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Billingsley To Compete In State

Billie Billingsley cinched winning a saddle at the Tri-State Finals Rodeo June 6-8, following his win at the Tri-State Rodeo in Guymon in the steer wrestling division.

The Guymon Rodeo was the final Tri-State Rodeo before the Finals, and Billingsley is leading the competition by 26 points. The most anyone can receive during the finals rodeo is 24.

The Tri-State High School Rodeo Finals will be held nightly June 6, 7, and 8 in the Amarillo Colliseum. Performances will be held at 7:30, and an afternoon performance will be held at 2 p.m. Saturday and again at 7:30 Saturday night.

The McLean Rodeo Club will be travelling to Amarillo Saturday to watch Billie participate in the Finals, and give him their support. They will be spending the night Saturday, before returning to McLean.

Following the Tri-State Rodeo, Billingsley will compete in the State Finals in Sguin, June 17-23. This will be his second year to make the State Finals, and he is currently ranked second in the steer wrestling division. The top four finalists in the State Rodeo will compete in the Nationals Rodeo in Rapid City, South Dakota.

In last year's State Rodeo, Billingsley missed going to Nationals by .1 of a second.

He had the fastest time out of 84 doggers at State, and received

Panhandle Health Care Serves McLean

Panhandle Health Care Agency, a non-profit organization covers the top 20 counties in the Texas Panhandle, and has nurses in every town.

Panhandle Health Care Nurse in McLean is Dorothy Wilson, LVN, at 779-2547.

The agency is dedicated to providing total health care 24 hours per day, seven days a week in the patient's home under the supervision of a physician.

There is no distinction in eligibility or in the manner of providing any service or the facility.

Some of the services offered by the agency are:

Physical Therapy. Physical Therapy will be provided by Registered Physical Therapist upon specific orders of the attending physician. When appropriate, nurses will be instructed by the therapist and will carry out the planned program under his/her supervision.

Nursing Services. Nursing Services are available upon the orders of the attending physician on an intermittent basis. Nurses are on call 24 hours daily, 7 days a week.

Examples of services are: bed baths, enemas, hygienic and other personal care.

Teaching and training activities, Surgical Dressings, Catheterizations, including retention catheters, irrigations, family instruction, Diabetic and Cardiac management and instruction; feeding tubes; rehabilitation activities; inhalation treatments and instruction; nutritional guidance; injections such as B (12), diuretics, insulin, narcotics; intravenous such as Aminophylline, Chemo-therapy and other medicines; and infusions for dehydration, etc; medication evaluation; blood pressure and other vital signs; blood drawing for laboratory tests; ostomy care and instruction; enterostomal therapist available

Home Health Aides will be available on an intermittent basis for limited services upon the orders of the attending physician.

Speech Therapy and Social Services. Speech Therapy and Social Services may be given by a registered Speech Therapist upon the order of the attending physician. Speech Therapy may be given to patients with deafness as well as those with speech problems.

Speech Therapists are available through the office. A Medical Social Worker is available for both direct and indirect services as requested

by the attending physician. Equipment available to the patient on order of attending physician are: Hospital Beds, bed rails, wheel chairs, walkers, oral electric suction, bedside commodes, bed pans and urinals, trapeze bars, crutches, infra red lamps, whirlpool baths, pressurized mattresses, I.V. Standards, Oxygen and equipment including positive pressure equipment.

Upon the request the Agency will assist patient in making

contact with the equipment company of his choice.

Supplies and Drug. Many supplies are furnished. Examples follow: surgical dressings, syringes and needles, chux, enema supplies, urinary cath-

eters and all related supplies. No drugs or medicines are furnished. They must be provided by the patient or his family.

Scout Camping Great Experience

Girl Scout camping is an experience which provides a creative, educational opportunity in group living in the outdoors. Its purpose is to utilize the Girl Scout program, trained leadership and the resources of natural surroundings to contribute to each camper's mental, physical, social and spiritual growth.

Quivira Council has many opportunities for girls to attend a summer camp. Day camps are held in several communities and an established camp is held at the Resident camp.

Day camps are usually five (four or five hour) days. The girls go to camp in the morning and return home in the afternoon. These camps are held in the out-of-doors. The girls go on hikes, learn about wildlife and plants, do nature crafts, swim, cook over an open fire and learn camp skills.

Established Camp is a one week or two week experience. The girls are taken to camp on a Sunday afternoon and picked up to return home on the following Saturday morning. The girls participate in cookouts, nature hikes, nature crafts, camp fires, sports, songs, games, swimming and swimming lessons.

Special activities are archery, canoeing and fishing.

Girls who have completed kindergarten and girls in first thru twelfth grades can attend day camps. Girls who have completed first grade and girls in second thru twelfth grades can attend established camp. Girls who attend our camp do not have to be a member of the Girl Scout program. Billingsley also won the average buckle for the Tri-State Finals rodeo last year, valued at over \$300. This year, he will receive the Championship buckle, also valued at over \$300, the championship saddle, and has a chance of winning the average buckle again.

He received a saddle blanket

at the Hereford Tri-State Rodeo, and has won four belt buckles this year. He has won or placed in 16 of the 18 rodeos he has participated in.

Billingsley is the 18-year-old son of Bill and Jerry Billingsley of McLean. He is a 1985 graduate of McLean High School, and was the recipient of the Carl Lee Henley Memorial Scholarship this year.



Capitol Comments...by Foster Whaley

The Senate passed the House version of the Blue Law repeal proposal with minor amendments. By the time you read this, the bill should be on the Governor's desk for his signature.

By a vote of 79 to 56, the House gave second reading approval to Senate Bill 500 which requires every occupant in the front seat of automobiles and pickup trucks be "buckled up". On final passage, the bill carried by a vote of 77 to 60.

Every effort to exempt pickups and make other amendments failed. I attempted to exempt farm pickups making frequent stops on roadways while repairing fence or feeding cattle alongside the county road or highway, but the track was well-greased. I was run over like everyone else. The law will apply to every vehicle on every highway, street or county road in Texas. The franchised car dealers association sent the message to all of their auto dealers to lobby their representatives and urge them to vote for the bill with no amendments. The reason? If one amendment went on the bill, it would have to return to the Senate for a conference. Sen. Roy Blake, D-Nacogdoches, had threatened to filibuster it to death in the Senate.

All State Representatives in West Texas, except the two from Lubbock, voted against the bill. This is another example of "big brother" government. The truly conservative Republicans

voted against the bill, but 22 of the 53 in the House voted for it. It was not a partisan issue, but one important point to remember is that the rural Democrats consistently vote a more consistent pattern of less government than do urban Democrats of Republicans. All of the Republican votes for the bill were from the large major cities. I religiously buckle up before I move a vehicle but I resent the

state and federal government acting as my big brother. This is not the land of the free and the home of the brave if we will not lobby our U.S. Congressmen and tell them to quit mandating what we do with our personal lives. The reason we get these kinds of bad laws is because a majority of the legislators listen a lot more closely to a well-organized lobby group instead of to the people who elected them.

Orange Waffles

- 1-3/4 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
- 2-1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1-1/2 cups milk
- 2 teaspoons grated orange rind
- 5 tablespoons liquid shortening
- Log Cabin Lite lower sugar syrup product
- Butter or margarine

Mix flour with baking powder and salt. Combine eggs, milk and grated orange rind. Add to flour mixture; add shortening and mix only until smooth. Bake in preheated waffle baker. Serve hot with syrup and butter. Makes about 10 4-1/2-inch waffles.

To freeze, brown waffles lightly, stack with waxed paper between and wrap in aluminum foil.

To reheat, unwrap and arrange on baking sheet, heat at 300° for about 10 minutes (or reheat in toaster or toaster oven).

Lean. She is 21, and a graduate of Dalhart High School. Kay won \$150 for her winning design.

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
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

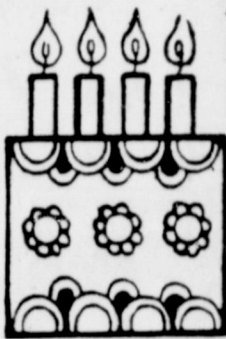
