## Cops seize $\$ 88,000$ in cash

Ciudad Acuna men face money laundering charges

Driving faster than the posted speed limit is against the law in Texas and often times results in a traffic citation. But on some occasions, the penalty is even higher, just as two Mexican nationals learned last week.
Gonzalo Aguilera Rodriguez, 30, and
e Gerardo Hernandez Rivera, 29, both of Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, were traveling southbound in a 2003 Ford Focus when Deputy Barry clocked the car going 78 mph in 70 mph zone. Barry pulled the mph in a 70 mph zone. Barry pulled the men over and quickly became suspicious hat there was more to the men's story than they were telling him.
At that point, Barry asked for and received permission to search the vehicle. Jason Chatham and the two officers soon located seven bundles of cash, wrapped in fabric softener sheets and plastic wrap, hidden behind panels on
either side of the car's back seat. At that point, Rodriguez and Rivera were arrested and charged with money laundering. Their car was taken to the Sheriff's Department where Chief Deputy George Arispe and DPS Trooper Danny Nunez assisted in removing a fender from the vehicle and locating a hidden compartment containing another three bundles of cash.

Deputy Chatham's K-9 partner Brutus also assisted in locating the hidden money.
In all, the cash totalled $\$ 88,420$. According to Deputy Arispe the two suspects admitted to him that the money was the proceeds of a drug transaction. He said the first three bundles of money were placed in the hidden compartment after drugs were delivered from the compartment to a buyer in Oklahoma. The remaining seven bundles were
picked up when the men passed through the Dallas/Ft. Worth metroplex.on their way back to Mexico.
-Rodriguez and Rivera were booked into the Schleicher County Jail and their bond was set at $\$ 50,000$ each. However, officers from the U.S. Customs Service placed a hold on the men, preventing them from bonding out of jail. Rodriguez and Rivera were transferred Monday into the custody of Customs officers who reportedly plan to bring federal money laundering charges against them.
Locally, the confiscated cash was deposited in the bank and District Attorney Stephen Lupton was notified so that his office could begin the legal process of seizing the money.
Steps are also underway to seize the 2004 Ford Focus, but it is unknown SEE CASH on PAGE 8.

Arizona cops raid Colorado City school
Financial records, computers confiscated from FLDS dominated school district

Law enforcement officers and officials from the Arizona Attorney General's office descended Tuesday on the Colorado City, AZ, where they served a search city, AZ, where they served a search City Unified School District. The lawmen, some wearing tactical uniforms and bullet proof vests, spent the better part oullet proof vests, spent the better par the day carrying out boxes of records
of of the day carrying out boxes of records
and impounding the school's computers, and impounding the schools computers,
which were then loaded into a large $U$ which were then loaded into a larg
haul truck parked near the school. haul truck parked near the school.
School Superintendent Alvin Barlo School Superintendent Alvin Barlow
and administrators Oliver Barlow and and administrators Oliver Barlow and
Jeffery Jessop stood outside the adminJeffery Jessop stood outside the admin-
istration building and watched helplessly as the school's records were rounded up and carted away.
The C-City Unified School District has been under intense scrutiny in recent months, prompted in large part by the investigative reporting of John Dougherty of the Phoenix New Times, who uncovered evidence of mismanagement within the district.
All of the members of the CCUSD school board and administration are members of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, a polygamous sect that broke away from the
mainstream Mormon Church more than a century ago. Most of the school's support staff, many of whom are reported to earn more than the district's certified teachers, are also members of the FLDS Church. The school even lists a chef on its staff. On the other hand, few of the school's teachers are FLDS members. Strangely, the group that runs the school does not send their children to school does not send their children to
school there. Most, if not all, FLDS children were removed from the school by their parents, reportedly on order from their parents, reportedly on
FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs.

Many of Jeffs followers began relocating in 2004 to Schleicher County, Texas where the group purchased a 1,691 acre and began building a new town some 4 miles north-northeast of Eldorado. Among the new buildings is 30,000 sq. ft. meeting hall that officials believe also serves as the group's school. A massive temple is under construction nearby on the property that has become known as the YFZ Ranch.

Dougherty, whose investigative reports for the Phoenix New Times attracted the attention of Arizona lawmakers, alleges that CCUSD funds are SEE RAID on Page 8

Remember to Read During Summer Vacation

With summer vacation approaching, most students freed from school are anticipating a great many activities: swimming, playing baseball, hik ing and camping. These are wonderful pastimes but I would urge parents to make sure there is somethi
else on that list: reading.
A brain needs exercise just as much as muscles do. En-
couraging our children to concouraging our children to continue reading not only makes summer more interesting, it also gives them a head start on the coming school year. A fascinating study pub-
 lished by the Johns Hopkins University examined the im pact of summer vacation o student achievement. Since
1906, researchers have discovered students score better on standardized tests at the beginning of summer than they do at the end of summer when they are "rusty."
Low-income students tend to experience significant losses in reading comprehension and word rec ognition while middle-income students have slight gains in reading skills over the summer. This goes a long way toward explaining different performance in schools between students from families of dif ferent economic backgrounds. Studies show thes students make similar progress during the school year, but those from lower-income families tend to lose ground each summer. Educators believe lack of emphasis on reading in some homes could lead to this disparit
During the summer months, middle-income students lose an average of one month of combined math and reading proficiency, while lower-income students lose an average of three months. Over the 2 years of primary and secondary schooling, those cumulative losses leave low-income students fa behind their middle-income peers.

Some educators use this information as an ar gument on behalf of year-round education. Others say more summer education programs should be made available to students. All of them agree that parents need to do as much as they can to keep ittle minds active.
The 2000 Census found that seven to 15 million "latchkey children" return home to an empty house each afternoon. After-school programs meet only alf this demand but during summer months, no even this is available. Only 10 percent of students ttend public schools during summer months but m pleased to say there has been progress. Over period of 25 years, the largest school districts of fering summer programs rose from only 50 percent o nearly 100 percent.
Another approach, which has proven effective for participants, is the Texas Summer Reading Club rogram promoted state-wide by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission (TSLAC). This summer, the theme is "Go wild...read!" TSLAC provides materials and information, while local libraries implement their own programs to encourage summer reading
David Price, County Librarian for the Burnet County Library System, tells me his program reaches 50 percent of the children in the county a a very important age.
"In those early years, up through fifth grade, they are extremely energetic and very curious and they want to learn," he said. "It is the perfect time to develop their reading skills."
This investment in reading programs is cost-ef fective. According to the Johns Hopkins study, the cost of making up the summertime loss of learning is expensive. Nationwide, taxpayers provide $\$ 7,000$ er year per student. The time spent getting students back up to speed averages $\$ 1,540$ per pupil per year. The large urban school district of Baltimore, Maryland, with 90,000 students, finds itself spending nearly $\$ 138$ million per year helping students make up ground lost during the summer.
The worst loss is not financial: it is time. You be recovered.
Consult your local library for a summer reading program. If your children are too old to participate in that program, consider giving them a summer reading list with a reward for reading 75 percent of he books on it. It will expand their horizons and give their brains a good healthy workout.

Ever since I heard about the tunnel under the English Channel, I wanted to experience it.  speaker in a very subdued voice telling passengers we were entering the Chunnel. The only difference was the sudden outside darkness Twenty minutes later we emerged into daylight.

We left the train at London's Waterloo Station and immediately went to a change booth to get change to ride the subway. To my surprise, a one hundred dollar bill yielded only 44 pounds (no, the British isles did not convert to the Euro). The US d
Once I got over the shock, we resumed our joyful journey. I had only one set-back: when two orders of fish and chips and one cup of hot ea cost 30 bucks.
We had travel cards to ride the subway. It is the only way to get around in London. It takes only a ride or two to get acquainted with
the system. The Underground cars run every two or three minutes at each station and it's about that long between stops. We stayed near Victoria Station. The first thing on our genda in London was to ride the London Eye, the giant Ferris Wheel on the Thames River near Big Ben We rode it at sunset so we could see he lights of the city coming on. On Sunday morning we strolled hrough Hyde Park, a huge area of looming trees, green grass and fowers. The sun was shining, the sky was blue.
It was perfect. That afternoon we went to a matinee performance of a musical, The Far Pavilions When we left the theater, it was raining. We had a margarita and quesadillas at the Texas Embassy, a Tex-Mex restaurant and cantina on Trafalgar Square
The next morning we went to the Tower of London. Colorful guides there provided us with some of the finest acting we saw in London. We walked along the Thames, crossed the Millennium Bridge and visited the Tate Museum. That evening we saw another play, Losing Louis. We had a full weekend in London.

## Voters to decide on definition of marriage

AUSTIN - If all goes as lawmakers hope, the final gavel will fall on the 140-day regular session of the 79 Legislature on May 30.

Conference committee discussion continues on school finance and property tax reform but after a vig
orous battle in orous battle in
the Senate, lawmakers in the upper chamber oted 21-8 to put a constitu ment banning
 gay marriage on the fall general election ballot. If voters approve the amendment on Nov. 8 , the provision likely would be challenged in court as have similar laws in other states.
At one point during the discussion of the same-sex marriage measure, Sen. Juan Hinojosa (D-McAllen) offered an amendment that woul prohibit people with three previou marriages from tying the knot a fourth time. That amendment and six others did not survive. Hinojosa was one of the Democrats who voted against the resolution, and his amendment had not been serious.

 conference committeeThe Senate also approved a transportation bill that would among other things require a yes from voters be fore an existing "free" highway built with gasoline tax revenue could be converted into a toll road. But that provision is not in the House version of the bill, so it is headed to a conference committee.

Sponsor Sen. John Whitmire (DHouston) quipped to his colleagues: "Hold your applause, or your boos, until after I complete reading the resolution." Lawmakers, he added, couldn't do their job without newspapers.

Raid nets lawmen truckload of CCUSD records \& computers

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 neled from the school to FLDS leaders. Recently Arizona legislators enacted a law that will allow the state to step in and take over the district, a move that was not expected until August. $\qquad$
But the Arizona Attorney G eral Terry Goddard's action on Tues day will serve to protect the district's records until such time as a state receiver can be appointed.
Goddard released a stateme late in the day in which he advised that a criminal search warrant had that a criminal search warrant had been served on the school and that boxes of financial records, other

ment had been taken into custody. "For the past two years, my of fice has been investigating reports of possible financial mismanagement in the Colorado City School District," Attorney General Terry Goddard said. "We executed the search warrant today in an effort to be sure the records are not at risk of being destroyed, removed or altered if the district is placed in receivership and to help determine if any wrongdoing has occurred.'

The search warrant and its related documents are sealed by the Superior Court and remain confidential.
Goddard noted that his office is preparing a petition to present to the State Board of Education to put the school district in receivership. The Arizona State Legislature recently passed a law allowing the board to place school districts in receivership
if they are being financially mismanaged. The new law will take effect Aug. 12, 2005.
News of the raid reached Eldorado mid afternoon on Tuesday (about noon Arizona time) and contact was made with Gary Engels, special investigator for the Mohave County Arizona District Attorney's office, who confirmed that a warrant was being served.

While Engels declined to provide specific details about the warrant, his confirmation matched reports from other sources in Colorado City, prompting the Success to post the first news of the raid on its Internet website, which was later substantiated by a press release from substantiated by a
