Warren Jeffs' brother apprehended in Colorado

Seth Jeffs said to be transporting money, credit cards, cell phones & mail to Prophet in Texas

Seth Steed Jeffs, 32, of Hildale, UT and brother of FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs, was arrested Friday, Oct. 28, 2005, in Pueblo County Colorado on federal warrant charging him with concealing his older brother from arrest. The younger Jeffs also faces a charge in Colorado state court for soliciting a male prostitute.

According to court documents, a Pueblo County officer responded to a citizen complaint about a suspected drunk driver on Interstate Highway 25. Deputy Eric Medina reportedly stopped a 2005 Ford Excursion driven by Nathaniel Steed Allred, 26, of Colorado City, AZ. Seth Jeffs was the only passenger in the vehicle.

Allred told the officer that the Excursion belonged to Jeffs and that he had been hired by Jeffs to provide sexual companionship. Allred also claimed that Jeffs had paid him \$5,000 for sexual services.


The officer arrested Allred and Jeffs and they were booked into the Pueblo County Jail on charges of prostitution and soliciting a prostitute, respectively. The men were questioned and each was issued a summons to appear and was released.


deputy reportedly noticed a large sum of money in the vehicle. When neither Jeffs nor Allred would grant permission to search Pueblo County K-9 officer Sgt. Vic Boley was called to the scene. His drug dog reportedly alerted to narcotics in the car, giving the officers probable cause to search the vehicle. They found more than \$142,000.00 in cash, a number of prepaid credit cards and prepaid cellular phones, and a large quantity of mail addressed to Warren Jeffs or The Prophet. Also in the car was a collection jar containing pennies. The outside of the jar was decorated with a sign saying, "Pennies for the Prophet" and a photo of Warren Jeffs identical to the one on his FBI wanted

Authorities say that no illicit drugs were found inside Jeffs' ve-

Apparently neither of the deputies were familiar with the stories swirling around Warren Jeffs and his followers, but one of their supervisors did recognize the name and contacted the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Later in the day, Seth Jeffs telephoned the Pueblo County Sheriff's Department to see if he could retrieve his vehicle and During the traffic stop, the was invited to do so. But, instead

Jeffs admitted to the investigators that he was acting as a messenger and was delivering the money from FLDS church headquarters in Colorado City, AZ to the church's other headquarters

near Eldorado, TX. He also advised the agents that he was aware his brother was wanted by the law and said the envelopes contained gifts and well-wishes his brother the prophet and that he was taking the eavelopes to a "Bishop" at the church headquarters in Texas.

Jeffs went on to say that neither he nor any other members of the FLDS congregation would ever assist lawmen in locat-

ing Warren Jeffs. According to an affidavit filed by federal investigators, Seth Jeffs said "it would be stupid to tell anyone where he is because he would get caught."

Investigators are calling the arrest one of the most significant developments in the Warren Jeffs case since the first felony indictments were handed down against the fugitive prophet in June of this year.

hicle Jeffs and Allred were apprehended in, may offer investigators a glimpse into the inner workings of the FLDS church and Warren Jeffs' financial empire. The 2005 Ford Excursion is registered to Fleetwood International Logistics, Inc. of Austin, TX. Seth Jeffs reportedly told investigators

that Fleetwood was a corporation he set up in order to register his vehicles. He said payments on the Excursion were made by the FLDS church.

A story in Wednesday's Salt Lake Tribune reports that prosecutors will argue before a federal magistrate on Thursday that Seth Jeffs should be held in jail without bail. The story notes that it is customary for federal officials to hold defendants who are considered to be a flight risk or a danger to the community.

Friday night rollover sends 5 San Angelo youths to hospital

A one-car accident 15 miles north of Eldorado sent five San Angelo youths to area hospitals early Friday evening, October 28, 2005.

The driver of a red 1998 Mercury Sable reportedly lost control after trying to avoid rear-ending a second vehicle that slowed in front of them because of buzzards on the roadway.

The car was headed southbound when it skidded off the roadway and flipped over, coming to rest on its roof.

Emergency Medical personnel from Eldorado and Christoval responded to the accident, along with officers Traven Berrie and Jason Chatham of the Schleicher County Sheriff Depart-

The sixteen-year-old driver of the car, as well as all the passengers, were reportedly wearing their seat belts at the time of the accident. The vehicle was registered to Magdalena Tomlinson of San Angelo.

Cleared for take-off?

When two businesses involved in an argument both use the "free market" to make their case, consumers should prepare for turbulence – particularly when the subject involves government regulations limiting competition.

All consumers benefit from market competition through the lower prices and improved quality it brings; while there are winners and losers on the business end – the efficient win customer loyalty, the inefficient are left in the dust. Competition is simply not as kind to individual businesses as it is always is to consumers.

Such is the case in air travel, which was deregulated by the federal government in 1978.

For consumers, the results of air competition have been stunning; prices are lower enabling more people to fly more often to more places. And air travel is far safer, with the number of accidents dropping significantly in the years following deregulation.

Of course, after too many years of growing fat with heavy regulatory protection of ticket prices and routes, many airlines in the late '70s were unprepared to compete in deregulated markets. Some of them simply didn't survive; remember invincible stalwarts like Eastern Airlines, Braniff and Pan American World Airways?

Airlines weren't the only businesses affected by deregulation — even airports were suddenly facing market pressure to compete for passengers and airlines alike.

By the late 1970s the relatively new Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport was well on its way to becoming the third busiest terminal in the world. Despite this early success, its managers and backers were not eager to face off in a deregulated market against Love Field and their nimble tenant, Southwest Airlines.

Then-U.S. House Majority Leader Jim Wright (D-Fort Worth) took up the cause and attached an amendment to a bill in 1979 which limited the service of any airline offering flights out of Love Field to cities in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas, Louisiana and Arkansas. Later changes to the amendment added Mississippi and Alabama.

Today there is a scuffle in Congress over the future of the Wright Amendment. Predictably, the battle lines are drawn based on the economic interests of those involved.

Southwest, joined by supporters like the city of Dallas and the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation, argues everyone would benefit by repealing the Wright Amendment - the airline could fly more places at lower costs for travelers. "Wright is Wrong" is one slogan Southwest has adopted to get its message across, while "Set Love Free," has become part of most every flight attendant's message when flying out of Love Field.

American Airlines, DFW Airport and the cities of Fort Worth and Arlington are fighting back. They have rebuked the spunky Southwest Airlines by challenging them in the free market game. Their campaign website calls on Southwest to simply move operations and compete at D/FW.

But is that truly free-market competition? The Wright Amendment artificially raises the prices at D/FW by eliminating competition with Love Field, while not being as convenient for many travelers.

From air travel to trucking to telecommunications, deregulation has always proven to be the friend of consumers. The case of the Wright Amendment is no different. The benefits this relic of the regulated past bequeaths on a few are far outweighed by its costs to consumers and the economic progress of the state and nation. Texans, and all Americans, would benefit greatly from its long-overdue repeal.

Regency Suspension Bridge, a visible reminder of days gone by

I've heard about and read about the suspension bridge across the Colorado River at Regency many times and I've always wanted to visit it. Last weekend I finally got the opportunity.

Kathy and I went to Waco on Saturday for the Area Marching Band Contest. Actually, Kathy attended the contest and took pictures for the paper. I went with my son J.L. and one of his friends to the Texas Tech/Baylor game.

Nevertheless, on the way back home we turned off the main road just outside of San Saba and drove 17 miles north and west on a Farm-to-Market road. There, near the now abandoned town site of Regency, we turned off on a county road that took us down to the river and the Regency Suspension Bridge.

The bridge is beautiful. Tall towers support cables that curve gracefully across the river as they support the bridge's wooden deck.

You have to understand that Kathy is a recovering bridge-aphobic. She has never cared for bridges, especially ones with support structures that extend above



the roadway. And, since Kathy was driving, I wasn't at all sure that we were going to proceed across the river without a change of driver. But, everything was okay. Kathy tightened her grip on the steering wheel and we inched

The bridge is really quite sturdy and I didn't feel it sway at all as we drove across. But later, when I walked out onto the bridge snapping photos a "bounce" in the bridge was easily detectable.



The first bridge at Regency was built in 1901. It collapsed in 1924, killing a 9-year-old boy, his horse and several head of cattle. A replacement bridge was washed away by in the 1936 flood. The current Regency Suspension Bridge was completed in 1939, and according to a historical marker nearby, it was built 90 percent by

The bridge spans the Colorado River north of Richland Springs and south of Brownwood. It stands as a tribute to a distinct era of Texas history...a time when civilization was still inching its way westward from Central Texas and the Hill Country.

It was a time when the need for water required that communities cling to the banks of rivers like the Colorado, rivers whose floodwaters from time to time threatened the very existence of those communities.

I don't know how much longer the bridge will remain. It's a great piece of Texas history and well worth the visit if you get the chance.

Former comptroller heads governor's school finance, tax panel

AUSTIN — Former state Comptroller John Sharp, newly appointed chair of the governor's panel on property tax and school finance reform, spoke to the

Texas Association of Business in Austin Oct. 28.

Sharp, also a former member of the Texas House and Texas Railroad Commission. said the panel

will work closely with every member of the Texas Legislature.

HIGHLIGHTS

Although members of the panel Sharp is chairing have yet to be named, Sharp said that when their work is finished, "I will tell who was naughty and nice."

Regardless of differences that have stood in the way of a bipartisan solution to school finance and tax reform for the last two regular and three special legislative sessions, Sharp, a Democrat, expressed confidence that the panel's efforts will be successful.

Lawmakers and panelists will find reasonable ways to relieve the property tax burden and adequately fund education, but a personal income tax will not be considered, he said.

One thing for sure, he said, is "We're not going to get more revenue from the present system (of taxation)" because so many Texans already pay the maximum property tax.

Sharp predicted that when the Texas Supreme Court rules on the pending case over the constitutionality of the school finance and property tax laws, those laws will be found unconstitutional.

The ruling will trigger a special session and lawmakers will huddle up to work on both problems. The state's high court heard oral arguments on the subject July 6, and the case has been pending since then.

Enrollment below expectations

Texas public and private colleges and universities recorded lower than expected enrollment this fall, according to a report released Oct. 27 by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

This year's total enrollment of 1.192,243 is only a 19,134-student increase over the fall semester 2004. This causes concern, because enrollment growth is not trending in tandem with the state's population, which is growing more rapidly than anticipated.

State demographer Steve Murdock of the University of Texas at San Antonio said Texas is now 35th in the nation in the percentage of people with college degrees. In 1990, Texas ranked 23rd.

Money back, comptroller says

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn urged Gov. Rick Perry to call a three-day special session of the Legislature so lawmakers could vote to give every homeowner in the state a check for \$260.

When Strayhorn closed the books on the biennium that ended Aug. 31, she found enough unanticipated surplus tax revenue to give taxpayers the rebate. But the governor's office dismissed the idea.

Miers withdraws as nominee

Under pressure from her own political party, Harriet Miers withdrew as President George W. Bush's nominee to replace retiring associate justice Sandra Day O'Connor on the U.S. Supreme Court.

Miers, a Republican, was appointed commissioner of the Texas Lottery by


