### VOLUNTARY REGISTRY

AUSTIN - Adoption records in Texas are sealed under current law. The only way an adopted person can legally obtain identifying information about his or her biological parents is through a court order.


There are hundreds of requests made daily from persons wishing to obtain information about their biological parents or about their siblings. Even though there are search groups who try to match birth parents and children who want to obtain contact, there is no state registry which would open the records, even if there is consent by all parties involved. Brothers and sisters separated after being adopted by different families cannot, under current law, obtain identifying information about one another unless a petition is filed in district court and a judge, using his own discretion, decides to release the identifying information to the petitioner.

Adoption records in Texas currently cannot be opened unless a judge grants a petitioner's request. The process is often lengthy and costly. We are sponsoring legislation in the Texas State that would provide for a voluntary registry of biological parents and adoptive children and their pre-adoptive siblings. The purpose of the legislation is to establish a strictly voluntary registry through which adoptees, birth parents and adoptive siblings who wish to do so may locate each other. The bill does not include the parents who adopted the child. Each person looking for the others must register and must be a minimum of 21 years of age. The registry would respect the rights of all members of the adoption circle, including those who wish to maintain their privacy.

## In The Kitchen

Although beef is one of my favorite foods, I always like to find a good recipe for chicken to add a little variety to our menus at home. The following two dishes are delicious, and just a little different from the ordinary.

**Skillet Company Chicken**  
3 whole chicken breasts, skinned and split salt and pepper  
1/4 cup butter  
4 green onions, chopped

1 medium green pepper, chopped  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced  
1 (12 oz.) can or 1 1/2 cups Seven-Up  
1/4 teaspoon rosemary, crushed

1 (8 oz.) carton commercial sour cream  
paprika  
hot cooked rice

Sprinkle chicken with salt and pepper. Melt butter in a large skillet over medium heat; add the chicken, and saute until browned. Remove chicken, and set aside. Add vegetables to pan drippings; cook until tender. Add Seven-Up and rosemary. Return chicken to skillet; cover and cook over low heat 20 to 30 minutes or until tender. Remove chicken to serving platter; keep warm. Add sour cream to vegetable mixture, if desired. Cook over low heat, stirring, until thoroughly heated (do not boil). Spoon mixture over chicken; then sprinkle with paprika, and serve with rice.

**Cheese Chicken Rolls**  
1 tablespoon minced onion  
1 teaspoon minced green pepper  
1 tablespoon butter, melted

1 (5 oz.) can chicken, drained  
1 1/2 cups (6 oz.) shredded sharp Cheddar cheese, divided  
1/2 cup commercial sour cream  
1 tsp. hot sauce  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 (10 oz.) can butter-milk biscuits  
1 (10 3/4 oz.) can cream of chicken soup, undiluted  
2/3 cup milk  
Saute onion and green pepper in butter in a medium skillet until tender. Drain, if necessary. Stir in chicken, 1 cup cheese, sour cream, hot sauce, and pepper.

Roll each biscuit to 1/4 to 1/8 inch thickness; spread each biscuit with about 2 tablespoons chicken mixture. Roll up biscuits, jellyroll fashion, pinching edges to seal.

Place rolls in a lightly greased 10x6x2 inch baking dish. Bake at 450 for 10 to 12 minutes. Combine soup and milk in a medium saucepan; mix well and cook until thoroughly heated. Pour soup mixture over roll-ups; sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup cheese. Bake at 450 degrees for 2 to 3 minutes or until cheese melts.

## McLean City Council Approves Sammons Communications Disaster Alert System At Called Session March 22

McLean may have a disaster alert system soon, according to Mayor Sam Haynes. Haynes and the McLean city council met March 22

with John Mason, of Sammons Communications, to approve a proposal by the cable television company to equip the present cable services

with a warning system. According to Haynes, when the system is installed, it would then be possible to alert citizens of potential danger from

severe weather or other disasters by broadcasting a warning on all stations on the cable system. Installation of the warning device is scheduled for

April, according to Mason.

Councilmen also decided to have the engineering firm, McMorris and Associates, to draw up specification for street repairs, and to ask for bids for the work.

Bill Thomas, president of McLean Area Ambulance Association, asked the council for permission to use the two east rooms of the city hall for vehicle storage for the ambulance association. The council asked Thomas to prepare a list of require-

ments for remodeling the space for ambulance use, although they tentatively approved use of the building for that purpose. In the called meeting, councilmen approved the 1981-1982 audit report, prepared by Wayne Brown of Pampa.

## Special Good Friday Service Planned At Methodist Church





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COMMUNITY PROFILE - Mayor Sam Haynes Retires From City Leadership After 10 Years At City Hall

 "I think the people in McLean are the best people in the world. Everyone seems to want to do the best they can for the community, and in times of need, they are always there to help their neighbors," said Sam Haynes, who will step down this month after ten years of service as McLean's mayor.  
 Mayor Haynes has long been known for service to his community, and his many friends and admirers are quick to admit that he is among the most hard-working of those who are "always there."

He first began his mayoral duties in 1973, and has run unopposed in every election since that time. "That first race was really close," recalled Haynes. "I ran against Boyd Meador, who was an excellent and dedicated public servant. I was honestly surprised that I won, but the votes showed that I hadn't won everybody over. I think I squeaked by with four votes over Boyd."

Now, after ten years, Mayor Haynes, has decided not to run for reelection. "A lot of things went into my decision," Haynes explained. "But mainly I just wanted to spend more time with my family. Our youngest girl, Dollie, will be in the seventh grade next year, and I know that with all the school activities she will be involved in, and that I will want to attend, I just wouldn't have enough time to give to the job of mayor."

Haynes and his wife Linda have six children, Thacker Haynes, of McLean; Jenny Evans of Lubbock; Kathy Carter, of McLean; Scott Raines, of McLean; Sally Haynes, of Lubbock; and Dollie, of the home. They also have "six and a half" grandchildren, Chris and Jackie Evans, J.T. Haynes, Kristina and Charlie Carter, and Sasha Raines. Daughter-in-law Evelyn Raines is expecting a new addition to the grandchild count in June.

Haynes has indeed been the master of time-juggling since he moved to McLean in 1944. As a member of the McLean Tigers he was first-string quarterback, and also participated in basketball, track and softball. "Those were really fun times," Haynes laughed. "I couldn't have weighed 100 pounds soaking wet. I may have been the skinniest athlete McLean ever had." Skinny or not, Haynes was named best all-around athlete in 1947, his senior year.

After three semesters at the University of Oklahoma, Haynes returned to McLean to work with his family on the Triangle Ranch north of McLean. With his return, his service to the community began.

Haynes has taught Sunday School for over 30 years at the United Methodist Church here. He also has been a member of McLean Lions Club, with perfect attendance, for more than 25 years. In that time, he has served several terms as lay leader for his church, and has served as district Lions club secretary. He also served 12 years on the McLean school board.

"I've always enjoyed public life," Haynes commented. "And felt that I could make a contribution to the welfare of the community. I guess I'm proudest of our new city gas system, which has enabled us to quit losing money on our gas, and to build up a reserve of payments so that we may be able to pay for the system ahead of time. I'm also very pleased that the council has set aside \$1000 a year out of revenue sharing funds to buy something for the

city park. I've always felt that our McLean youth were our most important investment, and whatever we can do for them is a great help to our community.

"I think the most frustrating difficulty I've dealt with as mayor has been trying to maintain the basic needs of our citizens on the limited budget the city must use. Yet even with our limited financial base, I think we've been able to do a bit more than other towns our size."

When asked what he thinks are the biggest problems facing McLean, Haynes responded, "I hope that the city will be able to avail itself of the opportunities presented by the new highway, and that the factory building can be used to help McLean grow. Another major problem is the paving and repairing of McLean's streets, which are in dire need of attention. Hiring a full-time city marshal who could enforce city ordinances would also be a major advantage for McLean. Of course, all this takes a lot of money, which the City simply does not have at this time."

In addition to his other public service duties, Mayor Haynes has served on the Panhandle Regional Planning Committee, serving as its chairman in 1976. The same year he also was president of the Region II Texas Municipal League, which serves 27 counties in the panhandle of Texas.

Presently Haynes is chairman of the council on ministries at the United Methodist Church, and teaches the Builders Sunday School class. He is a member of the Hillcrest Cemetery

Association, and is on the board of McLean's Lovett Memorial Library. He also coaches T-Ball to youngsters during the summer.

One of his most satisfying jobs was as the "Voice of the Tigers", announcer at the McLean Tiger home football games. "Football has always been one of my favorite sports," he said. "And it was a great honor to be able to announce the games for the boys." Apparently his affection for the McLean

Tigers was not one-sided, as evidenced by a large floral arrangement sent him by the football team during Haynes' stay in the hospital a few years ago. "Get well soon," read the card. "We miss the 'Voice of the Tigers.'"

McLean residents will have a chance to show their appreciation to Mayor Haynes Saturday night. A reception, hosted by friends, will be at the Lions Club Building from 7 p.m. until 9 p.m.

tain their legal rights to privacy. It merely establishes a lawful process for those who want to make contact, meet and share identifying information.

Contact would be made through the registry only if all parties involved gave mutual consent. Counseling sessions would be required before a contact was allowed to provide the person registering an opportunity to explore the short and long term ramifications of the contact. It is also necessary to conclude what information is really being sought and whether the registry is the best process to provide such information.

The establishment of a voluntary, mutual consent registry law for the State of Texas represents a compromise position that addresses the needs of advocates of the open records, while at the same time preserves the privacy rights of the other members of the adoption circle. If mutual consenting adults want to exchange identifying information and meet, a registry law will give them a legal, professional process to use for meeting their needs.
