Commissioners choose new course for Civic Center construction project

Schleicher County Commissioners decided last Friday not to proceed with the construction of a new building at the current Civic Center complex. Instead, the county will renovate the two existing buildings and consider enlarging the facility at a later date. The change came after project's architect and structural engineer asked to be released from liability in connection with problems that might arise with the building's foundation.

As a way of holding costs down on the project, county crews were being used to prepare the subgrade for the foundation, with supervision being provided by the engineer. So, the concerns expressed by architect Henry Schmidt and engineers McClanahan & Associates of San Angelo, seemed to catch the county commissioners off guard.

The men chose not to sign a release of liability, but did vote to halt construction of that portion of the project. Work on the two existing buildings will continue as planned with much of the exhibition hall being rebuilt from the frame out due to damage from black mold. Another part of the project that avoided the axe was the installation of rest rooms in the newest portion of the building, as well as air conditioning.

The action came at a specially called meeting of the commissioners court. It was called to order by County Judge Johnny Griffin with Commissioners Johnny Mayo, Bill Clark, Kirk Griffin and Matt Brown in attendance.

Along with other business, the commissioners reviewed a bid from Reece Albert Construction for \$56,250.00 for crushed rock. The company proposed an option under which it could provide rock from two separate pits. The commissioners didn't care for that offer, and directed Judge Griffin to meet with Reece Albert officials and tell them that the county only wants rock from the Mike Moore pit.

Next, Shannon Wideman met with the commissioners and asked about the Civic Center project. She told the men

that she had read in last week's Success that the project might be scaled back. She questioned the need for a civic center and asked when county citizens had voted to approve borrowing the money for the project.

Judge Griffin explained that the county's need for a handicap accessible court room will likely require the Memorial Building be converted for that purpose. He also noted that the community needs another facility where large gatherings can be held. The judge further noted that a series of public notices were published, along with several news stories while the topic was being discussed. With no one expressing opposition the commissioners then voted to borrow the funds by issuing certificates of obligation, a method of borrowing

money that does not require a vote of the public.

Mrs. Wideman agreed that the community needed a handicap accessible courtroom, but expressed her preference for a health and fitness center over a civic center. She explained that she is concerned that many local children are overweight and that a fitness center similar to the one in Big Lake would be of service to the community.

Judge Griffin thanked Mrs. Wideman for her concern but said that the work on the Civic Center will proceed. He suggested that questions about a fitness center might better be handled by the Hospital District. He told her he would contact the Reagan County judge to see how the facility in Big Lake was funded.

Comptroller Strayhorn delivers sales tax rebates

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn sent \$380.9 million in monthly sales tax payments to Texas cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts last week, down 0.6 percent compared to May 2002. So far this year, local sales tax revenues are down 1.5 percent compared to the same time period in 2002.

May's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in March by monthly sales tax filers and in January, February and March by quarterly sales tax filers, and reported to the Comptroller in April. The state's share of sales tax reported in April was \$1.1 billion, down 0.5 percent compared to a year ago.

"For the first time since the sales tax

was enacted in 1961, state revenue from the sales tax is down for the tenth consecutive month. This is unprecedented," Strayhorn said. "We are also going to have another historic unfortunate first in Texas - two consecutive years of losses in sales tax revenue."

Comptroller Strayhorn sent May sales tax rebates of \$261.9 million to Texas cities, up 0.8 percent compared to May 2002. Texas counties received sales tax rebates of \$21.1 million, up 0.6 percent compared to one year ago. Seventy-six special purpose taxing districts saw their sales tax revenue increase. They received \$10.2 million dollars this month, up 1.3 percent compared to May 2002.

Locally, the sales tax rebates offer a

mixed picture for the local economy. Schleicher County's payment was up considerably from one year ago, while the City of Eldorado and the County Health Services Tax both declined. (See chart below)

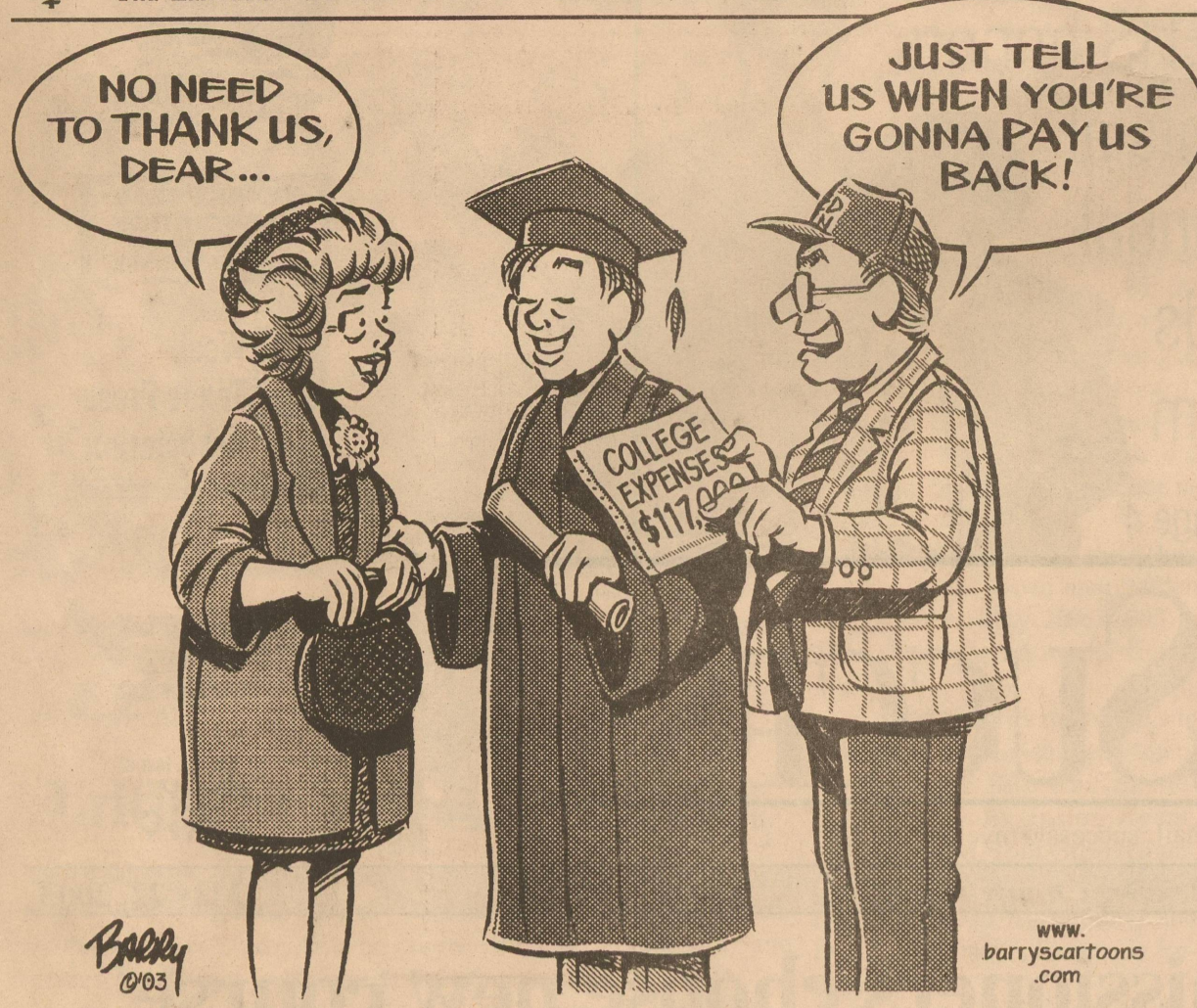

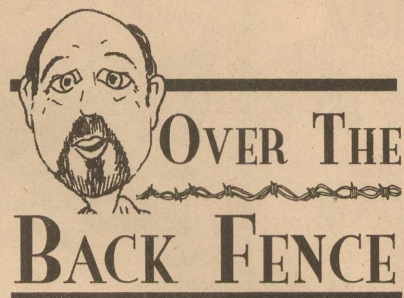

The last full measure of devotion

America has 141 new heroes, those who died while serving their country in Iraq. The flags that you see flying at half-mast next Monday will be for them, and the brave souls who preceded them in other wars, all of them dying to defend America against its foes.

I only mention this because many people tend to forget why we celebrate Memorial Day. To them it is nothing more than a day away from work and little notice is paid to the fallen heroes whose sacrifice the holiday is supposed to honor.

Since the first call went out at the open of the American Revolution, patriots across the centuries have rushed to defend our nation. Sadly, many of them paid the ultimate price. President

Democrats adopt Ardmore, Okla. for legislative stand

AUSTIN — Years from now, a traveler will be glancing through an airline magazine (assuming there are still any airlines in business) and read an interesting piece of trivia: For a short time in the early 21st century, Texas had two capitals.

And in the sense that a capital is a place where members of a deliberative body of government gather, the historical trivia will be correct. It will be noted that from May 12, 2003 to May 16, 2003, 51 members of the Texas House of Representatives — more than a third of its membership — gathered at a motel in Ardmore, Okla. to prevent their colleagues from taking any legislative action for lack of a quorum.

For all practical purposes, for four days, Ardmore was the Democratic capital of Texas. Austin, on

the other hand, was the Republican capital of Texas.

Invoking long standing rules, as soon as it was evident what the Democrats were up to, House Speaker Tom Craddick placed "a call upon the House." That means the doors were locked and the Sergeant-at-Arms ordered to locate absent representatives and return them to the chamber so that a quorum could be reached. The sergeant-at-arms having no police powers, the job fell to the Department of Public Safety.

The DPS and the news media found the missing lawmakers easily enough Monday night, but they were north of the Red River. Texas officers have no jurisdiction outside the state unless they are in

pursuit of a felon. An attempt to talk some of the Democrats into "surrendering" so they could be flown back to Texas in a state plane failed.

Wars have been fought over less than this parliamentary maneuver, but these days, we do most of our fighting with words, not bullets or bombs. That is not to say there was not plenty of bombast from both factions.

Much of the rhetoric swirled around a Texas icon, the Alamo. Both parties invoked the 1836 battle.

"Texas patriots made their stand at the Alamo to halt the progress of an overpowering Mexican Army intent on destroying the rights of the residents of Texas and crushing Sam Houston's small army," Rep. Ryan Guillen (D-Duval County) said. "I would not compare our efforts to theirs. We are risking far less. But we are following their example, as all true Texans should."

Speaker Craddick said the Democrats were more like Moses Rose, the only defender believed to have left the Alamo before the final assault. (Historians debate that, but that's another story.)

Beyond the references to Texas history, humor softened the political tensions. The Republicans, stealing a page from the U.S. government's effort to capture Iraqi war criminals, posted on their Web site a deck of playing cards featuring the missing lawmakers. Milk cartons with photocopied images of Democrats appeared on the floor of the House.

Singer Willie Nelson sent the

Ardmore 51 red bandannas, CDs and health drinks. Maybe he had been inspired by a press release from Rep. Phil King (R-Weatherford), who observed, "Not since the days of Jesse and Frank James, and Belle Starr have so many outlaws hid out in Oklahoma."

So, what does it all really mean?

As of this writing, it looks like a battle won by the Democratic members, who succeeded in killing the Congressional redistricting bill that had gotten their dander up. But as the saying goes, it's possible to win a battle and still lose a war.

On the longer term, it means relations between the two parties likely will be even more rancorous. As surely as video footage portraying President George W. Bush as a war time leader will be aired when the election campaign begins next year, footage of the Chicken Ds, as the Republicans called the absent Democrats, will be seen the next time they run for reelection.

It means some legislation that had nothing to do with redistricting probably died of friendly fire. It means that for a few days, the Ardmore economy got some relief from the throes of the recession from the lawmakers, their associates and the news media.

Finally, in the realm of social science, as opposed to political science, the Ardmore episode speaks volumes about what makes Texas different. It's hard to imagine something like this playing out in Iowa, or Rhode Island, or Oregon.

A Backyard Ferris Wheel

Tim Gearn of Hereford has a Ferris wheel in his back yard.

"Yep, I decided to have some fun at home," says Tim. "A little backyard adventure right here at the house. I thought we needed a Ferris Wheel. I was interested in a Tilt-A-Whirl but they were just a little rough on my old neck so I thought a Ferris Wheel would be a lot of fun to have in the backyard. Have the church groups and lots of kids over."

He searched the internet for a wheel and located one in San Antonio. On a hot July day last year, Tim and his son loaded the wheel onto a big trailer rig Tim uses in his construction work. He has built feed lots and feed mills all over the panhandle.

"Actually the wheel was in real good shape. It was built in 1948. I rebuilt it from stem to stern but really didn't have to do a lot of metal work on it."

Tim did most of the restoration work himself. He has the space to do it. He has a big warehouse-sized workshop behind his office, which is located near his house. Tim's lot is Texas-sized: fifteen acres. The wheel is popular with neighbors.

"Folks will give me a call and say 'My grandchild sure would like to have her birthday party at your house.' I tell them sure, bring 'em on. Just make sure I get some ice cream."

The wheel can hold lots of kids.

"I counted thirty-seven children on it one time. It's got twelve seats on it. These little guys, you can put a bunch of them on there. 'Course you have to watch them like a hawk, but it's a lot of fun. Getting them off is the hard part."

The wheel is a curiosity.

"A number of parents driving by with their children stop and want to know when the carnival is going to open."

Once a group of older ladies came over for a ride.

"This Ferris Wheel and I guess any kind of carnival equipment brings out the kid in everybody."

Dogs love the wheel.

"My son's dog, Re-run loves to ride the Ferris wheel. He's a bar-ditch dog. That's where we found him, in a bar-ditch. If you're not watching out, he's liable to jump in the seat with you."

The wheel is lighted some nights.

"You can see it from most of town. We've had a number of kids say 'well, we see the lights are on, let's go ride the Ferris Wheel.'"

Tim is expanding his fair-ground. He's building a carousel.

"I was going to build a small one with four characters on it, but the project got out of hand and now I'm up to sixteen characters. It's going to have pigs, zebras, horses, all kinds of things for the kids to ride."

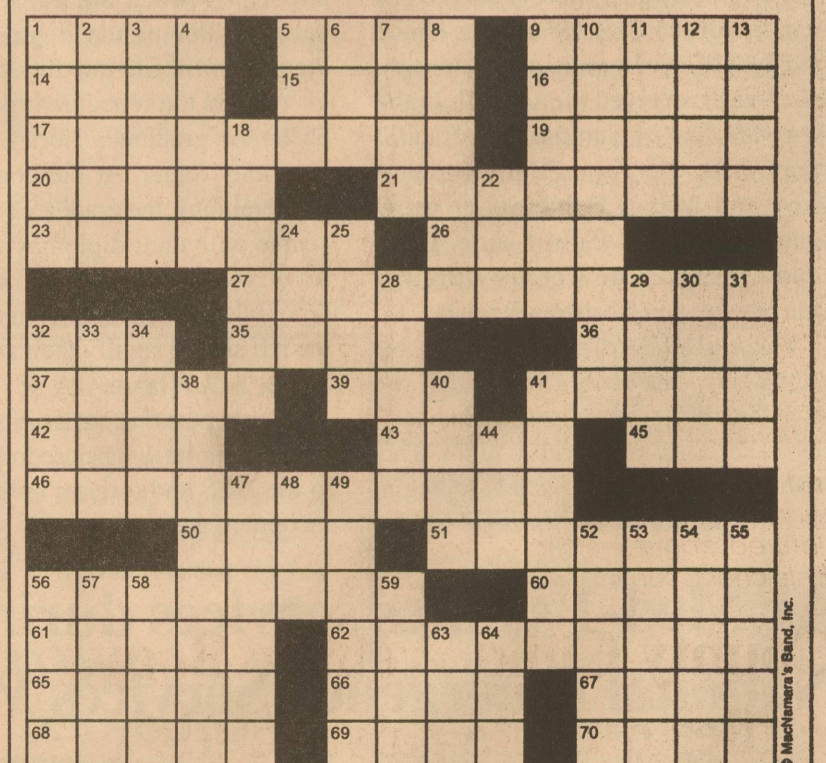

Thus it is a great disappointment when one SCISD schoolbus driver shows no concern for the welfare of an elementary child. The driver refused to wait for the child even after said child's siblings pleaded and begged for her to wait for their youngest brother. Just turn to the news station either on radio or television and you will hear horrific real-life stories that happen to children when they are left alone for even a few minutes. Eldorado is not immune from evil. Many bad things could have happened to my nephew. Young and scared, he could have become disoriented. A stranger passing through town could have lured him into his/her vehicle. Why didn't the driver stop and explain to the parent why her child was not on the bus. She left the explaining to the other little boys as she drove off. Can any of us even begin to imagine the pain and anguish the

mother felt when she arrived at the school and her child was nowhere to be found. The principal & teachers who were still there could not understand why she was looking for her child. My husband & I considered moving back to Eldorado when our first child reached the age for school. I'm so glad we stayed in the Bradford school district. I am impressed by the way Bradford Elem teachers, principal, and maintenance personnel go beyond the call of duty to ensure that each child boards the appropriate vehicle at the end of the school day. EHS recognizes top students at annual awards program

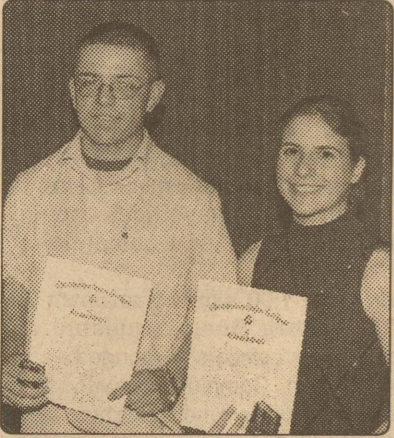

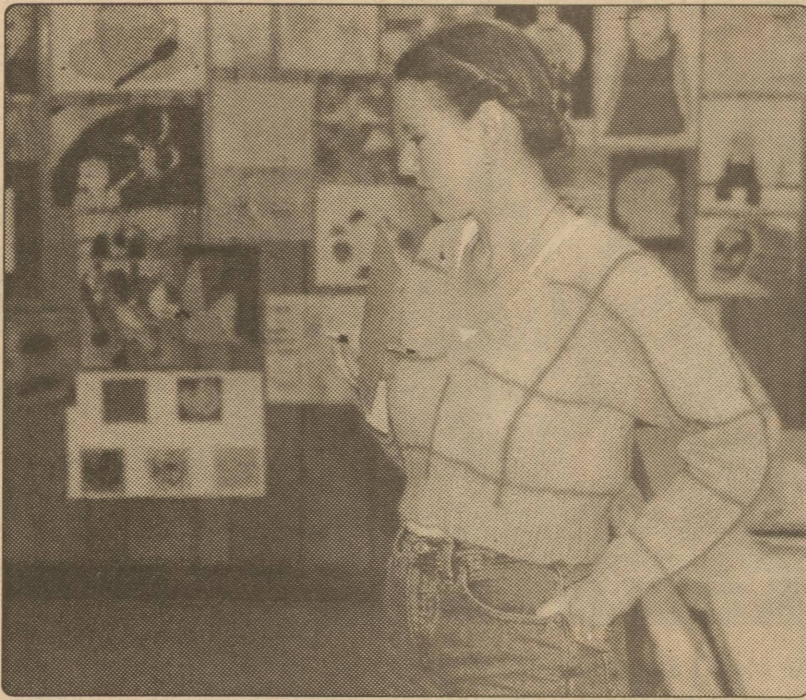

With that, the court moved on to open bids for the construction of an animal feeding facility near the Civic Center. Mikeska Welding of Eldorado was the low bidder at \$19,800.00 and was awarded the job. A bid by Paul Martinez of Sonora for \$22,605.00 was rejected. However, the men did agree to pay Martinez \$330.00 for his help in redesigning the plans for the facility. As part of the work on the feeding facility, Schleicher County will supply the building material, concrete, water and electrical supplies.

Next, Fire Chief Jerry Jones informed the commissioners of un-

derground leaks in the fuel line that serves the fire department's fueling station. The court authorized Jones to carry out repairs as needed.

The commissioners then voted unanimously to purchase an electronic fuel card reader for use at the county airport. Also, the county will buy a fuel tank, pump and fittings necessary to sell unleaded fuel at the airport. It was noted that the system will be plumbed for jet fuel, which will be added at a later date.

Before adjourning, Commissioner Johnny Mayo asked the court to consider finding willing people to serve on an airport board.
