## Just Talkin'

The City Council recently approved repairs on the underground water storage tank on Hill Street, as it was beginning to deteriorate on the bottom and sides. They hired a firm to put a fiberglass coating on the bottom and one foot up the sides. It was scrapped, primed and painted, on the outside as well.

Well, the council decided that the tank had to be inspected, so members met Saturday morning and made the trip. Among those being brave enough to enter were councilman Vida Mercer and city secretary Carolyn Mayo.

Entry has to be made through a hole in the side of the tank, which Carolyn says presents a tricky situation, especially if you are short. However, once inside, it was very interesting. A representative of the firm was on hand and told the women they were the first women he ever had inspect a tank during the 20 years he has been in the business.

Speaking of the City Council, remember when the Council was talking about replacing the chairs in the City Hall because they were being held together with baling wire? At the time, Billy McCravy commented that they had not better buy more comfortable chairs because they might make them stay longer and the meetings were already long enough.

Well, they decided to have the old chairs sent off and repaired. They returned to City Hall last week, glued back together and without the baling wire. They may not be more comfortable than before but at least councilmen won't have to worry about one of them giving away during an important part of the meeting!

Perhaps you noticed a large billowing cloud of smoke to the northwest Friday afternoon, which looked very ominous. We did, too, and since it was a slow afternoon, we took a wild tear to investigate.

Of course, smoke can always fool you, as it is always further away than you think it is. But, being determined, we found the source of the smoke.

It was an oil spill on the Jones land off the Merton Highway. A spokesman for Regal Development who happened to be on the scene, told us that the tanks were not full on Thursday, but sometime during the night, the well began pumping on its own, filling the tanks and causing them to run over.

About 20 barrels of oil ran down into the pasture and had to be burned off. Several workers were also on the site building a ditch around the tanks to prevent another spillover.

## Eldorado School Is Conducting Self-Study

Administration and faculty of the Schleicher County school system will be busy during the next several months outlining learning goals and curriculum guides for the next five years. The self-study is the initial part of an accreditation process required by the Texas Education Agency.

School Superintendent Guy Whitaker explained that the school was accredited by TEA five years ago and now has to undergo the accreditation process again. During this school year, the school system will continue to implement the plan made during the first five year plan and at the same time re-enter the accreditation process, with the self-study.

During the 1981-82 school year, learning goals for each area of school activity will be outlined. In March of 1982, the school will have to submit its five year plan.

Individual teachers will be asked to submit their own goals and ideas for the self-study. A committee will be appointed to compile a list of goals and determine if they are within TEA guidelines. The completed list of guidelines and goals are then submitted.

The goals are usually broad and basic, said Whitaker, but are followed by detailed steps on how they are to be carried out. "Everyone will be involved in this self-study and determining our goals," he said. "It will

be a very in-depth study."

As part of the process, TEA representatives make a monitoring visit to the school to see if teachers and administration are following their own guidelines. Such a visit was made to the local school system this year. The school received a good rating, said Whitaker, except for bi-lingual education.

Because of this, the school conducted an at-home survey to see how many elementary students spoke a major language other than English in their homes, and are in the process of conducting the same test in high school. Whitaker estimated that there are 50-60 students in the district who speak another major language in their homes.

Because the number of students speaking a major language other than English is that low, the district is not required to hire bi-lingual teachers. Instead, the district is using home room teachers to work with these students so they will pick up more English.

This area will be one of the major areas the district will work on during its self-study and determining its goals for the next five year.

"Actually, with the self-study, setting goals and the monitoring visits, the accreditation process is a never ending one," the superintendent noted.

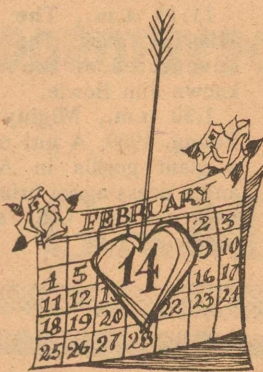
The first service was held Feb. 21, with Mrs. Nora Gee of San

O'Harrow is a veteran of Foreign Wars, serving during World War II.

In announcing his candidacy, O'Harrow said, "As a native of Eldorado, I have worked 14 years and seven months as a law enforcement officer in Schleicher County. I

would like to have the opportunity to serve the people of Schleicher County. I feel I am well qualified to carry out the duties of this office. I will uphold the law, be fair and truthful and will represent all the people of Schleicher County to the best of my ability."

## Randy Stout Is Running For District Attorney

Randy Stout, a native of San Angelo, announced today that he is a candidate for district attorney of the 51st Judicial District.

Stout, a former Bobcat All-American said he wanted to be district attorney because, "I want to give something back to the community which has done so much for me."

Candidate Stout attended the University of Texas on a football scholarship. He graduated with a bache-

lors' degree in government and history. In 1973, Stout entered South Texas College of Law in Houston. While attending law school, he interned with the Harris County District Attorneys' office. Stout was admitted to the Texas State Bar in 1976 and since that time has been active in the prosecution of criminal cases.

Stout worked for the Galveston District Attorneys' office for over two years. During that time, prosecutor Stout tried over 50 jury trials. In May of 1979, he returned home to join the Tom Green County Attorneys' office.

"I think I'll make a good district attorney for two reasons," Stout said. "One, my experience as a criminal prosecutor and, two, my belief that some cases demand a jury trial either because of the offenders' record or because of the nature of the crime. When elected DA of the 51st district, I will be a tough but fair prosecutor."

Stout faces Gerald Fohn in the May 3 Democratic Primary. The 51st and 119th Judicial Districts overlap. The 51st district covers Tom Green, Coke, Schleicher, Irion and Sterling Counties. The 119th covers Tom Green, Concho and Runnels Counties. Royal Hart is district attorney of the 119th district.

Stout married the former Julia McIngvale of Dallas. They have two sons, Randal Lane, Jr. and William Henry.

## Focus On Small Business

In the face of high taxes and government regulation and red tape, it's little wonder that so few small firms are being started to explore new technologies and develop new products. What, if anything, is government doing to encourage new small innovative companies?

There is growing sentiment in the country, including Congress, to grant more favored tax and regulatory status to small technology companies. There also is feeling ways must be found to direct venture capital to such small enterprises.

Small Business Administration released a report outlining the need for more innovation by small entrepreneurs. This report recommended legislation to give such small companies more favorable tax treatment, less government regulation, more government "seed money" and more incentive through changes in outdated patent laws. The report said such changes would help boost national productivity and lessen inflation.

Numerous studies have shown that there is a drop in U.S. productivity; that the number of patents has fallen off sharply; and that small and medium size companies just area not being formed because of the lack of incentives--many government-related.

The concern about these small firms is earnest because they were responsible for half of all major industrial inventions and innovations since World War II.

There is some concern that the Nation is losing its ability to innovate and that we have taken our technological superiority for granted. There's also the feeling that as American businesses grow larger and larger they have less drive to take chances--to invent, to innovate, to take risks on research.

Generally, studies have shown that there are four areas that need to be worked on if the decline of small R&D firms is to be halted:

- A new two-tiered, Federal regulatory system that would give small business-

es more leeway in meeting Federal standards for environmental matters.

- New Federal tax laws to give small businesses special writeoffs, depreciation, and the option of deferring capital gains if the money is rolled over or reinvested in another small business.

- Pumping of several hundred million dollars annually of Federal R&D money into the small businesses by requiring Federal agencies to set aside percentages of their research dollars.

- Patent laws to allow small businesses to retain, under certain conditions, patent rights on inventions made under Federally-sponsored research.


