Across the country this week, high school seniors will walk down the aisle and receive their high school diplomas, launching themselves into the adult world. Some of them will go on to college or trade school; some will go to work; some will get married. But for all of them life will never be the same!

Remember your high school graduation? Would you have believed then that your life would be what it is now? I wish that we could convince these kids to be ready for the various changes that life will deal

When I graduated 24 years ago from high school in Weatherford, Okla., I thought I had my life all planned. I planned to go to college at Southwestern State (which I did), major in English, (which I did). Following college, I wanted to teach in the U.S. Army's schools in Germany so that I could travel all over Europe. I also planned to be an old maid, and upon my return to the United States, I wanted to get an advanced degree in library science and spend the rest of my life locked up in some musty back room with my beloved books doing re-

search! old with that kind of plans? By the time I had been out of

high school a year, I was married and the mother of a beautiful, black-headed baby girl, and had completed enough hours to be a junior in college.

Needless to say, my plans to live my life as a spinster were the first ones to fall by the wayside. But never in my wildest imagination could 1 have pictured myself as the mother of four, the stepmother of two, and the grandmother of five. I also never, never, never could have pictured myself as the editor of a newspaper. I had been the news editor of the school paper during my senior year, and loved it, but a crusty old newsman from the Oklahoma City newspaper had firmly squelched my dreams of being in the newspaper business. He told me that there was no place for a woman in journalism, and at that time I believed him.

When I think of how much my life has changed since graduation, and then I think about how much the world has changed, it boggles my mind. Just think, since my grad-uation in 1957, we in the United States have lived

through the Beatnik era, the Hippy days, the anti-war movement, the Viet Nam tragedy, the dope-infested world of rock and acid rock music, the assassinations of national figures...In other words, the world is nothing like it was then, but then neither am I.

I hope the seniors of 1981 are ready for the world. (And knowing some of these seniors. I hope the world is ready for them!) I hope that we have ... ie some things to prepare them for the changes that life

Kudos For Our Congressman

Congressman Jack Hightower of the Panhandle's 13th District has been targeted for defeat in the next election by a national action group of "liberal" Democrats who consider the Texas Panhandle Congressman too conservative, but we predict that they're camping on a cold trail.

Congressman Hightower is, indeed, a political conservative, and this editor, who is not a political conservative by today's standards, sometimes disagrees with Jack Hightower's political positions, but we are still of the opinion that Congressman Hightower is a fair and effective spokesman for the people of the district he represents, and an honest one to boot. It's hard to demand more than that of a Congressman.

The 13th Congressional District of Texas is, after all, a politically-conservative district, if the voting patterns of its citizens during the past three decades are to be believed. It has, on occasion, been represented by Republican Congressmen who have been ultra-conservatiave and generally ineffective and by Democratic Congressman who have been both politically-conservative and politically-effective.

We don't expect Jack Hightower to change his conservative views about government and we hope he will not be pressured into changing his political party affiliation, either. Knowing Jack Hightower, we doubt that he could be.

Congressman Hightower, is at the moment, one of a small group of conservative Democrats in Congress who are in a position of determining by their votes whether the economic program of the Republican Reagan Administration will be enacted or defeated in the House of Representatives in the next few days. Republican leadership in the House declares that the outcome "depends on the votes of 62 conservative Democrats from 20 states, including Congressman Jack Hightower of Texas." The Chairman of that Republican task force, Rep. Stan Harris of Virginia, has mailed lengthy "Letter to editors" of newspapers in Congressman Hightower's district openly seeking to pressure the Democratic congressman to vote with the Republicans on this issue. He could have saved his postage. Congressman Hightower has already committed himself to the editors in his district:

"I committed to the President's budget goals when he first articulated them earlier this year," he writes from Washington in a letter dated April 29. "I committed to him personally when he called me on the phone last week, and I told him I was definitely supporting the bi-partisan budget plan as he asked. I think that particular budget plan will pass, too."

We do not agree, without reservation, with the Reagan budget, but we believe that the big majority of citizens in this district do agree with it, and we believe that Congressman Hightower is properly representing the people of his district when he publicly commits his support.

That's what "representative government" is all about, and we believe the 13th Texas District is being ably and honestly represented.



AUSTIN - It was just a few years ago that oil was two dollars a barrel. We used oil like there was no tomorrow in those days.

One day we woke up and the price of oil was more like \$20 a barrel. Now we know there is a tomorrow, and we are all very concerned about having enough oil for the future.

Trying to plan ahead, Speaker Billy Clayton, several Legislators from all over the state and I have proposed a way to be sure we have the water we need for the future. The plan, embodied in HJR 33, will put aside money for water development.

HJR 33 will put a constitutional amendment on the ballot for next November. If the voters pass the amendment, two things will happen. First, the state will put aside half of the budget surplus each biennium to finance water projects. Second, the other half of

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington



One of the biggest problems troubling our country's economy today is the lack of money for investment. A vital economic segment that is most troubled by this shortage of investment capital is small business.

Small business is the strong right arm of our economic system in the United States and we must take steps to insure that it remains strong.

Small business accounts for 43 percent of this country's Gross National Product—almost half of all the goods and services produced in the United States.

Small business provides 58 percent of all the jobs in private

enterprise in this country.

Yet small businesses, all too frequently, are starved for capital funds. Only 27 percent of U.S. corporate assets are con-

trolled by small and medium-sized businesses.

I recently introduced the Bentsen Small Business Investment Act of 1981, which attacks the problem of capital formation and retention for small businesses now struggling to cope with record high inflation and interest rates. This program would re-

duce taxes small businesses must pay by \$6.6 billion in 1982.

My program of tax reforms and investment incentives would make it far easier for our small businesses to achieve the kind of

growth of which they are capable.

For example, the Bentsen bill would defer capital gains taxes from the sale of an asset owned by a small business if the gain is

reinvested in another small business asset within 18 months.

Also on the investment end, my measure would revise a provision in the tax code which presently discourages employees from investing in their company's firm through stock option plans.

This legislation also would increase the amount of used equipment that a small business operator could apply to his investment tax credit

ment tax credit.

Another component of the Bentsen act would ease estate and gift taxes paid by small business operators. This especially would benefit the family farmer struggling to keep his farm intact for

future generations.

Since the beginning of this year I have met with individuals representing over 100 national, regional and state small business organizations. My program addresses the tax priorities set by


these groups.

At the same time I believe it is relatively inexpensive, realistic and achievable during the 97th Congress.

As a member of the Senate Finance Committee, I'm seeking bipartisan support among my colleagues for this small business legislative package. As one of the most vital parts of our economy, small business must be stable and prosperous if we expect to restore overall economic health to this country. I'm confident that this legislative program is the best way to help





Why? Flowering of onions is usually caused by temperature change.

An onion is a biennial, which means it usually takes two years from the time seed is planted until plants are supposed to flower. However, this condition is triggered by temperature. A young onion plant exposed to alternating cold and warm temperatures causes the plant to go dor-mant, resume growth, go

dormant and resume growth done to eliminate this probagain. This generally results in premature flowering or "bolt-

Onion bulbs from flowering plants are still edible but will generally be smaller. They should be used as soon as possible as the green flower stalks which emerge through the center of the bulbs will make storage almost impos-

AND THOUGHT The past four weeks I've talked a lot about the "whys" and "hows" of growing a successful vegetable garden in Grav County.

If you do the right things at the right times such as planting the right varieties and fertilizing, watering, mulching and controlling pests properly, chances are you will enjoy the 'fruits of your labor."

Most inexperienced gardeners have a tendency to believe all that's left to do is to sit back and enjoy all those tasty, fresh vegetables. Believe me, that's wrong! If anything, you should pay even closer attention to your garden and what's going on out there. An outbreak of disease, an infestation of damaging insects, or even a short drought period can wreck your garden and make all previous efforts worthless.

Also, make it a point to harvest all your vegetables when they mature. To get the most from your garden, har-vest your vegetables at their best stage for eating. This is also a must for canning and freezing. The final quality of your preserved vegetables is no better than the quality you began with. In other words, what you put in the jar is what you take out.

After all the effort you put into growing your garden this year, make sure that you enjoy your vegetables at their peak of quality. It's important to remember that once a vegetable is removed from your garden, it has no further source of food nor can it replace loss of moisture. So, make the time between harvesting and eating or preserv-

ng as short as possible.

FREEZER FAILS What do you do when the freezer breaks down or the power goes off? Try to find out now long it will be before your freezer is working again and keep the door closed. A fully loaded freezer will stay cold enough to keep food frozen for days. A half-full freezer will keep food cold for only a

Meats that still contain ice crystals or have been maintained at 40 F. (5C.) or below for less than two days may be

safely refrozen. Some quality may be lost, but the product is still wholesome. Throw out any food that has an unusual color or odor. Never refreeze ice cream.

If it looks like the power will be off for a long time or your freezer won't be repaired for a while, use dry ice. If dry ice is placed in the freezer soon after the power goes off, 25 pounds should keep the temperature below freezing for two to three days in a 10-cubic foot, halffull freezer and three to four days in a full freezer of the same

Handle dry ice carefully. Be sure the room is well ventilated, and never touch dry ice with your bare hands. Place the dry ice on cardboard or small boards on top of packages, and do not open freezer again except to put in

more dry ice or to remove it when your freezer is working

If using dry ice is not possible, move food to a food locker. Carry it to the locker in insulated boxes or thick layers of paper to prevent thawing. Or possibly a neighbor may be willing to store some of your food until your freezer is

EMPLOYED MOTHERS --NEW 'HOPE' FOR DUAL-ROLE SUCCESS

Employed mothers, there's new "hope" for success in both of your "jobs" --at home and at work. Home economics research is finding no basic difference between children of employed mothers and those who remain in the home, However, studies show that employed moms' guilt and worry can affect the children. Guilt and worry about working outside the home tends to interfere with or makes time mother and child spend together less enjoyable,

the research indicates. Here are some suggestions to enhance parenting skills for mother who work outside the

Choose what is most important. You are managing two jobs, so realize you won't be able to do everything. Don't increase stress by worrying or feeling guilty about things you cannot do. Accept your limit-ations and help your family to

Take care of yourself. Your own sense of well-being is

tremendously important. When you are frazzled, go to a quiet place and relax. Schedule a regular night of the week all for yourself.

Link work and parenthood. Talk to your child about your job. Invite him to visit you at work, and help him to get to know your co-workers. Perhaps most important, look for ways your child can help you in your job. As he learns about and participates in your work life, he is preparing for his own working years.

Research findings say several things about working moms and their children. If you're an employed mother, you're part of a large and growing number, researchers report. Almost half of all mothers in the United States with school-age children are employed full-time outside the

Here's what the studies indicate about the children of employed mothers: By itself, a mother's full-time employment is not likely to harm her child. There are few, if any, consistent differences between children of mothers who are in the home full-time and those who work outside the home full-time.

There is virtually no difference in school achievement and social adjustment between children of mothers who work outside the home and children of mothers who work at home. Children of mothers who work outside the home have as much personal attachment to their mothers as do children of mothers who remain at home


A bathing suit and bulges is like a chocolate cake with chicken gravy. Unappetizing. There's just no way that flab and good looks can go together. Yet it's nearly time to put on our swimsuits and bravely parade our winter-

white, slightly over-padded selves along the beach and beside the pool. But millions of Americans, determined to look more glamorous, will torture themselves with all kinds of crazy, illogical diets--from periodic starvation to eating only grapefruit or hot dogs and bananas--in the attempt to lose those extra pounds. Moderation, not starvation, is the key to losing weight and staying healthy, says the Texas

Medical Association. In most cases crash diets lead only to bad nutrition and even vitamin deficiencies. Merely taking vitamin pills won't stop you from developing dangerous vitamin and mineral deficiencies while on a crash diet. Some vitamins must be eaten naturally in food to be effective, and others must be taken in combination with certain foods for the

greatest benefit. Crash diets can also lead to self-pity. After a few days on one of these strict diets we feel sorry for ourselves and we blow the diet and go on a binge. Then we go right back to our previous eating pat-terns. So much for the diet and the bikini.

The reason many people have to go on diets in the first place is simply because they consume too many calories for their body to use each day. Calories not used as energy are stored in the body as fat. Despite what the books and magazines say, the only sure

Texans Property Tax Rights Told

AUSTIN--Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, today reminded Texans of their right to appear before local Boards of Equalization (BOE) to appeal values assigned to their property for ad valorem tax purposes.

'The right to appear before the BOE is the single most important remedy that is available to taxpayers regarding the value which is placed on property," Graeber said.

The board is the taxpayer's opportunity to be heard in an informal setting and without incurring expensive court costs," he added.

Each local government which collects property taxes must have a board of equalization to hear taxpayer appeals on values. Most BOEs meet during May until about mid-July, Graeber said. Taxpayers who rendered

their property to the local assessor must be notified of the time and place of the BOE meeting if the assessor increased the value rendered. Graeber said those who did

not render still have the right to appear before the BOE, but persons in this category will have to learn on their own when the board will convene. BOE sessions are open to the general public. Time and

location of the meeting must be posted in the administration office of the jurisdiction and with the appropriate county clerk. A city BOE, however, is not required to file notice with the county clerk.

Additionally, at least 10 days prior to the BOE meetnotices must be published in a general-circulation local area. The information is also available from each tax office by telephone.

Graeber said there are two basic situations in which taxpayers are entitled to receive an adjustment in their tax value:

-- If it exceeds local market values. If the property owner finds and submits to the BOE the kinds of evidence which indicates the value assigned to that parcel of property is too high, then the taxpayer would be entitled to a reduction in the valuation.

-If it is valued higher than similar property. Regardless of what other property like yours is selling for, the value of property on the tax roll should be about the same as the value for all similar properties in the jurisdiction.

Graeber added that tips on presenting an appeal are outined in the agency's pamphlet 'Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies. Responsibilities!" which is available to local taxing units.

He reminded taxpayers that Boe's sole authority is over the value of property. "The board must limit the taxpayers' discussion only to matters concerning property values. Discussions regarding the amount of taxes or the injustice of taxation merely waste the taxpayer's time.

These complaints should be referred to the appropriate governing bodies," he said. Graeber noted that in a number of counties, the new countywide appraisal districts are providing 1981 appraisal rolls to one or more local

taxing jurisdicitions. In those counties, the appraisal district will appoint the board of equalization for the taxing

jurisdictions being served. "Information will be made available locally on when and where the BOE will meet, regardless of whether it is named by a taxing jurisdiction or by the appraisal district,'

Graeber noted. He added that appeals procedures will be the same before all BOEs in the state.
