



increase combat readiness of all participants, with emphasis in



Cookin' With Asparagus-

COOKING WITH ASPARAGUS While shopping in Puckett's Monday afternoon, I came upon some fresh asparagus, and immediately begun grabbing as much as I could take home and eat. Although I had to beat Ida Hess off with a stick, I was able to get plenty for our supper.

just steamed it that night, but I decided I'd try a few of these recipes out next time.

- Stir-Fried Asparagus
- 1 whole chicken breast
- l pound asparagus
- 2 tablespoons oil 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 cup chicken broth 1 tablespoon sherry
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 teaspoons corn starch 2 teaspoons cold water
- 1/2 teaspoon MSG (optional)
- 1/4 teaspoon sugar
- ./2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper 2 tablespoons toasted sesame

Skin, bone, and cut chicken into thin strips. Snap off lower portions of asparagus. Wash spears and slice diagonally in 2-9 inch pieces, leaving tips

Heat skillet or wok and add 1 tablespoon oil amd and garlic. Add asparagus and stir-fry 30 seconds. Remove asparagus from skillet and keep warm.

Reheat skillet and add remaining oil. Add chicken and stir-fry 30 seconds. Add chicken broth, sherry, and soy sauce and cook 2 to 3 minuts, or until chicken turns white. Add asparagus and stir with chicken one minute

Blend cornstarch and water.

Stir into asparagus mixture and cook, stirring, until thickened. Sprinkle with MSG, sugar, salt, pepper, and sesame seeds. Makes 4 servings.

Asparagus with Browned Butter (This simple treatment is best for crisp, fresh asparagus.) 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1 tablespoon lemon juice 2 1/2 pounds asparagus, cooked

Chopped Parsley Heat butter in saucepan until pale brown. Add lemon juice and mix well. Serve over hot asparagus. Sprinkle with pars-

Makes 6 servings

Asparagus Cantonese 2 tablespoons oil

1 clove garlic, crushed 2 pounds asparagus, sliced

diagonally

Salt, Pepper Heat oil in skillet over high heat almost to smoking point.

Stir in garlic, then add asparagus. Cover and shake pan vigerously for 3 to 5 minutes. Asparagus should be crisp-tender. Season to taste with salt

and pepper. Makes 8 servings.

Teacher Insurance Legislation TSTA Seeking New

Representatives of the Texas State Teachers Association told members of the House Education Committee that teachers in 220 Texas school districts have

no health insurance.

Jack Kelly, TSTA governmental relations specialist, said the State of Texas is literally 'gambling' with the health of these unprotected teachers by not providing a minimal state funded health policy.

'The state provides teachers with a minimum salary schedule, five days of sick leave and a retirement program that has become a biennial source of revenue to balance the state budget and that's it! Kelly told the lawmakers.

TSTA is seeling legislation to establish group health insurance for teachers.

Testimony by TSTA followed three weeks of intensive lobbying on the Senate side of the state legislature for Senate Bill 525, an omnibus bill which passed the Senate last week.

We are extremely pleased that the Senate voted to incorporate several TSTA bills into SB 525 which amends House Bill 72, the education reform bill enacted last summer, Kelly

TSTA was successful in get-

ting the Senators to provide more funding for the career ladder and to speed up the implementation of levels three and four of the ladder in order to achieve the plan's original goal of rewarding experienced teachers.

The amendments will also

credit teachers for course-work begun before HB 72 was enacted and it allows teachers to appeal arbitrary. capricious and bad faith decisions regarding their placement on the career ladder.

The senators also adopted language giving teachers more

authority over discipline in their classrooms. Additionally, the new bill will minimize teacher paperwork and require school districts to pay certified teachers who volunteer to tutor before or after school for their

Earlier the Senate adopted

TSTA's duty-free lunch bill which was carrieed in the Senate by Sen. Carlos Truan of

Corpus Christi. TSTA is intensifying its efforts to get the same amend-ments adopted in the House which is necessary for final passage of the measure.

He was pronounced dead at the scene at about 2 p.m. by Bates, who ruled the death accidental. No autopsy was


