City okays purchase of equipment for wastewater

The Eldorado City Council met in a regularly scheduled meeting on Monday, October 11, 2004, and voted to proceed with the purchase of a Dissolved Air Flotation (DAF) unit, to be installed at the city's wastewater treatment plant. Bids for the unit and the controls necessary to operate the machine, came in at \$101,025.00, a figure that was well above what the council expected.

Engineer Steve Dennis explained that rising steel prices, plus the need to increase the capacity of the unit, had driven up the cost of the DAF unit, but continued to advise the council of his opinion that the installation of a DAF unit was the best method for bringing the wastewater treatment plant into compliance with state regulations. Rojas had left the meeting prior to the vote to respond to an ambulance call.

Environmental Treatment Systems of Atlanta, Georgia, was awarded the bid to construct the DAF unit for \$72,975 Verfurth Electric in San Angelo will be paid \$19,700 to install electric power, as well as a control panel and switches. West Texas Water Wells got the bid to install a pump in the final pond of the wastewater plant. That portion of the project will cost \$8,350.

Steve Dennis estimated that the city will spend just over \$5,400 for a concrete foundation, piping and installation of the DAF unit.

The meeting was the council's regular monthly session and was called to order by Mayor John Nikolauk. Council members Tommy Minor, Richard Mendez, Juaquin Rojas, Bill McCutcheon, Dora Bosmans and Toni Sudduth were in attendance, as were Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay and City Secretary Carolyn Mayo.

Robert Montalvo, representing Cebridge Connections, the company that provides cable TV service in Eldorado, then met with the council, ostensibly to discuss the renewal of the company's cable TV franchise agreement. Montalvo explained, however that he could not discuss the legal side of a franchise agreement because he worked on the operational side of the company. Montalvo said he came to discuss with the council concerns they might have about the company's operations.

Council member Bill McCutcheon zeroed in on changing technology and asked what plans Cebridge has for modernization of equipment.

Montalvo couldn't directly address McCutcheon's question but said he would pass it along to his district of-

Other issues brought up included problems with reception and concerns about the lack of a local service technician. Montalvo urged anyone with a complaint to call 1-866-533-4353.

Ballew appears in TV Ad with Swift Boat veterans

Vets demand Kerry release his military records

Ray Ballew of Eldorado served in the U.S. Navy during the Vietnam War as Skipper of a Navy Swift Boat, a river patrol boat that saw plenty of action with the enemy. Little did he dream then that some 34 years later he would reunite with dozens of his comrades in Washington, D.C., not to reminisce about days gone by, but to appear in a television commercial aimed at influencing the outcome of a presidential election.

Ballew was among 89 Navy Swift Boat veterans and Vietnam prisoners of war who gathered last weekend in the nation's capital, to videotape a television commercial in opposition to Democratic presidential candidate John Kerry. The rally, sponsored by a group calling itself Swift Boat Vets for Truth, featured a number of decorated war veterans, including Air Force Colonel Bud Day, who was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor after surviving 67 months in a North Vietnamese POW camp.

Ballew explains that the purpose of the rally, and the television ad, was to call on John Kerry to release his military records. "All he needs to do is sign form 180 and release the records," Ballew stated.

Kerry received three Purple Heart commendations during a four month period while serving as a swift boat skipper in 1969. Those medals, and the actions that led to them, are at the heart of a heated political debate that is currently drawing national media

Ballew notes that the Swift Boat Veterans aren't affiliated with any political party or campaign. "We're just asking Senator Kerry to release his military records and to explain why he testified before Congress that American fighting men were systematically committing atrocities over there," Ballew said.

Included among the men who appeared with Ballew was his former commanding officer, Admiral Roy "Latch" Hoffmann and Air Force Colonel Bud Day, a man who spent 67 months in a Vietnamese prisoner of war camp. Day, who received the Congressional Medal of Honor upon his release from Hanoi, told his colleagues that his North Vietnamese captors played audio tapes of John Kerry's Congressional testimony as they tortured him and his fellow prisoners.

The second annual Eldorado Star Party was created by a partnership of various amateur astronomy clubs from around the state and the X Bar Ranch in hopes of attracting serious amateur astronomers. The party will offer astronomers four nights of viewing of dark

skies in a protected environment.



"In recent years with cities growing and light pollution becoming an increasing problem for amateur astronomers in Central Texas and points east, our location is a big draw" says Stan Meador with the X Bar Ranch. "Particularly, due to the fact that we're three to five hours closer to major metro areas in Texas than is Big Bend and far West Texas helps since most folks had resigned themselves to thinking you had to go that far to get good dark skies," Meador added.

Meador concludes, "We couldn't be happier with the great group of people this event draws to our area. We look forward to hosting our astronomer friends for many years to come."



Bad drivers to pay more for violations

AUSTIN — Bad drivers are in for their own form of October

The law's been on the books for more than a year, but Texas drivers with certain violations on their driving record are beginning to find that their actions were more expensive than they thought.

Under the driver responsibility program administered by the Department of Public Safety, motorists convicted of speeding or more serious charges such as driving while intoxicated, are going to have to pay the state fees or surcharges. If they don't pay, their \$4,500 total) for a second offense driver licenses will be revoked.

You don't have to offer any excuse to vote early, just go to wherever local election officials have set up as the place for early voting. Check your county clerk's office for locations.

To vote by mail, a registered voter still must declare a reason why he or she can't cast a ballot the traditional way on election day.

Dove hunter numbers...

Dove season continues for another couple of weeks (to Nov. 10 in the South Zone), though sunset is coming earlier each evening as fall gets into stride.

South Texas game warden Mike Bradshaw of Carrizo Springs says the season in his part of the state, which began in mid-September, has been OK though birds don't seem to stay in one particular area very long.

There are still more dove than hunters with some 392,000 seasonal shotgunners having reported to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department that they bagged dove last year.

Speaking of numbers, Bradshaw says some conservationists are pondering what effect returning to half-day hunts would have. (Once upon a time, dove hunting did not start until noon each day.)

Despite the best efforts of Bradshaw and other game wardens, some hunters use a full day of hunting to illegally take one limit in a morning hunt and another in an afternoon hunt. But the limit per day is only 12 birds (15 in the North Zone), not 24.

Check smoke detectors...

October is Fire Prevention Month and fire safety experts are urging homeowners to make sure their smoke detectors are working.

Officials recommend testing smoke detectors once a month and replacing batteries at least once a year.





He finished his combat tour a year later and was honorably discharged from the Navy in May of 1971.

"I want to say that I didn't serve with John Kerry. He rotated home just as I was arriving in country,' Ballew states. "But I served with men he served with and I resent the implication that we raped and murdered innocent civilians."

"All I want is for John Kerry to release his records and answer the questions raised by the Swift Boat Veterans," Ballew stated.

Stuffed Baked Potatoes "Lorraine

Stuffed Baked Potatoes "Lorraine"

- 2 medium Russet potatoes (about 1/2 pound each) 3 slices thick-cut bacon,
- cut into 1/2-inch pieces 1 small leek, white part only, rinsed and thinly
- sliced (about 1/3 cup) 1 large egg yolk, room temperature
- 1/3 cup milk
- 6 tablespoons shredded Gruyère or Swiss cheese, divided (about 1 1/2 ounces) Pinch nutmeg Salt and pepper
- 2 pinches paprika Position rack to center of oven; preheat to 400°F. Place potatoes directly on oven rack and bake until skins are crunchy and insides are soft when gently squeezed,

about 50 minutes. Remove from oven and cool about 30 minutes. Lower oven temperature to 300°F. Sauté bacon over medium heat until browned and crisp, about 4 minutes. Use slotted spoon to transfer bacon to small bowl. Discard all but 1 tablespoon fat in skillet. Add leeks and reduce heat to low. Sauté, stirring often, until soft and golden, about 5 minutes. Transfer contents of skillet to bowl with bacon.

Cut the top third off each potato and scoop out insides, leaving 1/4-inch shell all around to keep skin from collapsing when restuffed. Scrape potato flesh from inside tops as well. Press flesh through potato ricer into large bowl, or mash with hand masher in large bowl until smooth. Mix bacon and leek mixture with egg yolk, milk, 4 tablespoons cheese, and nutmeg. Season with salt and pepper and add mixture to potatoes. Mix well. Divide mixture between the empty potato shells and place in small shallow baking dish. Top each with 1 tablespoon remaining cheese and sprinkle each with pinch of paprika. Bake 20 minutes or until cheese melts and turns golden. Let stand 5 minutes at room temperature before serving. Serves two.

Potato Pork Stir-Fry

- 1 1/2 tablespoons peanut oil
- 2 medium scallions, sliced 1 1/2 tablespoons fresh ginger, peeled and chopped

- 2 cloves garlic, minced 1/8 teaspoon crushed red
- pepper flakes or to taste 1/4 pound ground pork 1 small red bell pepper
- (about 5 ounces), cored, seeded and diced
- 1 1/2 cups broccoli florets (about 3 ounces)
 - 2 cups packaged refrigerated or frozen and thawed shredded potatoes (about 3/4 pound)
 - 2 tablespoons rice vinegar 2 tablespoons soy sauce

Heat wok or large skillet over high heat. Swirl in oil; add scallions, ginger, garlic, and crushed red pepper flakes, then stir-fry 15 seconds. Add pork and cook, tossing and stirring, until cooked through and lightly browned, about 2 minutes. Toss in bell pepper and broccoli; stir-fry 2 minutes. Sprinkle potatoes over vegetables and pork; cook without stirring 30 seconds. Gently but thoroughly toss, then continue cooking 1 to 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Pour in rice vinegar and soy sauce; cook, stirring, for 20 seconds, until sauce bubbles. Serve immediately.

\$600,000. These benefits can reportedly be paid to care-providers who are related to the children, so sometimes one wife can get paid for taking care of another wife's kids. In all, Colorado City gets back about eight dollars in benefits for every dollar the residents pay ration is near one-to-one.

Fire and EMS services in the million. twin cities of C-City/Hildale, until recent years, have received hundreds of thousands of dollars

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in state and federal grants. Some published reports put the number even higher, claiming that more than \$1.8 million from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has flowed into the town to pave streets, upgrade fire equipment and build a water-storage tank. Hildale got \$94,000 for in state taxes, while for the rest its fire station. And the governof Mohave County, Arizona the ment-financed airport on the edge of Colorado City costing \$2.8

Before long, government was which were nearly non-existent big business in the former settlement of Short Creek, and served as a major employer. It was only natural that FLDS members would dominate the local governing bodies since the church's members counted for the vast majority of the two towns' residents.

Recently, the Colorado City School system reported their 2004-2005 budget at \$6,794,474.00 to fund a staff of 123 teachers and aides while serving a total of 342 students. That comes to \$19,866.88 per student.

Not counted in the school's staffing number were other auxiliary employees like bus drivers, cafeteria and maintenance workers. It has been noted that while the teaching staff consists almost entirely of non-FLDS members, the administration and all support staff are members of the fundamentalist group that no longer sends its children to public schools.

Jon Krakauer, author wrote in his book "Under the Banner of Heaven" that fundamentalist leaders in Colorado City view the whole process as "creative budgeting." He says that they regard it as a "virtuous act."

For her part, Flora Jessop, who says she fled the group in order to escape living a forced polygamous lifestyle, says of the people in Colorado City, "They are told to go on welfare. It's called 'bleeding the beast' and they find it amusing that Satan is supporting God's work."

The Success continues to seek input from FLDS leaders, including those currently living and working at the YFZ Ranch near Eldorado. So far, there has been no response from the group.
