Arctic cold 'grips area

A frigid arctic air mass swept across West Texas and the Edwards Plateau region before settling in for a five-day siege. Ice and snow blanketed much of the area, causing numerous traffic accidents before closing Interstate 10 and other major roadways on Tuesday. SCISD closed Wednesday, as did schools across the Concho Valley.

Locally, snow accumulations ranged from four to six inches Wednesday morning making travel slow and hazardous. Elsewhere, numerous traffic accidents forced the closing of Interstate Highway 10 from Ft. Stockton to San Antonio. Hundreds of travelers remained stranded in every town along the Interstate.

Drivers reported slick, icy roads all across Schleicher County Wednesday morning with numerous fender benders and traffic accidents occurring in town and across the county.

Temperatures plunged across Schleicher County on Saturday and remained below freezing all week. Earlier in the week, heavy ice accumulations brought down power lines in the western portion of the county, knocking out electric service to many in the Reynolds

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo noted that City Hall had received reports of flozen water pipes in a number of residences, most of them mobile homes. The city's water system remained up and running, however.

The National Weather Service forecasts a slight warming trend later in the week with another wintery blast to follow on the weekend.

For his part, Sheriff David Doran, urged citizens to stay off the roads if at all possible and to exercise extreme caution if they were forced to drive. "The majority of people around here aren't used to driving on this stuff," Doran said. "Stay home. If you can't stay home, then slow down and be careful"

City Hall, Memorial Building burgarlized over weekend

Armando Moreno, 19, of Eldorado is in Schleicher County jail, charged with two counts of burglary of a building in connection with break-ins at Eldorado City Hall and the Youth Arcade, located in the basement of the Memorial Building.

Chief Deputy George Arispe reports that Moreno, accompanied by two juveniles, broke into the shop building at City Hall, early Sunday morning, where they lifted an IPod music player and a set of headphones belonging to a city employee from a city work truck. The trio also picked up a hammer from the shop and took it with them

as they went next door to City Hall, where they reportedly gained access through the side door to the front office.

Once inside City Hall the trio used the hammer to break into locked desk drawers and storage compartments. They then rifled through the drawers, scattering files and paperwork across the floor. Arispe said the culprits were looking for money but only managed to find approximately \$50 in the city's petty cash fund.

The hammer was also used in an attempt to break the handles and knobs off the city's safe and

locking file cabinets but the burglars were unable to gain entry.

Mayor John Nikolauk reports that the hardest hit areas were his office, City Secretary Carolyn Mayo's office, and the Utility Billing Department in the front office.

Nikolauk found the break-in Sunday afternoon and reported it to authorities. At that time he learned that a city utility employee had previously reported the break-in at the city shop building.

"They really trashed the place," Nikolauk said as he walked through City Hall. "The didn't get much in the way of money, but they did a heck of a lot of damage"

Across the street at the Memorial Building the youth arcade was also burglarized. The thieves made off with a television set and a playstation video game console in addition to approximately \$30 in cash.

Deputy Arispe says that Moreno was quickly identified as a suspect because of close similarities between the two burglaries and last year's school break-in where the emphasis seemed to be more on damaging public property than on making away with stolen loot.

Moreno was arrested and convicted in the school burglary case and was out of jail on 10 years probation when this weekend's break-ins

"The two burglaries were too much alike for it to be a coincidence," Arispe told the Success.

Moreno was brought in for questioning when he reportedly confessed to the crime. Moreno was then arrested. He was arraigned Tuesday morning before Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle who set two surety bonds in the amount of \$3,000 each. Moreno remains in jail at press time.

Arispe reports that this week's burglaries occurred at roughly the same time as a rash of tire slashings, although he believes the two are unrelated. The deputy says he has a suspect in the tire slashings but he is awaiting analysis of a knife he confiscated from the subject to see if it matches the cut tires. He said he expects to wrap up the tire slashing case in the coming days.

The Default Majority

The "do-nothing Congress" is dead. Long live the "do-nothing Congress." Such should be the proclamation with the ascension of Democrats to control of Congress.

The Republican congressional majority foundered on its inability to address important issues during the past two years, so Democrats are set to fill the breach with an energetic burst of pretending to address important issues. This effort is so urgent



that they promised to do it in 100 business hours, trumping Newt Gingrich's first 100 days of legislative action in 1995.

Gingrich mistakenly thought he could

govern the country from the speaker's chair and disastrously overreached as a consequence. Speaker Nancy Pelosi's only early overreaching will be exhausting all of her party's popular, largely symbolic measures in a matter of days. What will Democrats do to fill the countless other hours before their term is done?

Some of the Democrats' internal reforms are worthy, especially curtailing privately funded travel and enhancing the transparency of earmarks. It is telling that the late GOP congressional majority couldn't manage even these relatively tepid reforms, since some members of its leadership would have been practically immobile without a corporate jet.

But all rules have their loopholes, and the ultimate ethics measure is rigorous self-policing. Watch Pelosi ally Rep. John Murtha. If his friends continue to fatten themselves on federal money steered their way by Murtha and return the favor with campaign contributions, nothing will have changed in Congress except the party affiliation of the self-interested barons running the place. Prediction: They will.

The Democratic substance is vanishingly thin. They will raise the minimum wage, but 29 states already have a minimum wage higher than the federal rate. The effect of the hike mainly will be to give a small boost to the wage of teenagers working summers or after school. FDR would yawn.

On prescription drugs, Democrats promised to have the government negotiate for lower drug prices. But the case for major overhaul of the Medicare prescription-drug program has weakened, as the program has proven reasonably popular with seniors and cheaper than expected. Democrats simply might give the Bush administration the authority to negotiate lower prices, which would be meaningless because the administration opposes such negotiations.

An important political consequence of the Democratic takeover is that it liberates Republicans from the compulsion they had felt to abandon their principles in order to try to protect their majority. As Nancy Pelosi took the speaker's gavel, President Bush sounded the sort of clarion calls on fiscal responsibility -- endorsing a balanced budget in five years -- and earmark reform that he never did when free-spending Republicans controlled the Hill. He hopes to box in Democrats with their own anti-deficit rhetoric and force them either to forgo major new spending or embrace politically perilous tax increases.

This is the kind of choice Democrats were able to avoid in November when they became a default majority -- a majority elected not for what it stood for, but for what it was not. Eventually, Democrats will have to move beyond their default position if they want a record of substantive accomplishment after the pageantry and symbolism of the 100 hours have passed.

"To the People of Texas & all Americans in the world— Fellow citizens & compatriots, I am besieged, by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna. I have sustained a continual Bombardment & cannonade for 24 hours & have not lost a man. The enemy has demanded a Surrender at discretion, otherwise, the garrison are to be put to the sword, if the fort is taken. I have answered the demand with a cannon shot, & our flag still waves proudly from the wall. I shall never Surrender or retreat."

Then there were the first words spoken on the Moon.

"Houston...Tranquility Base here. The Eagle has landed."

A few months later during the first leg of the Apollo 13 mission we heard, "Houston, we have a problem.

And who could forget Dan Rather's report from Dallas that President John F. Kennedy had been assassinated.

And, there have been other momentous communiques to and from Texas, but for some reason history seems to have forgotten them. For example, this one from an oil scout sent to West Texas by



Standard Oil.

"Dear Mr. Rockerfeller. I have, at your request, looked into reports that large oil deposits have been found in western Texas. Not only are these reports greatly exaggerated, most of them are outright fabrications. I can drink more oil than this God forsaken place will ever produce. I have, therefore, taken it upon myself to close our office here in the belief that we may better direct our efforts in a more promising location."

Then there was the letter one of Santa Anna's admirals wrote him as his army approached San Jacinto.

"Your Excellency,

Please accept my congratulations on your glorious campaign. The rebels are crushed and Texas is restored to its place in the Re-

I have sent scouting parties ashore to secure a convenient place to bivouac your troops. I pray you will find suitable the area near Rio San Jacinto as a place to

rest your men while we load your horses and equipment for the voyage home."

Or, how about the telegram one

"Met today and auditioned Buddy Holly. STOP. The kid has no discernible talent. STOP. If you're thinking of signing him to a contract...STOP"

Finally, there's the letter sent to a Waco druggist by the powers that be at Coca-Cola. "Dear Mr. Alderton,

Cruising in and around New Zealand

We've been thinking about a trip to Australia and New Zealand for about ten years. We finally got to the stage where we said, "What are we waiting for?" We flew from LA to Sydney. The opera house and harbor bridge are just two reasons why people who spend lots of time on the water call Sydney's harbor the most beautiful in the world.

Challenge to unseat House Speaker Craddick dissipates

AUSTIN — After the 80th regular session of the Texas Legislature convened on Jan. 9, House members spent a few hours debating their way

to a decision on TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION how the vote for speaker would be conducted.

After the body finally decided that the vote would be a recorded vote, not by secret ballot, state Rep.

Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, ended his quest to unseat incumbent Speaker Tom Craddick, R-Midland.

Members voted from their desks, electronically. The tally was 121-27: Craddick was elected to his third consecutive term as speaker. No Republican member voted against him.

Inaugural festivities planned

Jan. 16 is inauguration day for Gov. Rick Perry and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst.

Plans include the swearing-in ceremony on the south steps of the Capitol, a barbecue on the west grounds of the Capitol, a mid-day parade on Congress Avenue, and an evening black-tie ball at the Austin Convention Center.

In other business, the Texas House and Senate conducted a joint session Jan. 11 to canvass votes from the Nov. 7 election.

House and Senate members served as tellers in the canvass and they affirmed Perry was the top vote-getter in the race for governor with 1,716,792 votes. Closest in the vote count was Democrat Chris Bell of Houston, with 1,310,337 votes.

Dewhurst pulled the most votes in the race for lieutenant governor with 2,513,530. His closest rival was Democrat Maria Luisa Alvarado of San Antonio, with 1,617,490 votes.

Guv names emergency items

Gov. Perry on Jan. 12 made public two emergency items for the Legislature to work on this session:

"Legislation authorizing the reduction of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for public school purposes on the residence homesteads of the elderly or disabled to reflect any reduction in the rate of those taxes."

"Legislation providing that state appropriations made for the purpose of directly reducing local property taxes and state appropriations made for the purpose of returning state funds to the public do not count against the constitutional state spending limits and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the grant of public money for the purpose of returning state funds to the public."

Combs issues revenue statement

State Comptroller Susan Combs on Jan. 8 said the Texas Legislature will have \$14.3 billion in new money to spend in the 2008-2009 state budget.

Combs issued the required biennial revenue estimate, reporting to the Legislature and the governor that \$82.5 billion in general revenue is available for appropriation.

Combs said she anticipates \$77.5 billion in general revenue income during the next biennium, plus a \$7 billion ending balance for the current biennium.
