedom throughout the land

The time span ranges from 2 p.m. in Puerto Rico to 8 a.m. in American Samoa, thus making t possible for all Americans to participate in inging bells at the same time.

experience can walk up to the typical front door in the daytime and be inside the house in a matter of only a few minutes.

A quick pry with a crowbar or jimmy or a fast thrust of the latch with a plastic credit card, a stiff nudge with the shoulder, and he's home free. Doors can and should be made to deter would-be intruders.

Begin your security check by taking a critical look at the exterior doors and windows of your house or apartment. Better yet, lock yourself out and discover how easy it really is to get in—through an unlocked patio door, by using your gasoline credit card on the front door latch, by slipping the pins out of the utility room door hinges from an unlocked garage, or or by slipping easily through an unlocked window. This should give you some idea of how inexperienced a successful burglar can be.

DOOR SECURITY STARTS WITH 'CHECK-UP'

Door security should begin by having family members lock all doors when leaving-whether there's anyone home or not.

Be sure to check basement doors, bulkhead doors, patio and terrace doors as well as those leading from the basement or garage to the rest of the house. Sliding doors can be 'double secured' by placing a metal or wooden rod in the bottom gutter on which the door slides.

Oddly enough, the kind of exterior doors and hardware provided by the builder can either invite or deter a would-be invader.

To keep costs down, flimsy doors and cheap locks are commonly installed with little thought to the security threat they pose to the family.


TYPES OF DOORS MAKE DIFFERENCE

There are three types of doors commonly installed for residential use: solid wood, paneled and hollow-core.

A solid door made of thick, solid wood offers good security.

A paneled door is safe only if the panels are fairly heavy and are set tightly in place. Flimsy paneled doors need only a solid punch with the fist or knee to give easy access to inside locks.

The hollow-core door should never be used (but often it is) as an exterior door-since it will shatter under the impact of a good blow with the fist.

Test exterior doors in your home by giving them a good swift kick and a strong nudge with the shoulder. If your foot ends up on the other side, be grateful you discovered its weakness before an intruder did. Replace the door with a sturdier one.

If exterior doors have glass in them, especially small panes that can be easily broken to give an intruder access to inside locks, consider replacing the glass panes with tough plastic panes.

Also, make sure all exterior doors are installed so that the hinge pins are inside. Two or three good whacks with a hammer or crowbar will easily remove exterior-mounted hinge pins permitting the intruder to remove the door completely from the frame.
