## Warren Jeffs transferred to Purgatory jail in Utah

**PURGATORY** — (pûrg'ætô'rê) [Lat., place of purging], in Roman Catholic doctrine, the condition of those who have died in a state of grace but have not been purged of sin. These remaining sins include unforgiven venial sins or forgiven mortal sins. Souls burdened by such sins must be purified before entering heaven.

The Purgatory Correctional Facility, located just a few miles outside St. George, Utah, was apparently named for the red sandstone Purgatory Flats that surround it. No one seems to know for sure how the Flats earned their name. Perhaps because they are sandwiched between towering sandstone cliffs and parching hot desert, almost as if suspended halfway between heaven and hell.

Regardless, the huge jail now serves as backdrop for the rapidly unfolding morality play that surrounds Warren Jeffs, the one time fugitive but now jailed prophet and president of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

Jeffs was transferred to the Purgatory lockup on Tuesday, Sept. 5, 2006. Utah lawmen brought Jeffs into the facility by helicopter, thereby avoiding the news crews who were gathering at the front door awaiting his arrival in a caravan of SUVs that never arrived. Neither did the fixed wing aircraft that was supposedly transporting Jeffs.

It is unknown if the trickery on part of law enforcement was meant to fool persons wishing Jeffs harm or those who might seek to free him. Perhaps the shell game was intended to mislead the media. Or, possibly all of the above.

Jeffs has repeatedly offered his forgiveness to law enforcement officers since his capture last week near Las Vegas, even though none are known to have asked for it.

Jeffs' forgiveness wasn't always so forthcoming, especially when loyal followers ran afoul of his strict edicts. Dozens of men in the FLDS church have been unceremoniously excommunicated from the fellowship since Jeffs took over the flock from his father Rulon Jeffs in 2002.

But it wasn't the serial excommunications or the subsequent reassignment of wives and children to other men that landed Jeffs in hot water. Neither was it the fact that he kicked the affected men out of their homes and gave those homes to other families. Nor did his legal problems stem from the fact that Jeffs and his followers openly practice plural marriage or, as it is better known, polygamy.

Instead the soft-spoken prophet found himself facing the prospect of life in prison because he allegedly ordered girls in his church, younger than the

age of consent, to marry older men and required the girls to have sexual relations with their much older husbands.

Citing a 1999 case known as State v. Chaney, Washington County Attorney Brock Belnap brought two charges of Rape as an Accomplice against Jeffs. In the earlier case, a defendant was convicted of rape of a child as an accomplice for placing his thirteen year-old daughter in a spiritual or polygamous marriage with the expectation that she would engage in sexual intercourse. In that case the Utah appeals court upheld the conviction even though the defendant was not physically present at the time of the act.

With State v. Chaney as precedent, Belnap is alleging that Warren Jeffs ordered a girl identified only as Jane Doe IV to marry an older man despite the fact that she was less than 18 years of age.

According to court documents Jeffs allegedly met with Jane in Hildale, Utah prior to the marriage at which time she told he she felt like she was too young to marry.

Jeffs allegedly told Jane that it was her spiritual duty to submit to the marriage and that the marriage was an arrangement "from God."

At that time the marriage plans were finalized. Jane and her future husband, identified only as John Doe IV, were driven to Nevada where Jeffs performed the marriage ceremony. Afterward, Jeffs instructed Jane and John to "multiply and replenish the earth and raise children in the priesthood."

Within a month of the wedding, John reminded Jane that Warren Jeffs had instructed them to have children in order to replenish the earth and that "now was the time."

It was at that time, and without Jane's consent, that John allegedly had sexual relations with her in Hildale, Utah.

Shortly thereafter, Jane met with Warren Jeffs and told him she did not want to stay in the spiritual marriage because she hated having "husband-wife" relations with John. Jane said that neither she nor Jeffs used the word sex or sexual intercourse because it was culturally not permitted. However, the court document continues, Jane believes that there is no question that Jeffs understood what they were talking about.

In response to Jane's concerns, Warren Jeffs told Jane she must remain the spiritual marriage and do whatever John told her to do.

Jane stayed in the marriage for a period of time, but continued to complain to Jeffs. At one time he allegedly advised her she should have a baby with John because a baby would change everything.

## State approves additional funding for improvements to Eldorado Airport

Approximately \$94,000 for Eldorado Airport was approved by the Texas Transportation Commission at its August meeting.

The funds will be used for planned airport improvements, which include engineering and design for future construction.

A contract for the project is expected to be awarded this fall

Project costs will be funded through TxDOT's Aviation Facilities Grant Program, which preserves

and improves the state's general aviation system, and Schleicher County.

TxDOT expects this year to provide approximately \$60 million in funding for planning, constructing and maintaining community airports. Approximately 275 community airports in Texas are eligible for funding.

Arrivals and departures from community airports account for more than three million flight hours per year and provide aircraft facilities for agricultural, medical, business and commuter use.

## Bush's Vietnam?

For the past 30 years, left-right debate over America's wars has traveled a well-worn rut. The left says whatever war is in question is "another Vietnam," while the right denies it. After three decades of being serially wrong, in the Iraq War liberals might be making their first-ever correct diagnosis.

In Iraq, as in Vietnam, we face a vicious insurgency that has worn down the will of the American public. In Iraq, as in Vietnam, we have failed to cut off the enemy from re-supply. In Iraq, as in Vietnam, we have had ever-shifting military strategies. In Iraq, as in Vietnam, we have had trouble building effective, clean governmental institutions in the soil of an alien culture. Most importantly, in Iraq, as in Vietnam, we face the prospect of defeat.

The consequences of that defeat would be remarkably similar to those in the wake of Vietnam. The prestige of the U.S. government would sink around the world, emboldening our enemies and creating a period of American doubt and retreat. A humanitarian catastrophe would likely befall Iraq, just as it did Vietnam. The only significant difference is that in Iraq, radical Islamists harbor ambitions to come to our shores and kill Americans, whereas the Viet Cong never wanted to follow us home.

The American domestic political scene already has the hallmarks of Vietnam redux. The Democrats are waging an intraparty civil war to marginalize supporters of the war, and they revile President Bush as much as they did President Nixon. Republicans, on the other hand, are hoping that the Democrats lurch too far in their dovishness and will, once again, discredit themselves on national security for a generation.

The two parties have clashing imperatives in the Iraq debate. The Democrats want to wage a fight over the war in retrospect while declining to make any positive prescriptions that might divide their party or expose unpopular positions (e.g., an immediate pullout). The Republicans have to fight in prospect, avoiding the losing debate over the past while convincing people they have a plausible strategy for success and the Democrats have none.

But what is that strategy? For too long, President Bush's administration has seemed content to do the bare minimum in Iraq, hoping to hold things together just enough to allow troop drawdowns that justify its assurances of progress. Bush would be much better served by forthrightly acknowledging Iraq's distressing circumstances and backing an all-out push to secure Baghdad even if it takes thousands more American troops in the country.

Because there is one other similarity with Vietnam that should be avoided -- the aching sense that not everything was done to win the war. By the end of Vietnam, we had essentially beaten the insurgency and could have helped the South Vietnamese hold off the conventional invasion of the North, if we hadn't given up.

In Iraq, too, we have scored some successes against the Sunni insurgency. It is not too late to tamp down the militia-directed violence, which hasn't yet taken on an uncontrollable life of its own. But the clock is ticking, toward the hour when we will indeed suffer another Vietnam.

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## Some people see past the fear

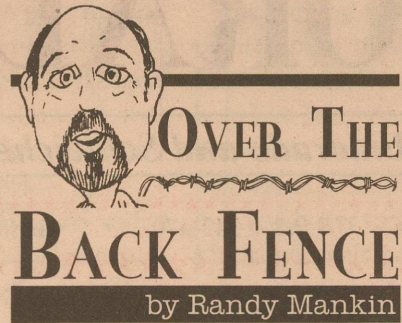
The world was shocked this week to learn of the death of Steve Erwin, the Australian outdoorsman who came to be known as the Crocodile Hunter.

Erwin routinely put himself in danger and kept TV audiences sitting on the edge of their seats. Yet somehow you always felt that he would manage to find a way to cheat death...and he did, at least until this week, when a seemingly placid stingray sank its poisonous barb deep into his chest.

He leaves behind a wife and two children. Then there are all the people whose livelihoods depended on him. They were either employed at his privately owned zoo, or involved somehow in the production and distribution of his TV shows. They will miss him, too. So will millions of his fans.

Steve Erwin was only 44 years-old.

I don't know when or how Erwin decided to he liked putting himself in danger. He and people like him thrive on excitement and feast on the fear that would choke most people. I don't



understand it.

I never understood snake handlers, either. Or people who like jumping out of perfectly good airplanes.

Someone, somewhere thought to himself, hey wouldn't it be fun to get on a horse, ride as fast as I can and as close as I can to a steer with very long horns, then jump off that horse and wrestle that steer to the ground?

While the vast majority of us would answer with a resounding, No! The thrill seekers, people like Steve Erwin, manage to see past the danger, if they see it at all, and recognize the challenge.

My friend Jon Krakauer is a mountain climber. He's climbed some of the toughest and most challenging peaks in the world,

including Mt. Everest, the world's tallest.

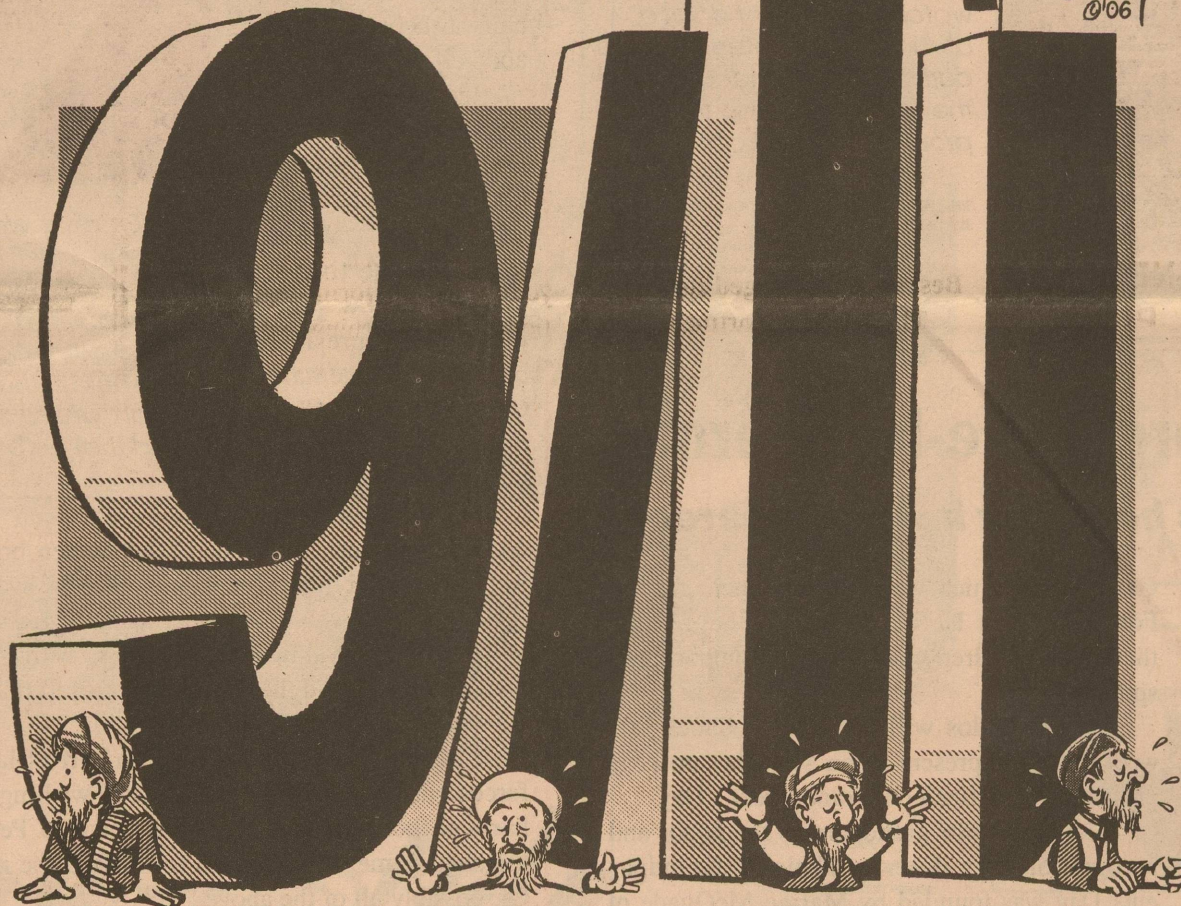
Jon is certainly a thrill seeker, but he's become more circumspect in recent years. A number of his fellow climbers died on Everest back in '96, and he very nearly did.

The experience has caused Jon to question the reasons people climb tall mountains. He still climbs, and he still puts himself into places you and I would never dare. But, he says he'll never again climb into what he calls the Death Zone. The area where the air becomes so thin that climbers are in a race with death to reach the peak and get back down.

Could Steve Erwin have found the happy medium, the balance point between risk and reward that my friend Jon has found? We will never know.

Conversely, when Jon is out climbing one of those comparatively lower peaks, I hope he will consider that Steve Erwin wasn't killed wrestling hungry crocodiles, but swimming with otherwise peaceful looking stingrays. Be careful, Jon.

## A dream vacation turns into a nightmare

Some acquaintances of mine saved up for a weeklong family reunion and vacation on South Padre island. They rented a house with a pool and were having a ball. After being there for a few days, someone suggested they go to Matamoros for lunch. It was just across the border from Brownsville, only thirty minutes away.

They loaded up three vehicles with family members and headed for the border. During their time on the island, they had talked with other tourists who visited Mexico. They said it was no hassle, that all you needed to go across the bridge was a driver's license.

The group had planned to just walk across or take a taxi, but found themselves in a one-way lane leading into Mexico. It was noon when the first of their three vehicles got to a Border Patrolman on the Texas side. The owner told the officer that he had some gun shells in the pickup and asked if that would pose a problem. They had no weapons, only bullets. The Patrolman said, "No, just declare them to the Mexican authorities on the other side of the bridge." On the Mexican side, they were told

they would have to go to another crossing to turn over the ammunition, and waved the other two vehicles on through. Those folks quickly returned to Brownsville to wait for word about their family.

The three passengers in the pickup were detained. I'll call them Dad (pickup owner), Mom and Son (21 years old). Son was driving the pickup. Dad was placed in an official car and driven across town to another border crossing station. A customs agent drove Mom and Son to the station in their pickup. The three were confused and worried. They thought since they told them about the bullets, they would let them go. No such luck.

They were questioned for hours, all in Spanish, which only Dad spoke. The officers wanted their birth certificates, social security numbers, driver's license, title and registration to the pickup. A few

hours later, an agent who spoke English came in and said he was charging Son with firearms possession, that in Mexico possession of bullets was the same as having weapons. A representative from the American consulate stopped by and told them she couldn't do anything except loan them her cell phone to call family members to get the title and other items. A family member brought them down by plane, along with a big bundle of cash. Mom says all during the questioning and waiting, the Mexican officers were rude and gave the Texans glaring looks, refusing their requests for water. They hadn't had anything to eat all day. "We could feel their hatred and resentment," says Mom, "just because we were Americans." Around midnight, they took Dad and Son to a jail cell.

After conferring with attorneys on both sides of the border, Dad and Son were released the next day after paying the judge and attorneys \$9,000. Dad's pickup (he still owes \$10,000 on it) is still in Mexican custody. He really doesn't care if he gets it back. He is glad to be home. He brought his wife and son home in a rent car.

## Candidates have their own takes on TAKS

AUSTIN — Now that the kids are back in school, gubernatorial candidates are talking about what they would do to improve education.

Candidates focused on the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills, or TAKS.

Incumbent Republican Gov. Rick Perry seems to be saying TAKS matches the curriculum, things are fine the way they are, and stick with the program.

Democrat Chris Bell said TAKS should be a diagnostic tool to help schools get an idea of students' academic strengths and weaknesses, but not to be the key-stone to public education in Texas.

Independent candidate Kinky Friedman has one of the bolder ideas, which would be to kill TAKS, the test students must pass to advance at intervals in the elementary and secondary grades, and finally, to graduate.

State Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, also running as an independent, wants kids to take TAKS at the beginning of the school year rather than at the end, so teachers can get an early assessment and make needed adjustments.

She also wants to give teachers a \$4,000 a year raise, bring back a \$1,000 health care stipend taken away by the Legislature and offer high school graduates tuition-free junior college.

### Plans made for nuclear plants

Dallas-based TXU Corp. on Aug. 31 announced plans to build one to three new nuclear power plants in Texas.

TXU will file applications for the plants with the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission for licenses that would allow the company to produce two to six gigawatts of power generation capacity at the sites.

The applications will be filed by 2008, and if approved, the power plants would be up and running between 2015 and 2020, according to a company news release.

Part of the plan is to increase capacity at the Comanche Peak nuclear power plant near Glen Rose.

### Students' math scores improve

Students improved their math scores but received lower reading scores this year on the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Texas Education Agency announced in an Aug. 29 news release.

"The average math score of the 129,784 Texas students enrolled in public and private schools who took the SAT was 506 out of a possible 800. That compares to a score for Texans of 502 in 2005.

"While the Texas score showed improvement, it fell short of the national average math score of 518. Nationally, math scores dropped two points in 2006," the TEA said.

### New biodiesel plant to open

This month, Hawaii-based Pacific Biodiesel Inc. is bringing online Willie Nelson's vision: a biodiesel fuel plant in Carl's Corner, the truckstop about 60 miles south of Dallas.

The plant will process locally produced cottonseed oil and used cooking oil to make the fuel, B20. The plant is designed to make 3 million gallons of B20 a year.

Nelson has long promoted biodiesel as a way to reduce the nation's dependency on fossil fuels and to create a new revenue stream for family farms.

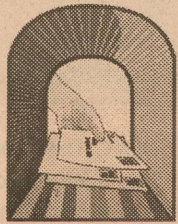

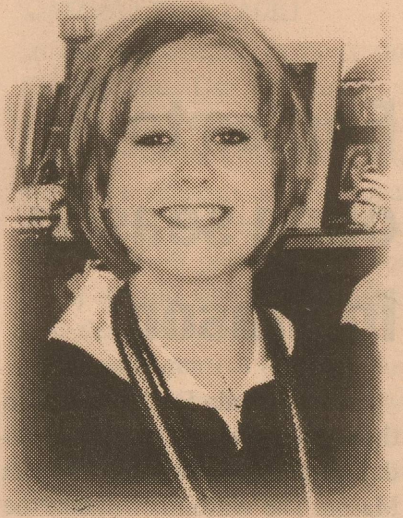

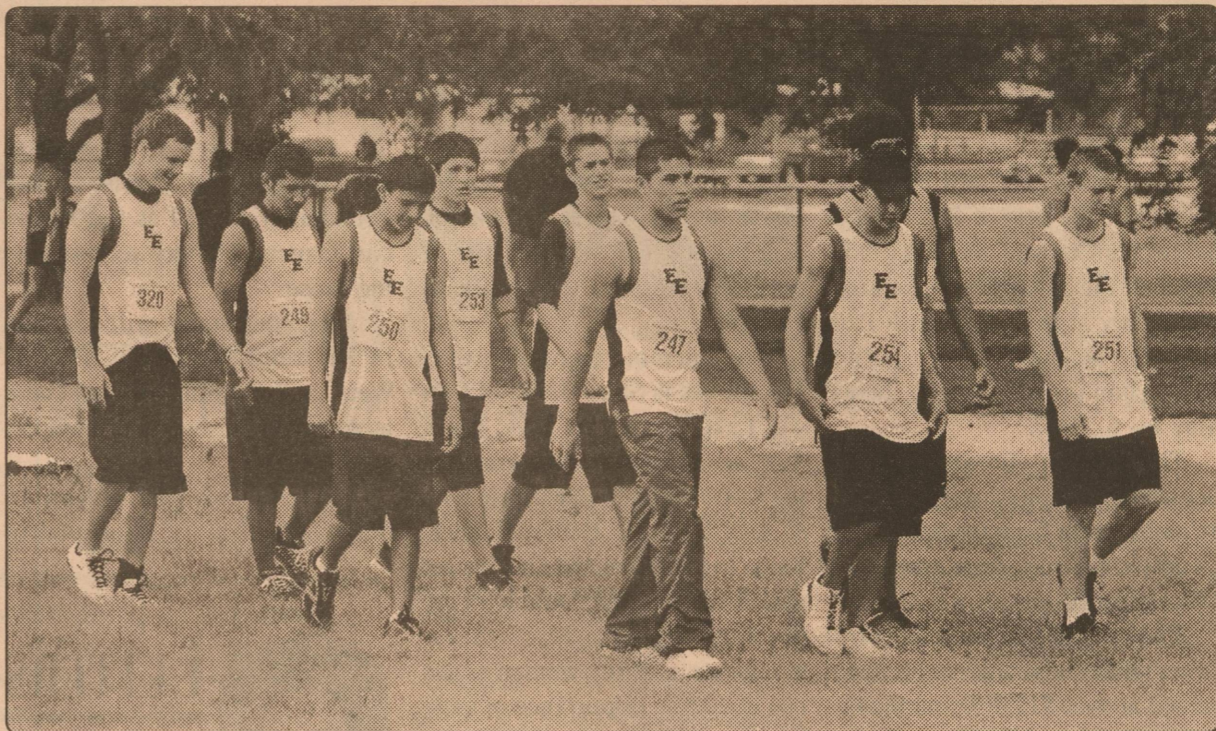

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# Schleicher County Wellness Foundation News

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Schleicher County Wellness Foundation was held August 24 at 6:45 AM in the SW Texas Electric Coop Board Room. The meeting was called to order by the Chair, Eddie Albin. Board Members present were Ilse Williams, Jim Martin, Beverly Minor, Treasurer, Christy Meador, Cherie Sproul, Randy Mitchel, Eddie Albin, Randy Mankin, Vice-Chair and Jim Martin.

Staff members present were Jim Brame, Executive Director, Nancy Lester, Program Director, Beckie Sullivan, Wellness Coordinator and Holly Brame, Executive Assistant. Board Members not present were Danny Pina, Dr. Johnson, Dr. Day and Rick Sterling. Ilse Williams acted as Secretary.

Beverly Minor gave the Treasurer's report which indicated property assets of \$2,500 and \$200.00 in donations since last meeting, bringing the total of cash donations to \$801.00. Expenses included legal fees of \$150.00 and bank service fees of \$5.00. The total cash balance was \$646.00. She mentioned that 1st Community raised an issue about the board resolution which was filed with that depository. In response, Beverly Minor was officially elected Treasurer of the Foundation.

Dr. Brame gave the Executive Director's report that he had met with Architect Gary Donaldson and forwarded the Foundation's ideas for the wellness and exercise center but had not received any draft for the board to review. He reminded everyone of the official tax exempt status of the organization.

Randy Mitchel and Christy Meador visited the Sonora Center and stated that the pieces of exercise equipment were placed too close to each other. Dr. Brame will make a special note to the architect to ensure that our equipment would have sufficient space allotted. There were 20 lockers, 2 showers, and 2 toilets per gender. Randy Mankin had contacted the board president of the Reagan Co Hospital Board and will meet with him Monday to learn about their grant application process.

Ilse Williams reported that directors' and officers' insurance

was appropriate for non-profit organizations for two scenarios, employment disputes and misappropriations of funds, but the premiums are high. Currently, the Foundation has few funds and no paid employees so the need for insurance will not arise till later. Beverly Minor will also investigate future cost of such a policy.

Holly Brame reported that a mailbox was soon to be acquired by the Foundation. Nancy Lester will work on a logo and still needs resume info from certain board members. Ilse Williams will make up a sample letter of commitment to provide to other organizations which might promise financial or in-kind support pending the award of a grant from the San Angelo

Health Foundation. Nancy Lester repeated the need to have detailed plans as we approach others for support. The Lions Club's plan to donate the proceeds from the September Golf Tournament was reported as a good possibility by Eddie Albin.

The Jump-Rope for Heart Campaign in the spring will benefit SCWF.

There is the need to offer prizes to the students. Christy Meador suggested T-Shirts with our soon to be logo and other information. SWTEC may be able to help funds the purchase of such T-shirts.

It is also hoped that a substantial donation may be sought from Preferred Management, the company that leases and operates the

local hospital.

In other business, Dr. Brame announced that we needed to consider changes to our by-laws by possibly extending the Directors' terms. We should also establish firm rules concerning absences in that any Director missing 2 meetings without notifying one of the Officers will be dropped from the Board. Inclusion to provide for the office of secretary is necessary.

Nancy Lester gave a brief presentation concerning adapting regular recipes to diabetic needs, provided sample recipes and served delicious food. She emphasized that such adaptations are not hard to do since there are many products that can be used instead of sugar. She also suggested that anyone wanting to learn to shop and cook with diabetic needs in mind should make it a habit to read labels. Such health education activity is to be a most important function of the Foundation's wellness center.

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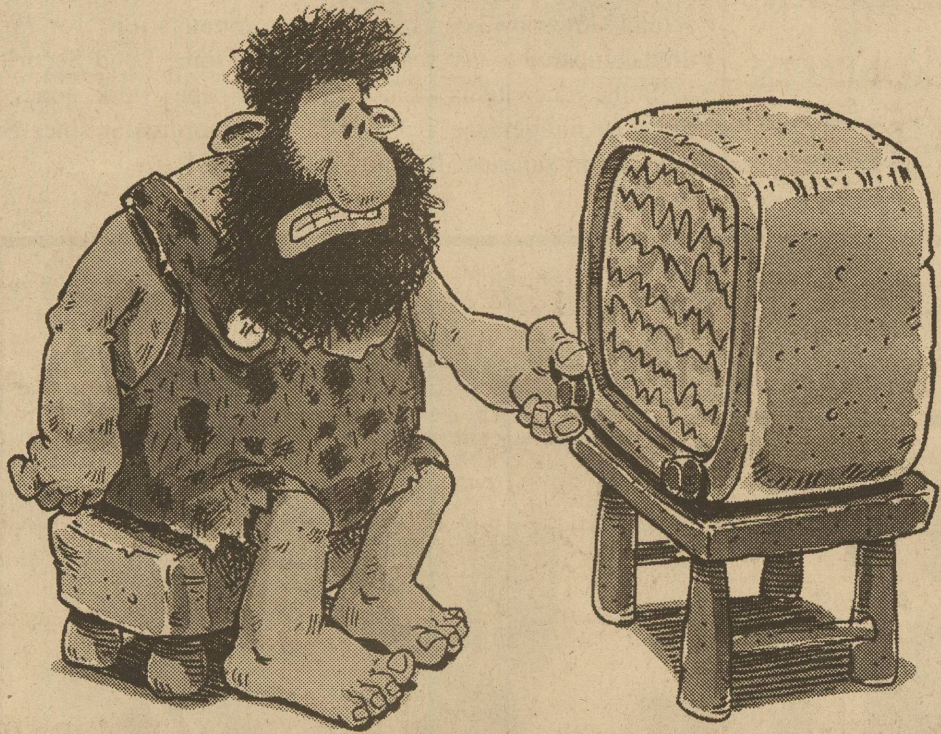
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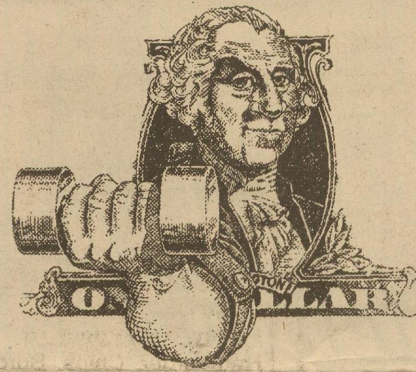

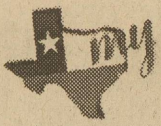
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# Utah gets first chance to bring Jeffs to justice

At another meeting Jeffs allegedly told Jane, "No matter what happens you cannot fight the priesthood because if you do you will lose your salvation."

The Utah charges of rape as an accomplice are much more severe than charges filed in Arizona for similar offenses. There, Jeffs only faces charges of sexual conduct with a minor and conspiracy to commit sexual conduct with a minor. Both charges are based on alleged marriages with under

age girls.

Utah's more severe charges mean that Jeffs is less likely to be released on bail. And, Washington County Attorney Brock Belnap has already filed papers asking that Jeffs be held without bail. In the documents Belnap noted that documents recovered from the Cadillac Escalade Jeffs was riding in at the time of his arrest reveal that he has ordered his faithful followers to conceal him from law enforcement.

The motion to hold Jeffs without bail quotes documents found in his possession which allegedly state, "So I have to be hiding in my travels, not to let anyone know. And when I come to a land of refuge, you must not reveal where I am in your phone calls and your letters." Belnap further argues that Jeffs is an extraordinarily high flight risk and claims that no amount

of money would compel his appearance in court. "He has an enormous network of followers who will support him financially and help him evade capture," the document continues.

Jeffs is in the Purgatory Correctional Facility because he voluntarily waived extradition during a court appearance before a Nevada judge last Thursday. Utah gets the first opportunity to prosecute him because of a deal struck between Arizona and Utah authorities. There are also federal charges of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution pending against Jeffs. It is unknown when the federal authorities will get their bite at the apple.

Jeffs was wanted on Arizona and Utah charges when was suddenly named to the FBI's Ten Most Wanted Fugitives list in May of this year. Since that time law enforcement agencies across the country have cooperated the dragnet that finally led to his capture.

At the time of Jeffs arrest, he was reportedly wearing a white T-shirt, cargo shorts and tennis shoes, a vast departure from the neck, to wrist, to ankle clothing Jeffs requires of his followers. Like-

wise, one of Jeffs numerous wives, Naomi Jessop Jeffs, was riding in the 2006 red Cadillac Escalade with Jeffs when he was caught. She, too, was strangely out of uniform, dressed in denim jeans.

Warren Jeffs brother, Isaac Jeffs, was driving the vehicle when it was pulled over by a Nevada state trooper after he was unable to read the SUV's temporary dealer tag. Jeffs' wife and brother were both released after questioning.

A bail hearing is believed to be the next courtroom procedure Jeffs will face. If Utah has its way, he will be denied bail and will be held behind bars until the charges against him are satisfied.

At press time, news reports indicate that Jeffs has hired Las Vegas attorney Richard Wright to defend him.

In the mean time, Warren Jeffs remains in jail in the Purgatory Correctional Facility, almost as if he were suspended halfway between heaven and hell...just a few miles from the FLDS stronghold of Hildale/Colorado City, and a few miles in the other direction from the courthouse in St. George where he is slated to face justice.

## County Commissioners meet on budget and tax rate

The Schleicher County Commissioners were present Friday, September 1st and Tuesday, September 5th during the required public hearings for the 2007 Proposed Budget and Tax Rate. The court also conducted some business which included lifting the County Wide Burn Ban.

On Friday, the court voted to take sealed bids on a 1980 2½ ton International Fire Truck # E-31 as is. The county donated the truck to the Prescribed Burn Association who had a used engine installed. The truck engine blew a hole in the block during a prescribed burn. The Association was asking for their money back on the engine. The county decided to sell the truck and reimburse the burn association with the proceeds, if any.

The county's total budget for 2007 will come to \$3,225,785. The budget increased over \$360 thousand, due to increase in tax evaluations and oil/gas production. The county's proposed tax rate is actually lower by 3 cents per hundred compared to last year.

Some other items included in the new budget are a 3%-20% increase in salaries. The highest

increase will go to jailers and road crew. The court also earmarked \$50,000 for new air conditioning units for the Sheriff Office/Jail, \$52,000 for a maintenance supervisor and helper, \$28,000 for matching funds for a airport grant. A new car for the Sheriff department and a new dump truck for the Road Department, were also included.

On Tuesday, September 5, Commissioners Matt Brown and Johnny Mayo voted to propose a tax rate for 2007. The rate will be voted on Monday, September 11 at 10:00 a.m. The court also voted to increase the collection of delinquent county tax fees from 15% to 20%.

Commissioners present for Friday, September 1st Public Meeting were Bill Clark, Matt Brown and Johnny Mayo.

The court at this meeting agreed to give Volunteer Fire Chief Jerry Jones who is acting Emergency Health Management Coordinator \$800.00 a month compensation for monitoring the Home Land Security Grants and paper work. Jones has been the coordinator since September 11, 2001.

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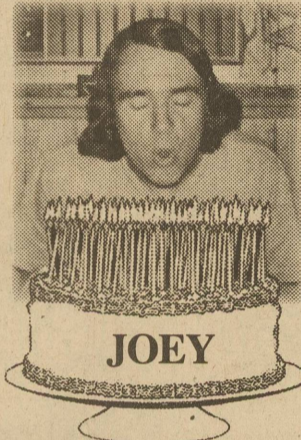
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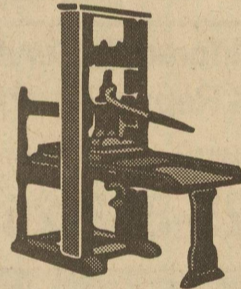
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# Schleicher among 216 Texas counties qualifying for livestock assistance due to ongoing drought

AUSTIN – Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs today announced that livestock producers in 216 drought-stressed Texas counties, including Schleicher and several surrounding counties, may be eligible for \$14.5 million in assistance under the recently announced federal Livestock Assistance Grant Program. The livestock block grant is part of a broad-based national drought disaster assistance program for American farmers and ranchers announced by the U.S. Department

of Agriculture this week. USDA will distribute \$50 million in state block grants to 20 states to help livestock producers recover losses suffered because of the ongoing drought. Assistance may cover such items as the cost of lost forage, supplemental feeding, the cost of relocating livestock to new pastures and the cost of emergency water supplies. The Texas Department of Agriculture is working with statewide agriculture and livestock groups to establish the criteria for distribut-

ing the funds in Texas. "The funds released by USDA will provide a much-needed infusion of dollars to Texas producers devastated by the ongoing drought," Combs said. "With the entire state facing unprecedented economic setbacks because of this year's drought, I appreciate all that Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns has done to help our hardworking producers recover some of their losses during these desperate times. "We will be working closely

with our livestock groups, the Governor's Office and USDA to set up the criteria, announce a sign-up period and distribute the funds from the block grant to our producers as quickly as possible," Combs said. Only livestock producers in the eligible counties who suffered a loss of forage production because of the 2006 drought may receive assistance. Payments are limited to \$10,000 and cannot exceed the amount of lost forage production and related losses. Only 40 of the state's 256 counties did not qualify for assistance. Among the area counties that are eligible for assistance are: Brewster, Coke, Coleman, Crane, Crockett, Ector, Edwards, Gillespie, Glasscock, Irion, Jeff Davis, Kerr, Kimble, McCulloch, Mason, Medina, Menard, Midland, Mills, Mitchell, Nolan, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Reeves, Runnels, San Saba, Schleicher, Sterling, Stone-wall, Sutton, Taylor, Tom Green, Upton, Uvalde, Val Verde and Winkler.

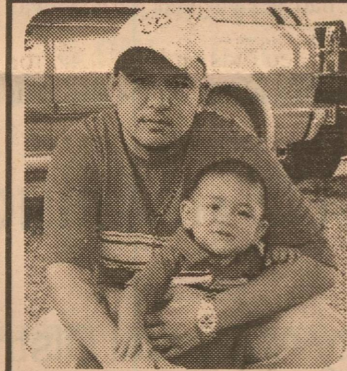

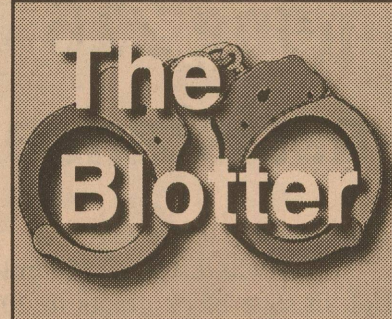

## What's All the Buzz about Planets?

Scientists frequently hold important meetings, most of which elicit widespread public ho-hum. Indeed, most of their technical discussions would quickly put us lay folks to sleep.

Not so with the recent convening of 2,500 astronomers in Prague, Czech Republic. The 19th General Assembly of the International Astronomical Union has generated surprising public interest and media attention—at least one aspect of the 2-week assembly. While most of their sessions would still put many of us asleep, not so with the issue of defining a planet.

Astronomy, regarded by many as the oldest field of science, has been around for centuries, yet surprisingly there has been no official definition of a planet. For most of astronomy's history, this wasn't a problem as the then-known planets were so different from anything else in the heavens. But Clyde Tombaugh's 1930 discovery clouded the issue just a bit. He found a faint object beyond Neptune that came to be regarded as the 9th planet named Pluto. For decades it was thought to be larger than Mercury so there were few serious objections to considering it a planet.

But in 1951 Gerard Kuiper created more clouds when he theorized the existence of a disk of icy-type objects orbiting the Sun beyond the orbit of Neptune.

His idea wasn't too off-the-wall as a similar disk of rocky-type objects, now known as the asteroid belt, had been discovered in the ear-

ly 1800s between the orbits of Mars and Jupiter. The largest asteroid, Ceres, being less than 600 miles in diameter, wasn't considered a serious contender as a planet.

But the issue got much cloudier with the discovery that Pluto was smaller than Mercury, and even smaller than our Moon and several moons of other planets. Should an object that small be considered a planet? Then in 1978 James Christy found Pluto has a moon half its size, now named Charon.

Within the past few years discovery of a number of distant objects has verified the existence of what is now called the Kuiper Belt, and many began to regard Pluto as just an unusually large Kuiper Belt object that should not be called a planet.

Then Michael Brown's discovery last summer of a Kuiper Belt object slightly larger than Pluto (tentatively dubbed Xena) was the final cloud. The IAU simply had to come up with a clear definition. A somewhat radical proposal was to be debated and voted on Aug. 24 (after this column was written). So more next time on what comes out of the historic 19th IAU General Assembly.

Late breaking news: Pluto demoted. More next time.

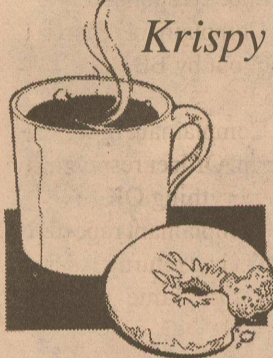

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# MDA telethon raises record \$61 million

LAS VEGAS — Thanks to an all-star talent list headed by Celine Dion and a quarter of a million dedicated volunteers across the country, the Muscular Dystrophy Association's Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon set a record in contributions and pledges.

As MDA's 41st Telethon ended at 6 p.m. EDT today, the tote board showed an all-time high of \$61,013,855 for the voluntary health organization's programs of research and services to benefit people with neuromuscular diseases.

"I'm deeply gratified by the generosity of the American public," MDA National Chairman Jerry Lewis said. "They never fail to come through for 'my kids' who have muscular dystrophy and other conditions that waste muscles and too often shorten lives."

Lewis, 80, returned to star in the Telethon despite a heart attack in June. He has never missed a Telethon.

This year's show was dedicated to longtime MDA President &

CEO Robert Ross, who died in June.

Returning to "the entertainment capital of the world" after 12 years in Hollywood. The 211/2-hour live Telethon originated from the South Coast Hotel in Las Vegas and was broadcast nationwide and in Canada on the 190 stations in MDA's "Love Network."

Lewis announced Monday that the Telethon would return to the South Coast Hotel in 2007, soon to be renamed South Point Hotel.

America's best "sidekick" Ed McMahon returned as the Telethon's anchor, while Jann Carl of "Entertainment Tonight"; Tom Bergeron, host of "America's Funniest Videos" and "Dancing With the Stars"; popular talk show host Larry King; "General Hospital" star Kelly Monaco; Billy Gilman, award-winning singer; and comedians Norm Crosby and Bob Zany assisted Lewis as co-hosts.

This year's Telethon talent included appeals from the country's most popular actors, singers and TV personalities. Live and taped

performances ranged from musical guests in country, pop, rock, gospel and variety acts.

Some of Broadway's best casts were also showcased.

In addition to the tote board figure, which reflects pledges and donations, a number of MDA sponsors presented checks representing their year-round fund-raising efforts for MDA. Leading this group was a record contribution of \$23.5 million from the International Association of Fire Fighters, the highest yearly contribution ever from any MDA sponsor.

Profiled and interviewed on the Telethon were several families living with neuromuscular diseases.

The Telethon drew international viewers via its live Webcast at www.mda.org through streaming media provided by RealNetworks.

"This remarkably successful effort will mean the world to the tens of thousands of individuals and families who are fighting neuromuscular diseases," Lewis said. "I'd like to thank everyone involved in making this really terrific show the best Telethon ever."
