City of Mertzon Receives Grant

The Concho Valley Council of Governments has informed the City of Mertzon that there will be full funding by the Texas Community Development by a grant in the amount of \$180,000. No repayment of this grant will be required. The funds will be utilized to renovate the Mertzon water system.

The money was allocated for a larger ground storage tank with pump station and to provide new lines to new water which will be a looping system to equalize and stabilize the pressure throughout the system. This will do away with all the dead-ends of water lines that in the past have hindered water pressure.

A separate grand request will be filed in the future to update the sewer system.


Life Among the Fishes

However, there is one little tiny problem in serving either the toast or pancakes that I have not been able to solve.



The event, sponsored by the Men's Bible Class (non-sectarian) is four hours before midnight at 8 p.m. on the Eve of Easter.


Volunteers of Kimble County citizens, men, women and children in costume, reenact Jesus Christ's last days on earth in a picturesque natural amphitheater.

In 1881 windmills were beginning to be erected in West Texas. Several wells had been bored in Tom Green County, but none in Schleicher County.

C.C. Doty drilled the first well in Schleicher County in 1882. Doty was thought to be crazy to drill south of the Concho River, as people called it a dry desert. He thought water would be unlimited if he could drill deep enough.

He was right. At 52 feet he struck water, pure, clean, and cool. The location of this first well was at the "Ten Mile Water

The meeting was called to order by Bobbie Killebrew, president.


Nancy Lester presented the program and gave the ladies an adventure in basic cooking.


Hole". It is still in use on the J.F. Runge Ranch. Doty erected a "Star Windmill" over the well and thus brought to an end the period of the "barren prairie".

Now windmills dot the entire face of the country. Wells, windmills, and wire fence brought permanent settlement to an area formerly uninhabited. The West Texas men harnessed the wind and made it produce that one essential need, water.

There are two known caves in the county containing running water. These caves are northwest of Eldorado on the Whitten Ranch. Winding passages lead down to the water, 200 feet below the surface.

The Story is told of the early days when two outlaws, Ketchum and Adkins, hid in the cave on the Roach Ranch. During their confinement they discovered the water. Because of this discovery, wells were drilled in this area, 20 miles northwest of Eldorado.



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



The schedule is as follows:







Services Help Eliminate Danger To Children

The state spent a total of \$586,518 last year for major welfare programs in Schleicher County, according to Ray L. Dunavant, regional administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$317,256 spent for aged and disabled residents of the county and \$65,982 for families and children in the county," Dunavant said.

Food stamps worth \$175,741 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$27,539. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

In addition to services and assistance to low-income residents of the county, the department extended protective services to 19 abused and neglected children and their parents or caretakers. These services, furnished without regard to family income, were designed to reduce or eliminate danger to children.



Ranch Certified Brucellosis-Free

John Ben Cawley, owner of the Cawley Ranch near Eldorado, has had his cattle certified brucellosis-free by the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC). Brucellosis, an incurable bacterial disease often called "Bang's", is highly contagious among cows during pregnancy and calving, and can cause heavy losses due to abortions or weak calves.

The Cawley Ranch herd is one of 2,035 certified in the state.

Producers with certified herds have the advantage of shipping or selling cattle with fewer restrictions. Also, certified cows sold as breeding stock may command a higher price.

To have a herd certified, a producer enters into an agreement with the TAHC and has the herd's blood tested to ensure none of the animals are infected with brucellosis. If follow-up tests 10 to 14 months later also show no evidence of the disease, the herd is certified jointly by the TAHC and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). To remain certified, the herd must be tested yearly and be free of brucellosis.

The TAHC and producers are working to eliminate brucellosis infection through a program that includes testing at ranches and



livestock markets, removing infected cows. quarantining exposed herds, practicing management techniques to prevent spread of disease, and vaccinating calves.

Texas and six other southern states--Arkansas, Kentucky, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Florida and Louisiana--have 92 percent of the brucellosis infection in the U.S. Twenty-six states have no known infection, and 19 states have a very low infection rate. Reducing brucellosis infection in Texas could save the state's livestock industry millions of dollars by 1990, when USDA regulations will call for tougher restrictions on moving cattle from states with high infection rates.




A&M Club To Award Scholarship






