as its chief for 12 years. He has two children, Paige, 17, and Trevor,

75 Students To Participate In Shoot-Out

Senator Bill Sarpalius Asks Public Opinion

AUSTIN---State Senator Bill Sarpalius said recently that he is asking parents, students and others interested in the state's education system to provide him input on a proposal to lengthen the school day throughout Texas.

A subcommittee of the Select Committee on Public Education has recommended that the public school day commence at 8:30 a.m. (with an appropriate break for lunch) and end at 5:30 p.m., five days a week, for grades kindergarten through 12.

Sarpalius said he was talking with school officials throughout the Panhandle and South Plains about the proposal, but would like

on buses before sunup and they wouldn't get home until after dark. They also are disturbed that youngsters who work in the afternoons would be unable to continue their jobs or helping on family farms. Sarpalius said he was asking newspapers in the 29 county area of the 31st District to provide the opportunity to respond. He said he would research the results and provide a district and county breakdown of how those who respond feel about the proposal.
