### from the distaff side

The greeting card manufacturers and the calendar makers have declared Sunday as Father's Day. One cue, and at the given signal, we are all supposed to spend that day telling Father just how much we love him.

The preacher will use Father's Day for the test of his sermon, the church

congregations will sing "Faith of our Fathers". Ma Bell will make a million dollars on long distance calls from dutiful children to equally dutiful fathers.

But what about those of us who are fatherless? There must be millions of use out there - those who have lost a father because of death or divorce or desertion.

Do the Hallmark people have an appropriate card for us? Do the commercial writers imagine our pain when they show loving children gathered around a laughing, living father? At least on Mother's

Day, I can wear a white rose, and my friends know that my mother is dead.

But there is no symbolism to show that my father has been dead for many years.

Although he has been gone more than half my life, his teachings live with me everyday.

Too many fathers are absentee parents, flitting on the edges of the lives of their children, but not my dad. Perhaps it was because he was ill most of his life, and unable to play golf, or fish, or hunt. Or perhaps it was because his own mortality was painfully evident to

him everyday. Whatever the reason, he was the central figure of my childhood.

Cursed by a failing heart and a traitorously weak body, he compensated by constantly seeking knowledge and wisdom. He was the most curious person I have ever known. He wanted to know everything about everything. He devoured every piece of information he came close to.

As a teacher, he inspired his students with his courage, his keen wit, his caring.

As a father, he pushed and prodded and demanded excellence. But I

never doubted that he loved me. He gave me the most important gift a parent can give a child - the security of knowing that I was completely and totally loved.

Because he was a teacher and because of the tremendous financial demands of his illness, he never accumulated any material possessions. He loved to tell us children: "I'm doing you a great favor - I'm not leaving you anything to fight over."

And he didn't - an old car, his college class ring, his father's railroad watch were about the only things of any mone-

etary value that he left.

But what a heritage he gave us - a set of values which sets love of family and friends and church above all other ideals; a thirst for knowledge; a desire to champion the underdog; the willingness to stand up and suffer, if necessary, for what he believed in; a love for beautiful music; and a complete scorn for material possessions.

Each of his children has tried to live up to most of those ideals, but, like him, sometime we fail.

I keep trying, always measuring myself against

him. And I never forget. Happy Father's Day, Daddy.

## We Need To Fight This Killer

McLean has always been generous in donating money to help fight disease. We are concerned and support fund drives for cancer, cystic fibrosis, heart disease, mental illness.

But we ignore one of the worst killers and cripplers of our young.

More teenagers are crippled or die each year because of alcohol abuse or alcohol-related accidents than all other causes combined, according to Epidemic, a special on drug and alcohol airing this week on OETA.

Since this monster epidemic is stalking our youngsters in McLean, we should be organizing for the fight.

Our best weapon is knowledge about alcohol. We have failed on three fronts to provide cold, hard facts to our youngsters.

Our local schools have thus far failed to take advantage of thousands of dollars worth of free material about alcohol abuse available from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism, a state agency


paid for by your taxes. This material doesn't preach. It does educate students about the effects of alcohol on the body and the brain. The students presented with facts on the amount of alcohol which adversely affects motor control, for example, or the effects of alcohol on the brain.

Too many of our local churches have simply said "Don't drink", but failed to give the kids technical information to help them. Many times the teenagers don't feel free to even discuss the subject in church groups.

And we parents have failed in the war against alcohol. If we're confronted with teenage drinking, our knee-jerk reaction is "Thank goodness, he's not on drugs". We either ignore the obvious signs of drinking, or silently condone the action with a "kids will be kids" attitude.

If we really care about our youngsters, we will find a way, through one of these three agencies, to see that our kids get the best information available about a dangerous killer.

## TABS Test Shows Students Are Improving, Board Told Monday

During a lengthy meeting of the McLean School Board Monday night, board members heard the results of the TABS test in McLean, heard a presentation by Charles Buzzard, hired two teachers, and discussed several items of business.

Keri Reiter, guidance director for the McLean schools, presented the results of the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) test to the board members. The test is given each year in the state of Texas to third,

fifth, and ninth grade students. This is the fourth year that the test has been given in McLean.

Miss Reiter said that the overall results for McLean students were very good. She said that the tests showed a weakness in punctuation in all levels tested, but she said that she was primarily pleased that more than 90 percent of the students had acceptable handwriting. Students are not required to pass the criterion reference tests. She said that the tests are

used to show each school system what areas of instruction need to be strengthened.

Gray County's Chief Appraiser Charles Buzzard and his assistant Russell Garrison told the board that the appraisal board had totally reappraised the property in the McLean School district since October of 1982. He said that houses had been classified in three categories: brick veneer, frame, and solid masonry. Each category was divided into seven classifications. He said that appraisers had measured every house in the district with the exception of those in Donley County. Those houses were measured by the Donley County appraisers.

He said that the appraisers had set a separate schedule for houses in McLean, Lefors, and Pampa because of the different market values in each town.

Buzzard said that farm land and ranch land were valued about the same throughout the country. "We're encouraging farmers to apply for ag use value which is cheaper for them," he said. He said that he hoped to have an office open in McLean around July 5 for people to discuss their evaluation. A tentative date of July 25 has been set for the appraisal review board to meet. He said that July 29 will be the date for industrial and royalty evaluation review.

The school board hired two teachers during the Monday night sessions. Contracts will be offered to Mrs. Bell Hughes, who was teaching at Estelle High School before that school closed. She is certified in English, social studies, business, and library science. She has 22 years experience.

A contract will also be offered to Jim Bob Webb of Winters, who graduated from Tarleton State this spring. He was hired to teach agriculture.

Superintendent Jim Rutherford told the board that the county will be taking bids on a new barn at the ag farm south of McLean soon. He said that Gerald Tate had agreed to move the west side of the present barn, but that the school will have to move the east side.

In other business, Rutherford reported that no asbestos was found in the ceiling tile at the elementary school. "We were really lucky," he said. "Had asbestos been found, we would have been out a lot of money to replace those tiles." He said that the covering on the pipes at

the school did have asbestos but that they could be covered with an encapsulating material.

The board accepted a bid of \$2,030 to replace three doors on the bus bar. Overhead Door Co. of Amarillo will put in three 12 x 9 steel doors

and replace facings for the price.

The board granted a request from Sheri Haynes to use the gymnasium for a basketball clinic in July. Board members discussed the policy for using the facility, and reviewed the

provisions which call for a \$100 refundable deposit and a charge of \$25 per day. The board decided to let Miss Haynes clean the gym each day or pay a custodian's fee.

Rutherford told the board that the new roof on the elementary building had been completed.

Board members also agreed to charge \$25 per day to teachers who had used more than their allotted sick leave during the year.

Attending the session which concluded at 10:30 p.m., were board mem-

bers James Hefley, Tommy Cole, Joe Magee, Darryl Herndon, Lloyd Hunt, Tony Smitherman, and John Holland; superintendent Jim Rutherford; high school principal Ron Cummings; and Linda Haynes.

## California Woman Dies In Wreck Near McLean

A California woman died in a one-car wreck June 10 4.3 miles west of McLean on Interstate 40. Agnes Kathleen Taylor of Glendale, Calif. was towing a trailer behind a 1976 Ford when the vehicles jackknifed. She lost directional control, and the vehicle moved to the left of the paved road into the median. The car turned over one time, and she was thrown from the wreckage.

She was transported to the Shamrock Hospital by the McLean ambulance, and pronounced dead at 7:20 p.m. One passenger in the car, the woman's grandson Steven L. Whitfield was not injured.

The wreck occurred at 6:10 p.m.

At 5:05 p.m. Department of Public Safety trooper John Holland was investigating another accident. Kevin Lee Sutton piled his car on Pine

Street in McLean. He went into a nearby house, and the car coasted across the street and hit a motor home belonging to John T. Price of Odessa.

One June 8 at 3 p.m., Holland investigated an accident in which Timothy Loyd Anderson of Shamrock apparently went to sleep. He was driving a 1973 Buick and allowed the vehicle to move to the left off the main road and hit a bar-

ricade. He was not injured and the damage to the vehicle was very light.

One June 11, Holland investigated an accident on Second Street in McLean about 2:30 a.m. Eva Anderson and Terry

Todd were struck by a vehicle driven by Dale Killam. A McLean ambulance took Miss Anderson to the Shamrock Hospital where she was treated for a dislocated shoulder.

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


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
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

## A FATHER'S DAY TRIBUTE

He was born in a dug-out just 30 years after the great civil war, and 19 years after Custer died, and only 15 years after the great buffalo herds disappeared. In his lifetime he has witnessed the ending of this country's westward movement and the beginning of the industrial revolution that is still going on. He travelled to Hobart to the circus in a covered wagon and he lived in the era of the 747.

He knew Chief Lone Wolf and Komalti of the Kiowa tribes and observed them and their bands, the last of the free roaming Kiowa, who were adjusting and trying to become farmers and ranchers and just plain folks. He listened to them and he remembered.

As a boy, he went swimming and fishing in Lake Creek when it was a cool clear stream with deep holes and grass covered banks. This was before the prairie surrendered to cotton and wheat and before silt and

run-off killed the little stream. He roamed the Wichita mountains and looked for Indian burial caves and Outlaw treasure. He lived and learned in the out-of-doors and was enthusiastic about all that he saw and did. He would hide in the high grass to watch the mares as they foaled. He attended picnics, fish fries, and horse races and went hunting for squirrel and coon. On one night hunt he and his friend Leo killed the largest lynx cat in Greer County and sold it to the blacksmith for \$5. When he was very small he would slip into the study and pretend to be asleep and listen to his Grandpa and Col. Goodnight as they reminisced the Commanche Campaign and he remembered.

When he came to this town there was a windmill where the signal light is now and hitching rails in front of the stores.

As a young man he learned first hand about hobnails and hard tack, Quad trucks, and World

War I mud, and France in '18. He was a soldier in the war to end all wars, and yet he has lived to see three more wars and gave up a son to one of them, and he remembered.

He and his sweet wife Mary had the quiet courage to raise eight kids in the Texas panhandle. They taught them goodness, decency, honesty and love, and the children remembered. He also knows first hand about bad horses, blue northerners, small pox, scarlet fever, rheumatic fever, and croup. Also kerosene lamps, the W.P.A., depression, drought, hail outs, and renewing the bank note one more time.

He is a friend to all of his neighbors because he has always dealt fairly and honestly with them. Down across the years he has been my teacher, counselor, co-worker, and friend. This modest man is Walter Evans, my hero, My Dad.



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

## In The Kitchen

Fresh strawberries will be appearing in more abundance in the next few weeks. As a dieter, I appreciate the berry's low calorie count. However, one of the most delicious uses is for strawberry preserves. Jewel Ditmars of Mus-

kogee, Okla., brought us a half-bushel of strawberries last year, and included this old-fashioned recipe for preserves.

Mrs. Hitchcocks Strawberry Preserves  
4 cups berries, hulled  
4 cups sugar  
2 or 3 T. lemon juice  
1 T. Epsom salts (be

sure to use level table-spoon)

Boil 8 or 9 minutes with a big boil until berries are tender. Pour into big shallow pyrex or enamel pans.

Let stand three or four days, if possible. Shake pans occasionally.

Pour preserves in jar and seal with paraffin.

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# McLean Basketball Day Camp Set For Local Gym July 11 - July 15

A basketball day camp has been set for McLean July 11 through 15 at the McLean High School gymnasium. Former McLean High School basketball standout Sheri Haynes will direct the camp which will last from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day. Haynes, who has been coaching at Lockney High School for the last four years, was an All-State basketball player for the McLean Tigerettes, and graduated in 1975. She played on the national championship Lady Statesmen from Delta State University at Cleveland, Miss., and with the Flying Queens of Wayland Baptist University.

Assisting in the camp will be Sam Haynes, who is also a former MHS outstanding athlete. Haynes graduated from
