Rash of fires keeps volunteers busy

An outbreak of grassfires kept Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department firefighters hopping last week as they ranged from one end of Schleicher County to the other. The fires resulted from a number of different causes, including, downed electrical lines, a ruptured natural gas pipeline, and lightning.

The busy week for firefighters began on Tuesday of last week when they responded to a grass fire on the Stewart Ranch near Ft. McKavett in the extreme eastern edge of Schleicher County. Then, on Friday, June 18, 2004, a downed AEP Electric power line left three cows dead and burned up 15 acres of grass on the Gordon Emmons Ranch, west of Eldorado on County Road 408.

The battle would start again at 7:00 a.m. the following morning when a call came in that a natural gas pipeline had exploded in the Reynolds Community. Emergency Personnel tushed to the scene, but spent the next hour or so trying to determine exactly which of four pipelines was involved.

Ultimately, it was found that a 12 inch diameter pipeline, owned by Duke Energy, had ruptured. Fortunately for all involved, the rupture was some thirty feet away from where the pipeline crossed a 30-inch liquefied petroleum gas pipeline, owned by Conoco-Phillips.

Also fortunate was the fact that the fire was pointed away from the larger LPG line. A nearby home belonging to Earl Lloyd was also spared. However, some area residents went without electrical power for much of the day due to the fact that the pipeline rupture and fire occurred under a power line owned by Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative. A buried telephone line was also rendered useless by the fire.

Once the pipeline was identified, the necessary valves were located and closed and the fire burned itself out, revealing a small crater and the twisted remains the 12-inch line that looked more like ribbon than steel.

A line of thunderstorms pushed through Schleicher County on late Monday night and early Tuesday morning, sending firefighters once more scrambling to their trucks as lightning spawned a half dozen grass fires across the county. Fortunately, most of them were extinguished by the heavy rainfall that followed close behind the storm front, but not before local firemen spent hours driving back roads and across the rocky countryside in the eastern part of the county in hopes of finding and fighting the fire.

Fire Chief Jerry Jones asks all Schleicher County residents to be fire conscious during the upcoming 4th of July holiday, particularly in light of the hot and dry conditions. The rains that fell in the fall and winter of 2003, have made for a bumper crop of grass, Jones says. Grass that now stands tall and dry in the hot summer sun.

Please report any fires to the Schleicher County Sheriff's Dept. at 853-2737 or by dialing 9-1-1. Fire Chief Jones also asks that anyone planning a controlled burn on their property, please report it ahead of time to the Fire Department.

Blanch returns to lead SCISD

Just a year after retiring from the education business and resigning as SCISD Superintendent of Schools, George Blanch is returning to Eldorado and will again take the reins of the local school district. That news came Thursday, June 17th, during an emergency meeting of the SCISD board of trustees. At that time, Blanch was hired as acting superintendent.

Blanch will be filling the post left vacant when Supt. Mark Gesch was placed on paid leave at the school board's regular meeting on Monday, June 14. Blanch will be paid \$80,000 per year, roughly the same amount Gesch is making.

The Success has been unable to contact Mark Gesch since news of his leave of absence became public. However, the newspaper has learned that he is actively seeking other employment. In the meantime Gesch remains on the payroll at SCISD. His contract with the school runs through the end of the 2004-05 school year.

YFZ Ranch officials are apparently interested in drilling at least one additional water well on ranch property, some four miles north of Eldorado.

Cindy Cawley, General Manager of the Plateau Underground Water Conservation and Supply District says that she was contacted by Paul Allred regarding the need to drill for water on the ranch. Cawley, who was at a meeting in Austin when she received Allred's call, made arrangements for assistant manager Virgil Polocek to visit the ranch.

Cawley notes that while Polocek was given access to a water well near the ranch entrance, he was denied access to a second well on the north side of the ranch property.

Cawley said she eventually met with Paul Allred and explained the steps involved in drilling a water well in Schleicher County. She also outlined the state regulations that are involved.

Cawley then expressed concern about alleged environmental violations on the ranch property, as reported by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and informed Mr. Allred that water district personnel have the right under state law to inspect any and all water wells on the property.

Allred reportedly told that he did not have the authority to grant her access to the ranch.

Meanwhile, a TCEQ spokesman reports that alleged air and wastewater violations on the YFZ remains a priority for the agency and that an investigation into those violations is ongoing.

Eldorado's missing millionaires are alive and well in Oklahoma

Just when Eldorado needed some good news, came word in last week's San Angelo Standard-Times that a dozen or so of our neighbors had hit it big, winning the Texas Lottery and claiming some \$12 million, after taxes.

But the joyous news was short-lived. First, the story didn't reveal any of the lucky winners' names. Then, it went on to say that the money had been paid out way back in 1999. To make matters worse, the winners wanted to remain anonymous, claiming the prize money under an assumed name -- they called themselves The Bethel Dozen.

No sooner had Rick Smith mentioned the big payout in his column last Thursday than did the telephone start ringing at

"Who are they?" one caller weeds along the interstate he found | asked. Another wanted to know her billfold containing her driver's 'why The Success had not reported the story back in 1999. "Who are you covering up for? Are you one of the winners?" that caller queried.

> To say I was surprised, is an understatement. Not that we haven't occasionally let a story slip through our fingers, but not one of this magnitude. Then

there's the aspect that somehow, someway, twelve people had managed to keep secret the fact that they had each won over a million dollars. And...they had managed to keep that secret in Eldorado, a town not particukeeping ability.

Well, something just didn't smell right and I started digging. Fortunately, it wasn't long before I struck upon a trail.

Lottery," and "Eldorado." What I found was a document that listed lottery winners for the past several years. Sure enough, there were the Bethel Dozen with their hometown listed as Eldorado.

Rick Smith got his information, I thought, but my ego wouldn't let me accept the fact that I had missed such a big story. So, I turned back to the computer to do some more digging.

Before long, my efforts were rewarded, and the whole thing started making more sense. A press release, pulled from the archives of the Texas Lottery Commission revealed that there had indeed been a lottery jackpot, totaling more than \$12 million after taxes, claimed in 1999 by a group calling itself the Bethel Dozen. The story went on to say that the winners, most of whom lived in Gould, Oklahoma, had pooled their money and bought the winning larly well know for its secret ticket just across the Red River in Quannah, Texas.

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
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Eagles place 3 on All-West **Texas Team**

Clarification-Firework Ban

Correction-June 17, 2004-Commissioners Court voted Monday June 14, 2004 to prohibit certain fireworks (purchasing and selling) in the unincorporated areas of Schleicher County. An offense is a Class C Misdemeanor. The Success story stated all fireworks were banned in the county. All fireworks are banned only in the city limits.

A. No person may sell, detonate, ignite, or in any way use fireworks classified under 49 C.F.R. part. 173.100(r)(2)(10-1-86 edition), as "skyrockets with sticks" and "missiles with fins" in any portion of the unincorporated area of Schleicher County

B. This Order does not prohibit:

1. Common fireworks, small in size classified as Class

2. Large fireworks devices designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion, deflagration, or detonation and classified as Class B explosive by the U.S. Dept. of Trans. (TEX. OCC. CODE, Chapter 2154).

It should be noted that the sale or discharge of fireworks of any type is unlawful within the city limits of the City of Eldorado

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

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Tom Hanks, Steven Spielberg fly high in "The Terminal"

by The Movie Man

Amazing! A movie about dodgeball performed better than a film laden with time-proven talent.

Now, if that latter movie had been last week's sorry The Stepford Wives (don't fall for those lukewarm "positive" reviews), the Movie Man would certainly agree with the dodgeballing. But it's The Terminal starring Tom Hanks and the terrific Steven Spielberg.

And it wasn't even close; the team of Hanks and Spielberg got clobbered by Ben Stiller-Vince Vaughn. (The Movie Man should note that he's a Stiller fan and a big advocate of Meet the Parents and, especially, Zoolander.)

It'd be hard to name a duo with more success than Spielberg and Hanks. (Well, it's not impossible: George Lucas and Harrison Ford [or Spielberg and Ford, for that matter].)

It's no secret that the Hollywood elite enjoyed withholding honors from Spielberg throughout a great chunk of his career.

Even early on when he created some of the greatest films ever - Jaws, Raiders of the Lost Ark, E.T.: the Extra-Terrestrial, and Jurassic Park. These are beloved American movies, action-packed/touching and wonderfully made.

His serious turns were always shunned, perhaps because of simple jealousy. The Color Purple was completely shut out of Oscar honors. So was Empire of the Sun, maybe the most underrated movie ever

Finally, even Hollywood diehards had to admit that Schindler's List, released in 1993 (the same year as Jurassic Park!) was that rarest of celluloid: An actual

(While there is no such thing as a 10 [except Movie Wife, of course], Schindler's List has come closest. [Followed closely by Braveheart.])

But soon enough, the snubs returned. Amistad (with one of the best opening shots ever in a film) was dismissed in

However, the greatest insult of all



occurred in 1998 when the exceptionally overrated (and already forgotten) Ryan (with Hanks) for Best Picture. It's the greatest gyp in cinematic history. (At of that. least Spielberg won Best Director.)

The Movie Man is impressed that Spielberg is so remarkably consistent except for Schindler's 9 and Saving Private Ryan's 8, every Spielberg picture has received a 7: Jurassic Park ('93); Jurassic Park: The Lost World ('97); Amistad ('97); A.I.: Artificial Intelligence ('01); Minority Report ('02), and Catch Me if

This is the second role in two weeks that should merit award attention; last week is was Glenn Close in the abysmal Stepford Wives.

The background characters fare well, too. Especially INS agent Zoe Saldana who must deny Hanks exit from the airport

Spielberg's camera is its usual remarkable character. Few can frame a shot and light it as well as he does. The film is flawlessly directed.

Best scene...

In a wordless sequence, both Hanks and Spielberg show their skill.

Hanks, penniless and hungry, figures out that the way to make money in an airport is to return luggage shuttles for a

He alternates between madly dashing about the place scrounging up carts - even if it means dumping children out of them and pouring his change onto the Burger King counter to eat larger and larger meals. It's a wonderful sequence, played and assembled perfectly.

What doesn't work...

Early on, Spielberg falls back on the old trick of spinning the camera around the main character during a scene to illustrate his confusion. That's an old ruse he doesn't need.

Zeta-Jones, still a stunner even though she smokes when pregnant (which, of course, has little to do with her role, but, ugh, gross!), has a mostly do-nothing part and that's what she does with it.

While Hanks' final exit is well-handled, the completion of his mission is anticlimactic.

The rating...

This is the mildest PG-13 ever. A couple of swear words (used to fine comic effect) and drug mention apparently pushed this up a rating level. But it's no more than a PG.

Summing up...

Spielberg is the Randy Johnson of filmmakers. (The Movie Man would've used Nolan Ryan but too many readers are too young to know the Ryan Express.) When he pitches, great things are expected.

Spielberg has crafted a 3-hitter. Not
