## Welcome, Ex-Students And Rodeo Fans!



Welcome, Ex-Students!  
We hope you enjoy your reunion weekend, and that you take time to look at your old home town and see all the changes. We have prepared a few special features in this week's paper for your enjoyment, and hope you see some familiar faces in these pages.

At the installation of officers of the Lions Club last week, the visiting dignitary, 212 District Governor Marshal Cooper read the funniest story called "Trying To Do It Alone." For all of you who, like me, try to do everything yourself without giving others a chance to help, this story is dedicated:

TRYING TO DO IT ALONE  
Dear Sir:

"I am writing in response to your request for additional information. In Block #3 of the accident reporting form, I put quote "Trying to do the job alone" unquote as the cause of my accident. You said in your letter that I should explain more fully, and I trust that the following details will be sufficient.

"I am a bricklayer by trade. On the day of the accident, I was working alone on the roof of a new six story building. When I completed my work, I discovered that I had about 500 pounds of brick left over. Rather than carry the bricks down by hand, I decided to lower them in a barrel by using a pulley which fortunately was attached to the side of the building, at the sixth floor.

Securing the rope at ground level, I went up to the roof, swung the barrel out, and loaded the brick into it. Then I went back to the ground and untied the rope, holding it tightly to insure a slow descent of the 500 pounds of bricks. You will note in Block #11 of the accident reporting form that I weigh 135 pounds.

Due to my surprise to being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, I proceeded at a rather rapid rate up the side of the building.

"In the vicinity of the third floor, I met the barrel coming down. This explains the fractured skull and broken collar-bone.

"Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two-knuckles deep into the pulley.

"Fortunately, by this time I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold tightly to the rope in spite of my pain.

"At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of bricks hit the ground--and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the bricks, the barrel now weighed approximately fifty pounds.

"I refer you again to my weight in block number eleven. As you might imagine, I began a rapid descent down the side of the building.

"In the vicinity of the third floor, I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles and the lacerations of my legs and lower body.

"The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to

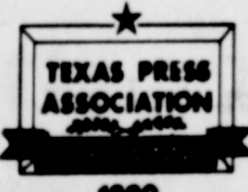

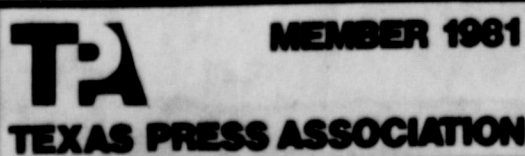

 lessen my injuries when I fell onto the pile of bricks and fortunately, only three vertebrae were cracked.  
 "I am sorry to report, however, that as I lay there on the bricks, in pain, unable to stand, and watching the empty barrel six stories above me...I again lost my presence of mind... I let go of the rope."

Dear Linda,  
 Several months ago the citizens of McLean found themselves being asked to make a decision on whether to stand in favor of or opposed to the opening of a private club near McLean. The Gray County Judge had expressed a desire to hear from the people of McLean before deciding whether or not to oppose the licensing of the club in question and he had further decided to base his decision solely on the results of a write-in opinion poll. The poll was taken and the results as reported by the Judge were heavily one sided against the

club, (approx. 250 to 19).

That could have been the end of the story and it almost was. Those desiring the license, however, questioned the results and by doing so prevented a crime from going undetected. After only a brief investigation it was learned that during the write-in poll several pieces of mail in favor of the club had been misappropriated. The actual number of letters missing was not staggering but they represented an untold number that would be impossible to determine. The number of missing letters was, however, more than enough to eliminate the possibility of coincidental loss or simple negligence on the part of the mail handler.

The area Postal Investigator was contacted and sent moderate evidence of the crime. The wheels of government turn slowly and several months later a U.S. Postal Investigator came to McLean and backed up with hard cold facts what was already known: a relatively large amount of mail had been misappropriated! Because there were several places, (1) the McLean post office, (2) the mail van to Amarillo (3) the mail van from Amarillo to Pampa, (4) the Pampa post office, (5) the

court house itself, where the crime could have been committed, because federal law does not require postal employees to undertake a polygraph test and because no evidence to merit further investigation at the court itself, the chances of finding the culprit were nil.

For now the issue of the private club is closed; the issue of this felonious crime is not. If someone has the position, the influence or the audacity to tamper with the U.S. Mail in order to sway the judgement of our County Judge, I for one am not willing to drop it. If they tampered with the mail in this case, they have a free hand to do so anytime they like, even if just to see what your grandmother had to write you about this week. I ask those of you who are quick to stand up and speak out against licensing of the club to speak out equally as quick against this misuse of our public trust.

## Letters To The Editor

As you have previously requested, this letter is to inform you of the results of my investigation into the alleged loss of mail from various residents of McLean addressed to Judge Carl Kennedy, Pampa, Texas 79065. Five residents of McLean, Texas, were personally interviewed on May 28, 1981. These individuals executed signed sworn statements relating to the fact that they were responsible for approximately 26 first-class letters, which were mailed to Judge Kennedy in favor of the private club. Personal interviews were also conducted with the appropriate postal employees of McLean and Pampa, Texas. County Judge Carl Kennedy was also personally interviewed concerning these alleged losses.

Any mail matter deposited at the McLean, Texas, Post Office is carried to Amarillo where it is processed and re-routed to Pampa for delivery. It was determined that none of the approximately 26 letters in question were ever received by Judge Kennedy, nor have any of the letters been returned to the senders. No pertinent investigative leads were disclosed during

these interviews. No determination could be made as to whether any of the letters in question were tampered with while in the custody of the U.S. Postal Service or while in the custody of the County Judge's Office.

Due to the lack of investigative leads, it is doubtful if any further attention will be given this case. If you have any further questions, please feel free to contact me by telephone at area code 806-762-7321, or by mail at P.O. Box 1919, Lubbock, Texas 79408.

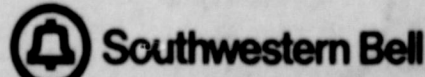

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# Rodeo, Homecoming Begin Friday

## First Performance Is Friday

Felton Webb arena north of McLean will once again come alive with the all-American sounds of rodeo, when the annual McLean 66 Roundup and Rodeo gets underway tomorrow (Friday) night at 8 p.m. A second performance of the one-around amateur rodeo is set for Saturday night, also at 8 p.m. Featured in the rodeo will be steer wrestling, bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, and calf roping. The audiences at the rodeo performances will also be treated to heading and heeling contests, girls barrel racing, kids steer wrestling, and a stick horse race for children five and under (Friday night only). Contestants will be awarded buckles for first place in each event.

Stock contractor for this year's rodeo is Bill Hext of Canadian.

Mike Darsey, president of the Roping Club, one of the sponsoring organizations of the rodeo, said that the club is also planning a ranch horse cutting contest Friday at 1 p.m. and a ranch horse race Saturday at 5 p.m.

Darsey also said that if anyone has any questions about entering the cutting horse contest or the ranch horse race, he should contact Jake Hess II who is in charge of the rodeo performances.

The club is also sponsoring a jackpot roping contest Sunday at 2 p.m. at the arena.

The McLean Lions are co-sponsoring the rodeo, handling the gate and concession stands. The "Young Country" will play Friday night and Saturday night for the rodeo dances beginning at 9 p.m. on the slab at the rodeo arena.

## Saturday's Parade Will Be Big

If early indications hold true, the McLean 66 Rodeo and Roundup Parade, scheduled for Saturday afternoon at 4 p.m., promises to be one of the biggest in recent years. Sponsored by the McLean Chamber of Commerce, but ramrodded as usual by George Terry, the parade will feature the Vernon riding club, the Khiva clowns, a wagon train from Pampa, several local floats, McLean and area horseback riders, Scout troops, and the McLean High School reunion band.

Elected officials have also indicated that they would appear in the parade. They include State Senator Bill Sarpaluis and State Representative Foster Whaley.

Those riding in the parade should meet at the north end of Main Street between 3 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. to get ready, according to Terry.

## Ex-Students Register Friday

Tomorrow (Friday) is the beginning of McLean's biennial Ex-Student Reunion, with early registration scheduled to begin at the McLean Senior Citizens at 2 p.m. Ex-Student Association president Mary Dwyer said that she thought that the ex-students would probably spend time visiting at the early registration.

Registration will begin again at 9 a.m. Saturday morning in the lobby of the McLean High School, where tickets for the barbecue dinner and information about class meetings will be available.

The exes will then go to the park to listen to local entertainers at a musical, beginning at 11 a.m. J.T. Trew is in charge of that portion of the program. Exes and their families will then have a barbecue dinner in the park, followed by a business meeting of the ex-student association for the election of officers. ## Gabel Tapped For Rodeo Honor

Greg Gabel, McLean High School graduate of 1981 has been chosen to compete in the Nестea Teenage Top Hand Challenge Rodeo. This rodeo is held in conjunction with the PRCA (Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association) and is being sponsored by Nестea and PRCA. Contestants are selected from six regions and must go through several rodeos to qualify for the national finals, held in Oklahoma City at the same time as the National finals for the PRCA.

Gabel will be competing in the first rodeo in Big Springs, June 24-27 in steer wrestling. The next rodeo he will compete in, if he qualifies, is in Austin. Then he will go on to Mesquite, if he qualifies, for an elimination rodeo, that will lead him to the finals in Oklahoma City.

## Accidents Around McLean Damage Several Vehicles

Three accidents in and around McLean resulted in injuries to one man and severe damage to several vehicles recently.

Injured in a truck accident was Paul N. Bedrosian, of Bricktown, N.J., driver of a cabover truck-tractor semi-trailer. According to investigating officer John Holland of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Bedrosian was driving the truck west on Interstate 40 when it went off the roadway on a curve about 400 feet out of town. When

Bedrosian tried to pull the vehicle back on the road, it flipped on its side and skidded approximately 200 feet before coming to rest. The force of the wreck threw Bedrosian through the windshield, but he was able to maintain his grip on the steering mechanism and was not thrown under the skidding vehicle. Damage to the truck was considered total.

Both McLean Ambulance Service and McLean Fire Department responded to the accident call. Although there was an amount of diesel

spillage, there was no fire, a fireman concentrated on directing the flow of traffic around the wreckage, according to Holland.

Bedrosian and his unidentified partner were taken to Shamrock Hospital where Bedrosian was treated for a broken collarbone. His companion was treated and released.

Trooper Holland cited Bedrosian for turning without safety.

Earlier this month another

one-vehicle accident occurred on Interstate 40 near the McClellan cutoff. John Koos of Oklahoma City was traveling east on I-40 June 8 when the left rear tire of his automobile had a blow out. Koos lost control of the car, which landed on its side in a ditch. Koos reported no injuries to himself, but the car was severely damaged.

A third accident involved two McLean residents June 7.

## Amarillo Man Drowns At Lake McClellan

A 24-year-old Amarillo man became the 16th drowning victim in the 18 year history of Lake McClellan, west of McLean. Gary Lee Waltz drowned Sunday afternoon while attempting to retrieve a 98-cent fishing float in 12 feet of water, according to witnesses at the scene.

Waltz was about 20 yards from the Lake McClellan shore when he drowned at 3:45 p.m. His body was recovered at about 5 p.m. by Parks and Wildlife Rangers Buck Williams and Dennis Thomas. The rangers cast grappling hooks from a small boat to recover the drowning victim, according to the Amarillo Daily News.

Justice of the Peace Dorothy Patterson of McLean pronounced Waltz dead at the scene.

According to the Amarillo newspaper, an eyewitness to the drowning, Randy Moczygomba of Wilson, said he heard the victim's calls for help, looked up and saw Waltz struggling, then go under.

"The victim then resurfaced but then went under for the second and final time as two men on shore attempted unsuccessfully to rescue him," Moczygomba said.

Rescue attempts were hampered by choppy waters, which were whipped by 30 to 40 mph winds, officials said.

The drowning occurred just off the south shore boat launching area, about 300 feet behind the dam.

McLean Volunteer Firemen and Ambulance Service went to the scene of the drowning to help in rescue efforts.

## City Council Discusses Dog Problem, Hears Citizen Delegation

Plans for an ordinance to limit the number of cats and dogs per household were begun by city aldermen June 9. The action came after efforts to find other means of curtailing the dog and cat population in McLean had failed. The council previously had hoped to find a way to finance a city animal shelter to help alleviate the situation, but those plans were stymied by lack of funds. Originally the council had considered doing away with the night watchman's job, using the funds ear-marked for salary to establish the shelter. That notion was dropped under heavy protest by McLean citizens who wanted the night watchman retained.

In last week's meeting a neighborhood delegation which included Martha Parker, Mr. and Mrs. J.T. Trew, and Mr. and Mrs. Archie Cooper asked the council to take action to control large animal populations at several homes in McLean. Mrs. Parker, who first spoke for the group, said that the large numbers of dogs and cats were "truly a health problem to the neighborhood and the community." Mrs. Parker also noted that a suspected rabid cat had been picked up in front of her house, and that a rabid skunk had been killed in the vicinity two weeks earlier. She added that she had heard reports that approximately 250 cats were kept by one of her neighbors.

J.T. Trew and Archie Cooper noted that the noise level of barking dogs in the area was extremely annoying to many residents. Cooper, in speaking about roving dogs in general said "Our neighbors don't know what they (the dogs) do to us."

Alderman Charles Milam who, along with Mayor Sam Haynes, had received several

complaints about both the growing animal populations and roaming dogs, said "We need a city ordinance before the problem gets any more out of hand."

Councilman George Terry suggested that the delegation contact health authorities, but Mrs. Parker rebutted that she had been told by county and state officials that the city health officer, Dr. Harold Fabian, had the power to declare a residence a health hazard. Council member Dale Glass stated that the group might circulate a petition concerning the problem and present it to Fabian, along with a formal protest. He added "We are your elected officials, and we will do our best to do what you want."

Mayor Haynes stated, "These situations are not fair to others in the community." After the lengthy discussion alderman Boyd Meador moved that the council draw up an ordinance which would limit each city residence to two cats, or two dogs, or one cat and one dog, but no more than a total of two. The motion was carried with Terry, Milam, Meador, and Miro Pagan voting in favor, and Glass and Haynes voting against. Glass noted that he couldn't place his vote for the motion, because he keeps more than two dogs at his home. He added that if the ordinance passes he will comply with it.

The ordinance, which will be written by attorney Don Lane, will be voted on twice by the city council. If the ordinance passes both times, it will then be published in the following edition of the McLean News and will become effective upon publication. If the ordinance is voted down the first time it is read, it will be eliminated.

In other business, Terry reported that street grading

had been completed near the J.D. Throckmorton home, and that sunken manholes in city streets were being repaired.

Bids on relocation of an El Paso natural gas tap regulator station were read. North American Underground of Dumas bid \$14,000 with 30 calendar days completion. B-C Construction of Borger placed a \$17,200 bid, with 45 calendar days completion. Dwight Brandt, a representative of McMorries and Burns, Inc., municipal engineering consultants of Dumas, recommended

that the council accept the low bid, which it did.

The council also directed city superintendent Bob Glenn to determine which on-hand supplies stored in city buildings were no longer of use for city repairs or maintenance, in order that obsolete items might be sold.

Council approved a plan drawn up to apply for flood control or wind erosion aid through Texas Resource Conservation and Development. The city is joined by Gray County Soil and Water Con-

servation District, and Gray County Commissioners Court in the application. Included in the McLean request is paving of the school parking lot.

A highway department maintenance agreement concerning the planned city approach areas of the new highway and the current route of Interstate 40 through the city was approved. The city's responsibilities include removing litter, mowing, and servicing the stop light.

### In The Kitchen

For the last several years the Texas Cowbells, a promotional organization made up of women interested in the beef industry, has been pushing the idea of beef for Father's Day.

In conjunction with that campaign, the group is circulating a small pamphlet called "All About Cooking Beef Outdoors." The book has several terrific recipes, including the following:

**HOT BEEF PEPPER SANDWICHES**  
2 pounds thinly sliced cooked roast beef  
2 cans (11 ounces each) condensed onion soup  
1/2 cup water  
2 medium green peppers, cut in strips  
1/2 tsp. basil leaves  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
8 to 12 Italian style or French hard rolls split

1 1/2 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
1 small onion  
1/2 cup Russian dressing  
1/4 cup horseradish mustard  
6 hot dog buns (toasted if desired)

Lightly combine ground beef, cheese, salt, and pepper; divide into 6 equal portions and mold into rolls the shape of frankfurters. Place on grill and broil at moderate temperature 20 to 30 minutes, to desired doneness, turning occasionally. Combine onion, russian dressing and horseradish mustard in small sauce pan and cook on grill 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Serve beef and cheese rolls on hot dog buns. Serve with sauce. 6 servings.

Combine onion soup, water, green pepper, basil and pepper in large saucepan or frying pan and simmer 15 minutes. Add meat and continue cooking, covered, 10 to 15 minutes. To serve, dip cut surfaces of rolls in cooking liquid. Serve hot beef and green pepper strips between roll halves. 8 to 12 servings.

### SBA Announces Loan Deadline

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FHA), Harold Sherrill, county supervisor said today.

Mr. Sherrill asked that those who need farm credit as a result of adverse weather conditions make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office in Clarendon.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken county will be accepted by Farmers Home until July 20, 1981, for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings lost through this disaster.

Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming (or ranching or aquaculture) operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Mr. Sherrill said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

## Medal Of Honor Winner Named TPA's Texan Of The Year

### McLean Girls Win Honors

Five McLean girls attended the Wayland Baptist Flying Queens annual basketball camp in Plainview June 7 through June 13, with two girls bringing home honors. Jem Ann Rice was named to

the All-Star team in the junior division, and Lee Ann Tate was named best hustler in the senior division.

Others attending the camp were Wendy McDowell, Patricia Rodgers, and Melanie Billingsley.

Texas-forever proud of its heroes of the glorious past-lacks not in present-day heroes, among whom is Master Sergeant Roy P. Benavidez (Ret.) of El Campo who performed some of the most spectacular acts of bravery under fire in the Vietnam War.

For his heroism he received the nation's highest honor for personal valor, The Medal of Honor, presented by President Reagan earlier this year.

The Texas Press Association will present to him, with gratitude and pride, its most prestigious honor, the Texan of the Year Award, during special ceremonies at the association's 102nd. summer convention June 26 in Fort Worth.

Sergeant Benavidez will be the 12th Texan in the association's long history to be so honored.

Benavidez will be accompanied to Fort Worth for the June 26 event by his wife, Lala, and their three children, Denise 14, Yvette 11, and Noel, 8.

Participating in the ceremony will be TPA past president, Fred Barbee, publisher

of the El Campo Leader-News, and TPA's current president, James Roberts, publisher of the Andrews County News in Andrews.

Over 400 Texas publishers, families and guests will be on hand for the red, white, and blue event at the Cowtown's new Hyatt Regency Hotel.

Benavidez, though retired after spending 22 years in the U.S. Army, is now spending most of his time talking to youth groups and schools, promoting pride in this nation and trying to rekindle "good, old-fashioned patriotism."

Benavidez has never lacked this particular patriotism, as ribbon upon ribbon on his uniform attest.

The act directly responsible for his receiving The Medal of Honor was his remarkable courage, physical stamina, and selfless determination to save a 12-man Special Forces Reconnaissance Team, all of which had been caught in ambush on a jungle battlefield in 1968 in South Vietnam. Benavidez was with the 5th Special Forces (Green Berets) Group. He alone volunteered

to try for what seemed to be an impossible rescue--and was wounded again and again, but managed to pull at least eight of his comrades, some also wounded, from enemy fire and get them into a second pickup aircraft which flew them to safety. The first helicopter, directed to the area by Benavidez, had been shot down by the enemy.

Most Medal of Honor are given in the field or immediately thereafter. But in the after-math of Benavidez' actions, he was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the Army's second highest decoration.

However, a number of years later, when buddies--and Publisher Barbee--recalled his special heroism, they pushed for the highest. It took a few months, but when buddy after buddy stepped forward to hail Benavidez as their lifesaver under the most dangerous circumstances, Reagan, in an emotional presentation earlier this year, presented him The Medal of Honor. The

President broke precedent in recounting the entire saga of his jungle heroism and read the complete Medal of Honor citation.

Subsequently, Benavidez was honored by both houses of the Texas Legislature and

Governor Clements declared a "Roy Benavidez Day."

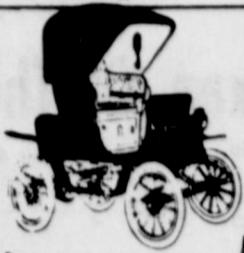

**Astronaut stress**

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — America's Columbia space shuttle succeeded, but as future space flights become more routine and prolonged, more problems in psychological adjustment can be expected, says a University of Texas psychologist.  
Dr. Robert Heimreich says stress may arise from the mixture aboard space shuttles of highly trained flight crews and scientists without flight experience.  
Also, the reward of world adulation enjoyed by early astronauts will diminish for future space crews—but the high risks won't, he says.  
For future flights, he suggests NASA seek persons with non-competitive personalities, who find satisfaction in work for their own sake and who have concern for other people.

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## Notes From Your County Agricultural Agent

by Joe Van Zandt

### REDUCE WATERING

You can reduce the use of water in your home garden and landscape by using the following tips.

1. Mulch to conserve water. A mulch is anything which covers the ground around plants and between rows. Mulching conserves moisture in the soil by reducing the rate of evaporation. Mulch also greatly reduces the presence of weeds, which compete with your plants for precious water and nutrients.

Many organic materials may be used as mulches, such as grass clippings (let the grass dry a bit before applying to the garden), straw, hay, partially decomposed leaves or compost.

Plastic mulch also works well, is easy to use and prevents surface evaporation. Plastic mulch, when applied in the spring, keeps soil warmer and gives summer crops like tomatoes and peppers a faster start.

Try to put the mulches when the soil is moist, even if you're not ready to plant. You can easily push back organic mulch at planting time, or cut slits or holes in plastic mulch. Ground mulched when dry is apt to stay dry if rain is sparse.

2. Grow cool-weather crops. In many areas, rainfall is heaviest in spring and fall. Ground water evaporates more slowly in cool weather, too, so take full advantage of spring, and fall growing season for crops that like cool conditions; beets, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, collards, kale, kohlrabi, lettuce, mustard greens, onions, peas, spinach, Swiss chard and turnips. Plant these crops early in spring so they finish production before hot summer. For fall crops,

sow in summer as recommended on seed packets, but keep the seed bed constantly moist for good germination.

3. Plant summer crops early. Transplant your indoor-started tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants—and direct-sow beans, cucumbers and squash—a little earlier than usual to encourage bearing before sizzling temperatures arrive. If unusually late spring frost threatens, cover the young plants at night with hotcaps, inverted plastic milk jugs or other protective devices. Remove covers in the morning.

4. Use shade to advantage. Moisture evaporates more slowly in shaded soil than in sun. Leafy vegetables such as cabbage, lettuce, spinach, and Swiss chard do well in partial (not complete) shade—that is, areas which receive full sun for only part of the day. Basil, mint, parsley and tarragon are a few herbs which thrive in partial shade. But fruiting vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers, and vine crops need full sun for satisfactory production.

5. Space plants closely. Space plants and rows so maturing plants just overlap. This will shade the ground to reduce moisture loss and weed competition. If you use a mechanical cultivator, you may need to switch to hand cultivation in narrower rows.

6. Harvest young. Pick your vegetables when they are at their prime—don't let them overripen. Picking reduces moisture requirements of plants and encourages continued production.

7. Weed regularly. Weeds compete with vegetables and flowers for every drop of water—and often the stronger,

deep-rooted weeds win the competition! Remove weeds as soon as they show themselves in your garden. Some weeds, like purslane, lamb's quarter and chickweed, may be eaten if picked young.

8. Water deeply, not often. Water in the evening or early morning. Use special soil-soaking hoses which allow water to drip slowly into the ground, and place hoses close to plants. Or set your garden hose, nozzle removed, directly on the ground to irrigate one part of your garden at a time. Let water run slowly for as long as necessary to soak deeply into the soil. A deep soaking is needed only every 7 to 10 days unless your plants show signs of wilting from insufficient moisture. Remember that oscillating-type lawn sprinklers, if used, throw water where you may not need it and allow much more evaporation than other watering methods. Sprinklers also cause salt burn on leaves when the water gets on the leaves during the hot summer sun.

9. Provide windbreaks. Strong or constant winds speed up evaporation. If your garden is fairly small, it may be possible to set up a temporary windbreak using fencing materials, cast-off construction materials or even worn-out bedsheets strung from posts. Just be sure windbreaks do not shade plants that need full sun.

10. Save water—literally. If possible, route your roof gutters and downspouts into barrels to save every drop of rainwater for your vegetables and fruits.
