The Honorable Bill Sarpalius, state senator from the 31st district, will be the main speaker at the annual McLean High

Sarpalius, who is serving his second term as senator from the area, is a former teacher. He was

reared at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, and later became a staff member and teacher there. In

high school he served as State President of the Future Farmers of America. He has earned both Bachelor and Master degrees in Agriculture from Texas Tech University and West Texas State University. As a freshman legislator, he introduced 30 bills, and 21 became laws. He has been the main force behind legislation in the state against drunk drivers.

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HB 246 Will Have Impact

McLean School Board Discusses Effects Of Legislation On Local School System

"This legislation will have an impact on the school system for the next 25 years," superintendent Jim Rutherford told the McLean School board Monday night, concerning HB 246. The new law, which was passed in the last legislative session, is slated to go into effect September of 1984. The law raises graduation requirements from 18 credits to 20, and lists subjects in three groups. The subjects in group 1 will be required for every student to take. The problem will come with the Group II subjects, Rutherford said.

Every school will be required to offer every subject in Group II every year, he said. McLean schools now offer most of the subjects, with many of them offered on alternating years.

"We will probably have to add four staff members in our school," he said. "The curriculum design is great - it's perfect," he said. "It's just what ever school would like to have, but the problem is that the legislature did not appropriate any money to fund the requirements."

Rutherford said "Co-opting with other schools may be our only salvation to the increased demands." He explained to the board that superintendents across the state hope that the legislature will either give the schools more time to find ways to implement the law or will appropriate enough money to fund the new requirements.

"The state brags that they have gone 14 years without a tax increase, but the local districts have carried the burden of funding and have had to raise taxes on a steady basis," he said. "It's time for the state to assume its responsibilities."

McLean School trustees discussed a variety of problems at the regular monthly board meeting Monday night in the superintendent's office, and heard some good news. Tax collections are now at 98.34 percent for the year. "That's an exceptional rate," board president Lloyd Hunt said. "Most schools don't do nearly that well."

The board received a delinquent tax payment of \$17,946.68 from Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. The payment represented a 90 percent settlement on the amount of taxes the railroad owed from 1975 through 1982.

Mayor George Terry met with the board to assure the members of the City's continued cooperation with the school, and to thank the board for granting the City an easement in the south part of town.

The school board renewed service contracts with the Region SVI Education Service Center for the same services as in previous years, with the exception of the library aid service. Superintendent Jim Rutherford said that he recommended that the board wait until more information was a-

available about funding before that contract was approved.

The board accepted a bid from School Specialties for 100 cases of paper for \$2260.

The board approved 37 transfer students for next year's school term.

A budget amendment showing an increase of revenue from \$1,047,193 to \$1,154,155, and an increase in expenditures from \$1,033,756 to \$1,084,856 was approved by the board.

Resignations were accepted from Cecil Reynolds, who has taught

math here for the last 10 years, and from Carol Abigt, a bus driver. The board voted to ask Pat Washburn to repay \$50 of his pay for two days of personal leave which he took earlier in the year. Washburn had resigned from the system earlier.

Rutherford also told the board that he had sent samples from the covering on the pipe and from the ceiling tile in the elementary building for analysis. He explained that the school had until June 15 to get asbestos checked. The state now requires that any surface

containing asbestos be covered or removed.

He also told the board that one of the new buses had broken down. The bus had 18,000 miles on it. He said that he was still working with the company to get the bus properly repaired.

Graduation Night Can Mean Highway Carnage

Each year, as high school prom time approaches, my thoughts turn to the carnage that occurs on our highways when young people drink and drive. How many youngsters, I wonder, kids who even now are preparing eagerly for the festivities of the graduation season, will be cut down in smoking tangles of steel and shattered glass in the days and weeks ahead?

The imagery isn't pretty, but it's real. And no one can say, "It won't happen to my child." In fact, it does happen, with depressing regularity. It happens to some 10,000 young people between the ages of 15 and 24 each year. Alcohol-related traffic fatalities are, far and away, the leading cause of death for this, otherwise, extraordinarily healthy age group.

As I noted in this column a few months ago, preventing teenage alcohol abuse is a challenge that faces our entire Nation. I applaud state and local governments across the country for the actions that they are taking to deal with the drinking-and-driving problem. States and communities are enforcing their drunk driving laws more strictly; many state legislatures have raised the legal drinking age to 21.

I also applaud the many student and parent groups who, today, are giving meaningful expression to their concern about drinking and driving. In Wayland, Massachusetts, for example, a group called Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD) started a program to prevent that kind of destructive behavior by their peers. This program model now has spread across Massachusetts, and into many

other areas of the country. Parent groups, such as Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) and Remove Intoxicated Drivers (RID), also are spreading.

Still, a recent survey of high school seniors found that they do a good deal of their drinking in cars. Fifty percent said they drink in cars at least some of the time, and 24 percent indicated that most of their drinking is done in cars. The opportunities for tragedy in this combination of alcohol and automobiles are great. The risks multiply on special occasions, such as prom night. Meant to be the happiest of evenings, prom nights too often turn into nightmares, for youngsters, their parents and the community.

Last month, at the national Conference for Youth on Drinking and Driving, sponsored by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, we learned about "Project Graduation," a most impressive effort by people in the state of Maine to keep graduation week fatality-free. For years, Maine's school and law-enforcement officials had approached prom time with foreboding. Then, in 1979, just two weeks before graduation, seven alcohol-related fatalities occurred in just one area of the state. Saddened and outraged, state and local leaders decided to put an end to this needless carnage.

The Drug and Alcohol Team of Oxford Hill, Maine, got things started by conducting a number of community awareness activities, culminating in a popular alcohol-and drug-free party for the seniors in 1980. Commenting on the success of that first

party, one law-enforcement official observed that "graduation night was quieter than an ordinary night on patrol in the community."

By 1982, the entire state of Maine was involved. School districts across Maine reported successful "chemical-free" graduation parties, some held on cruise boats, some in dance halls with live bands, some at state parks and camp grounds. "Project Graduation" received crucial media support from Maine's four television and 30 radio stations, too, beginning in April and running until after commencement.

The philosophy behind "Project Graduation" is that students can enjoy graduation without alcohol or drugs if they have alternative activities that are stimulating and pleasurable. More than just a good party, however, this unique success story also required strong citizen motivation, public awareness and firm community supervision.

There may still be time for your community to organize a "Project Graduation" for this spring. I hope there is, if you don't have one already. And while you're at it, look ahead and begin to plan an even better alcohol-and drug-free event for the 1984 graduating class. The grim statistics of alcohol-related traffic fatalities leave no room for complacency. Let's, each of us, take a personal interest in the well-being of our youngsters at prom and graduation time. Let's make every graduation season, from prom night through graduation, a period of joy and celebration, not mourning and regret.

LEMON LAWS

AUSTIN - We have heard complaints from automobile owners in the Panhandle who have been the unfortunate possessors of a lemon car or truck. We have also heard testimony at the state capitol from people who are frustrated with the lack of consumer protection in this state in regard to lemon automobiles.

One automobile owner recently testified at the state capitol that her 1978 stationwagon had been in for repairs 54 times without ever being properly repaired. The repairs on that one automobile ranged from three rebuilt engines, to numerous transmission repairs and a series of fuel line adjustments.

The cases involving lemon automobiles in Texas are many. Texans invest a lot of money in the automobile industry. In fact, Texas ranks in the top five in the nation in the number of car buyers. We have a problem with lemon automobiles here, and the Texas Senate has decided to take action which will better protect the automobile consumers in Texas.

The Texas Senate has voted to make automobile dealers and manufacturers liable for cars and trucks that turn out to be lemons. Under this new legislation, if the manufacturer or distributor is unable to make repairs to conform the vehicle to the express warranty after a reasonable

number of attempts, the manufacturer or distributor must replace the vehicle with a comparable one, or accept return of the vehicle, and refund to the owner the full purchase price, less a reasonable allowance for owner use. Senate Bill 1141 will require dealers and manufacturers to replace a vehicle or to refund the price of the automobile, if the vehicle has been in for repairs four times during the warranty period, or if it had been out of service for 30 or more business days during that time.

Under this Bill, dissatisfied owners would have to complain to the Texas Motor Vehicle Commission about an alleged failure to make satisfactory repairs to the vehicle under terms of the warranty. The Commission would then review the case and determine if the manufacturer should be ordered to furnish the customer with a new automobile or a refund.

The recently approved lemon law passed by the Texas Senate means there will be new regulation of manufacturers and sellers of new motor vehicles and new protection for the purchaser of a new motor vehicle.

High school seniors from the area who plan to attend college are invited to attend the annual event given by the Pampa Panhellenic Council.


The program will include a skit by college

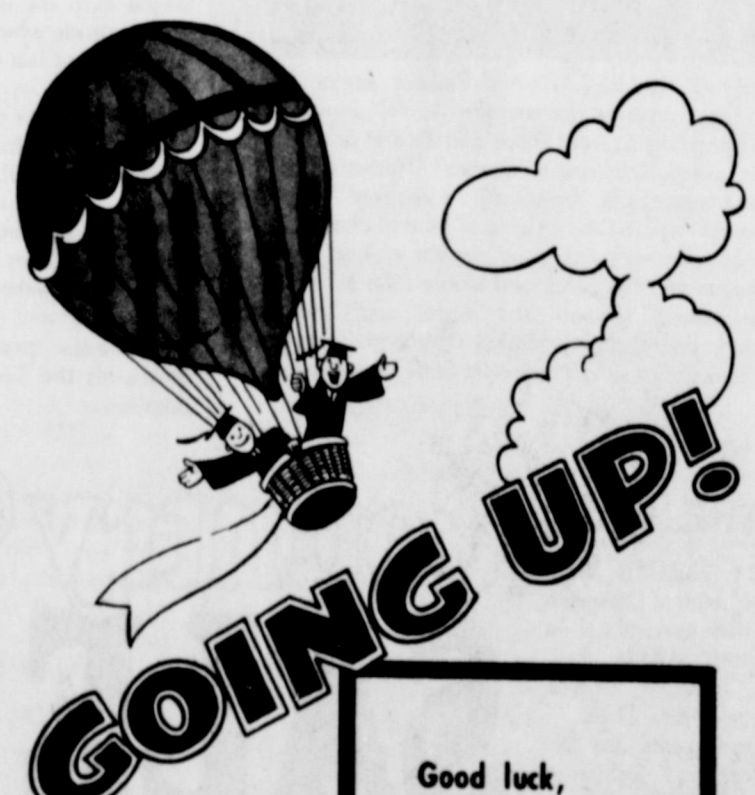

- 3/4 c. brown sugar
- water
- cinammon
- pecans

Grease a bundt pan. Sprinkle chopped pecans on the bottom. Place frozen rolls on top of pecans. Sprinkle rolls with 1/2 pkg. butterscotch pudding, and with cinammon. Melt oleo and brown sugar. Add e-

nough water so butter/sugar mixture will pour easily. Drizzle over rolls. Cover pan with a cup towel, and leave out on counter over night. In the morning, bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.
