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Richters fills vacancy on hospital board School nurse fills seat left vacant by death of Delia Pina

Susie Richters was sworn in Monday evening, Feb. 23, 2004, to fill a vacant seat on the Schleicher County Hospital District board of trustees. Ms. Richters was appointed last month to fill the vacancy left by the death of Delia Pina in Oct., 2003. She will serve until May, 2004 at which time the 1-year unexpired term will be on the ballot.

The meeting was called to order by Board President Randy Mankin, with trustees Shirley Joiner, Ricky Fuessel, J.D. Doyle, Frank Williams and Jim Martin in attendance. Following Ms. Richters' oath of office, the seven trustees then went behind closed doors for an executive session for the discussion of personnel items. They were joined by Hospital Administrator Sharon Dietz, Assistant Administrator Beverly Minor and attorney James Kosub. The board returned to open session about an hour later, taking no action on the matter.

The trustees then took up discussion of the hospital district's personnel policy and heard recommendations from Sharon Dietz and James Kosub regarding the employee benefit section of the policy. Following a brief discussion the group voted unanimously in favor of the recommendation to convert vacation time and sick time into personal time off that employees may take as desired.

Next, the board reviewed and approved the minutes of the Jan. 26, 2004 meeting and heard Quality Assurance reports presented by Nursing Home Director of Nursing Anita Jones and Hospital Director of Nursing Beckie Silva.

Sharon Dietz then advised the trustees that she is considering installing a satellite TV system to replace the facility's current cable TV system. She said she hopes the change will save the facility money over time and was asked to report back on her research at the next board meeting.

Ms Dietz also updated the board on the hospital's retirement plan and advised the trustees that a new direct deposit plan is being implemented for employee's payroll checks.

Dietz noted that a complaint against the nursing home was investigated by a Nursing Home inspector who ruled the complaint was unfounded. She further noted that the hospital's first full survey since joining the Critical Access program three years ago went will, with only one deficiency. She added that the deficiency, involving activity planning for Swing Bed patients, has already been

corrected. The board then moved on to call for

the election of board trustees on May 15, 2004. They also appointed Bessie Jones to serve as Election Judge and Beverly Minor to serve as Early Voting Clerk.

Next, the trustees reviewed and approved new liability property insurance policies. They also okaved the purchase of new carpet for the clinic lobby.

Reviews of the Critical Access Program and the Rural health Clinic Program were then carried out with the board finding that both programs are beneficial to the hospital district and opting to continue participation in both programs.

Before adjourning the trustees authorized two purchasing agreements, allowing the hospital to acquire supplies at discounted rates, and approved a contract with Donnie Burrows, the hospital's courier. They chose to table discussion on the purchase of a piece of equipment called a Biosite Triage Meter, pending more information on costs associated with the device.

The next meeting of the hospital board is slated for Monday, March 22, 2004, at 6:00 p.m. in the facility's board room.

TxDOT public hearing offers glimpse of Texas future


The future of transportation in Texas was the subject of a public hearing held Monday, Feb. 23, 2003, at the Schleicher County Courthouse, by representatives of the Texas Dept. of Transportation (TxDOT). Hilario Rodarte, TxDOT Area Engineer, based in Sonora, presented a video presentation outlining Gov. Rick Perry's proposed Trans

Texas Corridor.

Rodarte explained to a group of fifteen interested citizens, including the Schleicher County Commissioners court, that the Trans Texas Corridor represents a vision for Texas Transportation as it may exist some 50-years in the future. The centerpiece of the plan is a network of futuristic roadways carrying

truck and passenger car traffic separately, along with a high speed rail line, freight rail service and an section for public utilities.

Rodarte noted that a 1200-ft. wide right-of-way would be required for the proposed roadway, or some 145.455 acres for each linear mile. He explained that a wide array of financing options would be required to help pay for the project, including toll roads, local governmental and private financing, as well as paying a royalty to landowners whose property is used in the project. Most of the questions from the public concerned the Ports-to-Plains Corridor. Rodarte told the group that the Ports -to-Plains Corridor, slated to follow U.S. 277 through Schleicher County, has already been approved by the U.S. Congress and will be implemented as part of TxDOT's upgrade of the state's Trunk System. Other concerns expressed were about the viability of high-speed rail transportation in Texas, the need for highway upgrades and economic development in the western part of the state and an almost unanimous disapproval of toll roads as a way of paying for the system. Judge Johnny Griffin summed up the sentiment about toll roads by saying, "That's what the folks in the big cities would like. They want to build new roads to get us into their towns to spend money, but they also want us to pay for the roads." Rodarte reminded the group that the Trans-Texas Corridor is a long-range plan and showed them a "conceptual map" outlining possible routes for new roadways, most of the routes roughly paralleled existing roadways. He said the emphasis will be to ease the burden on Texas roads, while increasing safety for the driver.

Traffic stop on U.S. 277 yields 35 lbs. of marijuana

Sheriff's Deputy Jason Chatham notched up another drug bust Monday, uncovering some 35 lbs. of marijuana, with a street value of approx. \$25,000.00, hidden beneath the back seat and inside the door panels of a 1993 Mitsubishi sedan.

Chatham said he pulled the car over Tuesday afternoon on a routine traffic stop, some two miles south of Eldorado on U.S. 277. He said he became suspicious after interviewing the driver and asked for and received consent to search the vehicle.

Chatham reports finding several packages of marijuana under the back seat of the car. He then placed the vehicle's two occupants, Hevers Tino Herrera, 48, and Maria Leyva Herrera, 40, both of Mexico, under arrest.

As the two suspects were being transported to the Schleicher County Jail, their car was towed into town for a more thorough search, revealing even more pot hidden behind the car's door panels. Chatham also confiscated \$700 in cash from the suspects.

At press time, the suspects remained in custody in the County Jail awaiting arraignment before Schleicher County Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle at which time their bonds will be set.


Public comments are being sought throughout the months of February and April in all 254 Texas counties, Rodarte said.

Rodarte closed the program by asking all in attendance to complete a survey and to draw routes on a map that they would like to see included in the Trans-Texas Corridor plan. He also urged all interested to continue communicating with TxDOT as well as their elected representatives.

Sheriff warns citizens about recent rash of pet poisonings

Sheriff David Doran asked this week that local citizens be on the look out for a person or persons involved in a recent series of pet poisonings in Eldorado.

Most of the cases involve dogs, but some cats may have been involved, the Sheriff said. He said he suspects that poisoned food items, such as frankfurters dipped or injected with antifreeze, are tossed into yards where pets find and

eat them, or the poisoned articles are left where unleased and unsupervised animals that may be wandering loose can find them. The animals then usually suffer a slow and painful death, Doran said.

Anyone with information regarding a pet poisoning case is encouraged to contact the Schleicher County Sheriff's Office at 853-2737 or stop by the Schleicher County Law Enforcement Center.



A case of avian influenza found in a noncommercial flock of chickens in Gonzales County is not dangerous to humans or poultry, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The strain identified in that county was a low pathogenic virus that is commonly found in bird populations, the department said.

The poultry industry injects more than \$1 billion into the Texas economy each year, the department said. Of that, \$123 million in 2002 came through exports.

"The discovery of this case in Texas could have tremendous trade implications," said Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs, "and the TDA will continue to monitor the situation.'

EOIP signup Dutton, Edward Earwood, Ben underway now

The Natural Resources Conservation Service office in Eldorado will be taking Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) applications through April 16th. The EQIP program is a cost-share incentive program available to landowners and operators for the purpose of carrying out conservation practices on their land.

Each county within the state receives a base allocation of federal dollars ranging from \$70,000 to \$100,000. This money will be used as cost-share incentives to implement priority practices within the county. This year's priority concern, as identified by the Program Development Group, is prickly pear control.

Schleicher County also receives additional funding through EQIP to provide technical and cost-share assistance for Special Resource Concern Areas. These monies will be targeted toward land within the South Concho and Spring and Dove Creek Watersheds. Last year over \$670,000 was allocated to the two areas. Similar funding is expected this year. This year's priority concerns for these special resource concern areas are initial brush management on juniper and mesquite.

Cost-share rates were set at 50% of an average cost. All interested individuals are urged to come in and sign up as soon as possible. The local NRCS employees will review the application and ranking procedure with you and explain the program in more detail For more information, you can come by the office at 510 S. 

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
