Martha Parker Announces New Program

Anyone who wishes to have an impact on the drunk driving problem in Gray County can now get help at the Lovett Memorial Library.

Martha Parker, librarian, announced that A Citizen Activist Guide to Fight Drunk Driving has been made available to the Lovett Memorial Library by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration

(NHTSA), which published the document. NHTSA, an agency of the U.S. Department of Transportation, disseminated the Activist Guide in cooperation with Allstate Insurance Company and the American Library Association. The Guide has been mailed to more that 17,000 public, junior college, college and university libraries across

the country.

system for dealing with drunk drivers. It also includes helpful sugges-

The Guide provides "how to" information that will help individuals organize a task force to study the drunk driving problem and then get the study results translated into effective programs for their own localities. During the past few years, several citizens' groups have used a 'grass roots' approach that has successfully focused attention on the problem and on the potential solutions. The Citizen Activist Guide sets out a step-by-step method of investigating a community's existing controlling drunk drivers, how to draw public attention to the subject, and how to lobby for change.

Mrs. Parker noted that

at least 55% of all fatal traffic collisions are alcohol-related, and 650,000 people will be seriously injured by drunk drivers in the United States during this year alone. The problem

occurs, and is most effectively handled at the state and local level. where citizens can make a difference if they know how to proceed.

The Citizen Activist Guide to Fight Drunk Driving is available during regular library hours 1-5 Monday, 9-5 Tuesday - Friday.
