Simmons Seeking Re-Election

Eight Units To Be Built

APARTMENTS GIVEN OKAY

A housing project in McLean which has been sought for many months has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration, according to Robert Cowen of Clarendon, area representative of the agency.

Work on the \$136,000 apartments is expected to begin soon.

The project, which will be administered by the Housing Authority of the City of McLean, will include eight apartments—six two-bedroom units and two one-bedroom units.

Gray County and City of McLean crews will begin grading, paving, and dirtwork in the near future, and the Sam Smith Construction Co. of Amarillo will build the apartments.

Architect for the project is L. E. Wossum of Amarillo.

The apartments will be located in the northwest part of town, at Cypress Street between 4th and 5th Streets.

The cost of building the apartments will be paid through rentals. The housing is not a low-income project, as anyone who makes \$13,500 or less per year will be eligible to rent one of the apartments. The local housing authority will have control over rent levels.

Those involved in obtaining approval for the apartments include Mrs. Jim Hathaway, executive director of the Housing Authority of the City of McLean, and directors of the authority, E. M. Bailey, Mike John-

son, Johnnie Mertel, Ted Simmons, and Carey Don Smith.

McLean Mayor Sam Haynes helped get assistance in the project from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, and city councilmen W. W. Boyd, W. C. Kennedy, Mrs. Ruth Magee, Miro Pagan, and Dale Glass also were involved in the project, along with city employees.

Three Voted To McLean City Council

Boyd Meador, local real estate agent and former mayor, led the ticket in the city election for alderman Saturday with 120 votes. Also elected to sit on the city council were Miro Pagan, an incumbent, with 102 votes, and George Terry, owner of Terry's Appliances, with 102 votes.

Unsuccessful candidates were H.D. (Casper) Smith with 57 votes, and Boyd Lee Thompson with 51 votes.

Clifford McDonald and Creed Lamb each received one write-in vote.

Suggs, Smitherman Win School Election

Two incumbents were returned to office in the election for school trustees Saturday. June Suggs received 121 votes, and Tony Smitherman won 111 votes.

Unsuccessful candidates were H. D. (Casper) Smith, who received 81 votes, and a write-in candidate, Gerald Tate, who received 49 votes.

Johnnie Carpenter and Thacker Haynes each received two write-in votes, while Carl Henley, Leroy Blaylock, and Mike Darsey each received one write-in vote.

Bullets Halt Speeding Car Tuesday Night

A high-speed chase ended in gunfire Tuesday night as area law enforcement units converged in McLean to apprehend two juveniles in a reportedly stolen car.

Wheeler County law officers and highway patrol units, along with Shamrock Chief of Police George Hooten, Gray County Deputy Jimmy Shelton and City Marshal Ray Sharber, brought to a halt the chase which at times exceeded 100 m.p.h.

The pursuit began east of Sayre, Okla., near Erick, and crossed into Texas. Texas lawmen

High School Track Teams Busy In Meets

Members of the Tiger and Tigrette track teams won a few ribbons this week in meets at Amarillo, Groom, and Canadian, and school records were set by Tonus Hathaway, Rozanna Eck, and the girls mile relay team.

Competing in the Amarillo Relays Friday, the mile relay quartet of Melinda Hunt, Rozanna Eck, Tammy Killham, and Jill Trew qualified for the finals by posting a 4:31 time, bettering the McLean record of 4:31.6 which was set last year. The team did not stay for the Saturday finals, however, and competing at Groom instead, school record with a 98' 3 1/2" toss, good for second place in that meet.

Also in Amarillo, Tammy Killham ran a 66.1 in the 440-yard dash, and the 440-yard relay team of Melinda Hunt, Jill Trew, Joy Rhine, and Sally Haynes ran a 54.2, their best time this year.

Rozanna Eck set a school record in the 880-yard dash Saturday at Groom with a time of 2:47.3. She placed fourth in the event, missing the third by .1 second.

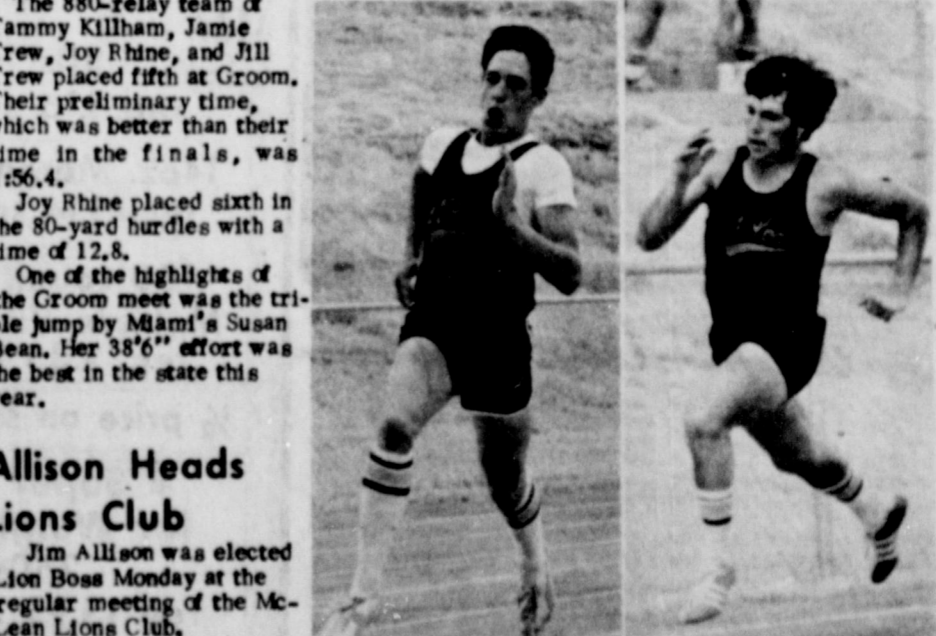

Here is another jewel from Leo Rosten. This time he is attacking, in his own hilarious way, conventional wisdom. He mows down facts with such a flourish that you may actually learn something while you are laughing.

Rosten exposes such truths as "cockroaches don't especially like dirt. What they really like best is soap."

Rosten also answers such earth-shattering questions as "Which famous composer, afraid his head would fall off, clutched it with one hand while conducting with the other?" Don't know? You'll have to read the book to find out.

Of course, Rosten gives his own views on time-honored cliches. Concerning the old maxim, "Early to bed and early to rise makes a man healthy, wealthy, and wise," he says "some of the sickest people I know get up at

down and conk out before the seven o'clock news," and, "no one ever grew wiser while snoring." Rosten's revised view is "Early to bed and early to rise takes most of the zing out of living." And as for "two heads being better than one, Rosten says "not if both are stupid."

In examining the advice "always tell the truth," Rosten asks "can you really tell your excessively homely daughter that she is no sight for sore eyes? Should you tell a sensitive friend that he has such bad breath that he ought to bottle it and send it to the Division of Chemical Warfare? Dare you tell your wife, just before you both leave for an important dinner, that the new dress with which she surprises you would look better on Halloween?"

Leo Rosten long has been a major contributor to American humor, and this latest book is a full life as are the rest of his works. "The Power of Positive Nonsense" is available at Lovett Memorial Library.

The sanitary landfill located 1 mile east on I-40 and 1/2 mile north of the City of McLean, shall be available to public use only during the following times: (a) Tuesday and Thursday of each week from the hour of 8:00 o'clock p.m. to 8:00 o'clock p.m., (b) Saturday of each week from the hour of 8:00 o'clock p.m. to 5:00 o'clock p.m. NO PUBLIC USE OF THE SANITARY LANDFILL SHALL BE MADE AT ANY OTHER TIMES.

The following fees shall be paid by all persons, other than authorized agents and/or employees of the City of McLean, Texas, using the sanitary landfills: (a) for each car: \$5.00; (b) for each pickup (3/4 ton and under): \$1.00; (c) for each 2-wheel trailer: \$1.00; and (d) for each truck (over 3/4 ton): \$2.00.

The fees are payable by such persons in cash at the time of entry into the sanitary landfill. IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON TO DISPOSE OF OR BRING INTO THE SANITARY LANDFILL TREES OR CONCRETE IN ANY FORM.

Any person using said sanitary landfill shall dispose of all solid waste, rubbish, trash, materials, debris, abandoned automobiles, and appliances at the places so designated at the site of the sanitary landfill and at no other.

No person shall remove any solid waste, rubbish, trash, materials, debris, abandoned automobiles or appliances from the sanitary landfill unless authorized by resolution adopted by the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas.

TIPS TO HELP YOU Naturally Great Pictures An increasing number of Americans are bringing the great outdoors home with them in pictures, but to avoid mulling it when roughing it, many ought to heed these hints on photographing nature.

• If you use a tree or an overhanging branch in the foreground to frame your picture and to add to a feeling of depth as well as visual interest, don't let distances fool your focusing. Select a visual point that puts both foreground and distant subjects in relative focus.

• Don't confuse the earth and sky. Keep horizons as normal as possible, unless you're aiming for some special effect. Keep the natural contours of the land unchanged so viewers don't lose their visual reference points and the picture doesn't lose its beauty.

When Should Quail

Season Be In Texas?

One of the more complicated tasks facing wildlife management officials each year is setting quail season dates.

The birds' vulnerability to environmental changes has to be considered in setting these dates. Early season bring complaints of hot weather and snakes from the state's bird dog enthusiasts and in some years complaints of immature birds in the bag.

If the season is set too late, hunters may not even get to hunt a large percentage of the quail crop because of natural mortality. This year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department proposes to split the state on a roughly east-west basis, with the western portion opening the season about two weeks earlier than the eastern half.

More specifically, the season for ecological regions of South Texas, Trans-Pecos, High Plains and Rolling Plains is proposed to begin on the Saturday nearest Nov. 1 and end of the Sunday nearest Jan. 31. In the remainder of the state, the season would be the Saturday nearest Nov. 15 through the Sunday nearest Feb. 15.

Public hearings have been held throughout the state to get public opinion on the proposed changes. The Parks and Wildlife Commission meets on April 25 to adopt hunting and fishing regulations for the 1978-79 seasons.

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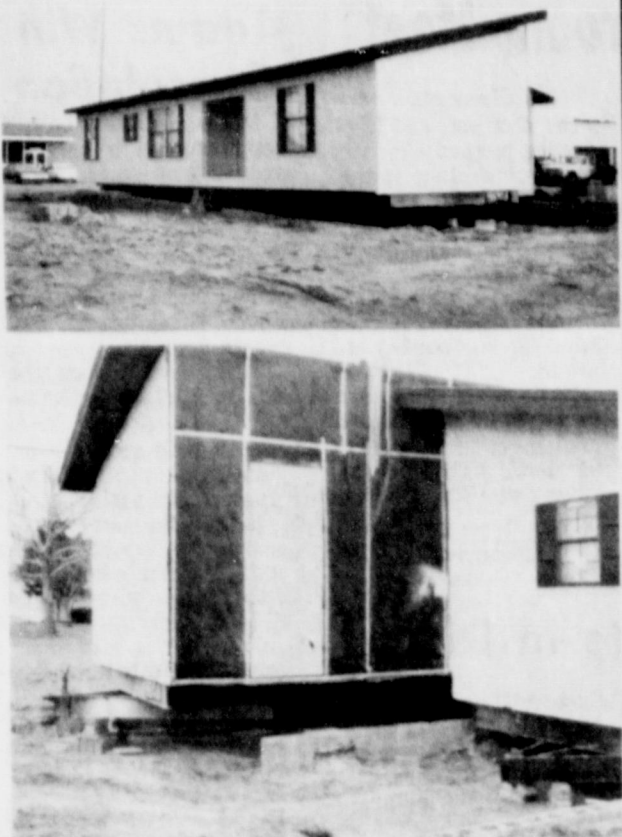

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING DOGS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE ON PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY; DEFINING TERMS; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDING OF DOGS; PROVIDING FOR RELEASE OF DOGS IMPOUNDED UPON PAYMENT OF FINES; PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OR DESTRUCTION OF DOGS NOT REDEEMED; PROVIDING FOR REDEMPTION OF DOGS SOLD; PROVIDING FOR RECORDS; PROVIDING FOR UNCONSTITUTIONALITY; REPEALING CERTAIN ORDINANCES; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY AND PROVIDING PUBLICATION AND PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS:

Section 1. For the purpose of this ordinance the following words shall have the following meaning:

"Dog" shall mean both the male and female.

"At large" shall mean any dog off the property of the owner and not under the control of a competent person either by a leash, at heel beside a person and obedient to that person's commands, or within a vehicle being driven or parked on the streets.

"Owner" shall mean any person, firm or corporation owning or keeping or harboring or having control of or custody of a dog.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any owner of any dog to allow such dog to be "at large" within the corporate limits of the City of McLean.

Section 11. That any owner who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined any sum not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every day of such violation shall be deemed a separate and complete offense.

HOMEMAKER NEWS

Placing an economic value today on a woman's contribution to her family in the future can help protect families financially in the event of her death or disability. In placing these values, the family needs to look at the possible economic loss they face if the homemaker dies or is disabled, and the family needs to look at information on the value of a woman's contribution to the family. The value of her contribution is needed for couples can realistically decide how much it would cost to hire someone to do that work, in case the need arose. In addition to more financial responsibilities in the marketplace, homemakers continue to assume major responsibility for household work, which include managerial and physical activities in the household by and for family members for no pay.

based on the calculations, a 1972 judgement of \$235,000 was awarded to a family as compensation for the loss of the homemaker's economic contribution for the next 19 years, when the youngest of three children would have reached age 21. In planning for the future, families should also remember that insurance companies keep up-to-date estimates of the monetary value of women's contributions to families--to encourage families to insure to wife for disability and death and to assist in fair insurance claim settlements. Prudential Life Insurance Company estimates that in 1977, the full-time homemaker with a husband and two children contributed 99.9 hours of work per week--valued at \$283.49, or more than \$15,000 per year. Among possible planning areas are life insurance, health insurance, disability income, retirement planning, emergency or contingency savings, savings and investments and employment securities.

Commissioners Convene In Saturday Session

County commissioners convened in an unusual Saturday meeting this week to approve the payroll for county employees. No action was taken after a short executive session. Geraldine Schultz, county welfare officer who has resigned effective June 1, was with commissioners when the session started. County Judge Don Hinton said previously that a decision has not yet been made on whether to keep that office open. Payroll approved at the meeting included \$166,825.75 for the Highland and McLean hospitals. Commissioners authorized First National Bank in Dallas to release \$50,000 in securities to First National Bank in Pampa. Those securities will be replaced by \$100,000 in securities due during March, 1989. Hinton signed a resolution naming April "Youth Activity Month."

Club Activities

Casey Carpet Company of Amarillo donated enough carpet to the McLean Boy Scouts to cover the floors of the Scout house last week, according to Neil Middleton, scoutmaster. The local scouts are writing thank you notes to the company.

Although household work generally is not valued in monetary terms unless it goes through the market system, its value is getting greater emphasis in legal settlements--and the housewife's social roles being considered. Cornell University research used "time" spent on household work as effective measure of a study on the subject. They identified workers in the marketplace to perform services similar to household tasks normally engaged in by family members. They obtained hourly wage rates for each of these job categories: cook, dishwasher, cleaning women, "handymen," washing-machine operators, laundry workers, clothes-maintenance specialists, child-care workers, homemaker aides and accounting clerks. In addition, they concluded that three major factors determine the amount of time spent on household work--number of children, age of youngest child and whether or not the housewife is employed. Using these three variables the researchers estimated the economic value of household work for a wide range of family compositions, educational backgrounds and job skills. For example,

News from your County Agricultural Agent

FRUIT INSECT CONTROLS. As the fruit tree blooming season arrives, tree owners interested in having worm-free fruit to eat next summer need to start a spray program. For peach, apricot, and plum, most homeowners should spray at least three times. The first spray would be at the pink bud stage; second spray when 75 percent of petals have fallen; and the third spray at shuck-split or 10-14 days after petal fall. The following insects will be controlled by these sprays: peach twig borer, thrips, stinkbugs, lygus bugs, plum curculio and oriental fruit moth. Recommended spray materials include Guthion, diazinon, imidan or a general purpose spray mixture for insect and disease control by the homeowner. This GPS mixture can be made by mixing 1 tablespoon of Captain 50% WP, 2 tablespoons Malathion 25% WP and 2 tablespoons Methoxychlor 50% WP. Use 4 tablespoons of this mixture per gallon of water. Some chemical companies also offer a general purpose home fruit tree spray that is satisfactory. Be sure to read the label, follow directions and remember any restrictions given on the label for chemical use. A more complete fruit tree spray guide is available in the County Extension Office, Courthouse Annex.
