Judge rules Jeffs' traffic stop was legal

Authorities may retain seized evidence

Utah district judge James Shumate ruled Friday that the traffic stop that led to the arrest of fugitive FLDS prophet Warren was legal. The decision allows prosecutors to use evidence seized during the stop in Jeffs pending criminal trial.

Jeffs, who leads the 10,000 member Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, stands accused of being an accomplice to rape. He allegedly arranged a marriage between a 14-year-old girl and her 19-year-old cousin then presided over the couple's wedding ceremony. The girl has testified that she told Jeffs several times that she did not want to be married and later asked him to let her out of the marriage.

Jeffs was on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted List when he was arrested last August after Nevada Highway Patrol Trooper Eddie Dutchover pulled over the 2007 Cadillac Escalade in which he was riding some 15 miles outside of Las Vegas on Interstate Highway 15.

Dutchover testified at a hearing two weeks ago that he stopped the red Cadillac because of an obscured license plate. It seems the temporary tag was partially blocked by the car's license plate holder.

Judge Shumate noted in his ruling that the obscured tag was difficult to read, especially at highway speed and in the dark. That fact alone was sufficient reason for the officer to stop the vehicle.

Shumate also rejected arguments made by Jeffs' lawyers that the Nevada law requiring license plates be clearly visible only applies to plates issued in Nevada.

The judge went on to explain that Trooper Dutchover acted properly when he sought to confirm the identity of driver Isaac Jeffs as well as passenger Warren Jeffs.

While Isaac Jeffs provided the trooper with a Colorado driver's license, Warren Jeffs at first declined to identify himself. That alone, the judge said, was enough reason for Dutchover to arrest him.

Jeffs' lawyers had also challenged the traffic stop because they said it took too long. Nevada law allows peace officers to detain subjects for one hour before they must be arrested or set free.

The computer system used by Nevada

troopers to verify vehicle registration and driver's license information was down at the time of the traffic stop. However, the judge said Dutchover was still able to determine that Jeffs was a wanted man in less than 60-minutes.

Dutchover had testified that he stopped the 2007 Escalade at 9:04 p.m. on August 28, 2006. He said he grew suspicious when Isaac Jeffs and Warren Jeffs offered conflicting stories. Both men were visibly nervous, he added.

The trooper went on to explain that he noticed a GPS unit and a radar detector in the Cadillac, prompting him to suspect that the vehicle might be used for drug trafficking or money laundering.

The judge noted in his ruling that Trooper Dutchover then asked for and received written permission to search the Escalade. That's when officers located a large sum of cash, a number of cell phones, wigs and envelopes addressed to "WSJ" or "the President."

Although Dutchover did not know who Warren Jeffs was, one of the troopers assisting with the search was able to make the connection and became suspicious that the evasive passenger might be Warren Jeffs, the fugitive leader of a Utah polygamous sect.

By 9:52 p.m., Dutchover had contacted his sergeant. The FBI had also been notified and agents were en route to the scene of the traffic stop.

Warren Jeffs finally admitted his identity to FBI agents and was taken into custody. He was then transported to Las Vegas where he was questioned before being placed in jail.

The FLDS prophet was later transferred to the Purgatory Correctional Facility in Hurricane, Utah, where he remains in custody awaiting trial.

Jeffs' lawyers lose another round

Judge Shumate handed Warren Jeffs' lawyers another defeat last week when he ruled that a pair of lawyers representing the news media would be allowed to look over motions offered by Jeffs' legal team to seal certain filings.

A hearing is slated for July 17 to determine what evidence, if any, should be kept from the public. Jeffs' attorneys sought the closure hearing in order to argue that some evidence should be sealed

The Inevitability of the Car

Americans have arrived at an answer to high gas prices and concerns about global warming -- buy more cars. According to a report in The New York Times, households with a small, gas-efficient car own, on average, almost three cars.

They are just adding the small car to their driveway fleet. The Times reports that last year more than 500,000 small models -- the Toyota Prius and Corolla and the Honda Civic -- were purchased as a second or third car. Which couldn't have been what small-car evangelists had in mind when urging people into more efficient vehicles. Ever since Henry Ford alighted on his vision of mass-produced cars affordable to the average consumer, there is no question to which Americans haven't found the answer to be more cars and more driving.

By 1930, three of four American households already owned a car. Today, more than 90 percent of even urban households have cars, as do 80 percent of poor households. So any plan to save the planet or anything else by getting Americans to drive less is a fantasy.

The White House and top Democrats are proposing to increase mandatory fuel-economy standards for cars as a way to lessen our dependence on foreign oil and reduce greenhouse emissions. By increasing the efficiency of cars, however, they only will encourage more driving. In the Cato Institute publication Regulation, Andrew Kleit writes, "The latest estimates are that for every 10 percent increase in fuel efficiency, people increase their driving by 2 percent."

Europeans enjoy top-notch transit and endure five-dollar-per-gallon gasoline, and yet they don't drive that much less than we do," Ted Balaker and Sam Staley write in their book "The Road More Traveled." "In America, automobiles account for about 88 percent of travel, and in Europe the figure is about 78 percent. And the Europeans are gaining on us. In Europe, per capita driving has been increasing more than twice as fast as in the States."

Mass transit is the supposed alternative to driving, but outside of the imaginations of urban planners and environmentalists (and a few large cities), it's not practical. The number of workers increased by 63 million from 1960 to 2000, according to Balaker and Staley, but 2 million fewer people took transit to get to their job. Less than 5 percent of Americans use transit to get to work, and most who do simply don't own cars.

Do all the new cars clog the roads? Sure, if no new roads are built. The amount of driving has doubled in the past few decades, but roads have hardly been expanded, and so congestion has increased 200 percent since the early 1980s. But urban areas with more roads don't have a congestion problem. "Of the 10 largest urban areas," Balaker and Staley write, "Los Angeles has the least amount of pavement per person. Dallas has twice as much pavement per person, and congestion is only half as bad as it is in L.A."

The automobile is an inevitability of modern American life. For good reason, the average American loves his cars -- each and every one of them.

Flooding creates disaster situation in 37 Texas counties

AUSTIN — Phenomenal rainfall and flooding left much of the state hurting, troubled or vulnerable in the second half of the month of June.

At least 11 deaths have been attributed to the foul weather. Military units activated by order of Gov. Rick Perry, the Texas Department of Public Safety, game wardens and other state resources responded.

Perry sent a disaster declaration that includes 37 counties to President George W. Bush, seeking federal assistance. The White House announced it was making federal funding available to help with the disaster areas.

Attorney General Greg Abbott warned residents in stricken areas to beware of scammers and price gougers, who seem to come out of the woodwork when disasters strike.



More rain is in the forecast. Some longtime weather watchers have called the unusually wet spring and early summer a signal that a 50-year drought cycle has ended. Others say it's a symptom of global warming. Others say it's El Niño. Still others say it's just a wet spell that was bound to come.

NT toll project moves forward

The Trans Texas Corridor project is on hold for the next two years.

Lawmakers wanted to use that block of time to study the possible effects of building the proposed massive network of toll roads stretching from the Mexico border to the Oklahoma border.

But legislation signed in June by Gov. Rick Perry allows certain regional toll projects to move forward.

Perry put his signature on the agreement, even though he appeared to have the whole Trans Texas Corridor project ready to go with Cintra of Madrid, Spain, and project partner Zachry Construction Corporation of San Antonio.

Now, one of those regional toll project proposals moved forward on June 28.

The Texas Transportation Commission voted 4-1 to tentatively approve a plan for the North Texas Tollroad Authority to accelerate the building of Texas 121 through Denton and Collin counties and do 30 other North Texas traffic congestion-relieving projects.

For things to really get going, the Texas Department of Transportation has to make sure certain things are in place.

Before making a final decision, the agency must be satisfied with the regional authority's preliminary studies, project timing, funding and payment schedules. Next, the Texas Transportation Commission — TxDOT's governing body — would have to ratify the decision.

Court rules in favor of DeLay

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals decided 5-4 to uphold a Travis County state district court ruling stripping off a charge of conspiracy stemming from the 2002 state election against former U.S. House majority leader Tom DeLay.

The charge is one of several brought in 2005 by Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, who serves as the state's chief ethics prosecutor. Earle said he plans to appeal the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals' decision.

DeLay, is still in hot water, facing charges of money laundering and conspiracy to launder money. He said he is appealing those charges, too.

Taking Pictures and Pitching Washers

I interviewed David Redwine about his wildlife photography 15 years ago. He did exceptional work back then and has kept improving. His pictures are in national publications.

When I heard about some big colorful birds that had taken up residence in Andrews, I called David. He lives in Andrews. He knew all about those birds.

"We have about two hundred of them now," says David. "They showed up in 2004 and we really don't know how they got here. Maybe somebody had them and they were released or somehow escaped their cage. They're Monk Parakeets with yellow, green and blue feathers and have orange beaks."

The birds are native to Argentina and Brazil, and are sometimes called Quaker Parrots. They're one of the top 10 talking bird species. David says they shriek and holler and most people think their call is monotonous and irritating. He found their communal nest in the top of a yucca plant. It's well insulated so the birds can live in Andrews year round. They'll eat anything, including cat and dog

food.

He has turned 250 acres of family land south of Colorado City into a combination wildlife sanctuary and resort. David has set up blinds to photograph deer, coyotes, bobcat, and all types of birds. He has even taken some pictures of rattlesnakes. When David was studying parasites in graduate school at SMU, he cut open a rattler from the Black Gap wildlife preserve near the Big Bend and discovered a new type of tapeworm. It is named after him. He says that's his claim to fame.

David and his wife Patricia have built an 18-basket disc golf course. They did the work themselves. When they finished the 18th basket on July 4th a couple of years ago, they painted the pole red white and blue. David gave us a ride over the course in one of his all-terrain vehicles. Beautiful place.

David is a pretty good disc golfer. Some of the baskets are 200 yards away from the throwing point and he can usually get to the basket in 2 throws. He is also good at washer pitching. On his property he has created a couple of washer pitching courses. He invited Susan and me to one of his parties recently. When we arrived, we had already been slated for a washer-pitching tournament. The grid was set up so the loser advanced to the next level of competition. The winner got to go play disc golf or do whatever he or she wanted to do. Some chose to play pool in David's fancy recreation room.

Up to that point my washer pitching experience was practically non-existent. I had thrown some casually but never in competition. This was serious stuff. A couple of men in the group had worked in the oil patch and thrown lots of washers. After the first game, I did advance, which meant I lost. I didn't get much better the second game, but somehow managed to win. During the second flight of the tournament, I put a washer in the hole my very first throw. It felt so good!

Touch of History

C.C. Doty, an early-day visionary

Once in a while some one comes along who is destined to make history. Christopher Columbus Doty was one of these rare individuals. Even though Doty had very little education, he was a person willing to take a risk to make changes for the better.

Doty came to Schleicher County in 1880, when this area was still part of Crockett County. He brought sheep to the region despite the disapproval of cattle ranchers.

In 1882 Doty had 4,000 sheep that were in need of water to survive. It had been a very dry year for Schleicher Co, and all the standing water in draws had dried up. Doty had to make a choice of moving the herd or trying to drill for water. He talked to a lot of people who thought he would be crazy to drill for water in this dry country. He asked the opinion of C.D. Foote from Ben Ficklin, who

was in the business of drilling. He said he would try to reach water, but thought Doty was wasting his money to drill in this rocky desert. Foote quoted a price for the job that Doty thought it was too high. It was more than the cost of a new drill.

Doty ordered his own drill from Fort Scott, AR, and picked it up in Abilene. After drilling fifty-two feet he struck water, lots of water. He was able to water his herd with plenty to spare. Thus, the first water well was drilled, and the first windmill was erected in Schleicher County. The well is still in use today.

Doty was also the first elected tax assessor for the county. He served this position eight years during the exciting land rush days.

C.C. married Alice Pancost of Concho County on June 3, 1889. The couple had one daughter named Annie Marie, but Doty always called her Bill Ann.

A historical marker was erected about eleven miles north on U.S. Highway 277, near the site of the first windmill, to honor C.C. Doty, and all of his accomplishments.

Doty died Oct. 26, 1944, but he left his mark on the history of Schleicher County.

Attorney Jeff Hunt urged Judge Shumate to permit the sealed review so that arguments for and against closure would not be made "in the dark." State prosecutors agreed with the media lawyer's request, but Jeffs' attorneys objected.

Shumate agreed to the request, but ordered that the media lawyers may not share details of the filings with their clients ahead of the July 17th hearing.

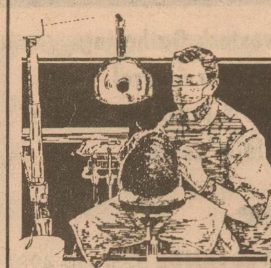

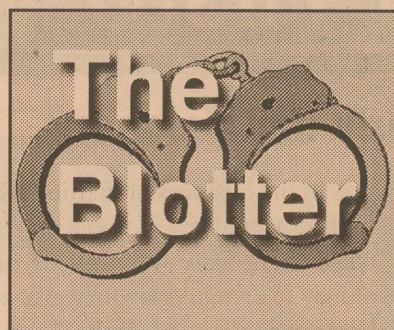
Salvation Army enters new and intensifying flood zones

Wichita Falls, TX- Four Salvation Army Canteens entered Wichita Falls today, Monday July 2nd along with a mobile command center in response to the excessive flooding there. Cleanup kits are en-route to this recently flooded location, and a distribution center

is being established at the local Salvation Army Corps in Wichita Falls. According to Captain Shafer of Wichita Falls, 600 homes are submerged in water and water is not expected to recede until Friday. The Salvation Army Canteens reporting are from Longview, Pampa, Lubbock and Wichita Falls, TX. Gainesville and Sherman, TX- Salvation Army flood recovery efforts in Gainesville and Sherman continue this week. Additional services are being provided to disaster victims combining with those being offered from the onset of the flooding. Along with meals and cleanup kits, assistance is being offered through distribution of furniture, clothing, household items, rental assistance and several other services. Salvation Army officers, disaster personnel and volunteers are out in full force in Texas responding to damages caused by the extensive flooding. Major James Taylor commented that if the heavy rains continue through the week, they have the potential to cause the most significant flooding event in more than 60 years in the state of Texas. Salvation Army Corps from the Oklahoma border to Mexico east of Abilene have also been placed on alert should an emergency response be necessary.
