Holm's conviction also triggered another series of events... events that led to the prosecution of several members of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Eventually, the expanding legal problems drew in the church's leader, Warren Jeffs, forcing him to go into hiding. Jeffs was reached a deal with Holm after it was learned that his accuser and former "child bride" Ruth Stubbs had taken part in ascheme to extract money from the leadership of the FLDS church in return for her not testifying against Holm.
Stubbs was reportedly going to share the proceeds with her brother. A letter connecting her to the plot was intercepted and is believed to have been destroyed by her brother, but only after Stubbs apparently won't face prosecution on a blackmail harge because the member of the FLDS church leadership who received the letter did not cooperate with federal authorities prior to the letter being destroyed.
It is unknown if Stubbs was scheduled to testify against arren Jeffs in his upcoming trial.
Jury selection in Jeffs' trial is slated to get underway on Monday, September 10, 2007.

## No Bull! Courthouse lawn off limits to all but non-profit use

Schleicher County Commissioners met Monday, August 27 and voted 2-1 to restrict the use of the Courthouse Lawn to non-profit organizations, only. Commissioners Matt Brown and Kirk Griffin voted in favor of the measure while Commissioner Lynn Meador voted in opposition while saying that he thought the matter should be explored further. Commissioner Johnny Mayo was absent.

Judge Johnny Griffin explained that the issue came up when members of the local Masonic Lodge took offense to booth fees charged by Jim Runge at

## Eldorado gets its first

 commercial radio station
## KLDE-FM due on the air next week

Eldorado's first and only radio sta-
tion goes on the air in early September. KLDE will be broadcasting at 104.9 on the FM dial according to station spokesman Randy Mankin.
While the station's programming format remains a closely-guarded secret, it was announced last week that KLDE will be broadcasting Eldorado Eagles football games live beginning with the Eldorado-Mason game on Friday, September 7th.
KLDE will also broadcast the Eagles road games enabling local fans to keep up with all the action even when they can't make it to the out-of-town games. "We're encouraging Eldorado fans to continue coming out to support the Eagles," Mankin stated. "But, bring a portable radio with you to the games and tune in to hear the games broadcast

Mason Vaughan will be the voice of the Eagles this year as he calls the play-by-play. Several "color commentators" have been lined up to provide on-air details of the action.
Eagles hope to be able to broadcast Eagles basketball as the teams move into their district seasons," Mankin added. As for the station's broadcast format, Mankin would only say. "Tune in and hear for yourself. I think you'll like it." KLDE will be broadcasting with twice the power as Eldorado's nearest FM radio station which will give the station excellent coverage throughout the Edward's Plateau and beyond. Promotional literature issued by the station indicates KLDE's FM signal is expected to reach Sonora, Ozona, Barnhart, Mertzon, Christoval and San Angelo.

Texans planning to celebrate the last three-day weekend of the summer should know that the Texas Highway Patrol will be out in force looking for people who are driving while intoxicated. During the Labor Day weekend (Aug. 31 to Sept. 3), all available state troopers will be out on Texas roadways in support of the "Drink. Drive. Go to in support of the

## The Revenge of the Tribes

In September 1898, an outnumbered British- led army battled the forces of a Muslim fanatic in Omdurman, Sudan. The Brits unleashed machine gun fire and artillery on the primitive warriors and suffered a loss of 48 dead and 434 wounded, while killing 9,700 , wounding 13,000 and capturing 5,000 of the enemy. Winston Churchill, who was present, called it "the most signal triumph ever gained by the arms of science over barbarians." The British ruled

decades. In October 1993, badly outnumbered American troops battled the forces of a Somali clan leader in Mogadishu. We un fre and helicopter gunships on the primitive warriors and suffered 18 fatalities and 73 wounded to as many 5,500 Somali killed and wounded. It was a fight nearly as lopsided as the Battle of Omdurman, but the U.S. was out of Somalia within a year
Since the 1990s, we have witnessed the revenge of the tribes. For hundreds of years, the result --w with some spectacular exceptions -- of a clash between modern and primitive armies was a bloodbath and Now, tribes, clans and primitives of all sorts represent one of the most intractable problems in the war on terror.
In western Pakistan, Gaza, Southern and eastern Afghanistan, Somalia and western Iraq, thas been ungoverned spaces that have created he environment in which terrorists can thrive. Ou problem in the war on terror is less the absence Tribes are inherently difficult to of stroeng secates hey, as James Kurth writes in The American Iney, as James Kuct "do not see themselves as citizens who enjoy equal rights within one homogeneous na ion", but as "at most a collection of nations in nation, but not of it."
This is why even the mind-bogglingly brutal Saddam Hussein had trouble handling the tribes of Iraq. The extraordinary progress we have seen in Iraq in the past six months has less to do with winning new converts to our ideological vision of iberal democracy, and more with how we have through inspired and very practical work at the ocal level -- turned the tribes in our favor. We have greased palms, stroked egos and benefited fom the excesses of an al-Oaida so savage and dark that it represents a threat even to the no particularly gentle or enlightened way of life of
he tribes.
President Bush doesn't appear to have entirely bsorbed this. He still insists that Muslims desire freedom as much as Methodists do. This may wel be true of Muslims who are as deracinated as most Methodists are -- living in societies that have issolved tradironal ties of clan and sect to make possible the individualism upon which modern iberal democracies are built. Most Muslims in the Middle East don't live in such societies, of course, and creating them would represent a radical social revolution almost as threatening to tribal sheiks as he vision of al-Qaida.
What we are instead witnessing in Iraq is a necessary American accommodation to people for whom blood and soil mean much more than constitutional rights or democratic procedure. Is hat ideal? No, but consider it part of the revenge of the tribes.

I met Big Al the other day. He's the biggest alligator in Texas (13 feet 4 inches long and weighs 1,000 pounds). He's between 70 and 75 to him, he was with his girlfriend Allie, who's just 9 feet. They've been together a long time. Must be true alligator love. They were both keeping cool among the lily pads in a pool at Gator Country, one of the most unusual places to visit in Texas. You can see alligators up close and personal, even feed and hold live alligators. It's located Interstate 10 . Gary Saurage is one of the owners. looking at other parks and dise looking at other parks and discovered there's not another place in the country that offers the have close interaction with alligators that we have," says Gary. "We make it safe for people to handle these gators."

Construction on the park started in 2005 and it opened in April of last year. Gary says they've been going strong since it opened.
27,000 people have visited the park. I asked him where he got the


150 or so alligators on the place "We get them from all over: Taylor's Bayou, High Island, we've had them come in as far away as Tyler, Texas. We usually catch them ourselves. You know, people get alligators in their swimming pools and we go get them. Anytime we can get our hands on a gator, we bring them here."
I was there during the summer nesting season. There were alliga or nests all over the place. When he eggs hatch, the population will increase to around 250 gators

trip. When they get off that bus, they're running and screaming they re running and screaming
and are just so excited. When and are just so excited. When you let them hold one of those 2 or 3 feet alligators, their face are just full of fascination. They really get a kick out of watching our shows. We ve got a heavy ire over this big pond with al he alligators in it and we have a guy that glides across the pond dragging one foot in the water We call it Redneck Seaworld. It's kinda dangerous.
Admission to Gator Country is $\$ 7$ for adults, $\$ 5$ for kids and seniors. Shows are at noon, 2 and 4 PM. Besides alligators, the park has an assortment of turtles an crocodiles.

College Ready Texas hits road
What does it mean for a student to be "college ready?" Basically, it has to do with ensuring that high school curriculum matches college entrance standards.
Members of the Commission for a College Ready Texas have been on the road to get more input on exactly what it means.
