Eagles stop Braves, 7-0

Eldorado's undefeated Eagles are facing an opponent they have little experience in handling.

The War Birds of Coach Armando San Miguel are winning this season and are starting to face the pressures that go with that success.

"We have been telling the kids that they cannot afford to have a bad game or a practice and that they have to stay mentally tough and not take anyone else for granted.

"We're getting lots of good publicity this year and folks are expecting us to win. That's new to our kids and we have been making a special effort to help them handle it," San Miguel reported.

The locals are expected to win again this week over Class AAA and neighborhood rival Sonora. The Harris Poll has the "Mean Green" as two-point favorites. 1984 was the last time an Eldorado team started with a 2-0 beginning.

Eldorado kept their mark unblemished by squeaking past Iraan in a tough, hard-fought contest, 7-0.

Wide receiver Trey Preston made a beautiful over the shoulder catch on a perfectly thrown spiral by quarterback Brad Bass to notch the locals' only TD of the game. Carter Edmiston booted the PAT and just missed a third quarter field goal.

"The Iraan game has turned into a big rivalry. We did a great

job defensively, but our passing game broke down somewhat. They threw a different defense at us than we were expecting.

"Iraan played tough and so did we. Our coaches made some adjustments at halftime that really helped too," San Miguel added.

Three weeks after school started in the fall term of 1922, about 20 gathered to organize the annual girls basketball team. Salome Stewardson was elected captain and Delta Boothe business manager. Miss Albertine Kent, one of the school faculty, consented to become the coach.

The following games were played: Eldorado 8, Sonora 9; Eldorado 26, Christoval 9; Eldorado 18, Christoval 9; Eldorado

24, Christoval 13; Eldorado 18, Sonora 16; Eldorado 23, Menard 7.

Board hears gripes

The Schleicher County Medical Center Board met Thursday night, September 8. A general discussion was held about what goes on at the hospital.

Several citizens were on hand to express their concerns about the changes in personnel and the setting of the tax rate.

The main purpose of the medical center is to provide good patient care. The rules set down are the same for small hospitals as anywhere else. But payment to small hospitals is less in comparison to larger ones.

Medicare expenses are set by the government. There is a set of rules and regulations which are broad and general and set by law.

"Examiners come out once a year. If anything is not right as to what it should be--we have to fix it so the examiners like it," William Edmiston, board member, stated.

Edmiston explained that Medicare pays a set fee of what they think a service rendered is worth. Rural hospitals are on a different pay scale than urban hospitals.

"Our tax rate is up because our utilization of facilities is down," Edmiston noted. About 60 to 70 percent of the cases that come in are Medicare related. If surgery is needed the patient has to go elsewhere.

There is not enough of a case load here to keep a surgical team on call--not enough demand for surgery.

Dr. Johnson was on hand at the meeting. He stated "If a patient's illness can be better treated by the level of technology that exists in San Angelo, then the patient will be transferred there without hesitation."

"If we don't have a doctor here, we don't have a hospital. It's important to have good doctors," Edmiston added.

The board adopted the budget two weeks ago. The proposed tax rate is \$.3486 cents per \$100 evaluation. The board will hold a public hearing on the proposed tax rate on September 8 and a public meeting on September 16 to vote on the tax rate.

Last year there was a decrease of .04 cents and the rate

Eldorado Mom has statement

Linda Creel, mother of two children in the Schleicher County Independent School District, met with the SCISD board of trustees Monday and issued the following statement:

"Mr. President, members of the school board, Superintendent Moore, gentlemen, thank you for this opportunity to speak about a subject of mutual concern: the goals and objectives of our Schleicher County school system. "At the last regular meeting of the school board, you voted to

employ Strategic Planning to assist you, the members of the school board, in formulating goals and objectives that could be used for guiding the operations of the school system. I submit to you tonight that these goals and objectives are already formulated and can be found in the Board Policy Manual, Schleicher County ISD, on page AE and AF. My concern as a parent is that the goals you already have are not being met. I contend that before new goals and objectives are grafted onto the present system, a concerted effort should be made to evaluate how well, if at all, the present goals and objectives are being met.

"Since the board meeting last month, I have spoken to all but two of the board members. As a result of these discussions, I have come to the conclusion that the major problem you face as a board is that you are not able to come to grips with your stated objectives and goals. They are only lines of writing on a page and not the motivating force guiding board actions and decisions. Some examples which come immediately to mind are:

"1. The total function 36 budget for coaching stipends alone is \$53,400.00. This figure does not include the cost of athletic travel, equipment purchase or maintenance. The total budget allocated for library books under Function 22 is \$5,850.00 if magazine subscriptions are included, the total rises to \$8,550.00 or a ratio of \$6.24 on coaching salaries for every dollar spent on books. This ration is of great concern to me because the athletic program represents 1/19 of your goals and objectives while books impact directly upon all 19 goals.

"2. There are currently two noncertified individuals employed in the high school. They have been hired to teach major core subjects: mathematics and science. While I would not suggest that a teaching certificate endows the holder with mystical powers, I do contend that possession of a teaching certificate indicates a certain commitment on the part of the

holder toward the profession of teaching as a life calling and not just as a fall-back option during difficult economic times.

"3. As I have discussed my concerns with you, several board members have told me that we have a good school. My answer is, do we? Consider the following:

"A. Slightly more than half of Eldorado students take the ACT each year. Those students who took the ACT between the fall of 1984 and the spring of 1988 scored below the national average in all areas tested. The same students scored below the Texas state average in math and social studies. On a composite average, Eldorado students score more than two points lower than the national average and almost a point lower than the Texas state average. In other words, when measured by this standardized instrument, even our college-bound students do not measure up to the norm.

"B. When measured against

the SAT, Eldorado students score 13 points higher than the national average in verbal skills and 26 points lower than the national average in mathematical skills.

"From the foregoing, it is evident that with the exception of the English department which is performing adequately, the rest of the academic, college preparatory, program of the school is not performing at the national level and, in the case of mathematics and social studies is not performing at the Texas level either.

"In conclusion, I will counter the statement that we have a good school in Eldorado by saying no, we don't. We do not even have an average school by Texas standards which rank below the national average. Now is the time to stop kidding ourselves and to come to grips with unpalatable facts. We are below average. Now is the time to come to grips with the objectives and goals you already profess as elected representatives of the community. Your children and mine deserve the best education we can give them and they are not getting it."

The Merry Makers 42 Club met with Lillian Mikeska Thursday, September 8 in her home.

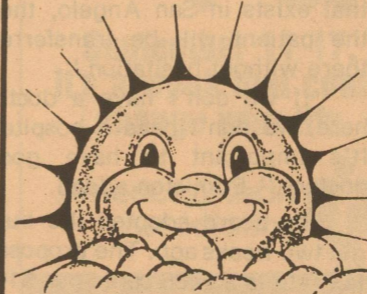

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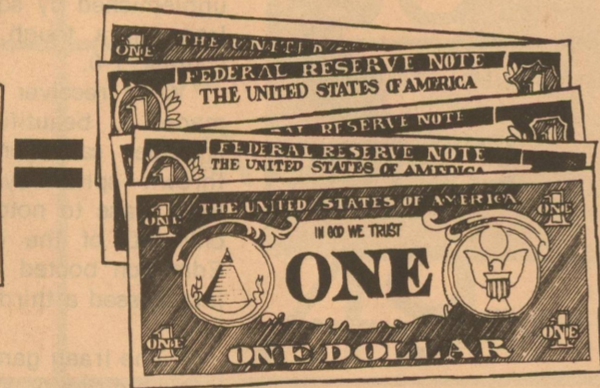

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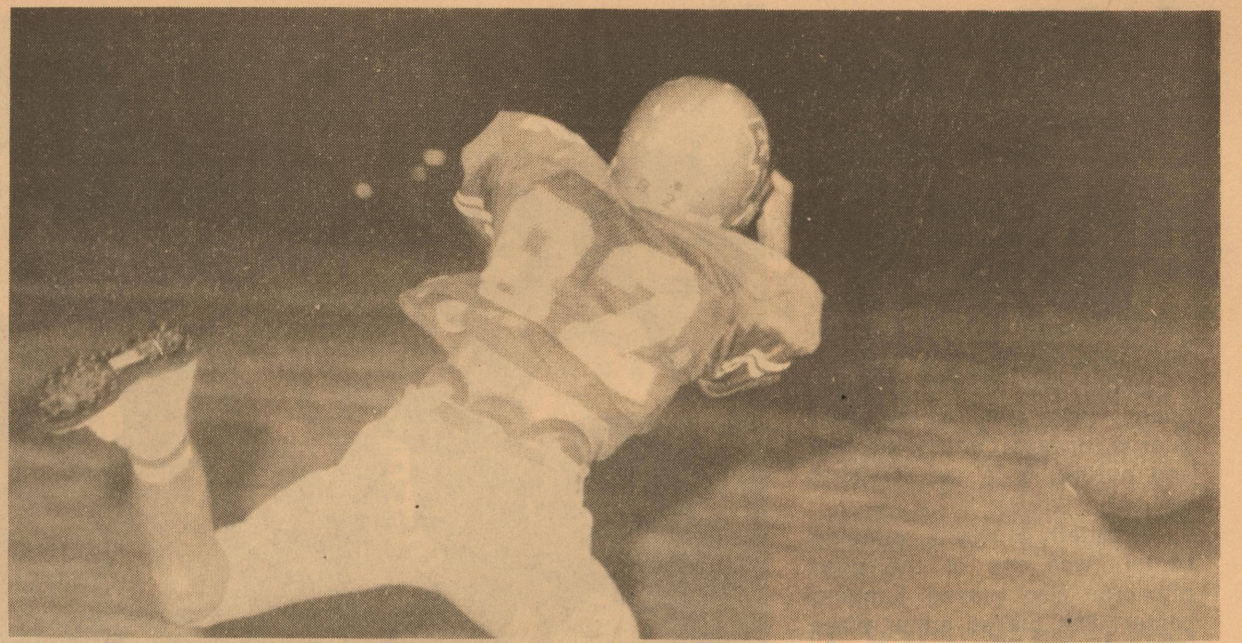

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. 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Tri-County Camp set on Oct. 10

It is time to go to Camp again! The Tri-County Nutrition Project and Concho Valley Council of Governments are sponsoring a Rural Senior Citizen's Retreat at the H.E. Butt Foundation Camp in the Texas Hill Country for the elderly of the region.

The Retreat is scheduled to begin with check in at 1:30 p.m. on Monday, October 10, and will last until check out at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, October 12.

The Retreat will be at Singing Hills this year. This facility will accommodate 100 campers and has 10 cabins, pavilions and a large waterfront and playground area. A large kitchen and dining room are located at the camp site. All cabins have complete baths, vented heat and bunk beds.

Reservations must be received by September 30. After this date, refunds will be made only for medical reasons or death of next of kin.

Because so many campers have requested no "KP", the camp this year will be \$30 per person. This payment covers cost of meals and insurance and clean up.

Each camper is responsible for his/her transportation to Camp. "Car Pooling" is suggested because of the shortage of parking space. Please do not park cars on grass or play areas. 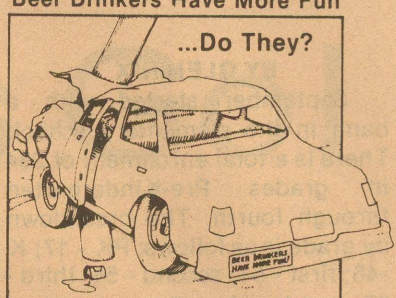

Cocaine now used by 22 million

Cocaine has been used by more than 22 million Americans, and six million are estimated to be addicts, according to the September issue of Texas Medicine. This marks a 400 percent increase in use of cocaine from 1972 to 1982. Because cocaine is now considered perhaps more addictive than heroin, the medical community has found that AIDS is a hazard for those who abuse the drug intravenously.

In the 1970s, there still was a question about the addictive qualities of cocaine, according to author K.J. Krajewski, MD, Assistant Professor and Director of Undergraduate Education, Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences, The University of Texas Medical School, Houston. As of 1987, several disorders had been associated with cocaine abuse including dependence, intoxication, withdrawal, and delirium, states the article in the official journal of the Texas Medical Association.

"The staggering growth of cocaine abuse also has implications in the AIDS epidemic," writes Dr. Krajewski. This is because drug abusers are the second most commonly affected by AIDS and intravenous drug abuse taxes the immune system, he adds.

"A number of obstetrical and gynecological conditions have been associated with cocaine abuse," according to the article. These include spontaneous abortion, premature labor, and men-

strual irregularities. Also significant is that cocaine abuse among women is approaching that of men. This pattern is different than of other drugs that are abused, explains Dr. Krajewski.

The article concludes that the popularity of cocaine use and associated medical problems has led more persons to seek medical treatment, placing significant demands on the health care system.

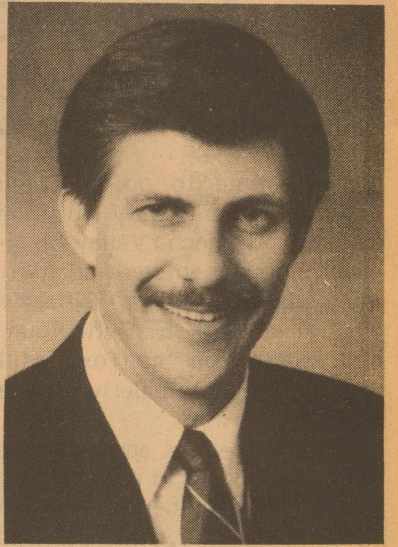
around ourselves. She closed with a poem from the book, Leaves of Gold, which was a Tribute to Love. The thought was to strengthen our castles of love and friendship.

Running Club underway

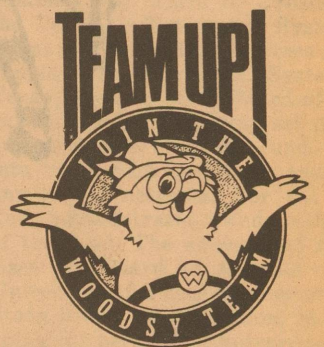
The running club at Eldorado Elementary School is underway again this year and has been named the "Speedy Gonzales" Running Club by the fourth grade class.

Sykes named Magistrate

Midland lawyer Robert Sykes deemed it a "great honor" and a "great responsibility" to become the United States magistrate for the Midland-Odessa Division of the federal court system's Western District of Texas.

Sykes, who succeeds Darrell F. Smith who had been the division's part-time magistrate since 1983, was sworn into office Wednesday afternoon by U.S. District Court Chief Judge Lucius D. Bunton.

"I'm going to do my best to fulfill the trust that has been placed in me," said Sykes.

"I just got his clearance today (Wednesday) from the Administrative Office (of the federal Judiciary)," Bunton said.

As is standard in federal background investigations, Sykes was checked out by the FBI, and the Internal Revenue Service. "Everything is fine," Bunton said. "I wanted him aboard by September 1," the judge said of hastening the swearing-in ceremony.

Smith, who remained on the job until Sykes officially became magistrate on Wednesday, resigned the post to devote full-time to his private law practice.

Both Smith, 45, and Sykes, 36, earned bachelor's degrees from Texas A&M University, where Smith majored in English, and Sykes studied business administration. Smith earned a law degree from Baylor University in 1968. Sykes received a law

degree from Southern Methodist University in 1977.

Bunton noted that Sykes was selected by a committee which had "interviewed a lot of people" who had applied for the magistrate's post.

Sykes grew up on a ranch near Eldorado in Schleicher County in Southwest Texas where his parents, Bobby and Pat Sykes, still ranch.

Sykes said he went to law school to study agricultural estate planning. "I didn't necessarily forgo ranching to do that."

Following his graduation from SMU, Sykes was a prosecutor in the Tom Green County Attorney's Office in San Angelo. In 1981, he moved to Midland, where he worked in the Trust Department of the First National Bank of Midland and later in the Trust Department of Republic-Bank First National Midland after FNB failed in October, 1983.

In 1985, Sykes established a general law practice in which he handled civil and criminal matters. As magistrate, he will continue his private civil practice of law. As magistrate, his dealings in criminal matters will come from the bench.

Midland County Attorney Mark H. Dettman, who also is an SMU law school graduate, said, that in his dealings with Sykes, he "has always been very professional, above-board, and honest. I know that he's cons-

cientious," he said. Assistant U.S. Attorney Tom Beery of Midland said he is "pleased" that Sykes is serving as magistrate.

"He's a fine man and a fine attorney, and I look forward to working with him," Beery said.

Sykes said he had applied for the part-time magistrate position because he "wanted to have that experience."

His role as magistrate includes the holding of initial appearances of those charged with violations of federal felony and misdemeanor laws, setting bail, holding arraignments, presiding over preliminary examinations, holding detention hearings, and presiding over misdemeanor trials.

He and his wife, Lisa, are parents of two sons, Reed, 4½, and Nathan, one.

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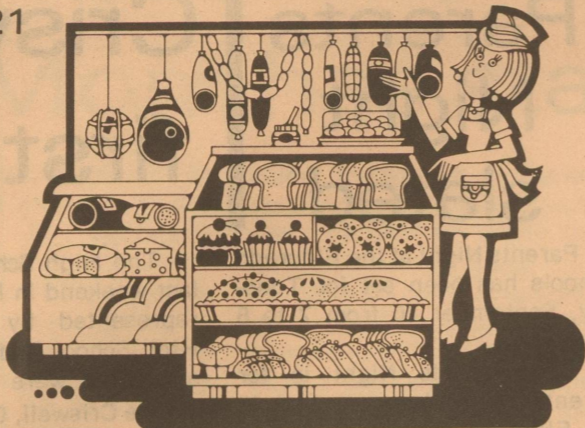


