Repairs To Cost About \$75,000

from the distaff side

Since Saturday morning about 4 o'clock, I've been trying to decide how to write this column. City street repairs took up the largest part of the discussion March 8 at the regular McLean city council meeting.

The streets, which deteriorated badly during the severe weather this winter are cracked, crumbling, and potholed.

Robert A. (Bud) Buie, of McMorries and Associates, an engineering firm from Amarillo, had inspected street damage previous to the council meeting, and gave aldermen a rough estimate on repairing the roads. Buie told the council that 35 blocks need to be double-coated, and 23 blocks need regular seal-coating. He said that the repairs probably would cost \$70,000 to \$75,000. Buie will prepare a map for the council showing the worst damage and will give specifications in order that the city can

advertise for bids should they decide to have the repairs done.

City superintendent Bob Glenn was author-

ized by the council to buy a new mower for the city. Cost estimate for the mower is less than \$2000. The use of \$1000 in

revenue sharing funds also was discussed at the meeting. The council decided to use part of the money, which previously

had been earmarked for city park expenditures, to rebuild the park fireplaces. Aldermen also voted to

donate to Hillcrest Cemetery Association five percent of the city's profits from the gas well located near the ceme-

tery. So far the gas well has not been put into operation, so total profits See COUNCIL, Page 2

School Board Rehires Teachers, Accepts Tax Settlement

McLean School Board members met Mar. 11 to rehire teachers, accept a tax settlement from Rock Island Railway, grant the city a right-of-way, accept the school calendar, and set the date for the next session of the board.

Following an executive session, the board approved the renewal of contracts for McLean school teachers and coaches. Contracts for \$500 above state scale were approved for Lela Kennedy, Evelyn Sanders, Konye Guthrie, Bobbi Stalls, Betty Jo Skipper, Jacque Riley, Debbie Fitch, Virginia

Holwick, Jan Johnson, Mary Lou Glass, Sharon Lofton, Pat Washburn (plus \$200 car allowance), Francis Adamson (subject to reassignment), Raymond Christian (subject to funding).

Cecil Reynolds and Carl Dwyer were hired at \$750 above state schedule. Coach Joe Riley was hired at \$3250 coaching and \$500 above state schedule; coach Frank Purcell was hired at \$2500 plus \$500; and coach Jerry Don Cook was hired at \$2500 coaching plus \$750 classroom. Tom Adamson and Maudene Rutherford

were hired, subject to funding. Aides Nancy Billingsley, Margaret Milam and Marie Baker,

at \$500 above state schedule, were hired. Clerical aide Sue Simmons was hired at \$500

plus state schedule. The board accepted a settlement of delinquent taxes from Chicago Rock

Commissioners See Voting Machine Demonstration

Gray County Commissioners will see a demonstration of a new vote-counting machine and will submit an application to the Texas Aeronautical Commission (TAC) for new runway lights at the local airport at their 9:30

a.m. Tuesday meeting in the county courtroom, second floor of the courthouse.

The airport runway lights are called PLASI (Pulse Light Approach Slope Indicator), and will make landing at Perry

LeFors Airport easier for pilots. The lights will operate day and night, and pulse white light where the plane is too high and red light where the plane is too low, and give off a steady white light in between. When the pilot is situated in the steady white light, the plane is in a correct slope to land.

The pair of lights will cost \$44,500, according to County Judge Carl Kennedy, and the county is making a request for the TAC to pay 75 percent of the cost while the county

will pay 25 percent.

The new vote-counting machines will be demonstrated for commissioners and may be used in the April 2 elections in Pampa, Kennedy said.

Commissioners will also once again discuss a fire protection contract with the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department, and discuss a fire protection contract with the city of Lefors as well.

Gray County has been asked to join the Texas Association of Counties in Bush v. Viterno, a case

brought by an inmate in a Texas correctional facility that challenges the state correction board's right to set standards for jails and prisons. Kennedy said the case could shut down many county jails if Bush wins.

The commission will also hear a request from district attorney Guy Hardin for more office space, and hear a request from the county tax assessor-collector to buy new typewriters.

Homestead Exemption Forms Available

Taxpayer homestead and rendition forms, due by April 30, are available to McLean and area residents at several locations in McLean. "Over 65" applications for homestead exemptions are available at the Gray County Tax Appraisal office in McLean, located in McLean City Hall, at McLean School District Tax Office, located at McLean High School, or at the McLean News. Persons who are 65 years or older may file the homestead exemptions, which will then be valid for the applicant's lifetime. Those who were 65 or older at filing time last year, and who filed a homestead exemption at that time, do not need to file again, according to a spokesman at the Gray County Appraisal office in Pampa.

For those persons under 65 years of age, homestead exemption forms may be obtained at the McLean school district office. Those forms, if filed by April 30, will be good for the applicant's lifetime. All forms should be completed and mailed to Gray County Appraisal District, Box 836, Pampa,

Tx. 79065 before April 30, 1983.

Agricultural Value application forms also are available at the Pampa appraisal office. The forms allow farm and ranch land to be taxed on productivity of the land rather than market value. Persons needing an agriculture form should contact the appraisal district, at Box 836, Pampa, Tx. 79065.

The Gray County Appraisal District is handling and processing all exemptions for all taxing entities within the county. More information about county taxes and forms can be obtained by writing Gray County Tax Appraisal District, Box 836, Pampa TX 79065, or by calling the office at (806) 669-6827.

County Residents Offered Fuel Assistance Program

Gray county residents are being offered a fuel assistance program through the Gray County Community Action department. Assistance on fuel bills is a one-time offer per customer for a six-month period. The next six-month period will begin April 1.

Maximum amount offered for fuel cost assistance is \$90. Any balance due over \$90 must be paid at the time of the application.

There are four guidelines that qualify applicants: (1) Applicant must

have a notice to disconnect a utility-water, gas or electric. (2) Applicant must have identification. If applicant has no driver's license, he must provide two other forms of identification. (3) Applicant must meet income guidelines. (4) Applicant must have proof of income.

Persons interested in learning more about the assistance program, or those needing fuel cost assistance should call Gray County Community Action at 665-0075 in Pampa.

McLean youngsters placing in the Gray County show included Stacie Smith, Reserve Breed champion lamb and winner of the showmanship trophy; Cash Carpenter, first in fine wool cross lambs and breed champion; and Lee Ann Tate, fifth in class with pigs.

Teresa Woods won the showmanship award in the County show for her steer, and also placed third in the light weight cross division. Other winners in the steer show were Tres Hess, third, light-weight English; Mark Tate fifth, and Tanner Hess, seventh in

the heavy-weight English division; Lance Gabel, first, Cody Gabel, second, Teresa Woods, third, Kyle Woods fifth,

and Stephanie Rodgers, seventh in the light-weight cross division.

White Has the Answer

The children of Texas finally have an effective advocate in Austin, it seems, in the form of our new governor Mark White. Gov. White presented his new budget to the legislature last week and vigorously urged that group to endorse a 24 percent pay increase for Texas teachers. White said that the immediate pay increase would bring the professional educators of our state close to what the same people could draw in industry.

The bill, sponsored by Senators Lloyd Doggett and Carl Parker, would give the teacher's a \$1.6 billion increase over the next two years. This would give a beginning teacher with a bachelor's degree a starting salary of \$14,500 instead of \$11,110. A teacher with a master's degree and 30 years of experience would receive \$27,250, instead of \$21,100.

This proposal is certainly a step in the right direction to insure that our children get the best education possible. Sen. Parker said "You can't have a Cadillac system on a Model T budget," a fact that our previous legislatures have managed to ignore for too many years.

Higher salaries will attract the best and brightest minds to the teaching profession, and it's the best way we can insure our children's education.

dependent School District will receive 90 percent of the delinquent taxes owed, and amount total and amount totaling \$19,758.86, less 20 percent (\$3951.77) for attorneys' fees. The school district actually will collect \$15,807.09 for its own use.

The settlement is the result of a court decision on the bankruptcy suit filed by the railway company. "There's a chance that we might not collect any of the back taxes if we don't agree to the settlement," said board president Jim Allison.

Board members also accepted a bid from Parsley's Construction of Pampa for reroofing McLean Elementary School. The bid, \$28,820, includes removing existing roofing material and applying a three-ply felt covering, a layer of vent-ulate felt, and tar and gravel. Parsley also included a 10-year guarantee on the job.

Other bids were from Ziebarth of Amarillo, \$21,735.28, 8-year guarantee; Locklear of Hollis, Oklahoma, \$18,990, 5-year guarantee on three plies of fiberglass felt; and P.B. Builders of Amarillo, \$20,400, 2-ply felt, no guarantee.

A right-of-way which would enable the city of McLean to proceed with a proposed roadway off Interstate 40 also was considered. The board unanimously decided to grant the city the easement in order that work on the thoroughfare might go ahead.

New textbook selections for 1983-1984 were approved. Purchases will include new books for the band program, as well as new literature for math, world geography, eighth grade American history, anatomy, business, and health.

The board set April 4 as the date for its next meeting. At that session board members will canvass election ballots. In the election, set for April 2, nine candidates will vie for three three-year terms. Candidates on the ballot are Sonie Bybee, Tommy Cole, Thacker Haynes, Gwen Henley, Darryell Herndon, John Holland, Ed Patman, Wendell Ridgway and Lynda Syfrett.

The 1983-1984 school calendar was set during the lengthy board meeting. The timetable begins August 12 with student registration. Classroom instruction will begin August 16, 1983, and the last day of school for students in 1984 is scheduled for May 11. Teachers will finish May 12, 1984. Labor Day holiday will be Sept. 5, 1983. Christmas holidays will begin Dec. 22, 1983, with classes resuming Jan. 2, 1984.

Thanksgiving holidays are Nov. 24 and 25, 1983, with Easter holidays April 20 and 23, 1984. March 12, 13, and 14 have been set aside as spring break, but may be

used as "snow days" should the need arise. The schedule also includes five days of teacher inservice and three days of teacher workshops.

 I have listened with interest to the opponents of Senate Bill #1 by Bill Sarpalius on the DWI problems, but I have not heard one who would acknowledge that the bill would stop some of the DWI crimes. They all present their point of how many more people will have to go to jail, and the cost thereof. If Senate Bill #1 will not stop some of the DWI Crimes, then we should petition Senator Sarpalius to come up with a bill stout enough to stop some of them.

A DWI crime does not make the offender any richer, any smarter, any happier or any more popular but he goes back to that bottle because it has been voted legal by the public and has been accepted by many people as a way of life. In The Kitchen

Some desserts are considered famous classics for a good reason: the treat is relatively simple and extremely delicious. Two of my favorite desserts, when I can eat desserts, are pound cake and cheesecake. Here are two recipes that are as good as I've ever eaten of these two famous classics.

Sour Cream Cheesecake CRUST:

2 1/2 cups packaged graham cracker crumbs
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter or regular margarine, softened

FILLING:

5 pkgs. (8 oz. size) soft cream cheese

1 1/4 cups sugar
3 T. flour
1 T. grated lemon peel
1/4 tsp. vanilla extract
5 eggs
2 egg yolks
1/4 cup whipping cream
1/2 cup dairy sour cream

To make crust, mix graham cracker crumbs with sugar and soft butter in medium bowl. Mix until ingredients are well combined.

Press mixture on bottom and sides of a 9-inch springform pan, building up sides of pan to form a rim all around. Refrigerate until needed. (You must use this kind of pan, if you want the cake to look good.)

Preheat oven to 500 degrees. To make filling, combine in large bowl of mixer, cream cheese, sugar, flour, lemon peel, and vanilla. Beat at high speed just to blend.

Beat in eggs and egg yolks, one at a time. Add cream, beating just until well combined. Pour into crust-lined pan. Bake 10 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 250 degrees and bake 1 hour longer. Spread top with sour cream. Let cool in pan on wire rack. Refrigerate 3 hours, or overnight.

To serve: with spatula, loosen crust from sides of pan. Remove side of springform pan. Cut cheesecake into wedges. Nice with strawberries. This is a huge dessert, and will serve 16 to 20 people.

Chocolate Pound Cake

1 cup boiling water
2 squares unsweetened chocolate, cut up
2 cups sifted flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 cup butter or regular margarine (this is one recipe in which I always use butter; it just makes it taste better.)

1 1/4 cups light brown sugar, firmly packed
2 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1/2 cup dairy sour cream

In small bowl, pour boiling water over chocolate; let stand 20 minutes to cool. Meanwhile, preheat oven to 325 degrees. Grease well and flour 9 x 5 x 3 inch loaf pan. Sift flour with soda and salt. In large bowl of electric mixer, let butter stand at room temperature until softened. At high speed, beat butter, brown sugar, eggs, and vanilla until light and fluffy. At low speed, beat in flour mixture (in fourths) alternately with sour cream (in thirds) beginning and ending with flour mixture. Beat in cooled chocolate mixture just until combined. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 60 to 70 minutes, until cake tester comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack 15 minutes.

Transfer from pan to rack; cool completely. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar. Makes 1 loaf.

Taking aim on fraudulent calls

In recent months, you may have read that Southwestern Bell is beginning to take steps to cut down on the number of fraudulent long distance calls placed from public telephones and charged to an unauthorized third number.

Effective April 1, the company will begin a new procedure that is designed to eliminate fraudulent calls.

On that date, all Southwestern Bell operators (as well as operators from independent phone companies) will start requiring approval from an individual at the third number before the call is put through.

While this new procedure may cause a slight inconvenience for customers desiring to place legitimate bill-to-third-number calls from public telephones, it will benefit everyone in the long run.

First, this will greatly reduce the burden on customers, who help shoulder the cost of fraudulent third-number calls through higher rates. And secondly, there will be less expense of having to investigate those types of calls, which also drives up rates.

Actually, the new third-number verification will cause a delay of less than one minute. If the operator is unable to verify the charges, the caller will be asked to provide alternate billing (such as charging the call to his or her Southwestern Bell Calling Card or placing the call collect).

A convenient billing alternative

The Calling Card may represent the most attractive alternative to third-number billing. Not only are direct-dialed Calling Card calls faster and more convenient than third-number and collect calls, they cost less. Depending on the distance of

Watch for phone cables when digging in your yard

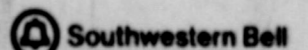
Now that spring is just around the corner, you may be planning gardens, lawn landscaping, putting up a fence, or other outdoor activities.
