Hospital trustees vote to sell home to Dr. Perez

A dozen red roses marked the chair where the late Delia Pina normally sat during hospital board meetings. Her death two weeks ago in a tragic bus accident left her fellow board members at a loss for words Monday night as they met for the first time since the event. The roses, and the vacant chair, placed there as a tribute, served as a reminder of Ms. Pina's years of service to the medical center.

Board President Randy Mankin alled the meeting to order. "We have lost one of our own," he said of Ms. Pina. "Her passing has left a giant hole in our midst. We can never replace Delia but we shall always miss her.'

Among other items of business the board took up the sale of a house owned by the hospital district on Honeysuckle St. Sealed bids were received from three individuals with Dr. Lillian Perez, the current occupant of the house, delivering the high bid of \$105,000.00. After discussing the matter briefly, the board voted unanimously to accept the bid and asked Hospital Administrator Sharon Dietz to meet with Dr. Perez and attorney James Kosub to finalize the sale.

A \$98,500.00 bid, submitted by Stan and Gloria Meador and an \$84,650.00 bid from Herman Walker were rejected.

Among other items of business, the trustees heard from former SCMC em-


ployee Lucia Guajardo regarding her employment status at the nursing home Board President Randy Mankin explained to Ms. Guajardo that since she wasn't on the agenda their questions could not be addressed by the board. At that point, Ms. Guajardo, who is a Certified Nurse Aide, explained that she had recently been laid off and questioned why she had been selected. Joining Ms. Guajardo were Rita McWhorter and Mary Roden. The ladies praised Mrs. Guajardo's work ethnic and professionalism and pointed out that she had been employed at the facility for 18 years. Again, Randy Mankin advised that the board could not discuss the matter. He then explained how the women could have their names placed on the agenda for the next meeting.

The trustees also took up the question of naming and employee of the year. Each year, SCMC employees vote on who they believe should receive the prestigious honor. As in years past, the trustees entered into an executive session where they tallied the votes. They emerged into open session without taking action or making public comment except to say that the SCMC employee of the year would be named during the annual Christmas Party.

A review of the district's financial records indicated a loss of \$28,471 for the month of September. Overall, however, the facility is posting an \$81,181 profit year-to-date.

In other business, the trustees also gave their approval to an agreement with Schleicher County ISD that allows students in the school's Health Occupations classes to hold classes in the hospital and nursing home. They also reviewed and approved several updates to policy & procedures manuals including those concerning Tuberculosis, the Safe Medical Device Act, and the hospital's

Schleicher County will also participate in the special, late, 2-week antlerless and spike season (no fork-antlered bucks allowed during the special late season) that will open Monday, January 5, and run through Sunday, January 18, 2004. This late rifle season takes the place of the previously listed muzzleloader season; however, muzzleloaders may be used during any of the other regular firearm


