Former All-American To Speak At All-Sports Banquet

Every year around March, I begin to get a little long in the face, my spirits are a little droopy, my pocketbook quite empty, and then usually by the third week in April, my load is suddenly lighter and my outlook on life much, much brighter.

The Panhandle Press Association's annual convention.

The annual All-Sports Banquet has been set for May 4 and former All-American and Texas Hall of Famer Donny Anderson will be the main speaker at the event.

Anderson was born in Borger. He attended Stinnett High School from 1957-1960, where he was a four-year letterman in three sports-football, basketball, and track.

He was named All-State, All-American, and All-Southern for his performances in football in 1960.

Anderson then attended Texas Tech University where he was named the "Golden Palomino with the All-American touch", for he was said to be

one of those rare athletes who lived up to his nickname: he was a "horse" when carrying a football, and he certainly was "golden".

Anderson holds nine individual football records at Texas Tech: longest kick-off return, longest run, most passes caught in a single game, most touch-

down passes caught, most passes caught in a career, single season scoring, single season kick-off return, and kick-off return career record.

He was the number one draft

choice of the Houston Oilers and the Green Bay Packers. He chose the contract he was offered by Vince Lombardi and the Packers and created international headlines in 1965 when

he signed the richest rookie contract in the game's history.

Sports writers and fans marvelled about how a "kid" from the West Texas prairies could

command a contract that called for such startling figures estimated to be anywhere from \$400,000 to \$600,000.

Beginning in 1966 and continuing for six years, Anderson was a standout runner, receiver and punter as the Packers captured Super Bowls I and II. A 6'3", 200 lb. left-hander, Anderson was voted the Pack-er's MVP in 1968 and 1969 by his teammate.

He has been inducted in the Texas Tech Hall of Fame, the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame, and the Texas Panhandle Hall of Fame.

Anderson now resides in Dallas, where he is an investor and owns his own insurance business, the Donny Anderson

Insurance. His wife, Karen, is a high fashion model for Neiman Marcus. They have two children, son Blake, and daughter Ashley Kesh.

One of the top left-handed golfers in the country, Anderson plays regularly at Royal Oaks Country Club in Dallas

and participates in more than a dozen benefit pro-ams around the state each year. Golf is the only sport in which he still competitively participates.

His parents, Jack and Ann Anderson, formerly of Phillips, presently reside in Shallowater. His father has been retired from

Phillips Company for three years.

Also highlighted at the banquet will be this year's sports

winners, and athletes who have achieved great goals.

Whittler's Bench

Boys here on the bench have been sittin', whittlin', and thinking about any noteworthy things which have occurred during the month of April down through more years than some of us would care to admit.

Many of the younger generation will not remember the sink-

ing of the Titanic back on April 14th 1912, which was one of the greatest sea disasters of all time. Estimates went up to 1,517 people of the original group of 2,200 who perished in the disaster, which followed.

The then largest ship in the world, which had also been declared un-sinkable, hit an ice-berg and sank in 2 1/2 hours.

There were only lifeboats for half of the people on board, and stories of valor as well as

selfishness abounded. Lord Alfred Rowe, pioneer English rancher of this area, perished in the ordeal and legend had it that he was found on ice floe with his brief case in his hand and his watch still ticking. A movie was made about the

Titanic, and I will never forget the people standing on the deck singing "Nearer, My God To Thee," as the 8,825 ft. luxury liner was sinking.

Another April occurrence celebrated its fiftieth anniversary this year, and all who endured it

will no doubt hope it never happens again.

It was the granddaddy of all duststorms, the Sunday afternoon "black duster" of 1935 which turned day into night,

roared in from Kansas etc., with black dirt boiling as high as 40,000 feet in the air, causing many to think the end of the world was at hand.

Another near disaster, not of the magnitude of the two pre-

viously mentioned happened several years ago when I was accompanying my wife to Austin to the University, where she was to present a program to a group of University English professors. On the flight down, she became nauseated and asked me for the little bag furnished for such occasions. I told her

it was a case of mind over matter and to think of something else and everything would be alright.

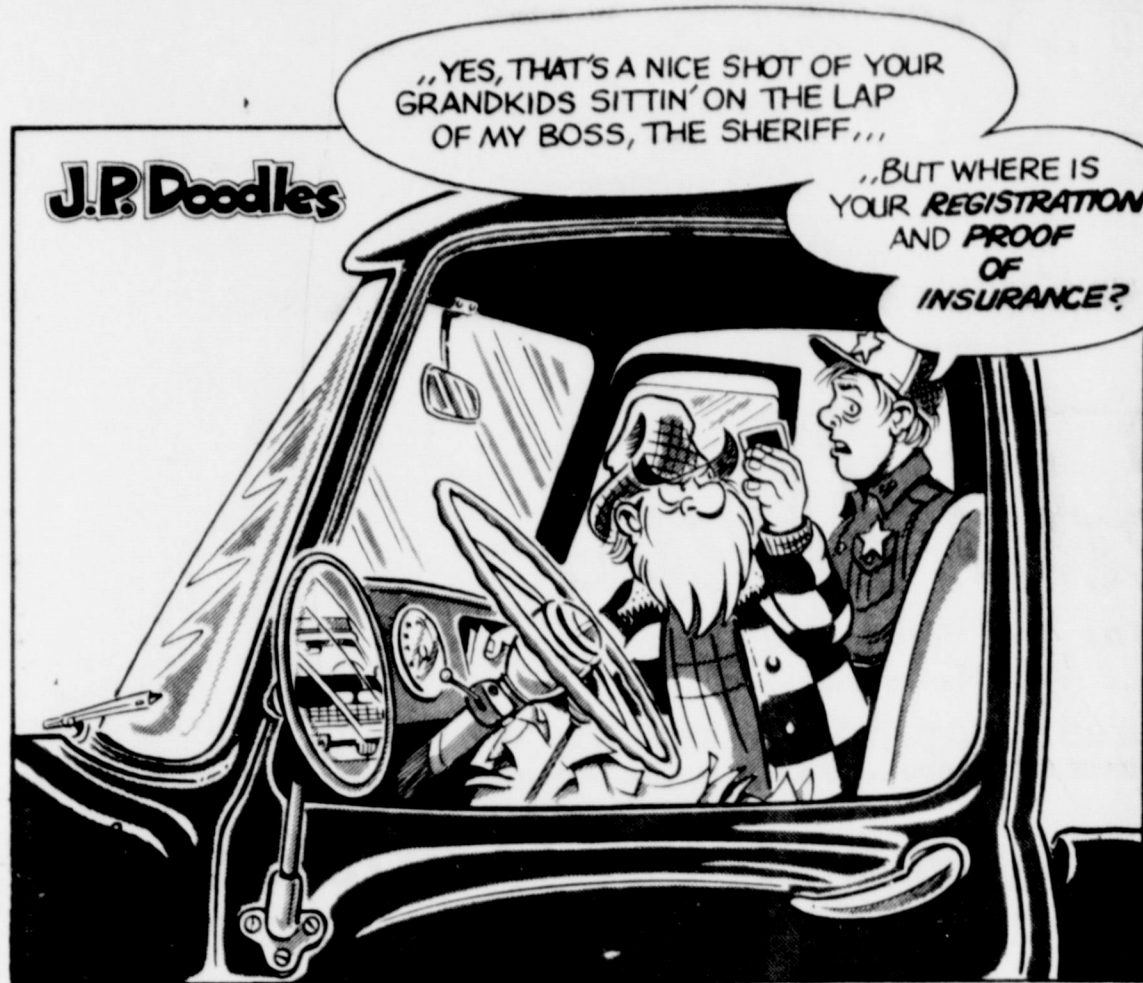
Shortly thereafter it was a case of matter over everything; particularly her new dress, and my stock dipped drastically at that time. It fell even further when we arrived at Austin and

found our luggage had been lost!

I still wonder how I averted death when she was forced to wear a hand-washed, and slightly pungent dress to the fancy dinner that evening. That's one time I really lucked out...

Opinions...

With the election of new city aldermen and school trustees, now is perhaps a good time to re-aquaint ourselves with meeting legalities and agenda requirements.

Although the city and school are under many of the same laws regarding action taken during the meeting, the two do have some differences.

The City Council has its regular meetings the second Tuesday of every month. They meet at the City Hall at 7 p.m., unless otherwise noted.

The agendas before these regular (and workshop) meetings must be posted 72 hours before the meeting, and are posted in the City Hall and at the Post Office.

To be listed on the agenda, one must call the city secretary in the morning on the Friday before the Tuesday night meeting.

If there is no specific action to be taken by the council, it is not necessary to be listed on the agenda. However for any action to be taken on any item, it must be listed on the agenda. In other words, no vote can be taken on any item not listed on the agenda.

Also, if an item is listed on the agenda and the person who made the request is not present at the meeting, no action will be taken.

The board of trustees at the school meet the second Monday of each month at 5 p.m. in the business office of the school, unless otherwise noted. Their agendas are posted on the bulletin board at the business

office. The agendas must also be posted 72 hours before the meeting.

To be listed on the agenda, one must call the business office before noon on the Wednesday before the Monday night meeting. As with the City, if no action is required, it is not necessary to be listed on the agenda. However, if action is necessary or a written complaint is to be presented, one must be listed on the agenda.

School officials do suggest, when issuing a complaint about a teacher or school problem, that students and parents first meet with the teacher. If that meeting does not bring about required results, it is suggested that they then meet with the principal. Likewise if that meeting is deemed unsuccessful, the parents should then meet with the superintendent. All of the meetings should be noted before bringing the problem to the board's attention.

Items that do not appear on the agenda may be discussed, but no action (or vote) can be taken on the item unless it appears on the agenda.

The council or board of trustees may go into executive session during the meeting under the provisions of section 2-g of Article 4252-17 of RCS of Texas to discuss employment, reassignment of duties, discipline or dismissal of employees.

Discussion may be held concerning any other matter, and any final action, decision or vote in regard to such matters considered will be made in open session.

Although it is certainly the right of every citizen to issue complaints to board and council members outside of the meeting rooms, such complaints shouldn't carry weight unless issued at the meeting.

If you are interested or concerned about the running of town and/or school, attend these meetings. If you have a written complaint or would like the board to take action on a request, be certain to be listed on the agenda. Don't ask these elected officials to act on a request illegally.

And above all, get involved! The future of your town and the education of your children depend on your input to the meetings. It is much better to be informed of possible actions to be taken at the meetings and be able to voice your opinion before-hand, than wait until action has been taken and then voice your opinion.

It is much easier for these officials to make their decisions when they know how their constituents feel before, than try and second-guess and perhaps make a decision that the majority of the constituents do not support.

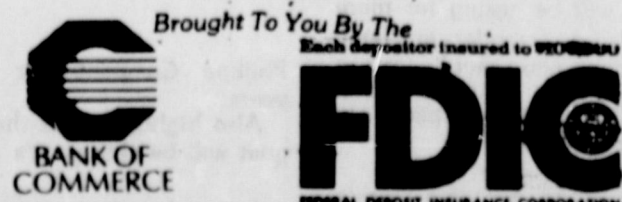

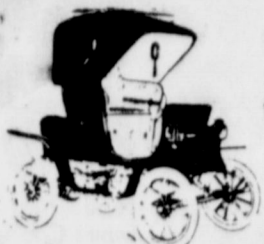

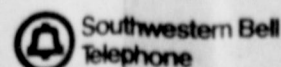

Jerry Cooper Of Shamrock Arrested In Connection With Death

A Shamrock man was arrested Friday in connection with the death of his wife, whose decomposed body was found in a shallow grave south of I-40 between McLean and Shamrock. Jerry Cooper, 24, an assistant butcher at a store in Shamrock, is in custody in \$20,000 bond in the Wheeler County Jail.

The body of his wife, 20-year-old Kathy Cooper, was found in a shallow grave about 1 p.m. Friday by Shamrock Volunteer firemen who were investigating the apparently unrelated discovery of a bloody towel and pair of pants at a rest area near the Kellerville exit of I-40. The woman's body was discovered about five miles southeast of the rest area. Although the autopsy is not yet complete, she was apparently shot at close range in the back base of the skull.

Wheeler County Sheriff Lonnie Miller said that Mrs. Cooper's mother had reported her missing about three weeks ago.

"They originally thought that she just left and got herself a job," he said, adding that there had been some family problems. "The details of the problem are kind of vague, just hearsay so far."

Sheriff and police officers are interviewing witnesses to get to the "nitty-gritty and motive," according to Miller.

As for Cooper, who was arrested at his job Friday afternoon, Miller said "we picked him up at 3 p.m. for questioning and by 9 p.m., we had booked him."

According to Miller, Mrs. Cooper was "just a housewife" that had a four-year-old daughter.

The fireman happened to find the woman's body when they and area law enforcement officers were investigating the discovery of a bloody pair of cut-off pants and a bloody towel at a rest area seven miles east of McLean.

Miller said that sheriff's officers, Shamrock police chief Art Taylor, Wheeler County constable Jerry Bob Jernigan, Texas Ranger Bill Batin of Pampa and highway troopers began tracing the bloody clothing at about 8 a.m. Friday.

Miller added that because the blood on the clothing was not more than three or four hours old, that officers see no connection between the finding of the shirt with the finding of Cooper's body.

He observed that the pants were men's pants and that the legs were "cut off real neat by scissors." The pants and the towel were apparently used to

mop up some blood off a floorboard of a car, he said. The items, plus a bloody pant leg, were found "all in one small stack."

Services for Kathy Cooper were at 4 p.m. Sunday at the 11th Street Baptist Church with the Rev. Jeff Messer, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Sham-

rock Cemetery by Richerson Funeral Home.

Mrs. Cooper was born Nov.

30 1964 in Shamrock and married Jerry Cooper in 1978. Survivors include her hus-

band; her daughter Kariston Dawn Cooper; her mother Bessie Campbell of Shamrock; three sisters, Corrolyn Kidd of Shamrock, Becky Pingleton of Amarillo and Rena Boss of

Parsons, Kans.; three brothers, Johnny Campbell of Shamrock and Homer Campbell and Dale Campbell, both of Amarillo and one stepbrother, Jimmy Harbour of Felt, Okla.
