

Do You Need A Prize?

Voters across the United States seem to get more apathetic with each election. The situation has gotten so bad that one man in California has come up with a scheme to give voters prizes for voting! The idea is that those who vote will be given a stubbed ticket which will entitle them to a drawing where very expensive prizes will be given away

It is a shame and a disgrace to think that American citizens care so little that they would have to be bribed to go to the polls. But Texas officials are predicting that eight percent of the registered voters in Texas will vote in the runoff election Saturday. When you figure that less than 60 percent of all qualified voters have even bothered to register to vote, the number of people who will actually choose the Democratic nominees becomes incredibly small.

Why won't you take the ten minutes necessary to stop by the school cafeteria Saturday and cast your ballot? You don't want to dress up and come to town? Come on in your grungy clothes...the election officials won't tell anyone. You don't know who to vote for? 

The single largest impediment to economic recovery is the stubbornly high level of interest rates. Nowhere is this problem more serious than in the housing industry.

High interest rates make monthly payments for houses far above the reach of most families, particularly those buying their first home. When existing houses aren't selling, new ones aren't built. The problem is made worse by the high interest rates that contractors must pay for short-term financing for construction. These rates affect both the contractor's ability to begin new houses and the ultimate price he must charge.

All of this means that people who want to purchase new houses, and have income levels that ought to allow them to do so, can't. People who need to sell their houses can't.

But the consequences of this situation go beyond the problems of those trying to buy or sell houses. The housing industry has a tremendous impact on the economy as a whole. Many contruction jobs have been lost, as have jobs in a whole range of industries that are related.

Appliances, timber, textiles, furniture and building materials industries are heavily dependent on a healthy home construction industry. Unemployment in these industries is high, and likely will not improve substantially until the housing industry begins to recover.

The Administration has embarked on a sound economic recovery program. If Congress will act on the program to cut the size and scope of government, control the size of the deficit, and generally bring order to the way government does business, interest rates will come down.

However, in the meantime we need to act to help the housing industry begin to recover.

The Senate soon will consider legislation to subsidize mortgage rates temporarily for buyers of newly built homes. The government would do this by "buying down" the interest rate by four points. For example, if the mortgage interest rate was 151/2 percent, the government would buy down the mortgage to a level of 111/2 percent. This could make a difference of hundreds of dollars in the size of the monthly payment. And it is the monthly payment which determines whether a family is eligible for a mortgage.

Those who qualify for the subsidy eventually would repay the money to the government. But this program would mean that they can purchase a house now. When their financial situation improves, or when mortgage rates decline, they will be able to repay the government.

This is a reasonable and prudent manner in which to speed the economic recovery of the housing industry, related businesses, and the economy as a whole

This legislation has been approved in the Banking Committee and the Appropriations Committee in the Senate, and I would expect the full Senate to consider it in the near future. The House has passed similar legislation, with differences that would be worked out in a Conference Committee after Senate passage.

HICCUPS

Almost everyone has experienced hiccups, the result of sudden bursts of activity of the diaphram and the muscles responsible for inhaling and exhaling air. Hiccups are annoying, but when they continue for a long period of time, represent a major health hazard. They can become fatiguing and prevent sleep.

What can be done to stop hiccups? A number of unproven measures have been recommended. These include holding your breath, standing on your head, drinking from the "wrong side" of a cup, taking nine sips of water, (to "drown" the hiccups), and breathing into a paper bag. There are others and you may have your own 'special" approach to stopping hiccups.

Very few scientific studies have been carried out in order to determine the cause of hiccups and the relative value of different forms of care. During the 1970's, researchers concluded that hiccups can result from disorders of the stomach and intestine, from brain lesions following surgery and with use of certain drugs. We also know that hiccups occur for reasons that are not apparent.

One scientific investigation did conclude that individuals swallowing one teaspoon of white granulated sugar often experience sensations of hiccups. Other studies show varying degrees of success with carbon dioxide gas and drugs such as quinidine and chlorpromazine.



Price Decontrol Boosts Stripper Oil Production

One very positive effect of the accelerated decontrol of crude oil prices last year was the best-ever year for drilling, nationally as well as in Texas. A less-publicized, but also very positive effect, was a tremendous increase in stripper well production.

According to premilinary figures from the National Stripper Well Association, output from wells which produce 10 barrels or less of oil per day totaled about 420-million barrels. That represents an increase of some 10-million barrels (4.7-percent) over 1980 production from stripper wells.

In Texas, the increase was even more dramatic. Last year's production of 156.9 million barrels, a 15-million barrel jump over the 1980 level, represented a 10.6-percent increase.

Also increasing dramatically was the number of stripper wells active last year in the state: 114,788 wells. That number is up 11,194 from the 1980 total of 103,594 and represents a 10.8-percent increase.

Those figures are good news for the petroleum industry in Texas. Last year, the state witnessed the phenomenon of many drilling projects which were specifically designed to bring stripper wells into production. More wells drilled and more wells producing means additional work for service and supply companies, further strengthening the state economy

The value of this production — using a prelimi-nary statewide average figure of approximately \$34.58 per barrel for crude oil and condensate amounted to more than \$5.4-billion. Additionally, the severance tax paid to state government — at the rate of 4.6-percent of wellhead value — was more than \$249.6-million from these producers, often re-ferred to as marginal wells.

Obviously, the benefits for Texas from a healthy petroleum industry are widespread. Decontrol of crude oil has allowed stripper well production to play an even more significant part in the industry's continuing contribution to economic well-being here.

These figres also mean that Texas - the nation's No. 1 crude oil and condensate producing state last year with 928,710,351 barrels — realized 16.9-percent of its production from wells averaging 3.7-barrels per day. Certainly the search must go on for big reservoirs all the way up to major fields with ulti-mate recoverable reserves of 100-million barrels or more. In this time of big budget deficits and funding cutbacks, Americans have to call on their creativity and ingenuity to solve some of this country's problems.

Turning to the federal government for help in solving every problem just isn't possible if we are going to reduce federal spending

One of the most troubling problems this nation faces now is rising unemployment. There are more than 10 million men and women looking for work without success.

Yet oddly enough, we also are on the verge of a critical shortage of technically skilled workers.

Department of Labor projections indicate that in this decade, the United States will have 2.5 million jobs left unfilled because applicants will not have the skills to qualify. Each year between now and 1990, we can expect to have a shortage of 57,500 industrial machinery repairmen, 28,000 computer operators, 21,300 machinists and 19,000 licensed practical nurses.

The obvious thing to do is train the unemployed to fill the jobs. However, a third problem arises.

Our educational system is not equipped to handle this demand. Vocational and technical programs already are suffering from faculty shortages and outdated equipment.

In the worst recession since World War II, our need for graduate engineers continues to outpace supply. Yet, colleges and universities report from 2,000 to 2,500 vacancies in engineering faculty. Of more than 200 training facilities surveyed by the American Vocational Association, 44 percent of the technical programs and 52 percent of the technical and industrial programs were using tools and equipment that is more than 10 years old.

This presents a gloomy picture. In time, I believe the free market process would resolve the situation, but I don't think we can afford to wait. With the right incentives, I think that business and education could pool their resources to solve these problems more rapidly.

I have introduced a package of three bills, the Bentsen Skilled Worker Training Proposal, which will provide the incentive to reduce these anticipated skills shortages without a big federal spending program.

Under my plan, business and industry would receive expanded tax credits for lending engineers to teach at colleges and universities and for making grants so these schools can hire more faculty. Tax credits also would be given to employers who encourage their workers to participate in skills training programs.

Tax deductions would be expanded for businesses that donate or share modern equipment with schools and colleges. One suggestion would be for businesses to allow students to train, outside of regular office hours, in the business facility on up-to-date equipment.

No big new federal programs or training facilities would have to be started under this proposal.

This plan would simply encourage schools and businesses to work together to overcome their problems, while at the same time making it possible for millions of Americans to compete for high paying skilled jobs.

In addition, if any off odors or color are evident, throw the product out. Never serve spoiled products to be just as dangerous to them as to yourself.

As an extra safety precaution, the USDA recommends that all home-canned low acid products be boiled for 10 to 15 minutes over a range unit before serving. Foods most often involved in botulism poisoning are corn, spinach, green beans, peppers, and asparagus. Heat during boiling will destroy the clostridium botulinum toxin which may be formed if canning failed. Therefore, USDA does not recommend microwave cooking of home canned vegetables. It is difficult to know when the entire mass of the product has reached it boiling point in the microwave oven in order to begin
