Schleicher County withdraws application for Colonia grant

Confusion over exactly how the county should proceed in the next round of Colonia grant applications, prompted Schleicher County commissioners on Monday to withdraw the county's application for funds to pay for street paving.

Judge Johnny Griffin explained that grant administrator Kay Howard prepared paperwork to pursue a grant for water and wastewater improvements in the Orient Heights neighborhood and the Three Sisters Addition. Meanwhile, the county's engineer, Tim Glendenning, had prepared to ask the grant committee for money to repair roads

Judge Griffin explained that Ms. Howard had informed him there was virtually no chance of egetting a grant for anything other than water and wastewater projects since those types of projects are the ones favored under the government's grant scoring criteria.

With that, the commissioners agreed to withdraw the grant application since none of them believed that the neighborhood needed a water or sewer project large enough to warrant pursuing a grant. Judge Griffin explained that the few remaining projects, including connecting two residences to the sewer system, could be done cheaper with county funds and manpower.

The action came during the commissioners' first meeting of April. The session was called to

Among other business, the commissioners agreed to spend \$24,500.00 to pave Mary Street from where it leaves the Eldorado City Limits to where it connects to Denny Street. Johnny Mayo noted that the county is furnishing crushed rock and preparing the grade for the project and expressed concerns about the overall cost, which he calculated to be in excess of \$40,800 per mile. Mayo said that the county wouldn't be able to do much paving in the future at that rate.

It was noted, however that there aren't many paving contractors who are willing to bid on a small job — Mary Street measures only 0.6 miles in length. Judge Griffin said he was confident the county could get a lower price on larger jobs, especially after a contractor moves its equipment into the county. After discussing several options, including the possibility of installing speed bumps on Mary Street, the men agreed to proceed with the paving as soon as the weather allows.

The commissioners also voted to call for bids for a transport load of diesel fuel. The bids are to be opened at the May 14th meeting.

Before adjourning, the commissioners briefly reviewed a draft copy of the county's personnel handbook, but chose not to adopt it until changes could be made. They also approved the purchase of a new slide for the county swimming pool for \$3,500. The men also heard from Phil McCormick who advised that the cart paths at the golf course have been paved and that the club is well pleased with the results. The men then reviewed and approved the county's regular bills.

The next meeting of the Commissioners Court is slated for 9:00 a.m. on Monday, April 23, 2007 in the first floor meeting room of the Schleicher County Courthouse.

Sheriff warns of phony check scam

Local residents among thousands targeted nationwide

Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran announced this week that a number of Eldorado and Schleicher County residents have been targeted in a phony check scam that has claimed victims across the nation. Doran urged local citizens to be suspect of any unexpected checks they might receive or any communication, whether by letter, telephone or e-mail, revealing that they have won a prize or a lottery contest.

Doran further urged anyone who suspects they have been victimized in such a scam to file a report with his office. He also asked that people who have been targeted by this or similar scams to report them to the Better Business Bureau.

Last month the BBB issued the following statement concerning these types of scams:

Potential victims across the

country are receiving notifications via mail that they are 'lucky' lottery winners. The solicitation and check offer is a scam whose only intent is to defraud the recipient rather than bring good financial news. The volume of these types of letters currently going around is substantial, so if you think that you have been singled out as a lucky winner in a drawing or a lottery that you don't ever recall entering, think again before responding.


If an unsolicited letter with a notification that you have won an award is received in the form of a final notification or you are a winner it will also urge your direct and immediate response. In many occasions the recipient will find a check included with your own name on it. Exercise caution as you are being targeted by a scammer.

According to Steve J. Bernas,

President & CEO of the BBB of Chicago and Northern Illinois, "These types of scams that feature phony lottery and drawing winners are burgeoning and consumers need to be extremely vigilant if they are targeted. Do not under any circumstances send a check or wire transfer money to any individual or company that you don't know. If the offer looks too good to be true it probably is."

The Better Business Bureau has reported this fraudulent activity to several law enforcement authorities and is working closely with the Federal Trade Commission, the Illinois Attorney General's Office, The U.S. Postal Service and the City of Chicago Department of Consumer Services who are working in concert with us to help shut down these scams. Unfortunately, Bernas

Jeffs' note to judge prompts leadership questions

Warren Jeffs apparently doesn't believe he should be prophet of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. A digitally enhanced photo obtained by The Deseret Morning News confirmed last week what jail house rumors had been saying for the past month — that Jeffs doesn't believe he is the man to lead the church his father Rulon Jeffs once presided over as prophet.

The photo was one of many obtained by a pool photographer during a hearing before Utah District Judge James Shumate on March 27, 2007. Jeffs made a couple of attempts to approach the bench and speak with Shumate, but was rebuffed and ordered to confer with his attorneys. Jeffs then

penned a note and attempted to hand it to the judge. That's when a pool photographer, tasked with taking pictures of the event for several newspapers, snapped the now famous photo.


Judge Shumate declined to accept the note again ordered Jeffs to speak with his attorneys. But for digital enhancement and expert photo analysis, the contents of the note might have been lost forever. Instead, The Deseret Morning News was able to report on April 5, 2007 a couple of phrases found in the note including, "I have not been a Prophet and am not a Prophet."

Chew On This

Any policy that taxes similar products differently is inherently unfair and should be changed. The Texas House of Representatives is considering a bill that gives them the opportunity to stand out as a leader in tax equity and fairness. The bill only affects moist smokeless tobacco products (such as Copenhagen, Kodiak, Hawken, and Skoal) and brings the treatment of this product more in line with traditional

excise taxes.

Next time you walk into a convenience store, take a look at the tins of tobacco or "snuff" behind the counter. You'll notice there is a great disparity in price between the premium quality tobacco and the cheaper low-end tobacco. The reason behind the difference is the tax levied on smokeless tobacco is different than any other product on the market; it's based on a percentage of its price,

not by its weight.

The tax on moist smokeless tobacco is an excise tax. Excise taxes tax the consumption of a product. Federal and state governments impose these taxes on commodities such as gasoline, alcohol and tobacco products. In all of these instances, however, state excise taxes are imposed based on a unit or weight of the product (i.e., a gallon of gasoline, a liter of alcohol, a pack of cigarettes).

The beneficial result of an excise tax based on unit or weight is that similar products are taxed equally regardless of price, and the tax is spread evenly. For example, a gallon of 87-octane gasoline is taxed at the same rate as a gallon of 93-octane, a pack of premium cigarettes is taxed at the same rate as a pack of generic cigarettes.

The bill before the Texas House of Representatives will effectively change the excise tax on moist smokeless tobacco to a weight-based system. It will level the playing field so that all tobacco products are taxed at the same rate.

Currently, in 40 states, moist smokeless tobacco products are being taxed as a percentage of their price. Because tobacco products also carry the state sales tax (based on price), this is like imposing a second sales tax. Texas' current excise tax imposes a 40 percent tax on moist smokeless tobacco products based on the manufacturer's price. Tack on the sales tax and the result is certain products are subject to a much higher tax than similar, less expensive products. Changing to a weight-based method would also eliminate a tax preference for inexpensive products that could harm state revenues.

Opponents of this bill claim that taxes based on price discourage teenagers from using tobacco products. But in reality, all this does is shift demand from the premium snuff to the low-end more affordable product.

The American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC), a nonpartisan free-market membership organization of state legislators in Washington D.C., fully endorses the change to a weight-based tax for moist smokeless tobacco products. Additionally, ALEC believes this tax change would simplify tax policy and make it easier for companies to compete on the free-market without preferential treatment from the tax code.

This year, 11 states including Texas, have introduced bills to change their excise tax on moist smokeless tobacco products to a weight- or unit-based system. Texas has the opportunity to stand out as a leader in the states by adopting this important reform and continue to be at the forefront of sound and fair economic policy. Snuff said.

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
Digital Television Alert

On April 7, 1927, a short speech given by then-Commerce Secretary Herbert Hoover was sent from Washington to New York as part of the first successful long distance television transmission. Headlines in newspapers the next day beamed, "Television Now Reality," and a new era of American history was born. Eighty years later, we are embracing a new technology that will significantly improve television resolution and quality while also offering many new services.

Beginning February 17, 2009, all television programming will be digital, as stations will no longer broadcast analog signals. Digital technology will provide viewers with superior picture and sound, as well as offer multiple programming choices and interactive options. This transition will also make additional broadcast spectrum available for public safety uses and for advanced wireless applications.

One byproduct of digital television is the ability for a station to multicast multiple signals from the same station at the same time. Among the numerous potential multicast offerings are local options that could include news and weather, foreign language content, and educational programming.

Furthermore, when all broadcasts become digital, analog spectrum previously used for television will now be dedicated to public safety services. One of the lessons

of 9/11 and Hurricanes Katrina and Rita is that emergency first responders, police, and firefighters require improved systems of communication. The transition to digital television will provide these responders with new frequencies to increase interoperability and allow officials from all jurisdictions and levels of government to more easily share information. This will ultimately save lives.

Remaining analog spectrum will be auctioned by the government to wireless companies, which is expected to generate billions of dollars in proceeds to help reduce the federal deficit. The sale of this spectrum will also lead to the implementation of even more new technologies as services such as wireless broadband becomes

available.

For many people, digital television is actually already here. Over 1,600 television stations are now broadcasting digital signals, and many consumers are currently enjoying these additional options. One product made possible by digital technology is High Definition TV, which has a far superior picture than standard definition television. HDTV has already changed the way many people watch sporting events on television. Digital technology makes possible crystal clear details previously impossible to see on television. Programs about nature and the outdoors are also vastly improved when viewed with digital technology.

Since March 1, 2007, all new televisions with screens 13 inches or larger have been required to be capable of receiving digital signals. If you have a converter box, cable or satellite service, you are ready for the arrival of digital television. However, it is important for those who currently receive television over the air to prepare for the digital transition, because their current televisions may not be equipped to receive digital signals.

Beginning January 1, 2008, all U.S. households will be eligible to request two \$40 coupons from the Department of Commerce to purchase two digital-to-analog converter boxes. In the coming months, additional information will be made available by the De-

Senator wants increase in college funding

AUSTIN - Higher education continues as a top issue for Texas.

State Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, said he wants more state funding to help more kids from low and middle income families get into college.

In an April 8 Houston Chronicle copyright story, Ellis said he wants to double state funding for the Toward Excellence, Access and Success (TEXAS) grant program to \$1 billion. Ellis said if action isn't taken Texas will be in crisis.

The Chronicle reported that about 70,000 students lost their tuition grants in the past two years, and according to U.S. Department of Education statistics,



the Lone Star State is 41st in the nation in producing college graduates.

About 158,000 families are enrolled in the Texas Guaranteed Tuition Plan, formerly called the Texas Tomorrow Fund. Enrollees locked in the cost of tomorrow's college tuition and required fees at "today's prices." Plan benefits are protected by a constitutional guarantee from the state.

The fund debuted under then-Comptroller John Sharp in the booming economy of 1996.

Waco economist Ray Perryman in early April published a 72-page report, "Thinking About Tomorrow, The Texas Guaranteed Tuition Plan: An Economic Assessment of Recent Evidence and Options for the Future."

Perryman proposes that the fund can and should be open to new enrollees. His report contrasts with a recent study by the state comptroller that warns the fund, which has been closed to enrollment since June 2003, is headed toward bankruptcy and should not accept additional enrollment.

Perryman says reopening enrollment makes sense when coupled with improved financial markets and a slowdown in tuition hikes. Those elements working together could return the strength to the fund, he said.

Measure puts road plan on hold

The Trans Texas Corridor also continues as a major issue as the 80th session of the Texas Legislature inches closer to its late May finale.

Opponents of the proposed road system criticize the state's policy of entering into "comprehensive development agreements" that transfer the state's traditional role to private entities who build and maintain the roads.

When such deals are made, the public is left out of the loop, opponents

The Senate Transportation and Homeland Security Committee on April 4 approved a measure to halt all comprehensive development agreements for 24 months to allow the state to study the issue further.

Child restraint bill passes Senate

Also on April 4, the Senate passed legislation strengthening child passenger safety.


S.B. 60 by Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, requires that children 7 years and younger, unless they are more than 4-feet 10-inches tall, be secured in a child passenger safety seat while riding in a motor vehicle.

Zaffirini said her legislation would save lives, preclude tragedies and injuries and qualify Texas for \$3.2 million in federal funds while saving the state \$17 million in health care expenditures.

House passes CHIP legislation

The Texas House on April 4 passed H.B. 109, relating to the Childrens Health Insurance Program.

A Unique Fundraiser with a Funny Name

Last year I did some interviews with the folks who put on the Texas Testicle Festival south of Jacksonville. I wrote a column about it and received dozens of calls and emails from curious readers who wanted to know more. This year I attended the festival for the first time.

It started some 15 years ago when a few families who work with cattle got together to eat calf fries at Chris and Patti Holman's place on Highway 69. It was originally held around New Year's but has since moved to the second Sunday in March. The word got out and more and more people started showing up. Five years ago the families decided to make it a fundraiser for Boys Ranch in the panhandle. They made a big sign, put it on a cattle trailer and parked it near the highway. The sign reads: THE TEXAS TES-TICLE FESTIVAL. HOPE YOU HAVE A BALL. Passing motorists stop, take pictures and attend the festival. Announcements over

a public address system remind people about caps and t-shirts for sale, a raffle and auction.

The event begins with a brief sermon from Mike Morrow, the pastor of a cowboy church near Tyler. The church's song leader, Sandy Dickey, provides special music. Then people line up for the meal, which consists of beef brisket, wild hog, fish, calf fries, vegetables, salads, iced tea and desserts. The families who started the event and neighbors furnish most of the food. The 200 pounds of calf fries come from a cattle company where Chris is employed.

This is not a serous event. People are in a good mood and you hear plenty of giggles about the name. Young kids play in a

pasture on the property and teenagers rope a stationary plastic calf. The cooking and eating take place in Chris's barn. Additional tables and chairs are set up on a concrete slab between the house and barn.

Here are some random comments I got from various folks:

"I was expecting something round and nasty." "I'm a cowboy at heart and have

been eating them for years." "There's nothing better. I could

eat them three times a day." "It's a great event for a good cause. It's God's work."

"Just drag 'em through some catsup and you won't know the difference. You'll think it's fish."

"If you can get past the mental part of what they really are, you can deal with it."

"Some people wouldn't eat them if you paid them, but that's what people come for, the calf fries."

About 400 people attended this year's Testicle Festival and donated \$5,000 to Boys Ranch.



This is in actuality an instance of identity theft of a business, which may likely not be aware that its name and identity are being fraudulently used in a check scam.

• As soon as you call the number provided on your solicitation, you will be instructed to deposit the check into your personal bank account. Here is where the essence of the check scam lays: as real as it may look, the check will not have any funds to back it up. Shortly after taking out what you think are the funds from the check, you will be instructed to wire a certain amount of money, usually via Western Union or MoneyGram, to a previously un-

disclosed third party location. • The money that you will be wiring will be your own, provided that you have enough in your account to cover the amount being sent. If not, within a few days your bank will realize that the check you deposited was a fake one, as a result of which it will bounce and you will be held liable for any insufficient fund fees at the least.



Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 17th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income-such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10% to 50% penalty may be imposed.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value change and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2005. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2006.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2006 renditions is April 17. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.






