Romper Relay Records Broken Last Week

The elementary boys made a definite showing during the annual Romper Relays held at the track two weeks ago, breaking 16 of the old school records.

In fourth grade events, Marco Martinez broke the 55 meter hurdles with a 11.13 timing and Joe Montalvo broke the 35 meter hurdles record with a 7.38 time. The relay team of Stan Meador, Donny Hefferman, Howard Ledbetter and Trey Preston broke the 400 meter relay record with a 63.87 timing.

Meador also broke the 45 meter dash, timed at 7.5 and Richard Adame broke the 100 meter dash record, timed at 16.26. Robert Espinosa broke the 1600 meter run, timed at 2:01.43 and Howard Ledbetter broke the 55 meter dash record.

Fifth graders Neal Edmiston and Rob Ingle broke the 35 meter hurdles and the 55 meter dash, respectively with times of 7.18 and 9.23. Corey Rodgers broke the 100 meter dash with a time of 15.67.

The fifth grade 400 meter relay team of Corey Rodgers, Todd Edmiston, Brant Ward and Neal Edmiston broke the record with a 64.67 time. Jeffrey Hausenfluck and Neal Edmiston tied with a time of 1:53.02 to break the 600 meter run.

In sixth grade events, Russ Dacy broke the 55 meter hurdles with a 10:13 timing and Gilbert Guana broke the 55 meter dash record with a time of 8.57. He also broke the 100 meter dash record with a time of 14.82.

The sixth grade 400 meter relay team of James Harlin, Mitchell Bradley, Troy Daniels, and Richard Gawrychowski ran 59.15 to break another record.

In field events, Mano Gauna broke

the fifth grade shot put with a 25 foot, 11 inch throw. In the fourth grade long jump, Carter Edmiston broke the record with an 11 foot, 5 inch jump.

In the sixth grade long jump, Richard Gawrychowski broke the record with a 13 foot, eight inch effort. Cruz Sanchez broke the fourth grade discuss event with a 55 foot, four inch throw and Jody Romero broke the fifth grade discuss event with a 57 foot, five inch effort.

About 270 persons ate at the banquet and then watched as the high school athletes were recognized. As each coach named off his team members, he relived some of the humorous stories about the athletic season. They gave the background on some of the nicknames the students picked up during the year, along with some other stories, much to the audience's delight.

The highlight of the event was the presentation of two special awards, the Fighting Heart trophy which went to Mike Griffith and Kara Homer and the American Legion Sportsmanship award which was presented to John Paul Joiner and Linda Gentry. The Fighting Heart award is voted upon by the coaching staff and the Sportsmanship Award is voted upon by players.

In football, Mark Wallis was named outstanding lineman, Eddy Montalvo was named outstanding back and Mike Griffith named most valuable player. Captains for the year were Mark Wallis, Ed Willoughby and Ronnie Hall.

Most outstanding player awards went to junior Lori Patton, girls varsity basketball; Wesley Wilson, varsity boys basketball; Sherri Walling, girls track and John Paul Joiner, boys track.

In his opening remarks, athletic director Johnny Clawson stated he felt the athletic program had progressed during the 1980-81 school year. There were 114 students out of

185 in high school who participated in athletics. "This is great participation especially when many of these doubled and tripled in sports and literary events. We have had tremendous success this year. These students have represented this community very well," he said.

Clawson also praised the varsity football team for playing with "a lot of heart and a lot of injuries. You can't measure success in wins and losses. Winning is not the only thing to be accounted for. These young men feel like they had a successful season. Don't let their record fool you; they did an excellent job," Clawson said.

Junior varsity football coach Gregg Copland praised his undefeated team for their teamwork and pride. "It is enjoyable to coach boys like these," he stated.

Girls basketball coach Larry Mitchel said his girls went into the new system "like champions." He added that both the varsity and junior varsity girls "learned a lot" by working with a new coach and a new system. He said they played exceptionally good ball with a good attitude and leadership.

"We needed team effort and that's what we had," said Coach Craig Bessent about the junior varsity boys basketball team. He added the boys played as hard as they could "and everything always turned out right."

"I hope everyone comes and supports us next year like they did this year," said Coach Matt Chalmers while introducing the varsity boys basketball team. He also praised the players saying they played with everything they had."

A good attitude on the part of the girls track team was noted by Mitchel as he named the members of

that sport event. He said the team "learned some good lessons as individuals and as a team," although they were plagued with injuries and soreness. He said he was proud of them and they learned to be proud of themselves, too.

Bessent again praised the junior varsity boys when it came to boys track, noting the "green was always on the track" meaning the boys had good team spirit. The spirit counted as they were undefeated in the track season and broke many individual and team records.

Copland told his varsity track team "Thank you for a year to remember forever. But don't forget how hard you had to work to get what you had--a great year." He noted that even if the team got third in the district, the boys ran with their hearts and learned a few things on the side."

The tennis team, coached by Clawson, participated in the "toughest district in the state" but had a successful year.

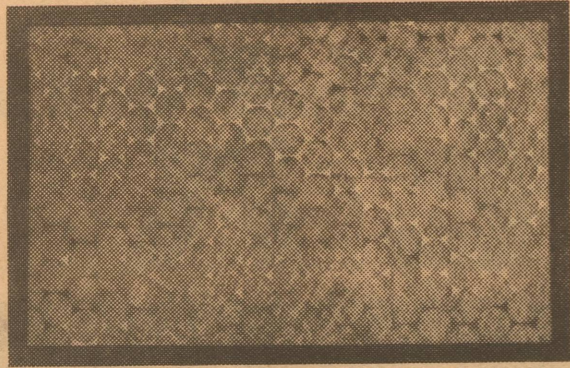

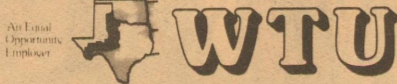

No Signs of Screwworms Seen

Intensive fly trapping and ranch visits by livestock inspectors have detected no further sign of screwworm activity in the Sutton County area since four screwworms were collected March 31.

Trapping surveillance and sterile fly release is expected to continue in the area until mid-May, says Dr. James E. Novy, director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Laboratory.

"A combined force of inspectors from the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) Screwworm Lab and from the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) will visit ranches in the area before the fly release program ends."

After mid-May most continuing surveillance in the area will be under direction of TAHC supervisory livestock inspector Jack Schwarz of Leakey. Most APHIS personnel will re-

turn to their routine surveillance duties.

"Livestock owners are doing an outstanding job of submitting samples of worms found in wounds for laboratory identification this year," says Novy. The 560 samples identified at Mission by May 1 of this year compare to only 337 by the same date in 1980.

Prompt sample submission by livestock owners and caretakers is essential to detect any new screwworm population in the U.S., says the veterinarian.

Monday through Wednesday, with breakfast being served at the church at 9 a.m. those same days. Leading the revival will be George Koehl, minister of music at Crescent Baptist Church in Abilene.

Fike is a native of Mississippi and a graduate of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary in New Orleans, La. He is expected to receive his master of divinity degree this month. He has led about 160 revivals and several re-

treats as well as youth rallies. He has been youth

director at Long Beach, Miss., a missionary to Africa and worked with persons in prisons and rest homes.

Koehl is the minister of music and youth at Crescent Heights Baptist Church in Abilene. He is a native of Midland and has earned a bachelor of music degree and a master of music degree from Hardin-Simmons University.

He has been a graduate assistant in teaching piano, a camp counselor, life-guard, office supply delivery man, receptionist, game room attendant, restaurant waiter and night custodian at a meat market.

Council Hires Attorney, Votes to Get Bids

The Eldorado City Council met May 12 to discuss and act upon four minor items.

The city hired F.W. Ferrell, an attorney from Sonora, for representation if needed.

Councilmen also voted to obtain two bids for paving East Street and two bids for replacement of City Gas distribution. Figures from the bids will be used to calculate the total costs which will be presented to

the council at a later date.

A letter was read from Patton Enochs and Weaterly Kinser re-

quishing their rights to six inch sewer line in the Hill and West additions. The city will be maintaining the lines.

Councilmen also decided to install a relief system close to the Ken Thomas and Zeila Baker residences to prevent a backup situation during heavy rainfall.

WTRC Directors Are Challenged At Meeting

Members of the board of directors of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center were challenged at their luncheon meeting Wednesday to raise \$475,282 by July 10.

The funds are needed for the building of a \$1.5 million facility in the San Angelo area where a large patient load has exceeded the capacity of the existing building. There are 592 patients receiving treatment in San Angelo and approximately 100 new admissions each month.

The July deadline was set by the J.E. and L. E. Mabee Foundation in their half-million dollar challenge grant given WTRC earlier this month.

The board also learned about several new programs during a report by Bill Snowden, director of treatment services. "Cognitive Rehabilitation" is a program to help victims of stroke or head injury regain the learning processes that were lost. Two patients have started this six-hour-a-day program which integrates the work of various therapy departments.

Work evaluation, established in cooperation with the Texas Rehabilitation Commission, is a new program designed to match handicapped persons' skills with jobs.

In his report, Snowden noted that of the 1,976 active patients at the Abilene facility, about 500 had been receiving therapy for more than six months. He described one such patient, Zach Briley, familiar to many as the Rehab poster child for the past several years. The three-year-old

boy, born with Spina Bifida, has a number of physical ailments including a stroke which paralyzed part of his body. After re-learning to walk with his braces and crutches, Zach broke his leg earlier this week and was back at the Rehab Center in a wheelchair Wednesday morning.

Board members passed a memorial resolution honoring Bilby Wallace of Clairmont who died Sunday. Wallace had been a board member and area chairman for the Cripplemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

Howard Tracy Buried May 15

Funeral services were held May 15 in McAllen for a former Eldorado resident, Howard Tracy, 34. Tracy died May 10 after a sudden illness.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C.A. Tracy of McAllen and one sister, Claudia Coleman. His mother is the former Frances Robinson of Eldorado.

Cows Need

Good Nutrition

A cow's reproductive performance is directly related to her plane of nutrition, says a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Nutrient requirements depend on age, condition, weight, stage of production and milking ability of the cow during lactation. Once requirements are determined, the herd should be separated and fed according to these needs.

School System Begins Program For Students

Schleicher County school district personnel are, in the process of recognizing the gifted and talented children in grades three through six, as part of a new program in the district.

These children are the ones whose abilities, talents and potential for accomplishment are so outstanding that they require a variety of special provisions to meet their educational needs. As children, they are found in all races, socioeconomic groups, geographic locales and environments.

Gifted and talented children are those identified by professionally qualified persons who by virtue of outstanding abilities, are capable of high performance. They require differ-

entiated educational programs and/or services beyond those normally provided by the regular school program in order to realize their contribution to self and study.

The students will be nominated by school personnel and other persons familiar with the students' performances, behavior or abilities. Parents of children who will be in grades three to six during the 1981-82 school year in Eldorado are encouraged to visit with school counselor Ken Newman to discuss the program before Aug. 28.

Newman said about nine or ten youths will be part of the program during the upcoming school year. The program is expected to be in full swing by Oct. 15.

WTU Applying For New Plant

An application has been filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity for a coal-fired generating plant to be built in North Texas by West Texas Utilities Company and two other operating companies in the Central and South West Corporation.

The certificate is required before actual construction can start on the plant, which will be built on a 1,937 acre tract which WTU purchased from the fabled Waggoner Ranch eight miles southeast of Vernon and three miles southwest of Oklaunion. The application is for Oklaunion Power Station Unit No. 1, which will have a net capacity for 640 megawatts. Ultimately, three units with a total capacity of 1,920 megawatts are planned.

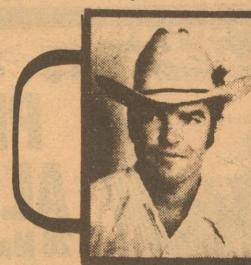
Cooling water will come from Lake Diversion, 20 miles south of the site. WTU purchased water rights in 1977 from Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2 and the City of Wichita Falls. Boiler fuel will be low sulphur western coal, probably from Wyoming mines. Oklaunion will be the

first power plant of be jointly owned by CSW operating companies. WTU, the managing partner, will own 350 megawatts, Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi 115 megawatts, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma 175 megawatts. The other CSW operating company, Southwestern Electric Power Company of Shreveport, will not participate. PSO's participation hinges on a favorable ruling by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission regarding an agreement between the CSW System and members of the intrastate Texas Interconnected System to install direct current interconnections across state lines.

As I write this column, an electrical storm hangs over San Angelo and the rain is pouring down. It is quite a sight from my office window on the fourth floor of the Continental Building, in the downtown sector of this growing city on the three Concho Rivers.

At a glimpse from my desk, I spot a long bolt of lightning over O.C. Fisher Lake and back to the north, another over the coliseum, and in the east there is a dark cloud over Producers Auction. Down below, before the rain started a squirrel seemed lost on the sidewalk on old Chadbourne Street. He quickly disappeared in a Liveoak tree.

It is a real satisfaction to a country boy at heart to see the rain now and to witness all the good it has done for the past three months across Southwest Texas. Not only are the ranges in topnotch shape but the farms as well.

Joe Pat Jones of Eden predicts a good wheat crop in Concho Country with about 20 bushels to the acre. "That's pretty good for a dryland farm in these parts," he smiled.

In Menard the other day, I took time to make the feed rounds with publisher-rancher Dan Feather. There was the Spanish goat and some club lambs to feed and changing the water for the pet rabbit.

Rain in that area has ranchmen mowing the grass and weeds in their pens around the house so they can work stock. It is somewhat of a contrast from working sheep in the dusty environment of several springs ago.

In Fort Stockton recently, I had a nice visit with high school classmate Bobby Neal, now district manager for USDA Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service. Bobby travels in Trans-Pecos to Marfa and El Paso and reports good vegetation. "It's most unusual to receive moisture this early in the year," he adds.

Frank Baker, Pioneer publisher, commented on the good grass cover while we drink coffee.

I also talked to some Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children chairmen when on the trip to Stockton and around by Sterling City. I don't know if its the unstable market

situation or the fattening of steers and heifers on wholesome country grass but I am already receiving some donations of livestock for the annual drive. And we won't officially kick it off until August.

At breakfast the other morning Louis Fohn told me the Uvalde area was making a slow comeback from extensive hail damage. Not only did a recent storm claim just about every window in downtown Uvalde but did considerable agricultural damage.

All of the peach lovers are praying for a hail-proof shield to hang over Gillespie County for the next six weeks during this normal storm season. And if all holds, this will be a bumper crop year. Duery Menzies of Fredericksburg says early harvest is running high and predicts the best production in many years right on into summer for the juicy fruit.

It looks pretty rosy as one observes the countryside. If we could get the high interest rates down, the inflation down and the sheep and cattle prices up...well, it would indeed be rosy!

Pay Attention To Your Garden Now

EDITOR'S NOTE--This is the last in a series of articles concerning gardening in Schleicher County. Provided by county extension agents Jerry Swift and Nancy Lester, it has been a regular feature in the Leader.

The past four weeks I've talked a lot about the "whys" and "hows" of growing a successful vegetable garden in Schleicher County.

If you've been doing the right things at the right times such as planting the right varieties and fertilizing, watering, mulching and controlling pests properly, chances are you've begun to enjoy the "fruits of your labor."

Most inexperienced gardeners have a tendency to believe all that's left to do is to sit back and enjoy all those tasty, fresh vegetables. Believe me, that's wrong!

If anything, you should pay even closer attention to your garden and what's going on out there. An outbreak of disease, an infestation of damaging insects, or even a short drought period can wreck your garden and make all previous efforts worthless.

Also, make it a point to harvest all your vegetables

when they mature. To get the most from your garden, harvest your vegetables when they mature. To get the most from your garden, harvest your vegetables at their best stage for eating. This is also a must for canning and freezing. The final quality of your preserved vegetables is no better than the quality you began with. In other words, what you put in the jar is what you take out.

After all the effort you've put into growing your garden this year, make sure that you enjoy your vegetables at their peak of quality. It's important to remember that once a vegetable is removed from your garden, it has no further source of food nor can it replace loss of moisture. So, make the time between harvesting and eating or preserving as short as possible.

Now it's time for a little philosophy. Gardening is a great activity--for everyone. Its rewards are many, but there's one that's overlooked by most and that's an appreciation of agriculture. You haven't been gardening; you've been "backyard farming."

If you have been successful this year, you owe a lot of the success to the advances brought about by modern science and research conducted by land grant universities and private industry. New varieties, improved cultural techniques, high efficiency fertilizers, and safe and effective pest control chemicals are all the result of a highly sophisticated agricultural system like no other anywhere in the world.

If your garden was a failure or just didn't live up to your expectations, try to figure out what went wrong. Vow to do better next time. And on your next trip to the local grocery store, be appreciative and thankful for the small number of farmers doing a great job to feed America.

I hope you've enjoyed the information I've provided you these past several weeks. Its purpose was to help you have a better garden during 1981. My office has numerous publications on vegetable gardening which are yours for the asking.

Researchers Read Electron Signals

Cancer researchers are "reading" electron signals from damaged kidney cells to find ways of removing or preventing the bad effects of good chemicals used in treating cancer.

Dr. Dennis C. Doby, Assistant Professor of Pathology at the University of Texas Health Science Center here, has found areas of damage in the kidneys resulting from use of cisplatin (CP), a powerful anti-cancer compound used for several types of cancer in its advanced stage. His research is supported by an American Cancer Society grant.

Dr. Doby, in previous studies with colleagues at Stanford University, has identified an area in the kidneys damaged by CP. Using a new half-million-dollar electron probe micro-analyzer, the researchers will now be able to examine a single nephron segment, millions of which comprise the kidney tissue. The probe aims a stream of electrons at the targeted cells and "focuses" on a single element of a molecule and produces a readable signal, depending on its particular wavelength.

For the first time, scientists here will be able to pinpoint the exact areas destroyed or damaged by the anti-cancer drug. Enzyme systems which have been disrupted can be traced and ways of preventing drug damage ultimately developed.

Maintenance Tips For Mowers Described

It's lawn mowing season again and millions of households will buy a power mower or other lawn equipment this year. While these tools are a great help in lessening the lawn care burden, they also account for over 60,000 injuries that require hospital emergency room treatment each year. Choose power lawn equipment with safety and quality in mind, advises the Better Business Bureau.

In addition to mowers, the market offers other tools to make lawn care and gardening easier. There are trimmers, edger/trimmers, shredder/grinders, yard vacuums and leaf blowers. In general, the buying and maintenance tips for mowers described below apply to all of this lawn equipment.

Comparison shop for product features and durability. The least expensive mower may prove to be the most expensive in the long run. It may prove to have the shortest life, need more repairs and be less safe.

One way to save money on a power mower is to buy it out of season. Time the purchase to coincide with pre-season or post-season sales. Regardless of when the purchase is made, look for promotions which include free or low-cost accessories for the mower.

Decide what features are desirable and cost-effective. Is an electric starter worth the added cost over comparable models with hand pull starting mechanisms? Is a bagging attachment needed? Unnecessary attachments, however, may boost the price of the mower.

Buy the mower that suits the lawn it will be cutting. The lawn may be large enough to justify a self-propelled, wide cutting width mower, but it may not be cost-effective to buy a riding mower or lawn tractor unless that's really what's needed.

Look for the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute Safety seal. Usually found on the back of a mower, it signifies that the model has been approved by an independent testing laboratory and it meets established mower safety specifications.

Buy from an established, qualified retailer, one who will stand behind the sale and provide proper service and replacement parts. Before dealing with any company, check with the Better Business Bureau for a reliability report.

Ask about and understand the warranty on the mower before buying. A comprehensive warranty will be an important factor in keeping long-range maintenance costs down.

Read the owner's manual thoroughly before using the new power equipment. Times change and so do mowers. Chances are that a new model with new features and operating instructions does not work like previously-owned mowers. For safety's sake, become acquainted with the mower and its controls before starting the engine. Also, read or reread all safe operating procedures recommended in the owner's manual.

Ways To Cut Repair Costs To limit the need for repairs:

- Check the oil and fuel levels before each cutting;
- Keep the mower clean and free of grass and dirt buildup;
- Check out the underside of the mower after each use;
- Check the blade periodically for sharpness and balance;
- Clean or replace spark plugs once a year;
- Occasionally check all bolts for tightness;
- Drain the gas and, if recommended by the manufacturer, the oil, before storing the mower in the fall.

The Better Business Bureau strongly stresses that homeowners always turn off the mower or lawn equipment before making any maintenance checks.

With proper care, a power mower will deliver many years of useful life. Based on industry averages, consumers can expect at least 5 to 6 years of useful life. Based on industry averages, consumers can expect at least 5 to 6 years of use from a walk-behind power mower and 6 to 7 years from a riding mower.

Results Of TABS Tests Received

Larry Blair Joins Program

Larry Delwood Blair, a 1964 graduate of Eldorado High School, has been offered entrance into the University of Texas Cooperative Superintendent Program.

This is a fellowship program offered to only ten applicants from the entire state of Texas.

He will be participating in the fourth 23-month program to be offered. It was started by the Texas school and has been copied by schools in other states since.

Applicants are hired by the Texas Education Agency for a 23-month term. Their work hours are scheduled around class periods at the university.

Blair will be working toward his Ph.D. status in Education while keeping his economic status.

After graduation, the students are placed by the university and the TEA.

Larry Blair is a native of Eldorado and holds degrees from Angelo State University.

He has already submitted his resignation as the Eden Independent School District Superintendent. Before he served as Superintendent with Eden ISD, he had been affiliated with Robert Lee, Ft. Stockton, and Medina schools.

His wife Judy, has taught English at Eden High School and has submitted her resignation, effective at the end of this school term.

Collins Introduces Energy Package

Texas Congressman Jim Collins has introduced a legislative energy package consisting of six separate bills which would remove certain pricing and taxation inequities currently affecting the domestic oil and gas industry.

"The time has come for the American energy industry to be freed from those unnecessary restrictions that hamper domestic exploration and drilling. America must become energy independent again.

Last year we sent \$80 Billion overseas to pay for foreign oil, up from only \$3 Billion in 1973," Collins, a member of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, said.

The Collins Energy Package bills:

--Remove certain price controls from unproduced gas from a new reservoir or lease, or gas that is reached through an existing well if new drilling is required.
"The enactment of these bills is necessary to provide

the domestic energy industry with incentives to produce oil and gas in this country. We must remove the disincentives now. For example, the IDC tax encourages well abandonment and the 1969 reduction in the percentage depletion allowance caused 21 percent fewer wells to be drilled in 1970. Enactment of my energy package is a step in the direction of American energy independence," Collins said.
