Economy In Good Shape

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that statewide sales tax rebates for the first four months of 1989 are up 13.4 percent over last year's tax allocations for the same period.

"The economy is in good shape, which is being reflected in our state and local sales tax collections,"

Bullock said.

Last year's sales tax rebates through April were up 6.5 percent over the 1987 rebates for the same period, while 1987 rebates through April actually fell 6.3 percent compared to the same period in 1986, Bullock said.

Bullock warned that the monthly comparisons

in this month's report are skewed because merchants collected and reported an extra day's worth of sales taxes in February, 1988, which was a leap year.

"We estimated that as much as \$1.9 million in sales tax could have been reported statewide for February 29 last year. One day may not seem like much, but it's enough to throw the numbers off," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$57.2 million were sent Friday to 902 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

April's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in February and reported to the Comptroller's office by March 20.

Eldorado's payment for this period was \$3,736.41, compared to \$3,881.78 at this time last year, a decrease 3.49 percent. However, 1989 payments to date are \$21,526.01 which is an increase of 15.98 percent over 1988 payment at this same period.

Said City Councilman, John Callison, "The most important asset we have is our young people. We have to take care of them."

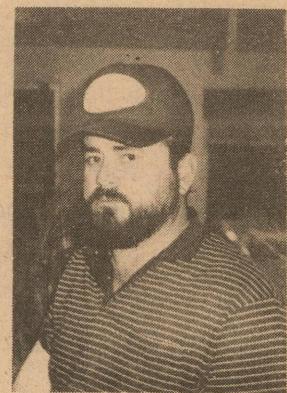
City To Reimburse Injured Fireman

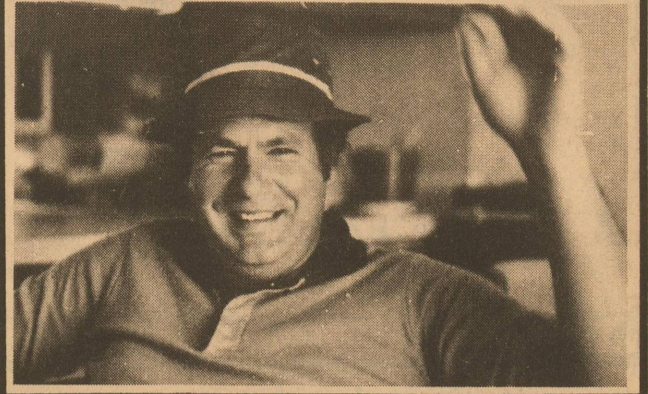
low or anywhere near the average I set several months ago.

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Texas Medicaid: Crisis Or Opportunity?

Texas has lost 72 hospitals since 1984. Slightly more than half, 37, were located in rural areas. In addition, 49 Texas counties have no hospital. This combination means that access to hospital services does not exist in many parts of our state.

A key factor in hospital closures is inadequate payment for services provided to Medicare and Medicaid recipients. Congress has been balancing the federal budget with taxes paid for the Medicare program which guarantees health benefits for the elderly and the disabled.

A joint federal and state effort, the Medicaid program provides health benefits to the elderly, disabled and poor, mainly children. Texas Medicaid covers only 25 percent of the poor people, less than any other state.

Hospitals cannot continue to break even or lose money under Medicare and Medicaid and remain open.

Increasing state funding of the Texas Medicaid program would help pregnant women, children, the disabled and the elderly. It also would help end the indirect subsidy Texas gives to other states.

Rep. Brad Wright, a Republican from Houston, has filed House Bill 1345, the Medicaid enhancement bill. Senator Chet Brooks, a Democrat from Pasadena, is filing a similar bill in the Senate. A broad-based coalition of business, consumer and allied health organizations join the Texas Hospital Association in supporting this bill.

These recommendations would cost the state an additional \$166 million. With the federal match of

\$247.8 million, a total of \$413.8 million new dollars would be available for Medicaid health programs in Texas!

The legislation directs that the Texas Department of Human Services improve Medicaid programs as follow:

- * Expand eligibility to more pregnant women and children. Eligibility levels would be raised to 130 percent of poverty for pregnant women and infants. Coverage would be expanded to include children to age three in 1990 and up to age four in 1991.

- * Restore the Medically Needy program which serves pregnant women, children and caretakers who have high medical expenses.

- * Increase coverage of nursing home and community care services. The cap on nursing home eligibility would be raised to 88 percent of the federal maximum, and home health services would be covered.

- * Extend Medicaid hospital coverage beyond 30 days per quarter.

- * Raise the base amount used to calculate hospital payment to a minimum of \$1,583 to assist rural hospitals.

- * Extend primary care services provided by physicians in rural areas.

- * Increase funding for "disproportionate share care," to assist providers serving a larger share of low-income patients.

- * Address payment inequities resulting from treating high cost cases. The current payment system is based on average costs, so high cost cases result in significant losses for hospitals and doctors.

- * Update provider reimbursement rates to com-

pensate for 1986 budget cuts. Due to the state budget crisis in 1986, 10 percent was arbitrarily removed from payments to hospitals.

Although the Medicaid program seldom directly touches the lives of most Texans, it is the largest single source of federal money for the state. Medicaid brought in \$1.1 billion in federal dollars in 1987.

The federal match for Medicaid is based on the per capita income of the state. For every \$1 of Medicaid expenditures in Texas, the federal government spends another \$1.60.

And yet, Texas is not receiving what it should. For every \$1 paid in federal taxes, Texas receives only 71 cents... while, in 1987, New York and Michigan received \$1.33 and \$1.03, respec-

tively, for every \$1 paid in taxes.

Why this vast difference? This imbalance can be traced directly to the Medicaid program. In 1987, Texas, with 6.9 percent of the nation's population, received only 3.7 percent of all federal Medicaid expenditures. In contrast, New Yorkers--who make up 7.4 percent of the population, received 17.6 percent of the Medicaid budget.

Texas should receive the full benefit of the federal tax dollars Texas sends to Washington. It's time to get our fair share of federal tax dollars!

Water Level In Wells Recorded

During the month of March, 1989, personnel of the Texas Water Development Board, as part of the Board's legislatively mandated ground-water data collection activities, measured water levels in nine wells in Schleicher County. These wells are completed into the Edwards and associated limestones and showed an average water-level decline of 3.23 feet from measurements taken one year ago.

The Texas Water Development Board maintains a network of water-level observation wells throughout the state which are visited annually to serve a water-level measurement.

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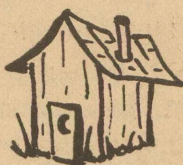
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Woman's Club Meets

Thanks to those who have already helped to make this van program a success!

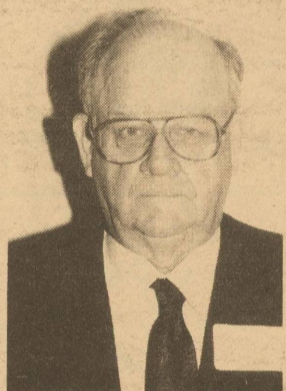
4-H Leaders Honored

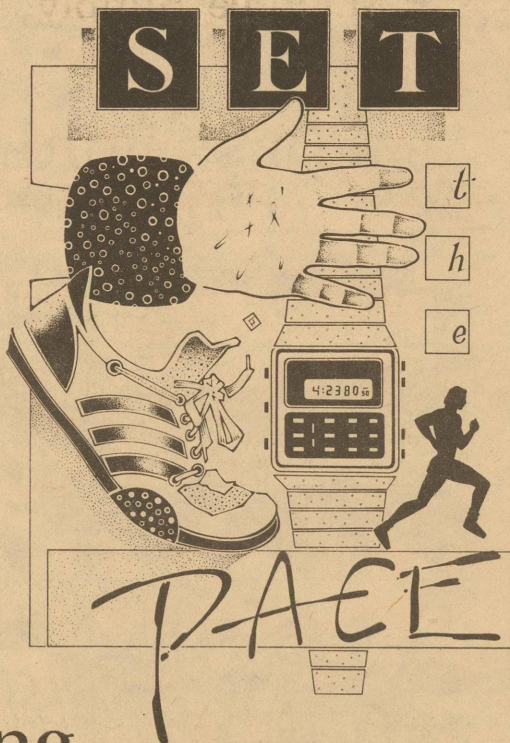

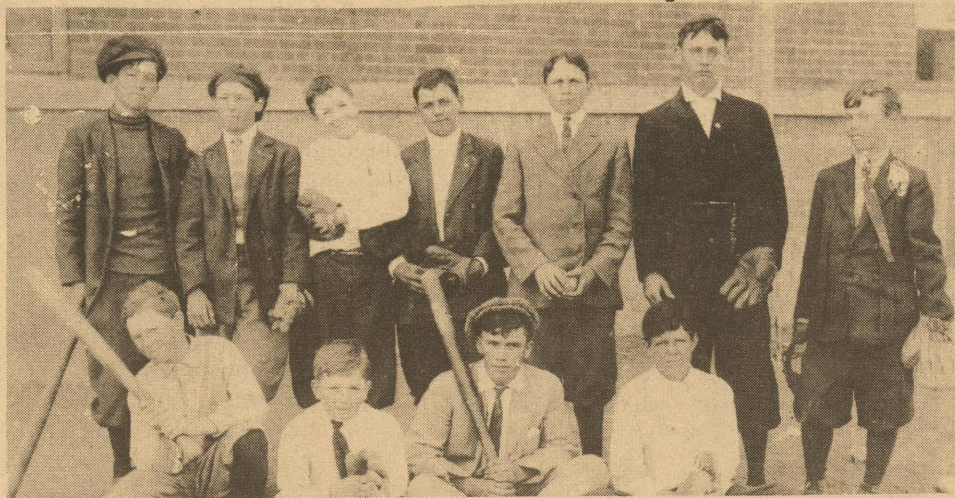
A Touch Of History

The Schleicher County Sheriff's Department responded to 100 calls for service during March. This represented a 20% increase over the month of February.

These calls included two thefts and three burglaries. Other calls included vehicle accidents, criminal mischief, suspicious persons and domestic and public disturbances.

Three persons were arrested.

Thirty-five civil processes were served, with thirty-two of them being delinquent tax suits. One out of county warrant was served.

Two automobiles were stolen in February. Both have been recovered.

According to Sheriff

Ronnie Norris, assisting citizens is the primary goal of the Sheriff's Department. "Our main job is to help the people of Schleicher County", said Norris. "I think that the people in our county know this and it is reflected in the calls we receive."
