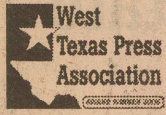

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Hernandez dies in rollover Star athlete memorialized in Eagle Gym

David Hernandez, 19, of Eldorado, died of injuries sustained in a one-vehicle rollover Sunday morning, February 11, 2007. The accident occurred six miles south of Eldorado shortly after 6 a.m. as a group of Eldorado teens were headed home from a trip to Mexico.

The driver, Frank Wipff, 19, reportedly fell asleep as he drove northbound on U.S. 277. The 1996 Ford Explorer belonging to Manuel Hernandez, drifted off the right side of the roadway then overturned and rolled multiple times before coming to rest on its side.

Rescuers were hampered by the fact that the vehicle was tangled in a fence and a mass of mesquite tree limbs.

Wipff, was reportedly the only one wearing a seat belt. He escaped relatively uninjured, according to investigators at the scene. Myra Robles, 19, Melinda Hernandez, 19, and Karina Sanchez, 18, were all taken to Schleicher County Medical Center for treatment. Ms. Robles remains hospitalized at press time.

David Hernandez was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle at 7:20 a.m. The body was taken by EMS ambulance to Kerbow funeral home. Hernandez reportedly suffered a broken neck.

The accident was investigated by DPS Trooper Rito Renteria. He was assisted by Sgt. Ruben Galindo and Trooper Norbert Ortiz. Schleicher County Chief Deputy George Arispe was one of the first to respond. He assisted with rescue efforts and secured the accident scene until the DPS troopers arrived.

An oilfield gang truck belonging to John E. Meador Construction was used to help secure the overturned Explorer. The roustabout gang was headed toward Sonora when the men happened upon the accident.

Also assisting at the scene was an ambulance crew from Sonora. The ambulance had transferred a patient to San Angelo and was en route back to

Sonora when it also happened upon the scene.

Trooper Renteria reports that the teens had left San Angelo at about 7 p.m. the previous night and drove to Mexico. They reportedly left Mexico at 4 a.m. en route back to Eldorado. Myra Robles drove the Explorer until she became sleepy and stopped in Sonora where Frank Wipff took over driving duties.

Trooper Renteria told The Success that David Hernandez was riding in front passenger seat at the time of the accident. The three women were all riding in the vehicle's back seat.

Renteria went on to say that he suspects alcohol may have been involved in the accident and says that his investigation is ongoing.

Hernandez was a popular senior at Eldorado High School where he was active in sports, including football and baseball. Local students were stunned by the news of his death and soon plans were being made to hold the funeral service in Eagle Gymnasium.

The services, held Wednesday afternoon, were the first-ever funeral services held in the Eldorado High School Gym.

David Hernandez was the son of Manuel and Maria Hernandez of Eldorado. His older brothers, Manuel, Jr., and Homero were also gifted athletes at Eldorado high school. It was in their shoes that David Hernandez was following. He was slated to begin his senior baseball season next week.

He is also survived by one sister, Melinda Hernandez, who was a passenger in the Ford Explorer when it overturned.

Grandparents are Andres and Tomas Hernandez and Lucio and Nataia Hernandez, all of Mexico.

Friends and family members erected an impromptu memorial at the crash site where Hernandez died. The memorial consisted of two wooden beams fashioned in the shape of a cross and was covered in written messages and personal mementos.

Store owner threatens lawsuit against county Claims Sheriff's patrol intimidates his customers

Philip Meyer told Schleicher County Commissioners Monday that patrons of his Red Front Convenience Store are intimidated by the sight of Sheriff's patrol cars. He said a deputy often parks across U.S. Highway 190 from his store. During those times, Meyer says, his business falls off sharply, hurting his beer sales.

Meyer said after he contacted Sheriff Doran to complain the deputy began parking farther down the road, but still within sight of his customers. Meyer told the commissioners if the deputy doesn't stop parking in sight of his store he will file a lawsuit against the county.

At that point, Judge Johnny Griffin commented that the Sheriff's Department is well within its rights and added that the commissioners don't dictate to Sheriff Doran how he should do his job.

When Meyer pointed out that a convenience store in Snyder had sued Scurry County because of law enforcement harassment, Judge Griffin stated that since he had mentioned a lawsuit neither he nor the commissioners could discuss the matter further. With that, Griffin turned to Sheriff Doran who said he had already contacted legal counsel and was advised not to discuss a potential lawsuit with the commissioners except in executive session with an attorney present.

Griffin then thanked Meyer for his time and moved on to other business.

The Success contacted Meyer following the meeting and he

reiterated that the Sheriff's Department is costing him money. Meyer explained that he video tapes activity outside his store. When one of his clerks mentioned that a deputy was regularly parking across the street, he said he looked at the tapes and confirmed that the presence of the deputy coincided with declining sales.

For his part, Sheriff Doran refused to comment on Meyer's specific allegation but did tell the Success that his officers routinely run radar on traffic that enters and leaves Eldorado on all five highways. "We're

going to keep doing our job," Doran said.

Doran went on to say that Meyer has made several complaints against him and his department to the FBI, even going so far as to contact newspaper and TV reporters in San Angelo and Dallas with allegations ranging from voter intimidation to accepting bribes from the YFZ Ranch.

"This is just another episode," Doran said. "You'd think I'd be used to it by now."

The county commissioners had more on their plate Monday

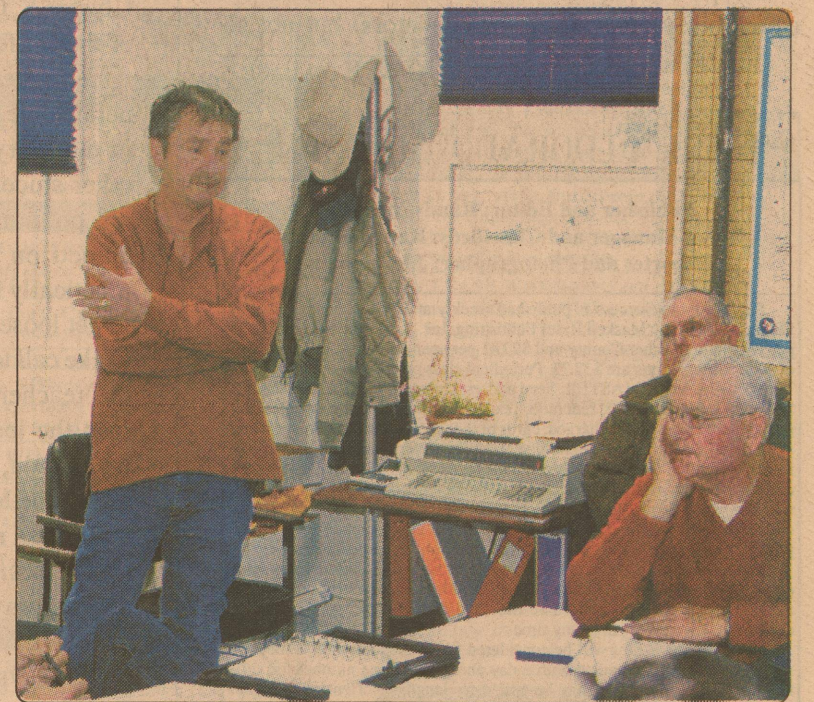

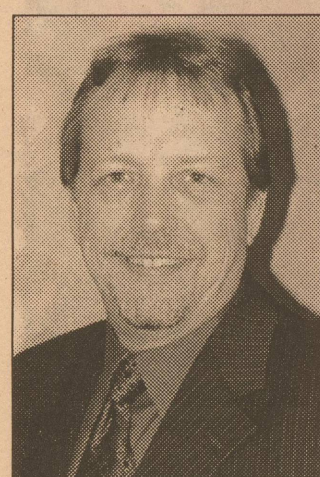

Record votes a clear path to good state government

If it's good enough for Craddick, it's good enough for the rest of us

Folks in the Austin press corps got a big chuckle in January when Tom Craddick pushed his fellows to record how they would vote in his effort to be re-elected Speaker of the Texas House.

You see, Craddick has been a staunch, behind-the-scenes opponent of record votes in the Texas House but, when his political power was threatened, he jumped on the bandwagon — temporarily, at least — because it gave him a way to intimidate recalcitrant legislators.

The rhetoric and debate leading up to that vote was a bit dizzying. Suddenly, some of the same people who de-railed last session's record vote legislation were heard arguing forcefully in favor of record votes!

It's too bad those arguments were disingenuous. Neither Craddick nor any other House leader has any intention of actually putting into law a measure that would require all substantive votes taken in the Texas House of Representatives be on the record. In their opinion, the concept is too much trouble, good only as a tool of intimidation not as a method to ensure transparency.

Here's the issue: There is nothing in the law that requires Texas legislators to state, on the record, how they voted on important legislation. And, unless the issue is forced, legislators won't go on the record with their votes.

In just one example from the 2005 session, representatives voted to exempt themselves from a bill requiring candidates to file campaign contributions and expenditures electronically — but not their future challengers. But, you can't tell who voted how because the vote wasn't recorded.

Now, before you say that all you expect of a Texas Legislator is that he votes his conscience, know that whether or not a vote is on the record has a profound impact on the outcome. A motion to table that bill — essentially killing it — appeared headed to easy passage until a record vote was requested. Suddenly, the vote flipped, and the motion to table failed.

In other words, Texas legislators often have one set of ethics when the vote is on the record and another when it's not.

Sadly, many legislators believe this issue is important only to the media. The disdainful comments legislators made during committee hearings make that clear, and the same comments make it clear many legislators don't take this very seriously.

It's true, the media — specifically newspapers — have pushed very hard over the last two or three sessions for this kind of legislation, not because it makes our jobs easier — though, in some ways, it does. Newspapers are in favor of this legislation because it makes it easier for citizens of Texas to hold lawmakers accountable.

Ironically, legislators are all in favor of accountability (especially for educators) but not so

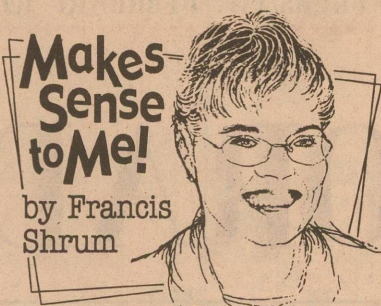

Perry cites growing economy in State of State address

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry on Feb. 6 delivered the State of the State address to the state Legislature, exclaiming "Texas is perched at the forefront of a new era of prosperity."

Perry said the economy is growing, tax collections are on the rise, frivolous lawsuits are down and so are the costs of insurance for homeowners and doctors. He also said teacher pay and student achievement have improved.

The pluses aside, Perry said nearly 4 million Texans are living in poverty, so during the next four years his goal will be to spread opportunity to more Texans "who are willing to take personal responsibility for their lives."

Perry indicated, nevertheless, that poverty is not necessarily tied to a lack of personal responsibility, saying the rising cost of health care is be "one of the greatest obstacles to personal prosperity."

"Of the 5 and one-half million uninsured Texans, 2 million are adults with incomes below 200 percent of the federal poverty level," Perry said. "Most are working Texans whose jobs offer health-care benefits they can't afford, or no benefits at all."

So, Perry announced the launch of "Healthier Texas," his program to redirect unspent federal health-care dollars to a pool that would serve Texans 200 percent below the federal poverty level.

Perry touched on other subjects, such as a Human papillomavirus vaccination program for girls entering sixth grade, his proposal to sell the state Lottery, and his plans build coal-fueled power plants and a statewide matrix of toll roads.

Perry also talked about border security, literacy, prisons, and a get-tough stance with the bureaucrats in Washington, D.C.

State of State: response aired

Austin News Channel 8 broadcasted via cable and Internet a Democratic response to the governor's State of the State address.

The response, by state Rep. Garnet Coleman of Houston, took Perry to task for not doing more to fund public education, the big increases in college tuition, and "teaching to the test" in the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills.

Coleman also pointed out that under Perry 200,000 Texas children lost coverage under the Children's Health Insurance Program, leading to \$893 million in cuts in federal matching funding.

He also criticized Perry's fast-tracking of coal-fired power plants instead of moving state policy further toward clean wind and solar power options.

And, Coleman called the governor's "Trans Texas Corridor" proposed highway project "unwanted, unwarranted and fiscally irresponsible."

Some don't swallow HPV program

Dozens of members of the Texas Legislature have come out in opposition to the governor's Feb. 2 executive order requiring Human papillomavirus vaccinations for girls entering sixth grade.

Chief among the opposers was Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, who chairs the Senate Health & Human Services Committee. Nelson, said she would seek an attorney general opinion

Hundreds protest coal plants

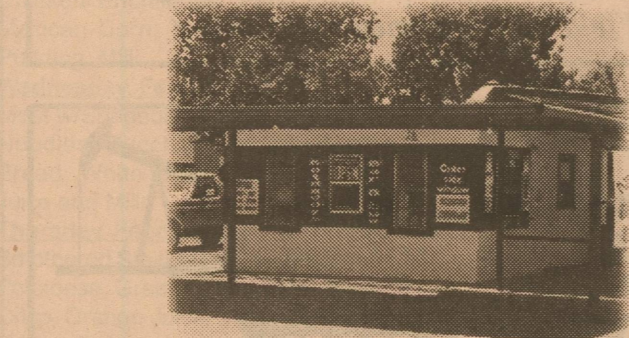
A crowd reportedly in the hundreds gathered at the Capitol Feb. 11 to protest the proposed construction of more than two dozen coal-fired power plants around the state.

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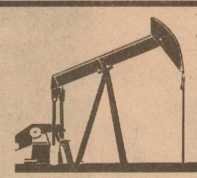
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3.4 pounds meth seized on US 277

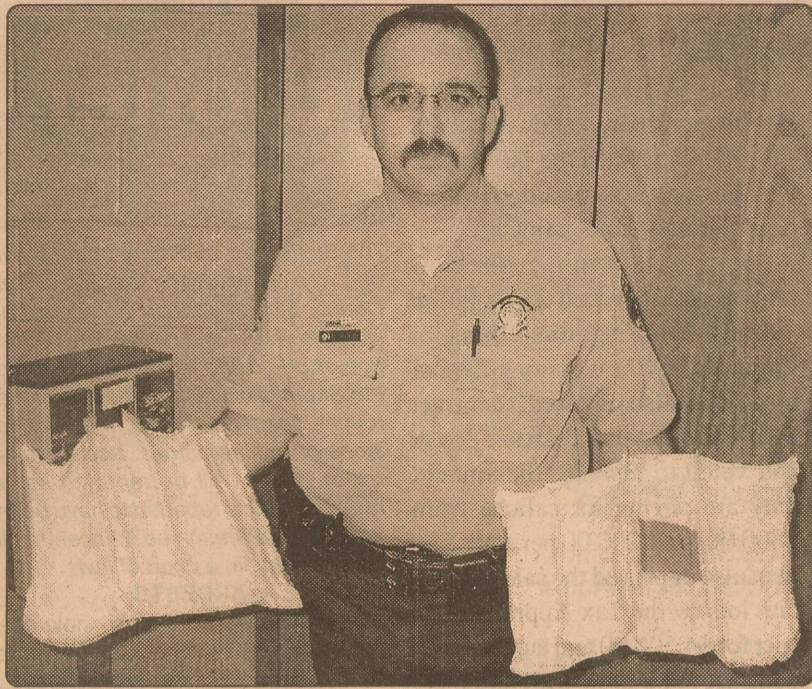
\$250K estimated street value

Javier Reyna Marquez, 38, of Piedras Negras, Coahuilla, Mexico was arrested Saturday, February 10, 2007 and two large packages of illegal methamphetamine were seized during a routine traffic stop on U.S. 277 some 9 miles north of Eldorado.

Schleicher County Deputy Jason Chatham became suspicious after pulling Marquez over. Chatham reports that the asked for and received permission to search Marquez's 1994 Toyota.

Before searching the car, however, the deputy patted down Marquez as a matter of safety. That's when he detected the bundles of methamphetamine taped to Marquez's legs.

The dope weighed in at 1,540.38 grams, or just under 3.5 pounds. The drug has an estimated street value of \$250,000.00.

Marquez was booked into Schleicher County Jail with charges intent to deliver of a controlled substance. He remains in jail in lieu of a \$200,000 surety bond. Officer Chatham was assisted on the stop and arrest by Game Warden Marco Alvizo.

City council meets, okays sale of lots

Manuel and Judith Samaniego were present for Monday night's city council meeting to explain their need to purchase 3 lots adjacent to their home that are presently controlled on behalf of several local taxing jurisdictions by the Tax Appraisal District.

The lots were seized by the district in 1995 for back taxes and have been held off the tax roles ever since.

The Samaniegos explained that their home sits on part of one of the vacant lots in question. They noted that over the years they have helped mow and keep the lots clean.

Under tax district rules the lots that have been seized and then offered for sale at auction may be sold by the district for the appraised value, or for the amount of back taxes. It was noted that the lots failed to sell at auction more than ten years ago and the Samaniegos now want to buy them for the appraised value of \$4,500.00 as recommended by Chief Appraiser Scott Sutton.

Following a brief discussion, the council approved the sale.

Council members present were Bill McCutcheon, Stan Meador, Dora Bosmans, Mayor John Nikolauk, Dr. Pat Johnson, Richard Mendez and Dorothy Dacy.

In other business, the council learned that Sulas Politte, youth minister at First Baptist Church, wants them to consider the possibility of a teen curfew. The item was tabled will be taken up at a future meeting.

Mayor Nikolauk then reported he had no news on the arrival of the new trash truck.

Next, Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay explained there had been two water leaks, which included a major repair of a 4 way-T near Divide Street. Fay also told the council he that gas department technician Ricky Huichapa has left the city's employment to take an oilfield job.

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo then presented the city's financial statements and tax reports. She also updated the council on repair costs at City Hall due to the recent vandalism and break in.

Mayo next informed the council she has been unsuccessful in finding anyone to bid on the paving projects. Money for the projects was borrowed recently when the city issued certificates of obligation. Ms. Mayo asked for help from the council in finding a paving contractor willing to work on small projects.

Ms. Mayo then reported that the city's bond company will reimburse the city \$4,908.60 for money allegedly stolen by a former employee.

Mary Lou Covarrubiaz is cur-

rently charged in the theft. She is expected to appear District Judge Barbara Walther's San Angelo courtroom this week.

Attorney Clint Griffin recommended the city accept the funds from the bonding company and sign a release and the council voted unanimously to follow his recommendation.

The council voted to renew the TASB Pool bid on electricity for

the city for the upcoming year. TASB will not revealed the kwh rates till next month.

The meeting ended with Carolyn Mayo updating the council on procedures filing for office in the upcoming May elections.

In a related matter, the council voted to approve a submission to the Department Of Justice to combine voting places for the 2007 election.

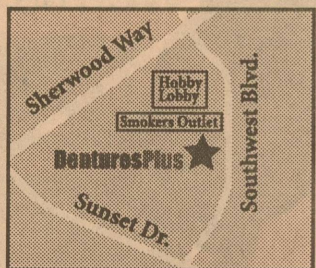

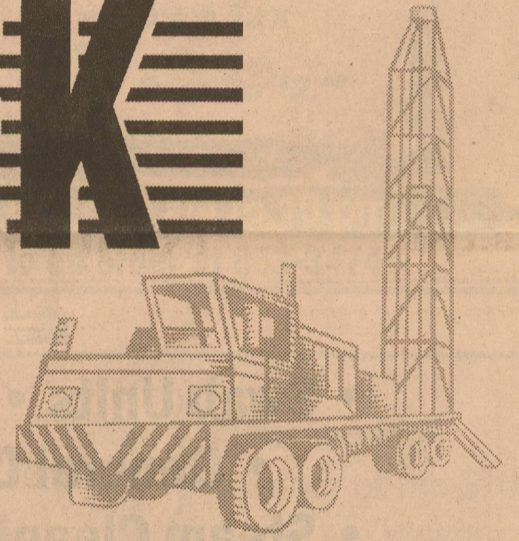
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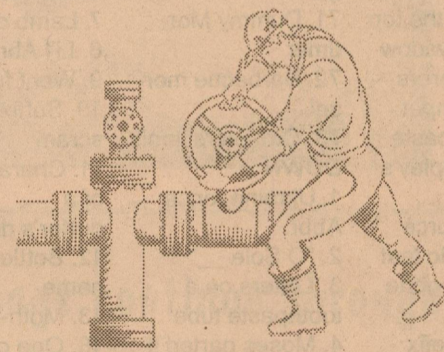
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County pays to pave cart paths at golf course

than store owner complaints. They also heard from representatives of the Eldorado Golf Club concerning the need to pave cart paths.

Phil McCormick and Nancy Lester explained that the club presently has \$18,000.00 in its checking account and that dues were recently raised in hopes of bolstering the club's treasury. Still, there isn't enough money to for the club to pay to pave 9,000 ft. of cart paths.

McCormick noted that a company from Spring Branch is currently working in the area. The company, he said, has the necessary equipment to pave narrow cart paths with 2-3 inches of cold mix

asphalt, but the job will cost some \$28,000.00.

After discussing the matter the commissioners voted unanimously to contribute \$28,000.00 toward the project, provided the golf club maintain the paths in the future. The company will also provide bids to the county to pave the main road at the cemetery, as well as the area around the chapel.

In other business the commissioners authorized the expenditure of \$3,000.00 to help pay for a cement pad and metal building to house the county's new communications equipment. The remainder of the \$12,000.00 purchase price will come from the Sheriff's Department seizure fund, the Fire

Department and the Volunteer EMS.

Fire Chief Jerry Jones then updated the court on the recent donations of three satellite phones (one stationery, two bag phones) donated to the county by the Concho Valley Council of Governments. Jones stated the phones did not cost the county, but the service will cost the county \$1,628.25 per year with 600 minutes per phone. The court approved purchasing the service from Global Star.

Jones then asked the commissioners to consider buying another truck chassis to replace a worn out "GI" truck the department had gotten years ago from the Texas Forest Service. Jones said the cost of a

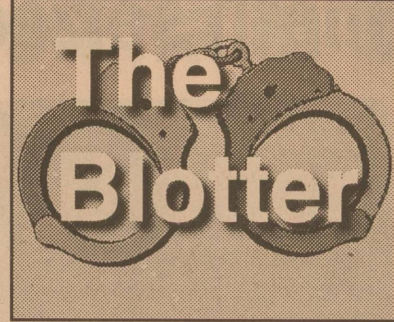
new grass fire truck could be as much as \$47,000.00. He said the Fire Department could contribute \$10,000.00 toward the purchase.

The men discussed the idea briefly but took no action.

Before adjourning, the commissioners approved a resolution naming First National Bank of Eldorado as the county's depository. They also renewed a contract with WTU Retail for electric power and voted to increase the amount they are paying for caliche from \$800.00 to \$1,200.00 per acre. The men also approved the sale of three city lots by the Tax Appraisal District for \$4,500.00 and authorized a contract to be used with any local jurisdiction wanting the county to hold its elections.

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Legislators should account for their votes

much where it comes to their own actions.

As it did in 2005, the Texas Senate will likely approve some type of legislation mandating record votes. But, unless they can pass the House State Affairs Committee in the next week or two, none of the several bills filed will make it to the House floor for debate and that means the fate of this legislation rests in the hands of nine state representatives (see sidebar).

Texas is one of only 10 states that does not have some sort of requirement that votes on major legislation be on the record, and it's easier to find out how your U.S. Congressman or city council member voted than your state representative or senator.

Good government advocates all across the state — including the League of Women Voters and nearly every citizen advocacy group you might name — have called for this kind of legislation in Texas.

Indeed, in the run-up to the Speaker's vote, 80 Texas legislators voted in favor of record votes, at least on the Speaker's race. That some of the same people who've quashed previous attempts to mandate record votes are among these 80 legislators merely adds to the irony.

Texas legislators must end the hypocrisy of using voice votes to avoid accountability. If it's important that folks back home

know how legislators voted in the Speaker's race, it's important for them to know how they voted on other important issues.
