

Animadversion, albuminous, bas-relief, chateau, detente, compadre, tenuousness...these were just a few of the words given to the high school spellers at the district UIL contest Friday afternoon in Clarendon.

And take my word for it, these were some of the easier words to spell and pronounce on

How do I know? For the third year, I was the announcer for the spelling contest.

Sounds simple, huh? Well, I was given a list of 120 contest words and 40 tie-breaker words that I needed to know how to pronounce, if there is more than one acceptable pronounciation, the definition of the word and be able to use the word in a sentence.

I didn't even have the most difficult part of the contest, though. The students in the contest are given more than one thousand words to study, knowing that the words given inn the contest don't have to be on the

study list. Just because a student spells all the words correctly doesn't mean he's going to regional or that he's got the contest won. The name of the contest is Spelling and Plain Writing, and believe me, judges do count off on the writing.

I don't neccessarily think spelling is the most difficult of the contests our students participate in, it's just the one I've had more dealings with.

If you think there's not much to UIL contests, or if you haven't had a child participate in them, ask some of the youngsters what they are required to be able to do, recall and know within a short amount of time

Number Sense participants must be able to work difficult mathematical problems in their heads (no scratch paper) with pencils. There are no erasers allowed in the contest, and any markovers (however slight) are

counted errors. In Ready Writing, students given are given two subjects from which they may choose to write a theme on. There is a time-limit and a word-limit on this contest and this year's themes included, "Discuss discipline in the classroom and

poosible alternatives for teach-

In Impromptu Speaking, stu-dents are given three subjects at the beginning of the contest. They may choose one of the topics to speak on. They are given one minute to prepare their 3-5 minute speech.

In Modern Oratory students must memorize a 3-6 minute speech and deliver it to the judges. One of the topics given in this even was, "Does today's popular music have a good or bad influence on students?"

Oral Reading changes each week from Prose to Poetry. This year was Poetry and the students aree judges on their interpretation of the poem while delivery

Fourth and fifth grade students participate in "Picture Memory" (one of the most difficult contests, I think).. They are given 40 pictures to study, and must be able to spell and write the name of the artist, the nationality, and the name of the picture correctly and in a certain order. Misplaced commas are counted errors.

Students in the second and third grades participate in Story Telling. They listen to a story told to htem for the first time at the contest. Then, to the best of their memory, they re-tell the story in front of a panel of judges and an audience. The students who re-call the most facts and table of events in the story place the highest in the contest

An the list goes on and on and n there' and much more in high schoolther's shorthand, typing, headline writing, editorial writing, feature writing...and probably one day soon, computer programming.

I think we should take our hats off to our youngsters for showing so well in the district contest. Many of the schools make this contest their big event of the year. They begin practicing on some of these events from the day school begins, gearing up for this particular contest.

Our students and teachers work hard at their contest in a much shorter time frame, and represent our school quite well.




The Hon. Frank P. Greever, Judge of the 31st Judicial District, was shot to death at Lefors Friday at the noon hour by A.E. Humes, who residence was in Oklahoma. Five shots were fired at the Judge, four of which took effect and he passed away in a few hours after all that medical skill could offer was done. The assasin, after his victim had fallen mortally wounded, turned the weapon, a thirty-eight calibur revolver, on himself and pulled the trigger several times, but there was no explosion as there were no more loads in the gun. He hurried to the sheds nearby and reloaded his pistol, taking his own life with a bullet through the brain.
