## Eagles should be contenders in 1988

After an improving season in 1987, Coach Armando San Miguel's Eldorado Eagles find themselves playing the contender role this fall, and a contender they should be.

The eagles return a strong and explosive backfield, guided by one of Texas' finest high school quarterbacks in Bradley Bass.

It is the strength of the backfield that led Top O Texas football magazine to pick the Eagles as a threat to the playoff aspirations of Big Lake and Ozona.

The Eagles will get their first baptism under fire this Friday night on the local field with a scrimmage against Brady. The test will commence at 6 p.m. with the junior varsity, followed by the varsity at 7 or 7:30.

San Miguel thinks Class AAA Brady will be a good test for his squad. "They have a lot of folks back from last year. It should be a test for our kids," the third-year head mentor said.

"We'll go into the scrimmage with the usual sore muscles. Bradley Bass got stung by a bee on his shoulder Monday and can't wear his pads, but he should be ready for Brady.

"That's our problem this year. The ones we put out there have talent, but depth is going to

hurt us. When we are complete we'll be lucky to have 45 players," San Miguel commented.

The third-year head mentor likes his team's role of respected contender and also the first three weeks of district warfare when two of the top squads in 6-AA have to come to Schleicher County.

Top O Texas Football has the following to say about the Eagles:

### EAGLES RETURN BACKFIELD

"With the entire backfield returning the Eldorado Eagles could fly high this season.

"Back to operate Coach Armando San Miguel's multiple offense is Bradley Bass, senior quarterback, who is an outstanding thrower and leader.

"The running back positions will have both speed and size in fullback Carter Edmiston, senior, halfback Juan Espinosa, junior, and wingbacks Trey Preston, senior, and Stan Meador, senior.

"With this size, speed and experience, Eldorado should have the top backfield in 6-AA this year.

"San Miguel's concern this fall will be building an offensive forward wall to support his outstanding backfield.

"Donnie Fuentes, senior, and Larry Ramos, senior, are the only Eagles returning with starting

experience.

"Scott Robinson, senior, and Jesse Barajas, junior, will have to go both ways this fall. Both were defensive starters last season.

"The Eagles will have three top prospects battling it out for the two starting tackle positions in Larry Silvas, senior, Cruz Sanchez, senior, and Howard Ledbetter, senior.

"Ward Evans, junior, could be found in the starting lineup

when the green and white Eagles open the season at Eden on September 2.

Eldorado's split-six defense will be headed up by Robinson from his linebacking position. He was a first team all-district selection last fall and should have another super season in '88.

"San Miguel has high praise for this year's seniors. 'They have been working extra hard during the offseason and displaying outstanding leadership.'

"The Eagles have won the district track title last spring and still should have ample speed left after graduation to have one of their quickest and fastest teams in years.

The Reagan County Owls will be a unanimous choice to win the district title this fall, but Eldorado should battle Ozona for the runner up position.

If the offensive forward wall will mature quickly enough, the Eagles could give Reagan County

all it wants when the Owls come visiting October 7.

The publication lists Justin Paxton, Richard Adame and Ward Evans. Bass and Robinson were both listed as having all-state potential.

Outstanding Boys To Watch, according to the yearly publication are Carter Edmiston, Trey Preston, Justin Paxton, Juan Espinosa, Larry Silvas.

half year.

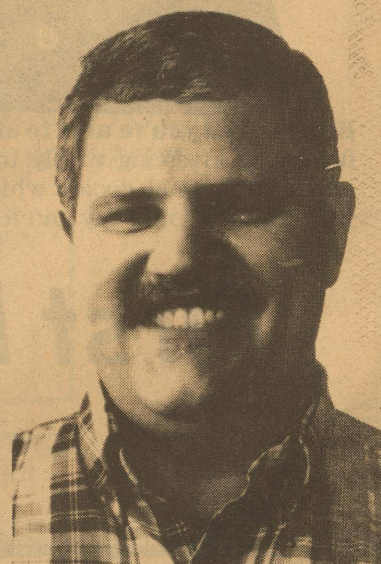
"We're real glad to have him over here. I think he will be an asset to the community," Norris said.

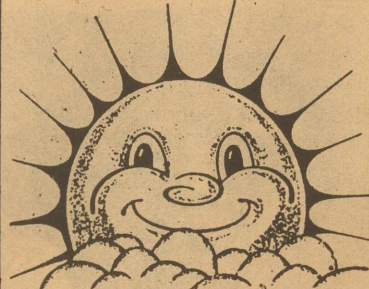
The festival's theme is "Year of the Train" to celebrate the 100th anniversary of when trains first came to this Runnels County community.

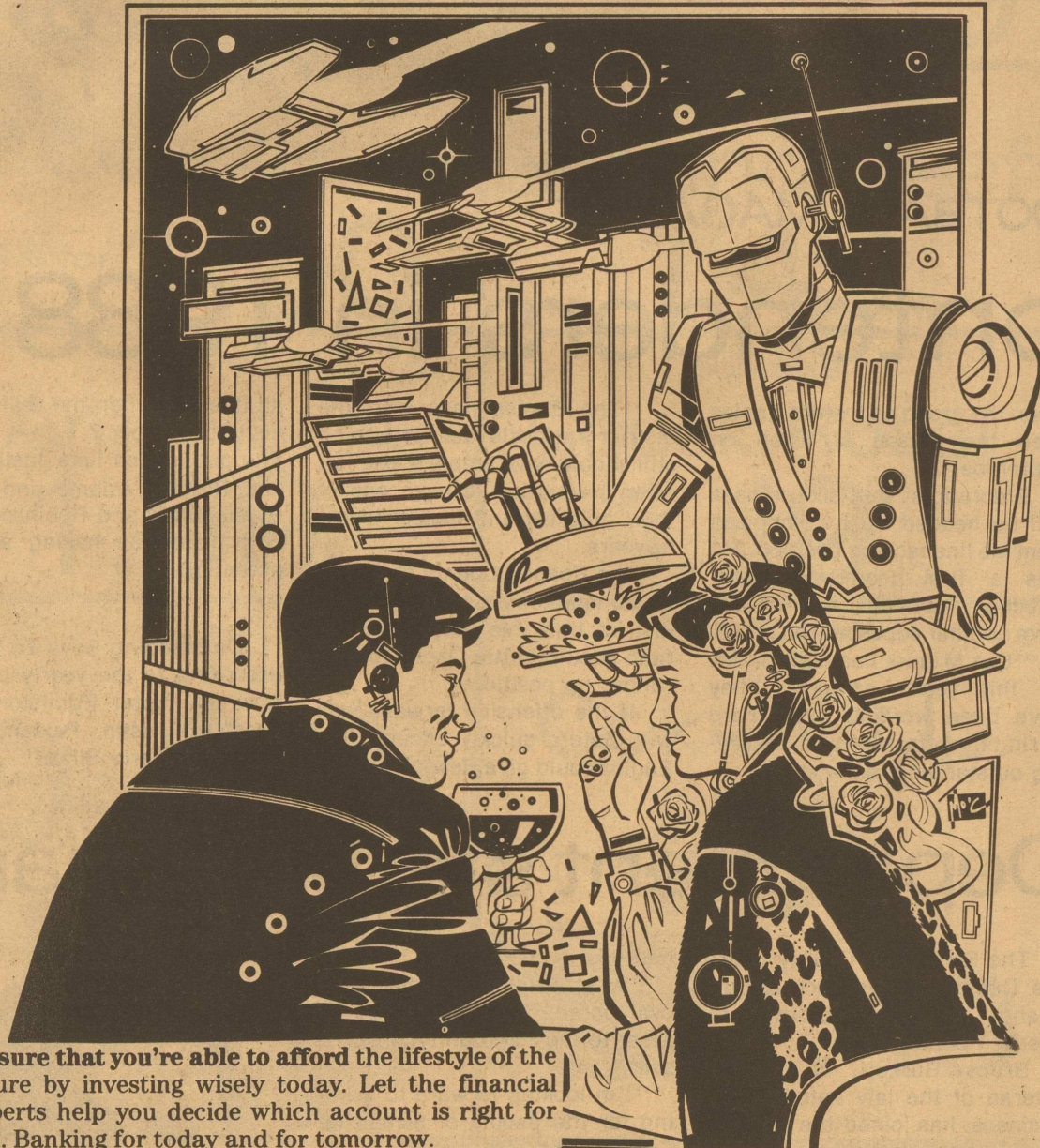

## Hundreds attend meeting

Hundreds of West Texas residents swarmed over the Schleicher County Courthouse lawn last Tuesday as the 43rd Annual Meeting of Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative was held.

Highlighted by a tasty barbecue, those on hand learned that no rate increases are expected and that cooperative membership has risen to 1610.

Fred H. Case, president, called the meeting to order and introduced Jerry Johnson, secretary, who read the minutes from last year's meeting.

A.T. (Sonny) Turner, general manager, spoke following the introduction of guests by Jim Martin, Executive Assistant.

Turner told those on hand that the cooperative has completed a good year and is in a very strong position. "I don't know of anything that has decreased in price in the last year with the exception of electricity," Turner revealed.

"If your billing is higher it is simply because you are using more kilowatt hours. I see no rate increase in the future for Southwest Texas."

"The first priority of our cooperative is safety and we have maintained that since your last annual meeting. We have been safety accredited by our national organization and by the Job Training and Safety people at the Extension Service of Texas A&M.

Another thing that we have worked on real hard this year is cutting expenses. We have gone to you our members to help us and you have responded. We asked that you read your meters and send in your readings and to report any outages or any problems you may detect on our lines in your areas," Turner continued.

Turner pointed out that the average billing has gone from \$134.77 in 1984 to a new low of \$107 in 1987. Costs per kilowatt and line loss have also been reduced," he concluded.

Director Richard S. Runge handed out service awards to Tommy Minor, five years; Bill Ferguson, five years; Paul Rebeck, 10; W.W. "Amos" Owens, 15; Fred Case, 20; Donnie Danford, 20, and Ronnie Sauer,

25. Directors elected by the members were Scott Shurley, Lonnie Pollard, Billy Williams, Albert Ward and Jimmy West.

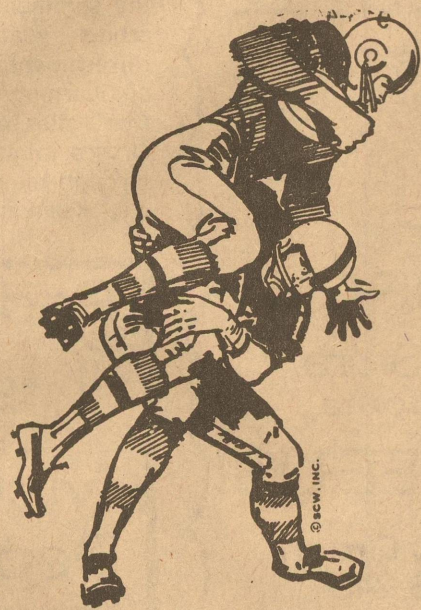

## Sign-up planned in Eldorado

Farm workers who qualify for the Special Agricultural Workers Program and who are not legal residents of the United States should be on hand Sunday in Eldorado.

Chris De La Garza of San Angelo will bring his mobile office to Schleicher County from 1 until 6 p.m. at Casa Arispe restaurant.

Any worker who worked 90 days during the period starting May 1, 1985 and May 1, 1986 can qualify for SAW.

Under the program illegal aliens can work legally in the United States and maybe eventually qualify for citizenship.

"Farmers should pay special attention to this. We'll be coming out there to Eldorado to give them a chance to sign up any employees they want to," De La Garza reported.

see a bright future for their town and they searched for a way to break loose from Menard County and be independent.

The law required a petition with at least 50 signatures of legal taxpayers of Schleicher County to be presented to the commissioners court of Menard. Many county residents worked, gathering names for the petition.

A total of 52 legal signatures were collected, and presented to the Menard court.

After duly considering the petition, in accordance to the law, Schleicher County was granted its freedom. In the spring of 1901 the county set forth to establish its own government, ordering an election to elect and install county officers.

Members of the first official officer family of the county were H.J.Y. Mills, sheriff and tax collector; A.B. Priour, county judge; F.C. Bates, Jr., district and county clerk; C. C. Doty, tax assessor; Jack Allen, treasurer; F.C. Bates, Sr., justice of the peace; and commissioners John Rae, C.C. Yaws, W.D. Ake and James Garrett.

J.D. Scruggs, Menard County Judge, drove in his buggy to officially qualify and swear in each officer.

Schleicher County's first courthouse was the building just east of the water works, known as the Silliman, Campbell, and Evans Building. The rock vault was built and used for keeping records.

In 1902 the first official courthouse was built. The two story structure was constructed of wood and cost was \$2,469.14. It was planned and built by J.J. Rice, who hauled the lumber on a wagon via dirt road from San Angelo. Each trip took four days.

On March 24, 1917 an

election was held at the courthouse to vote for bonds to build a new courthouse to replace the out-dated old building. The bond issue was defeated.

That very night after the election the old courthouse caught on fire and burned to the

ground. Most of the records were saved due to the rock vault where they were kept.

The commissioners court offered a \$500 reward for the arrest and conviction of parties involved with the fire, but the mystery was never solved.

### LETTER TO PARENTS:

The Schleicher County Independent School serves nutritious meals every day. Students in Grades K-3 may buy lunch for \$1.00; Grades 4-6 for \$1.10; Grades 7-12 for \$1.20 and adult visitors for \$3.45. Students may buy breakfast for 50 cents and adults for 75 cents. Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 25 cents for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, complete the enclosed application, sign it and return it to the school.

**FOOD STAMP/AFDC HOUSEHOLDS:** If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

**ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS:** If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household; (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None"; (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

**VERIFICATION:** The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

**REPORTING CHANGES:** If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

**FOSTER CHILD:** Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contract the school for help with the application.

**NONDISCRIMINATION:** Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

**FAIR HEARING:** If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official:

**CONFIDENTIALITY:** The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determination and verification of data.

**REAPPLICATION:** You may apply for benefits any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but need to apply later in the year, please fill out an application at that time.

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.
