Board Will Ask Bids For Remodeling

The McLean School Board met Monday night in regular session and decided to ask for bids for a massive remodeling project for the school's gym.

The board looked at two estimates provided by the firm of Wilson-Doche Architects. in Amarillo. One estimate for \$39,485 called for new girders between existing gir-ders and some additional finished flooring. The second estimate for \$98,600 was for totally removing the existing wood floor and framing in the main gymnasium smoking vestibule and dressing room area and replacing the floor with sand fill, a concrete slab over the entire area, providing a parquet wood floor and new plumbing rough-ins in the dressing room area.

The board decided the first type of repair would be a stop-gap measure, and possible waste of money. "I think if we are going to do it, we ought to do it right." board member Howard Gipson said. We have to do something before next year, board president Jim Allison said. gym is almost unusable the

way it is now. Following a lengthy discusion the board decided to ask for bids on the second type of repair, adding new lighting, a urethane floor instead of the parquet, and finished dressing

We can see what the bids are and then cut back from there," here," superintendent Jim autherford told the board. But I would guess, to finish the work right, we're probably looking at about \$150,000," Rutherford said.

Tax Hurts The Little Guys

Although the occasion didn't warrant much fanfare. the recent first anniversary of the windfall profits tax left a lot of small royalty owners in Texas steaming. And who could blame them?

Here they are, those remaining pioneess and their sons and daughters, whose hard work and determination helped them through the years to amass land holdings in the Texas Panhandle. When the oil comapnies came along, some of the land owners gladly agreed to let their land be used for drilling purposes, in exchange for royalty payments. The resulting checks, they thought, would be helpful for many purposes: Graceful retirements, the education of their children and grandchildren, or reinvestments. And in a number of cases, the small royalty checks were simply seen as one way to help ease the rising cost of living in America.

But all of that was changed last year with the Carter-inspired windfalls tax, which was sold to the American public as a way to "punish" large oil concerns. And as ordinarily happens when politicians assume a stance of social conscience, the results have been altogether different than anticipated in the halls of Congress. The windfall profits tax is not hurting the major oil companies. But it has put a crushing dent the operations of small independent producers, and in the lives of thousands of small royalty owners. Nationwide, about 2.5 million royalty owners are paying an excise tax of 30 to 75

percent on varied categories of crude oil.

Not long ago, the West Texas Land and Royalty Association surveyed its membership in an attempt to draw profiles of the average mineral rights owners who are being hurt by the windfalls profit tax. Slightly more than 1,000 owners responded to the survey in three West Texas counties; of that number, association representatives were able to put together a rather surprising sketch of those people the federal government wanted to punish with the additional taxation:

A great many of them are elderly citizens. About 46 percent, in fact, were more than 65 years of age.

Nearly 38 percent said the royalties make up from 50 to 100 percent of their income.

As high as 17 percent reported that their royalty comes amount to \$100 per month or less. Still another 12 percent were also in the small come category, with royalty checks ranging from \$100 to

The bottom line to all this madness is that no one who was the target of the windfall profits legislation has been affected. Instead, this subversive form of taxation has served to harm the working people of the Texas Panhandle and the United States.

Efforts are now underway in Washington to have royalty owners exempted from the Windfall Profits Tax. Stopping short of total abolition of the tax, this step would be a most logical step. It should be accomplished, and it should be accomplished soon.

In a 1911 British newspaper, brought to the News recently, there is an article headlined "17 Days In A Bath-room." The headline alone was enough to catch my eye, but the story itself is the real drawing-card. It goes like this:

"A singular story of a young girl's illness in a bathroom in which she spent seventeen days, was related at Westminster County Court, when the case of Constant V. Arondelle came before the Judge. Plaintiff, a Jermyn-street boarding house keeper, claimed 25 pounds from defendant, a music-hall artist, on an alleged verbal agreement. Her case was that the defendant, who was known to her, drove up to her establishment at three o'clock one morning, and said that he wanted a room. She said that every room was occupied except the bathroom, and the defendant said he must have it for his wife's sister, a girl who was with him in the cab, and expressed himself willing to pay 25 pounds for the use of it. The girl was admitted, and within half an hour a child was born. She occupied the bathroom for seventeen days. For the defense, it was denied that a compromise was given to pay 25 pounds. Mrs. Arondelle, who said she was the daughter of a County Court offical, gave evidence to the effect that when she went to the plaintiff's establishment to visit her sister she saw her in the bathroom. His Honour said it could not be said that a lodging house should receive a lodger in such circumstances at the ordinary price, but he must also have regard to the accomodation given. There would be judgment for the plaintiff for half a guinea a day for the seventeen days, and other items, a total of 18 pounds 13




