During the regular meeting of the MISD trustees, board members voted to re-scind number 41 of the March 11 meeting which proposed the non-renewal of the contract with high school principal Ron Cummings with an amendment in the 1984-85 budget of \$4500 for consultant fees.

Also handled in the Monday night meeting before new board members were sworn in, were the approval of the minutes, the check report, the financial statement, and the tax assessor's report.

Board members canvassed the ballots and issued the order of election. Incumbent Joe Magee and new trustee Gwen Henley were given the oath of office by out-going president Lloyd Hunt.

Hunt, who served in the McLean schools since 1922, then welcomed and congratulated the new members.

The first action of the new board was to elect Joe Magee as president, James Hefley as vice-president, and Darryel Herndon as secretary.

Discrepancies in the billing of Alanreed schools for transfer students and the payment received from Alanreed were also discussed.

Plans for much-needed renovation projects in the school cafeteria and elementary building were discussed. The board voted to take bids on the cafeteria work. They have also decided to redo the plans for the elementary heating and cooling projects, and get estimates on the heating costs only.

The board also decided to take bids on a 3M copier for the high school.

High school principal Ron Cummings presented the board with a cheerleader policy, which the trustees approved.

The new policy for high school cheerleaders states that Classroom work is first at McLean High School, but Cheerleading shall take precedence over all other school activities for the members. Other activities cannot interfere with practice, games, or any activity concerning them.

Qualifications: 1. Cheerleaders must be eligible with a passing grade of 70 in all subjects as stated in House Bill 72. If a Cheerleader drops below this grade in an area, she will be ineligible for that six weeks.

2. A squad member must not be involved in a major disciplinary infraction that could result in suspension or other major disciplinary action. Such action could only be appealed to a full committee, made up of the two recommending teachers, sponsor, and principal.

Purpose: 1. Promote school spirit and sportsmanship.

2. Provide support for athletic activities.

3. To serve as examples for the student body in the area of

citizenship, sportsmanship, fair play, and academic achievement.

4. Each Cheerleader should be willing to cooperate with their sponsor at all times.

Election Process: 1. The squad will consist of five members: 4 cheerleaders, and 1 mascot.

2. The student body will elect these five members from the candidates. They will be chosen at large with no class distinctions

3. The Head Cheerleader will be appointed by the sponsor. She will be selected in experience, leadership, and willingness to work.

4. The candidates must have two teacher recommendations and parental permission. There will be forms issued for these purposes and letters to the parents outlining responsibilities and costs.

Uniforms: The school will

provide one skirt and one sweater for the High School Cheerleaders. Pom-poms and megaphones will be provided by the school. The uniforms and equipment will remain the property of the school. It will be the responsibility of each Cheerleader to clean and maintain her uniforms. All Cheerleaders will dress the same. All purchases must be made with the consensus of opinion and with payment

in full at the time of purchase.

Camp: 1. Each Cheerleader will be required to attend cheerleading camp.

2. McLean schools will pay half of the tuition and room and board for the camp.

The above applies to the junior high cheerleaders. The junior high squad will consist of four members: two from seventh grade and two from eighth

TUITION INCREASE COMING

AUSTIN — More than 2,000 students participated in the march. Some carried protest posters; most chanted anti-establishment slogans. These students claimed the government was forcing them to do something they didn't want to do.

In the late 1960's, scenes like this were routine in the United States. But, this scene didn't occur in 1968. It happened last Tuesday. This issue wasn't the Vietnam War; it was tuition. The crisis wasn't part of a fading memory; it is upon us right now.

College students are incensed at what they consider an unnecessary government intrusion into their pocketbooks. They see no reason why their tuition has to be tripled.

Sadly, there is a reason, a very good reason. The state just doesn't have the money to subsidize education costs at the level it has in the past.

Texas' tuition — an unbelievable \$4 per semester hour — is the lowest in the nation. Ten years ago that \$4 per hour paid for better than 10 percent of a student's education costs. Now, it pays for less than 3 percent.

Four years ago, when lawmakers last were discussing seriously a tuition increase, there was not that much concern about what percentage of education costs a student paid. Now, there is grave concern. The state is facing a \$1.1 billion shortfall, and state funds to colleges and universities almost surely will be cut.

The quality of higher education in Texas will decline with the state contribution. That money must be reconv-

ered somewhere, and tuition seems a logical way to make up for the lost revenue.

There also seems to be a myth that Texas students will be hit hardest by this tuition increase. Nothing could be further from the truth. Even if tuition is tripled to \$12 per hour, Texas will rank only 48th among the states in tuition costs.

Instead, we in the Legislature are going to try to shift more of the tuition burden on out-of-state students. Right now, Texas taxpayers essentially are subsidizing those students. It is cheaper for students from many other states to pay out-of-state tuition in Texas than to pay in-state tuition at home.

Back in the days of huge budget surpluses, such a luxury was affordable. Sometimes, the cheap out-of-state tuition reaped an economic benefit as the "foreigner" who came to school in Texas decided to stay in the Lone Star State.

Such benefits are minimal, though. As the budget becomes tighter, luxuries must be discarded.

Though we support some type of tuition increase, we are not unsympathetic to students. We realize student fees in this state are not as cheap as the tuition. We realize that federal aid to students is being cut.

For those very reasons, we are not going to vote for an unrealistic tuition hike. We will vote only for a reasonable increase in the student contribution to the cost of education.

3. Be loyal to the organization at all times and uphold the rules and regulations of the group.

5. Lateness and truancy will not be tolerated. These can result in dismissal and will be

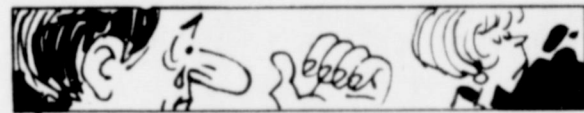
Pinky gives true meaning to the title "Jack of All Trades". Throughout his life, he has been everything from a cotton picker

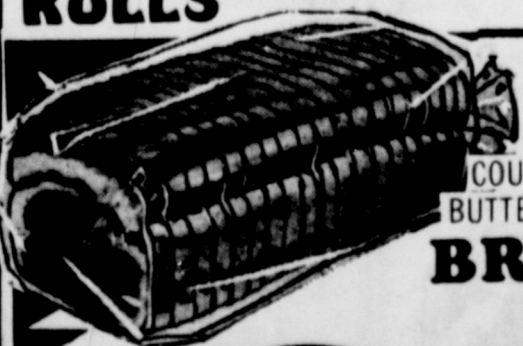





BLUEBERRY-LEMON STREUSEL CAKE

- 2 packages Betty Crocker wild blueberry muffin mix
- Almond Streusel (below)
- 1 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon grated lemon peel
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar

Heat oven to 350°. Grease tube pan, 10x4 inches. Drain blueberries; rinse and set aside. Prepare Almond Streusel. Mix milk, lemon peel and eggs in large bowl. Stir in muffin mixes (dry) and sugar until moistened; fold in blueberries. Pour batter into pan; sprinkle with Almond Streusel. Bake until topping is light brown and cake springs back when touched lightly near center, 35 to 40 minutes. Cool cake in pan 30 minutes (do not

invert pan while cooling); invert on wire rack. Remove pan; invert cake on heatproof serving plate. 12 servings.
Almond Streusel: Mix 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup all-purpose flour and 2 tablespoons firm margarine or butter until crumbly; stir in 1/4 cup sliced almonds.
High Altitude Directions (3500 to 6500 feet): Heat oven to 375°. Stir 1/4 cup all-purpose flour into muffin mixes (dry). Increase milk to 1 1/4 cups. Omit sugar. Bake about 45 minutes.

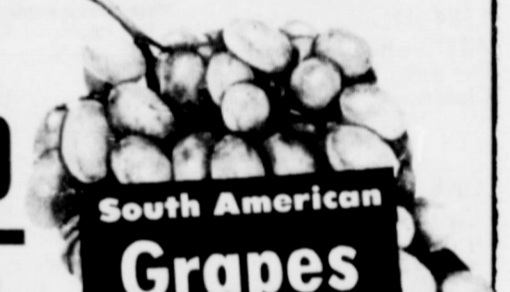
